everybody. I'm Council Member Stephen Levin, chair of the City Council General Welfare Committee. This morning we're going to be -- just doing my best Greenfield impression. Alright, this morning we are going to be [laughter] going to vote on two pieces of legislation intended to increase the amount of transparency and information available on essential services in the DHS shelter system -- Proposed Intro 929-A, sponsored by Council Member Johnson, in relation to requiring information on medical health services in shelters and Intro 932-A, which I have sponsored in relation to requiring information on mental health services in shelters.

part hearing to discuss the medial and mental health needs of the adults and children living in the DHS shelter system and those living on the street. At those hearing we discussed with the Administration, health care providers, shelter providers, and advocates about the significant health and mental

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health needs of adults and children living in the shelters and sleeping on the street, in safe havens, and in drop-in centers. At those hearings we heard how services are not provided uniformly across the system, and depending on where an individual or family is placed, their level of service may range from full on-site clinic to simply a referral to an off-site provider.

Intro 932, along with Intro 929, will provide the policymakers, advocates, heath care professionals, and the public with critical information about the services we are providing to a population that has experienced significant trauma. The bills would include information on the types of mental health services that are available across the system, the most common mental health issues among both children and families in the shelter system, and the services provided to those individuals living on the street.

While these bills are only a first step in understanding the scope of this issue and more work is needed to improve the system, it is critical that we understand what our system is doing to meet

the needs of the 60,000 individuals that are served each night.

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And so I'd like to thank the staff of the General Welfare Committee -- Andrea Vazquez, Senior Counsel; Tonya Cyrus, Senior Policy Analyst; Finance Analyst Nameera Nuzhat; and [inaudible] Ward, Legal Fellow -- for working on this legislation, as well as Dohini Sompura, the Unit Head. I'd also like to thank my Chief of Staff, Jonathan Boucher and Budget Director Ed Paulino, and now I'd like to turn it over to my colleague Corey Johnson to say a few words about the bill that he is sponsoring.

Mr. Chair. Homelessness is one of the most pressing and heartbreaking issues of our time; the crisis we're facing with over 60,000 people sleeping in our shelter system, 24,000 of whom are children, requires us to address both the short-term problems we face on a daily basis and the larger systematic issues behind them.

The need for this legislation arises from the startling lack of data regarding the health needs of our city's homeless population and the services available to them. It's impossible to address the

health issues facing our most vulnerable citizens if
we don't know what those issues are and the current
efforts we're undertaking to address them. If we're
gonna do right by this population and address
homelessness, we need a better understanding of the
services currently available and where there may be
gaps. With the passage of this bill we will have the
information necessary to identify and supplement
lacking services as well as address the systematic
issues that exacerbate the most frequent chronic
conditions homeless individuals face. This
information includes the number of shelters with on-
site services, the health services available at
intake facilities, and the availability of health
services to the unsheltered population. We have a
responsibility to safeguard the health and safety of
our most vulnerable New Yorkers; that is a promise
our city made to these folks and that is a promise
that we will keep. This legislation is an important
step in this endeavor.

I'd like to thank my good friend and the chair of this Committee, General Welfare Chair Steve
Levin for his leadership and for us doing this package of bills together, and my colleagues who were
