We're going to be voting on two bills today: Intro 407-A and Intro 1411-A. I'll say a word on each, but first we're going to be voting on a bill whose lead sponsor is the great Jimmy Vacca, Deputy Majority Leader. it had James-James Vacca. James Michael Vacca, Deputy Majority Leader, which addresses one of the issues, if not the single issue, which we have most been consumed by in this committee, which is the capital process, which is far too long, far too expensive, and also far to opaque, and Council Member Vacca rightly has focused his bill on the need for Council Members to understand when there are delays in capital projects in our district because being able to give accurate information to our constituents is of vital importance, and his bill would require notice within 30 days of any material delays in capital projects, and-and I am strongly in support of the bill, and I believe all of my colleagues are as well. We're also hearing Intro 1411-A, whose lead

sponsor it Council Member Joe Borelli, who could not be here today. We understand traffic from the Island is very bad. How this wasn't already in place as a rule decades ago I don't know, but we are pleased that Council Member Borelli has introduced this bill. going to pause and see if our Deputy Majority Leader James Michael Vacca would like to say a word or two on Intro 407-A.

the Council fund many capital projects because we want to make our neighborhoods better, but too often there are massive cost overruns, and especially when it comes to parks projects, and it can feel like we're allocating funds into a bottomless pit. reality is that our money is finite, and we can get discouraged from allocating funds to projects we know the community needs, and I speak to you as someone whose district has the largest park in the city, Pelham Bay Park, and I funded so many projects in my district in the 12 years I've served here. The Parks Department has a structured capital project process, and it usually takes years from the time we allocate our money until the time the project is completed. This project-process necessarily involves time to gather all the funds, design the project, select the contractor and then finally start construction. Unfortunately, this process often involves contractors' change orders, which can endlessly hold up construction. Delays in projects often create confusion in the community and are not transparent. We need accountability when it comes to the public's money, and my bill would increase transparency by requiring the Department of Parks to proactively
