3 CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: We have a, a Reso to 4 vote on in the Veterans Committee. Is it here, this 5 is my opening. The Reso is mentioned in here? Okay, 6 but is it in my opening statement, do you know? Okay, alright, that's fine. Okay, good afternoon. I am 8 Council Member Eric Ulrich and I am the Chair of the 9 Veterans Committee, New York City Council Veterans 10 Committee. I would like to thank my Co-Chair today 11 Robert Cornegy for Co-Chairing this important 12 hearing, he is the Chair of the Committee on Small 13 Business and for holding this hearing with us today 14 and thank those who are in attendance at today's 15 hearing. Before I begin with the... my opening 16 statement or proceed with my opening statement I'd like to ask for a moment of silence to remember the 17 18 seven American Sailors who were recently killed in 19 that crash aboard a Navy ship who lost their lives 20 and asked for just few moments if we can remember 21 them. Thank you. This afternoon's hearing will focus 22 on veteran entrepreneurship and veteran employment in 23 New York City and the ways in which we as a city can 24 promote and support veteran owned businesses and help 25 veterans secure employment and jobs in our city. We

will also be voting on a Resolution that establishes
June 22 <sup>nd</sup> as Veterans Tribute and Advocacy Day in New
York City, which was sponsored by Council Member
Eugene, the former Chair of this committee and
hearing a package of bills sponsored by the Chair of
the Small Business Committee, Robert Cornegy in
relation to small businesses. Veterans have a long
history of returning home from their service and
starting their own business, almost, almost 50
percent of World War II veterans owned and operated
their own businesses after leaving military service.
In recent years however the percentage of veteran
owned businesses has declined. As of 2013 only 4.8
percent of new entrepreneurs were veterans. The city
provides programs and support for veteran owned small
businesses but veterans may be unaware of these
programs or in some instances there may be other
hurdles to veteran entrepreneurship or getting a
business up and running. In addition to veteran
entrepreneurship today's hearing will also focus on
the general theme of veteran employment throughout
the five boroughs which continues to be a challenge
in the city. Unemployment rates for veterans in
Brooklyn, Queens, and Manhattan are higher than the

unemployment rate for the overall population or the
civilian population in those counties. In fact, many
veterans report that finding a job is the greatest
challenge in transitioning to civilian life and
veterans can often face stigma and discrimination
from employers as a result of their military service.
To that end I am pleased to report that on Monday,
yesterday the Civil Rights Committee passed Intro
1259A sponsored by Council Member Jumaane Williams
and the Public Advocate which seeks to amend the New
York City Human Rights Law to prohibit discrimination
on the basis of uniformed service. Discrimination
against veterans occurs most notably in the areas of
employment and housing accommodation. This important
legislation will provide veterans with legal recourse
to challenge discrimination and housing and
employment and other local level issues and allow
them another avenue to obtain relief when their
rights are violated or when they feel that they are
being discriminated against. Our hope is that this
hearing will help the committees understand the
different programs and support available to veterans
in the city who are interested in starting their own
businesses and understand the barriers that exist to

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veteran entrepreneurship and to try to break down
those barriers. This hearing will also help us
understand the obstacles to veteran employment and
how the city can help better support veterans with
their employment needs. I would like to thank the
committee staff; Committee Council Kaitlin Fahey,
Policy Analyst Michael Kurtz, the Financial Analyst
Zachary Harrison, my Legislative Director Mary
Prentice for their work in making this hearing
possible and I'd also like to recognize the members
of the committee who joined us and then $I^{\prime}ll$ turn it
over to the Chair of the Small Business Committee but
the members of the Veterans Committee who are here
Joe Borelli from Staten Island, Paul Vallone from
Queens, and that's it for now but I'm going to turn
it over to the Chair of the Small Business Committee
Council Member Cornegy who will recognize the members
of that committee who have joined us and also read an
opening statement.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you Chair Ulrich. So, good afternoon, I'm Robert Cornegy, I'm the Chair of the Committee on Small Business. I'd like to thank Chair Ulrich of the Veterans Committee for holding this hearing jointly with us and all of

2	you for attending our hearing today. We'll be hearing
3	a package of bills that I'm support I'm sponsoring
4	in order to support small businesses and build the
5	New York City workforce including Intro 1509, a local
6	law that requires the Commission on Small Business
7	Services to post business tools online. Intro 1511,
8	which will require the Commission on Small Business
9	Services to prepare and disseminate a, a state of
10	small business survey and Proposal Intro 1510A which
11	will require the Commissioner of Small Business
12	Services to create a comprehensive workforce
13	development plan based on the results of this state
14	of small business survey. We'll also be holding an
15	oversight hearing on the issue of veteran
16	entrepreneurship which was mentioned by Chair Ulrich
17	with a focus on the ways in which we can promote and
18	renew the proud tradition. Small businesses are the
19	life's blood of the city, not only do we have more
20	small businesses than any other city in the country
21	but nine out of every ten small businesses in New
22	York Metropolitan area has fewer than 20 employees
23	and two out of every three companies in New York City
24	employs less than five individuals. However, as we
25	all know mom and pop businesses in the city must

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often navigate complicated city regulations and pour
over city websites to find the information they need
in order to bring their products and services to
market. Today's hearing is another step in our
ongoing efforts to improve the climate for local
businesses. Each of the bills that we consider today
will allow businesses to engage in the capacity
building work that allows them to grow. Posting
online business tools that they otherwise might not
have access to such as accounting, record keeping,
and bookkeeping services can make it easier for local
businesses to run and grow their businesses more
quickly and easily than otherwise than they
otherwise would. Additionally, a well-designed
citywide survey of small businesses and a workforce
development plan based on the results of that survey
would give us both a clear picture of the needs of
our small businesses and a roadmap for how the city
can, can create a pipeline of highly skilled
individuals who can act as force multipliers for
tomorrows entrepreneurs. I'm looking forward to
hearing testimony about these bills and how they can
be developed to assist the small business community
in New York City. I also intend to understand how we

can better assist veterans during the job search
while starting a small business or while growing to
while working to grow that business. Finally, I'd
like to thank the committee staff; Council Nicole
Labean, Policy Analyst Michael Kurtz, Finance Analyst
John Russell, my Chief of Staff Stephanie Zimmerman,
and my Small Business Liaison Kegan Sheen. Finally,
I'd like to thank the Council Members who are from
the Committee who are here; Vallone from Queens is
here, oh Carlos Menchaca from Brooklyn and I'm sure
more will join us oh I'm sorry, Karen, did you just
curse out loud? Karen Koslowitz from Queens, Peter
Koo from Queens. Oh, Joe Borelli, he already
mentioned Joe Borelli, I didn't mention you but
[off-mic] dialogue] Ruben Wills from the great
borough of Queens. [off-mic dialogue] thank you.

COMMITTEE CLERK FAHEY: Please raise your right hand? Do you affirm to tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth in your testimony today and to answer Council Member questions honestly?

JAMAL OTHMAN: Yes.

COMMITTEE CLERK FAHEY: Thank you.

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COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: So, you can... you can begin, ladies first of course.

RACHEL VAN TOSH: Alright, there we go.

RACHEL VAN TOSH: Oh, thank you. can everyone hear me? Is it on now?

JAMAL OTHMAN: It's on now.

Good afternoon Chair Cornegy, Chair Ulrich when he gets back and members of the Committees on Small Business and Veterans. My name is Rachel Van Tosh and I am the Deputy Commissioner of Business Services at the New York City Department of Small Business Services or as we'd like to say SBS. At SBS we aim to unlock economic potential and create economic security for all New Yorkers by connecting them to quality jobs, building stronger businesses and fostering vibrant neighborhoods across the five boroughs. Today I'm pleased to testify on Intros 1509, 1510, and 1511 as well as share information about the work we do to support our veterans. On a personal note, our conversation today is especially important to me, both my grandfathers were veterans who lived in New York City and returned here after their service. When they returned home my grandfathers were able to find jobs and start

2	businesses after serving their country and that's how
3	they supported my family for the rest of their lives.
4	One was fortunate enough to attend a watchmaking
5	school through support from the government allowing
6	him to open a small jewelry shop on Canal Street that
7	he operated for 40 years at the same location. Just
8	as past veterans have returned home with the
9	necessary support to succeed my hope for every
10	veteran who returns home to New York City is that
11	they have every possible opportunity to build a
12	strong foundation for themselves and their families.
13	Veteran success and employment and entrepreneurship
14	is very important to SBS and aligns with our vision
15	of creating equity of access to opportunity in New
16	York City. At the beginning of this administration
17	SBS in partnership with the Mayor's Office of Veterar
18	Services now the Department of Veteran Services
19	released an extensive report on SBS services that
20	support and empower veterans. This includes priority
21	one, a tailored set of services for veterans and
22	their spouses available through our network of 20
23	workforce one career centers where SBS also provides
24	recruitment services, industry knowledge, and skill
25	building workshops to match candidates to jobs. SBS

has 12 dedicated veteran specialists most of whom are
veterans themselves at workforce one centers across
the city in every borough. These veteran specialists
work as a team to recruit veterans to workforce one,
prioritize veterans for staff appointments and all
career training and job connection services.
Specialists also deliver one on one career
development support which includes military to
civilian resume translation and interview assistance
We work closely with DVS and even have a DVS outreach
coordinator placed at our downtown Brooklyn location
In Fiscal Year '16 Priority One connected more than
1,300 veterans and their spouses to employment and
we're on track to serve as many veterans this year
and have seen a five percent increase as in wages
compared to last year. Workforce One is committed to
serving our veterans and is continually making every
effort to ensure our clients have access to good
paying jobs in fast growing industries. As I know
from my own family history small businesses provide
opportunities for veterans to achieve economic
security and create jobs. Through seven small
business solutions seven NYC Business Solution
Cantars across the five horoughs SBS provides free

2	accessible services to local businesses including how
3	to secure financing and access city benefits.
4	Understanding the unique barriers faced by veteran
5	entrepreneurs SBS offers specialized courses tailored
6	to veterans. For veterans who are looking to start
7	their own business we offer ten steps to starting a
8	business for veterans which builds upon our existing
9	course but also incorporates content for veteran
10	entrepreneurs. For veterans that are ready to follow
11	through with their business plan SBS offers a 40-hour
12	course specifically for them. And the curriculum
13	called fast track is a global entrepreneur education
14	program that equips aspiring and established
15	entrepreneurs with business skills and insights,
16	tools, and peer networks to start and grow successful
17	businesses, to date we've reached over 50 veterans
18	through these classes. As the Department of Veteran
19	Services continues to grow we are eager to
20	collaborate and connect the veteran's community to
21	these programs and our other services. We would also
22	welcome the opportunity to work with council to
23	spread the word about these resources to your
24	constituents. I will now discuss each of the bills on
25	today's agenda beginning with Intro 1511, which would

require SBS to prepare and disseminate a state of
small business survey. As the Deputy Commissioner for
Business Services I am committed to ensuring we're
providing services that directly address the needs of
New York City's small business owners. We regularly
receive feedback from customers who access service,
services through our business solution centers.
However, an empirical survey would help identify
additional obstacles that slow business growth and
creation. We would not only be interested in
assessing workforce needs but also other issues
related to operations, infrastructure and access to
capital. However, while SBS fully supports this
legislation we don't have the necessary resources to
complete the survey in a way that would produce
meaningful results and we would need some time to do
the survey. Intro 1510 would require SBS to create a
comprehensive workforce development plan based on the
survey. Since we do not yet know the results of the
survey it would be premature to commit to developing
a particular response to such, such as a
comprehensive workforce development plan at this
time. Instead we would propose engaging with the
council to discuss notential deliverables of the

2	survey based on analysis of the results once the
3	survey was completed. Intro 1509 would require SBS to
4	post business tools online. While we certainly agree
5	with the chair that its critical to make business
6	resources accessible that's why we committed to do so
7	through small business first. Since the release of
8	the Small Business First report, SBS is working
9	diligently with multiple agencies and businesses to
10	launch the NYC Business Portal, a one stop shop for
11	businesses to access all related city resources
12	through one portal. Recently we launched several
13	features on this site including a new landing page as
14	well as the ability to create an account from any
15	device so that users can access information regarding
16	their licenses, permits, and inspections with
17	agencies such as Department of Buildings, Fire, and
18	Health as well as pay for violations through Health.
19	The portal also includes licensing questionnaire, an
20	incentive estimator, which allow businesses to
21	identify the necessary licenses and permits that they
22	need when starting a business and learn about
23	incentive programs that they qualify for. Once the
24	portal is complete businesses will be able to
25	seamlessly conduct online transactions with city

agencies including applying for or renewing licenses
and permits, making payments, checking the status of
application, etcetera. Moreover, business owners will
be able to receive alerts about upcoming renewal
deadlines. We are also working with relevant city
agencies such as Consumer Affairs, Environmental
Protection, Department of Finance, etcetera to ensure
that information on this site is current and
accurate. Additionally, we recently created plain
language start up guides for 16 industries such as
retail construction and manufacturing. While we
support this legislation's goal of making business
information accessible and have been trying to do so
through our portal we must note that it poses
significant legal issues to connect commercial goods
or services or to promote or endorse particular
applications on city websites as required by this
bill. As you can see we do a lot for the job seekers
and small businesses of New York City but there's
always more to be done. We appreciate the council's
advocacy and attention to veteran employment and
entrepreneurship and look forward to continuing this
conversation with you. Jamal Othman will now provide
a brief testimony on the work of the Department of

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Veteran Services after which I'm happy to answer any questions. Thank you.

JAMAL OTHMAN: Thank you Chair. Good afternoon Chair Cornegy, Chair Ulrich in spirit and members of the Committee on Veterans and Committee on Small Business. My name is Jamal Othman and I have the privilege of serving as the Assistant Commissioner for City Employment, Education, Entrepreneurship Events and Engagement, it's a mouthful, of the New York City Department of Veteran Services. Thank you for the opportunity to meet and hear our testimony on Introduction 1509, 1510, 1511, and Resolution 1412 alongside my colleague Rachel Van Tosh, Deputy Commissioner of the New York City Department of Small Business Services. In my current role, I have the responsibility of leading the department citywide campaign to connect veterans and their families with employment opportunities, educational resources, financial services, and business opportunities. In fact, any resource they may be eligible as a result of their military service regardless of their discharge status. As a veteran of the Marine Corp myself I have a personal connection and vested interest in the economic prosperity of the

veteran's reserve because I am one of them. the
challenges of reintegrating into our communities
after military service is not a onetime life event,
it's a lifelong journey and at DVS we want to be part
of that veteran's journey all along the way including
increasing access to resources to our veteran
business community. DVS has always had a close
working relationship with our colleagues at SBS. DVS
regularly identifies veteran friendly businesses
committed to hiring veterans and ensure they're
connected to SBS for consideration as a supplier of
jobs to the Workforce One Career Centers. Our
community outreach coordinators regularly refer and
make warm handoffs to Workforce One Career Center
veteran specialists. And as Rachel mentioned DVS and
SBS recently launched a collaboration where one of
our outreach coordinators is hosted at a local
Workforce One Center working alongside a veteran
employment specialist. Currently we have an outreach
coordinator holding office hours at the downtown
Brooklyn Workforce One site where we have been
performing warm handoffs of veterans seeking
employment and workforce development opportunities.
The intention is creating a concerted holistic

approach to addressing the needs of New York City
veterans by both DVS and SBS. With regard to the
legislation being considered today DVS supports Intro
1511, which proposes to require small business
services to prepare and disseminate a state of small
business services. We believe one of the biggest
challenges we face as veteran service providers is
not knowing what we don't know. The results of such a
survey can help inform SBS and DVS to better provide
tailored programs and targeted part… particular unmet
needs in a data driven approach and DVS stands ready
to assist SBS in that endeavor. In relation to Intro
1510, which proposes to require small business
services to formulate a comprehensive workforce
development plan based on the results of the state of
small business survey we concur with SBS. We believe
it would be premature to identify programmatic
approaches until the results of such a survey
identifies gaps in services and community needs.
Intro 1509 proposes to require the Commissioner of
Small Business Services to post online business tools
on their website, we also concur with SBS. In fact,
DVS is currently revamping its website and planning
to roll out a dedicated landing page listing tools

and resources not only from SBS but also from other
federal, state, and city sources. The design and
content though will be consistent with advice
received on acceptable linking from NYC dot gov and
restrictions on endorsement of particular commercial
goods and services. Additionally, as we previously
testified [clears throat] excuse me DVS will be
launching VetConnect NYC, it's an online portal for
veterans and their families that provides a single
point of access no wrong door approach for veterans
to be connected to best in class vetted public and
private resources. VetConnect is in the procurement
phase and we expect to launch this fall. Finally,
Resolution 1412 would formally declare the date of
June 22 <sup>nd</sup> Veterans Tribute and Advocacy Day in New
York City. Nearing the culmination of the second
World War on June 22 <sup>nd</sup> , 1944 President Franklin
Delano Roosevelt signed the Serviceman's Readjustment
Act of 1944 more commonly known as the GI Bill into
law and I just may add that I am a product of the GI
Bill, I went to college and Graduate school on GI
Bill after separating from service and I wouldn't be
here today if it wasn't for the GI Bill but this
landmark piece of legislation quaranteed service

member benefits to pursue education, home ownership,
and vocational training to name a few. DVS supports
Resolution 1412 as this date represents a critical
milestone in our nation's history in acknowledging
the service and sacrifices of our veterans as well as
the stall work efforts of our veteran advocate
community which heavily influenced the passage of the
GI Bill. I want to thank you, the members of the
council and in particular the community whose
feedback we value. This concludes my testimony, I'd
be delighted to take questions at this point.
COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Before we move

forward I just want to say on behalf of myself, my family, the Committee on Small Business Mr. Othman I thank you for your service... [cross-talk]

JAMAL OTHMAN: Thank you sir... [crosstalk]

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: ...and I'd like for you to tell your grandfathers to both of them if they're still alive and still... and still around that we appreciate their service in all military endeavors.

RACHEL VAN TOSH: He was very excited to hear us testifying today.

COUNCIL MEMBER EUGENE: Thank you, good morning Mr. Chair, thank you... good afternoon everyone. As you know my name is Mathieu Eugene and I'm the Council Member representing District 40 in Brooklyn. First, I would like to thank my colleagues on the Veterans Committee and the Small Business Committee and especially the two Chairs, Council Member Eric Ulrich of the Veterans Committee and also Council Member Robert Cornegy of the Committee on Small Businesses for him and this very important Resolution to declare June 22<sup>nd</sup> Veterans Tribute and Advocacy Day in New York City. Resolution 1412 proposes that that Veteran Tribute and Advocacy Day to be held on the anniversary of the day that the, the President Franklin Delano Roosevelt signed the GI

Bill of Right into law creating a modern system of
benefits for veterans. My intention with Veteran
Tribute and Advocacy Day is not only to set up with
the service and sacrifices of our veterans but to
take this day as an opportunity to advocate for
better resources for veterans who are returning to
civilian life. Veterans of, of all ages face a wide
range of challenges, health problems, mental health
problems, difficulties adjusting to family and
civilian life and more. And I think it is right to
take a the anniversary of the GI Bill to advocate
for better services and resources for those who have
given so much to serve our country. I would like to
thank the Chair, my colleague Eric, Eric Ulrich as
well as all the members of the committee, all the
staff especially Michael Kurtz and also my own staff
and I would like also to take the opportunity to
thank all the veterans of all ages for what they,
they have done for us, for all of us for this country
for putting their life in dangers to defend our
democracy and our freedom and you made the utmost
sacrifices and I think we owe you a great deal of
gratitude on behalf of everybody and on my behalf
thank you so very much for what you have done for

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Thank you. Thank you
very much, thank you. I'm going to turn it back over
to Chair Cornegy and I want to apologize for having
to step out for your testimony, I'm on the
Environmental Protection Committee, we're voting on a
bill upstairs so I had to… I had to shoot up there
and I just came back down but I'm, I'm actively
reading your testimony I'll have some very good
questions in just a few minutes but I'll let my Co-
Chair take it from here.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you CoChair Ulrich. So, I'm acutely aware that some of my
colleagues have other responsibilities so I am going
to do something unprecedented and forego my usual
lengthy round of questioning and allow my colleagues
who may or may not have any questions to offer those
questions now. Council Member Wills, take, take your
time.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLS: I'm excited, this has never happened before that some, some... someone gave up speaking time, its... I was going to tell you a couple other Chairs that should learn from this but we're going to leave that alone. Good afternoon, thank you Chairs for foregoing that minute because

some of us do have to leave, I appreciate it
tremendously. I just had a couple of quick questions,
I went over it with the staff this morning. In the
briefing paper it discussed the drop off of the
veterans that were actually becoming entrepreneurs
from World War II and Korean vets at 41.1 percent and
then in 2003 it dropped to 2.2 percent of new
entrepreneurs by veterans and in 2013 it dropped to
4.8 percent do we know why there's such a sharp
decline in and I think the, the new it's new to me
the term that was coined as veteran, veteran
entrepreneurship?

JAMAL OTHMAN: My, my... I don't have any reason why that would... we had the drop-off, I mean it could be multiple speculated reasons... [cross-talk]

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLS: Uh-huh... [cross-

talk]

JAMAL OTHMAN: ...but I, I honestly don't know.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLS: I mean you can speculate, I mean is it... I mean I, I don't understand it because it seems like with all of the new programs that we have not just in New York City being the leader of it thanks to the leadership of our

committee chairs small business and veterans and some
other people, of course the state, I got to give some
state folks some credit also but it would seem that
we would have more veterans as entrepreneurs, right,
so I'm wondering why, I mean we are in a tech the
technology driven economy and different things like
that so do you have any speculation as to why that
dropped off to better help us, I know you said you
needed more resources to do certain things but we
need to find out why the veterans are not becoming
the entrepreneurs that we wished them to be?

JAMAL OTHMAN: Again I have no data to back this up off the top of my head what I would say is that since World War II you've been seeing a lot more veterans attend college and enter the, the mainstream job market, that could potentially be one of the reasons again I'm speculating.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLS: Okay... [cross-talk]

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2 RACHEL VAN TOSH: The chambers are
3 trained in all of the services that we provide which
4 includes our services for veterans and since we have
5 launched that program we have reached more than 5,000
6 businesses and connected nearly 1,500 of them to our
7 services. So, we think it's been very successful.

reached any aspirational marks, anything with that with the Chamber on the Go and veteran services, things that we would like to see or pull into the veteran's services citywide?

RACHEL VAN TOSH: Yeah, that's a good question I think that we've now successfully implemented two years of this service so this would be a really good point to work with our colleagues at DVS and see if there are some ways that we can make even stronger connections there.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLS: Okay, thank you. I don't want to take up more time than I should, thank you very much.

RACHEL VAN TOSH: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Thank you. That was... that was very short, I'm very appreciative, thank you. Do any other members of the Veterans Committee,

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I think Maisel and Vallone had to leave, there are
several other committees that are meeting
simultaneously so people are really in and out on the
16 <sup>th</sup> floor and here on 14. I didn't get a chance to
listen to your testimony but I did get a chance to
read it and I want to thank you for being here
representing Commissioner Sutton and the agency which
we fought very hard to create and we know how
important the work is that we're doing together to
help veterans. I have a question about the Workforce
One Centers and this came up at the hearing about two
years ago when we had the first hearing on veteran
entrepreneurship, we had heard some unfortunate
negative feedback from some actual veterans who came
that day to testify about some bad experiences that
they had at Workforce One Centers and I know that at
the time MOVO was looking into improving the customer
service and the accessibility of the veterans liaison
that is assigned to the Workforce One Center in each
borough and I'm just wondering if you have an update
on that, is DVS actively involved in training or
supervising any of those workers even though they
technically work for SBS and in, in the Workforce
One Centers, are they accountable in any way to the

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2 new department or to Commissioner Sutton maybe you 3 can shed some light on that?

JAMAL OTHMAN: Thank you for the question Chair Ulrich. So, as you know we, we... one of our committed milestones when the agency was created was to establish citywide precedence and I'm proud to announce that just before Memorial Day we accomplished that and we have satellite sites in all five boroughs and we have outreach coordinators in each borough. Each outreach coordinator in each respective borough works with the veteran specialist in that respective borough with the veteran employment specialist so you, you have... you have a close working relationship with each, each of these individuals. I'm going to use the Brooklyn site as an example where we currently have one of our outreach coordinators imbedded in the Workforce One site and what we're finding is that when you have a veteran employment specialist and, and an outreach coordinator that, you know specializes on assisting veterans with a whole host of resources and there are a couple of cubicles away from each other great things happen and what we're seeing is... you know ... you know people like to say warm handoffs, you know this

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is... these are... these are hot out of the oven, you know sort of transfers that are happening, veteran's right there, you could get immediate access to, to resources and services. So, what you've seen since the creation of DVS and since the establishment of the borough site is a much closer relationship between the Workforce One sites where there's a veteran employment specialist and our outreach coordinators.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: I think that's very important Chair and you know for veterans who felt that they were getting the run around prior to this marriage if you will between the two agencies I think it's very important that they work closely together to make sure that when referrals are made that they are made in kind and that they are obviously followed through somehow. There's some people that I, I know Workforce One Centers can't help, you know that there are... there are other issues involved and we won't get into those issues today but for the ones that we can I think it's really important especially in light of the fact that the employment rate among veterans in parts of the city like Brooklyn and Queens are higher than the civilian population, that's very disturbing

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to me. Are we helping formally homeless veterans, I
know we helped them with getting permanent housing
and the administration has done a yeoman's job in
actually eliminating chronic veteran's homelessness
in the city but are we helping them with job
training, are we getting them jobs, it's nice that
we're getting them into apartments and out of the
shelter system but what are we doing for those
veterans to get them jobs, do we have an update on
that DVS or, or SBS, anybody want to talk on that?

JAMAL OTHMAN: I'd be happy to add something to that. So, so, so as you mentioned... you... as you mentioned the city and, and, and DVS has... had made some great strides in reducing veteran among the homeless around veterans we have on staff an act of care coordinator because we recognize that it's just not about making sure that veterans are housed, we want to ensure that we have low recidivism rates so that's number one. I think number two is we're now in a place through our outreach coordinators and through our connection through SBS to again ensure that formally homeless veterans have access and get front of the line services at SBS Workforce One sites. Additionally, you know we explore all employment

avenues for all veterans, in particular for homeless
veterans so there may be a service provider that we
have partnered with that we that may, may take on a
case with one of our homeless, formally homeless
veterans. Additionally, the city the city of New
York is many people may not know this is actually
the largest employer of veterans in New York City, we
have about roughly eight to 10,000 veterans and
reservists working for the city of New York and
public service has historically been an avenue for
many separating service members and we want to make
sure that New York City continues that tradition so
we're also exploring avenues working with DCAS Civil
Service to ensure that veterans who get special
consideration, you know civil service credit have
access to those benefits including homeless veterans.

RACHEL VAN TOSH: And I will add that through the Workforce One System we do and priority, we do try to meet veterans where they're at so if they're not ready to be connected to employment we will connect them to wraparound services, we will work with them on building their resume, interview skills, we will work to connect them with appropriate trainings, and they receive first priority, first

place in the line for any of those services. So,

there's no, no wrong door you could come in... [cross-

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CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: That's really great news and I think we've come a long way from that first hearing where we were very concerned about how veterans were being treated in Workforce One Centers. My last question then I'll... I'm going to turn it back over to my Co-Chair is involving the set aside, you know Governor Cuomo announced a couple of years ago, I think it's a six percent set aside for procurement for state contracts for veterans and I believe that the city of New York, the administration was opposed to that idea of doing it on the city level at the time because we weren't actually sure what percentage of procurements was already being done with veterans and so the city said that they were going to add a question I believe to the GSA or something, it was a ... [cross-talk]

the newly created Mayor's Office of MWBE and DVS on

thinking through whether that makes sense at this
point. We did, you know allow for a checkmark sort of
in PIP around this and so far only 200 actually a
little over 200 businesses have signed up so it's
something we will continue to explore and talk
through and I think that, you know we're happy to
work with DVS and the Mayor's Office of MWBE on any
ways of expanding procurement opportunities for
veterans and we haven't waited to have a program in
order to provide them a whole range of capacity
building services in order for them to access city,
state, and federal contracts. So, while I think it's
important it's certainly not the only way that we can
support veteran business owners in contracting with
the city.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Thank you again for your testimony and of course for all your good work helping veterans in the city. Thank you Co-Chair...

RACHEL VAN TOSH: Thank you.

JAMAL OTHMAN: Thank you Chair.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you CoChair Ulrich I just wanted to ask, you know there's
some anecdotal information that suggests that
veterans, the transferable skills of service are more

suited for entrepreneurship than, than actual jobs,
what has been your experience with that anecdotal
kind of suggestion, do you do you support that idea,
do you think that it you know I'm just curious as to
what your expertise lends to, to that notion?

JAMAL OTHMAN: I, I... it... in working with veterans for, for the last 20 years what I've... what I've seen is a mix, right, I've seen the entrepreneurial spirit and that could be demonstrated in a... in a multiple of different ways, it could be by starting a business or it could be by showing a certain type of initiative at, at the... at the work place. I like to think that I'm entrepreneur at work so I've seen sort of a mix there. The, the spirit is there and it's just displayed in different ways.

that because I kind of got a sense that, that maybe what you're thinking and I wanted to make sure that we're supporting the notion that there may be some nontraditional opportunities for service members transitioning that we should be not only exploring but having resources ready available to assist in that area so its... you know it's kind of to some degree unchartered waters... [cross-talk]

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JAMAL OTHMAN: Yeah... [cross-talk]

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COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: ...as, as a mass idea and there are just so many technologically, technology driven industries that support service members and, and their transferable skills that I don't want to not only miss the boat on any opportunity that could be supportive of those service members so I'd like to continue to have that conversation and see how we as a council and how the Small Business Committee in particular can be supportive of a notion of a greater emphasis on entrepreneurship.

RACHEL VAN TOSH: I will say for the programs that we run that are tailored to entrepreneurs what we see is that most veterans come in with, you know a strong commitment to excellence and attention to detail and very high levels of strategic planning skills which are all extremely applicable to entrepreneurship so a lot of the tailoring of the curriculum that we run for businesses talk about how to translate that skill that you get in the military to planning a business. So, I think your words certainly make sense and resonate with our experience as well.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you, so

Senator Perkins... Council Member Perkins do you have

any questions? So, I'm going to move to the

legislative portion of today at this time and at the

First one, one that includes the comprehensive

business portal?

RACHEL VAN TOSH: So, we have continued to make updates to the portal and I'd like to think that our work is never done in fully rolling something like that out. As I mentioned we have a new interface, we have new abilities for individuals to access their unique permit and licensing information, they now have the ability to conduct transactions

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online with agencies like the Department of Health and really have one place where they can go to get information from all of the different agencies. So, we will continue to roll out new versions of that as information becomes available but we've certainly made good progress so far.

are... so I don't know if I heard you say that there's currently online business tools available for small businesses via the portal, the portal right now today?

RACHEL VAN TOSH: So, I think for, for that bill we certainly support it in spirit, I think the problem is with how its written there's some issues from our legal counsel around recommending specific commercial tools like QuickBooks and linking them on this site so while we support the idea of information about how to use tools like that, information on city services that direct connection to specific commercial products would be difficult for us.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: So, is the difficulty in choosing specific products to highlight or is it in... because if there's an array and

RACHEL VAN TOSH: I think that it would really depend on what scope we ended up going with and our desire to get a broad representative range of business owners in the city which I think we would want. I'm not a statistician so I would defer to somebody with expertise on that to the exact number of businesses surveyed given what potential cost might be and timeline, it could take I, I think up to a year maybe to roll something out but I, I wouldn't anticipate much more than that.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Does, does SBS currently have the capacity, I think you asked...

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answered this in almost an ask of resources but I'm going to ask the question anyway, does SBS currently have the capacity to create and disseminate this survey?

RACHEL VAN TOSH: I think if we wanted to do a large scale comprehensive survey again pending the exact scope we would need additional resources.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: I think you should know and you should articulate to Greg that it is never my... I'm sorry, Commissioner Bishop it is never my intention to emendate this office which is doing tremendous work... [cross-talk]

RACHEL VAN TOSH: Uh-huh... [cross-talk] COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: ...and I, I... [cross-talk]

RACHEL VAN TOSH: ...thank you... [crosstalk]

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: ...don't want you to think that I'm somewhere just thinking up crazy stuff for SBS to do, most of... most of the things that I've attempted to implement have been informed by a meeting with business owners in groups in... you know so it... it's not... it's not me just trying to come up with things...

RACHEL VAN TOSH: We support 1509, we think a broad comprehensive survey of business owners could really benefit our work so I thank you for proposing.

have any idea kind of broadly what information would be most helpful to gather from small businesses with, with an intent on helping to build capacity like because that's my intent not just information for the sake of information but to move us in a direction that we can truly be supportive of businesses and I, I believe I heard you say meeting... or that was you who said meeting either veterans or businesses where they are is, is the total intent of this legislation and I think anything that's come out of this committee so...

RACHEL VAN TOSH: Absolutely and the vision sort of mission of SBS is equity of access to opportunity for everybody in the city so I think what we would want to look at are the unique barriers, the unique barriers that businesses face across the city in accessing capital, in building business skills and things like that.

RACHEL VAN TOSH: I think there are some specific recommendations in the report around new ways to do work, workforce development like apprentice NYC in the report so hopefully it will move us, you know further along in exploring new ways to support people in accessing employment in the city.

I got to get this... the source again but it was a reliable... trust me it was a reliable source, that said if we as a city help build capacity in every small business... [cross-talk]

of New York in an effort that they could hire one

more person we would actually decrease unemployment

by 50 percent in over... in under five years, to me

just hire one more employee it would be better than
any goals that we're attempting to set in any other

through programs like customized training and on the	
job training so we have a robust set of services I	
think to support small businesses in helping to find	
talent and build their talent base and through all o	f
the work we do through business solutions and the	
variety of other programs that we offer we work to	
grow business owners so I'm completely supportive of

21	but we can target it very easily. I'm, I'm, I'm in
22	contact with small businesses every single day and a
23	lot of them would love access to capital but actually
24	the majority would love access to technical
25	assistance whether its whether it's you know how to

9	sounds like you're doing a little bit of that alread
10	but I'd like to explore how we can quantify what's
11	happening organically.

I'm Avi Leshes, I'm the Director of Government Affairs and Deputy Director of the Business Solution Center for the Chamber... Brooklyn Chamber of Commerce. With over 2,500... 2,100 active members the Brooklyn Chamber is the largest chamber of New York, we promote economic development across the borough of Brooklyn as well as advocate on behalf of our members who are small businesses. The Brooklyn Alliance which is a not for profit economic development affiliated of the Brooklyn Chamber which works to address the needs of businesses to their like business programs. The Brooklyn Chamber is generally supportive of Intro

1509 which seeks to further enhance the current
accessibility and organization of online business
tools on New York City's small business services
website. We are optimistic that the Committee of New
York City's Small Business Services can work together
to implement and enhance over time which will create
additional benefits to small businesses that utilize
such online functions. We are also supportive of
Intro 1511 which would initiate data collection of
New York City's Small Businesses Services for
analysis as it relates to Workforce needs of small
businesses and also Intro 1510 which would help this
agency to create a comprehensive workforce
development plan based on the results of the said
survey. In the 2016 state member issue survey 52
percent of participants indicated that they plan to
hire one to five new employees in 2017 so obviously
back to your comment about hiring new employees our
small businesses are saying that they want to hire
between one and five new employees so that's
definitely a, a goal that would could achieve. So,
I'm not going to go through the whole thing and
basically the, the… Brooklyn is home to New York
City's only remaining active duty military base. Fort

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Hamilton, the Fort has been in existence for almost 200 years and its economic and cultural impact of Southern Brooklyn is still significant today, we highly recommend to focus initiative between Fort Hamilton and the Veteran entrepreneurs such as what's going on in NYU, LIU and other incubators to workers to include but not be limited to training, mentoring, technology, access upon their discharge. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

was assigned to the Yokosuka Naval base in Japan where unfortunately there, there was a recent incident of seven sailors. There's been some discussion today about the issue of homelessness, shelters, and jobs I'm actually in a shelter for veterans in the Bronx and with regards to remarks that the Mayor made on Veterans Day last year in Madison Square Park across the street from Credit Suisse where I used to work. I have a transcript of his remarks and let me just briefly read to you two key remarks he made. Quote, unquote "anyone who has a job that they're looking to fill, fill it with a veteran", next remark, "when you hire a veteran I quarantee you you'll not only be doing the right

2	thing, you'll be doing yourself a favor because
3	they're that good". The problem with his remarks is
4	these are 12 jobs with New York City Government
5	Agencies I've applied for, I'm fully qualified for
6	them, I haven't been granted a single interview for
7	any of them. So, the question is, how do you rectify
8	his remarks with the actual practices in play. Next
9	question is one of those jobs well one of those jobs
10	I applied for was actually with the Mayor's Office as
11	a help desk analysis, a job I previously held, I
12	reached out to Harold Miller who's on his staff, I
13	asked him if there's anything he could do to
14	intervene to see if I could be granted an interview
15	and then have a decision made on merits as to whether
16	to grant me that job or to deny it, again I reached
17	out to his own staff, there was no interview. So, I
18	guess the question that I have for your Commission is
19	what will your commission do to have me granted job
20	interviews with New York City Government Agencies I'm
21	fully qualified for and applied for. Let me move on
22	to the next question, with regards to that oath that
23	we all took when we enlisted in the military to
24	protect something called the constitution against all
25	enemies both foreign and domestic without an

2	expiration date and without any exceptions, if the
3	Mayor's head of security Howard Redman whose
4	currently a defendant in a federal civil rights
5	lawsuit kept me out of a town hall meeting on April
6	27 <sup>th</sup> in Long Island City, if he's still on his
7	security team security team, team violating a US
8	Supreme Court decision in Wood versus Moss as well as
9	the New York State Open Meetings Law again what will
10	your commission do to allow me to attend a public
11	meeting where I'm essentially trying to ask these
12	commissioners of government agencies why am I not be
13	granted an interview and how can you help the 66 year
14	old lady in Rego Park whose… a slum lord that I
15	previously beat in court is trying to evict, I mean
16	with regards to HHR it has its office of, of Civil
17	Justice that perhaps Mr. Ulrich is familiar with, I
18	asked Steven Banks on March 1 <sup>st</sup> at the Yale Club face
19	to face, gave him about five to six court transcripts
20	if you could get me legal assistance, legal
21	representation, he told me at the time he would, he
22	tried to get me some legal help, the problem is he
23	lied, that never happened. I followed up with him at
24	numerous public events about that very question, that
25	very issue again he lied. His wife is actually the

supervising judge of the Housing Court citywide so
the question is if Judge Clifton Nembhard of the
Queens Housing Court was in my apartment in Queens in
Jackson Heights on July 10 <sup>th</sup> of 2015 while I was
recording him on audio to determine whether if there
a fraudulent inspection conducted in my apartment
when the judge was present with two court officers, I
could then use that information on appeal. If those
two court officers told me to shut off that audio
recording in violation of a 2014 California federal
court decision that basically says if a government
officer enters your residence you have the first
amendment due process right to record those officers
as long as you don't interfere, interfere with the
performance of their public duties then where's the
legal assistance been to let me overcome that
judicial misconduct that caused me to be unlawfully
evicted from my residence in Jackson Heights. I
should follow up on that point by it would it would
seem that Mr. Banks has a clear conflict of interest
on one hand, the mandate of his agency is to try to
stop or otherwise reduce evictions, on the… on the
other hand his wife is failing to supervise
subordinate judges such that veterans like myself

2	have to become a homeless only because of the fact
3	that a judge illegally prevented me from presenting
4	audio recordings, video recordings in court after he
5	initially said he would let me present those
6	recordings which then caused me to have absolutely no
7	defense in that litigation. Let me I don't mean to
8	dominate your time but I'm just going to try to be
9	brief. Okay, that okay, with regards to the root
10	cause of what caused me to become homeless in the
11	first place is there's a company I used to do
12	business with, worked for five years ago at Credit
13	Suisse, it's an IT outsourcing company it's called
14	Entity Data, the problem is HRA, the New York State
15	Attorney General's Office, the Department of
16	Education they all have contracts with this company
17	so if Credit Suisse illegally coerced me to work 50
18	hours per week, five years ago and I only got paid 40
19	hours in violation of the contract that applied then
20	why in the hell is HRA all these New York City
21	Government Agencies doing business with the same
22	company I'm still waiting to be paid from, I mean if
23	you… if it were you and you weren't getting your
24	compensation for the job that you're doing, week in
25	and week out, day in and day out that would have

severe ramifications upon with regards to your
ability to pay your bills. So, again with regards to
there was a discussion earlier about procurement so
if New York City is procuring services from vendors
that are violating labor law that are currently a
defendant in a separate what Eastern District Court
case where involving both TD Bank and Entity Data it
involves a compliance manager who got into a car
accident, she asked for reasonable accommodation
because they didn't grant that reasonable
accommodation she was retaliated against and
terminated. So, if Entity Data is a defendant in that
same lawsuit it's not related to me basically if
they're discriminating if they're violating labor law
and people like myself unfortunately that compliance
manager is at a loss because of their unlawful
conduct. Again, why is the city of New York doing
business with that company.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Okay, Mr. Komatsu, right?

22 KOMATSU: Yeah.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Is that correct?

First of all, I want to thank you for your service,

my grandfather's a Navy veteran, was, he passed away,

served on the USS America, that ship has been
decommissioned but I have profound respect and
admiration for our sailors, all the members of our
armed services but particularly I have a soft spot in
my heart for, for a Navy man and my brother's a
Marine which is technically part of the Navy, I like
to remind him of that, it drives him nuts sometimes
but he's in Camp Pendleton right now but thank you
for your service, thank you for coming here to
testify. You brought up a lot of first of all it
takes a lot of courage to come here, it takes a lot
out of your day and time to even come here and get up
and say the things that you've said so I want to
thank you for that and let you know that that is not
falling on deaf ears, it sounds to me and I'm not
trying to generalize your remarks but it sounds like
it to me that you have a number of legal issues that
you need legal assistance with and the council you
may be aware recently provided a significant grant to
NYLAG, the New York Legal Assistance Group and also
the, the person there is David Falcon, F a l c o n, I
can give you his contact information

KOMATSU: I reached out to them, they refused to provide assistance.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Okay, the other group that we fund is Legal Services NYC...

KOMATSU: I did that too ...

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: And did you speak to Peter Kempner?

KOMATSU: ...basically... [cross-talk]

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: I'd like to put you in touch with him, he's actually a housing specialist.

KOMATSU: I think I reached out to him
and again... [cross-talk]

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Well I... if I can I'd like to reach out to him on your behalf, I'd like to call him in advance to say you're going to hear from Mr. Komatsu and I want you to meet with him or take his call and just sort of try to sort some of these things out for him. So, I personally would be very happy to make that call so that you're not cold calling him and he doesn't say who is this guy calling me about all these issues, I'd like to give him a, a heads up that you're going to call and if I can after the hearing get your contact information. I'm sorry to hear that you've found yourself in the shelter system, I want to let you know that it can

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happen to anybody; people fall on hard times, they
lose their jobs, things happen in life for whatever
reason and you're up in the Bronx in the are you
are you in the in the, the [cross-talk]

KOMATSU: With Urban Pathways which did a bait and switch that let to me getting assaulted after an attempted assault on May 12<sup>th</sup>. I brought that to HRA's attention, they failed to act as a result I was diagnosed with a concussion on July 2<sup>nd</sup> of last year.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Well I mean anyone...

do, do you avail yourself of the services at the VA

KOMATSU: They told me they can't help, they can only help with veteran's issues... [cross-talk]

comes before this committee we don't put a time limit on them, I don't... I mean unless we have hundreds of them, we appreciate your service and we want to help you and for you to come here today I think takes a lot of courage and I want to let you know we're going to do what we can.

KOMATSU: Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON ULRICH: Thank you, thank you Co-Chair, thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Thank you Mr. Komatsu.

KRISTEN ROUSE: Good afternoon and I... I'd like to start my testimony by, by seconding the recommendations made by Councilman Ulrich to as my brother veteran that there are free legal services available for low income New Yorkers and we do receive a hiring preference in civil service positions in New York City and New York State and thank you for offering this help to, to a fellow veteran. My name is Kristen Rouse, I served for more than 20 years of combined service in the United States Army, Army Reserve, and the New York National Guard which included three tours of duty in Afghanistan. I'm here today to testify on behalf of

the New York City Veterans Alliance, a member
supported grass roots policy advocacy and empowerment
organization serving veterans, service members and
their families across the New York Metro area. I'm
also the President and Director of the New York City
Veterans Alliance which is a corporation registered
in New York State which technically makes me a
business entrepreneur. We applaud this joint hearing
for considering the needs of veteran entrepreneurs
and business owners in New York City. Veteran
business owners have not received significant public
attention from the New York City government since
2014 when SBS and MOVO jointly produced a report
concluding that there should be no focus program for
veteran owned businesses and city contracting. The
report surveyed only a small pool of veteran owned
businesses and as many of us noted at the time the
findings of that report were stunningly low even
going so far as to contradict a much higher number of
veteran entrepreneurs that had been counted in the
2007's United States census figures for New York City
but that report is what has stood since then as a bar
to making veteran owned businesses competitive for
city contracts, forcing veterans who seek lucrative

government contracts to seek eligibility instead for
federal and state contracting set asides in the
absence of a, a city set aside and with, with
reference to the training programs offered by SBS.
SBS has offered that the, the fast track training
program for veteran business owners but we've heard
from, from veterans that its offered during the day
time and which makes it difficult for employed
veterans to attend that, that training and
additionally outreach materials which are currently
difficult to find by navigating the DVS or SBS
websites as they are today simply do not inspire the
confidence of veterans that the course is worth there
wild. Veterans have instead turned a nonprofit or
academic ventures or they've started their own
ventures like Bunker Labs or NYU Tandems programs or
the, the other programs that Avi mentioned to launch
and incubate their business ideas and so we're seeing
a lot of a lot of proliferation and support within
the, the nonprofit and private sector and all the
while veterans seeking information about the city's
oldest entrepreneurial venture for veterans, street
vending still have to navigate murky regulatory
quidance between different city and state agencies

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just to determine how to attain a license let alone operate successfully so that, that information is still very difficult to find and clarify which is all to say that any workforce development plan or online business tools offered by New York City Government must include wording and materials specific to veterans and their needs as we've talked about here today to include eligibility for state and federal contracting set asides that currently exist. Any small business survey must seek to capture data on both disabled and non-disabled veterans which was not adequately surveyed in 2014 in order that the needs of veterans are, are adequately taken into account and addressed. I'd also like to just speak briefly about Workforce One, you know the, the integration between DVS and Workforce One has been encouraging but, but we hear anecdotally from veterans that many of the positions posted are you know earning below 15 dollars an hour and, and it's not seen as, as veteran job seekers as providing a lot of quality job opportunities, again that's anecdotal and, and the post that we see coming across our vet jobs lists are, are often of the lower wage, low skills, you know sort and so, so we encourage the city to, to

2	promote higher skilled, higher paying job
3	opportunities through, through Workforce One and, and
4	those portals. And furthermore, as Chairman Ulrich
5	mentioned at the outside of this hearing I want to
6	take this opportunity to encourage all members of New
7	York City Council to support the passage of Intro
8	1259 which does address, you know prohibiting
9	discrimination against veterans in employment
10	importantly as well as other aspects of you know
11	there, their life such as housing and, and so on. I
12	urge in particular Council Member's Maisel and
13	Cabrera members of the Veterans Committee to sign on
14	as co-sponsors of 1259 which they have not done yet.
15	I also urge Council Member Eugene who was present
16	earlier who, who sponsored this wonderful Resolution
17	honoring the passage of the GI Bill, we encourage him
18	to also support 1259 which will not only honor
