CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Good afternoon and thank you everyone for attending to his hearing of the City Council Transportation Committee. name is Ydanis Rodriguez, and I am the Chair of the Committee. We are joined today by my colleague Council Members Garodnick, Vacca, Chin, Rose, Constantinides and Menchaca and my great friend and colleague Council Member Salamanca who also his bill will be voted in this committee today. First before I read my opening statement, we're also joined by our great colleague and leader in our city Council Member David Greenfield. Before opening-reading my opening statement, I want to welcome my Nephew Eric Janos (sic) Rodriguez who is visiting us from Orlando and like doing a two-week summer camp in D.C. Internship program now he's trying to learn as much as possible how we do policy in New York City. Today, we will be voting on three bill aim at-aimed at improving the safety and wellbeing of New Yorkers as well as adding transparency in communities across the city. To start, we will vote on Intro 7-671-A, which will require the DOT to install pedestrian countdown

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2 clocks at all intersections near schools and parks.

3 This bill introduced by Council Member Vallone will

4 provide a new layer of safety for kids hit heading to

5 and from school and their local parks. I'm proud to

6 support this bill, and I encourage a yes vote as we

7 | will be voting this together with the others.

Next, we will vote on Intro 1234-A introduced by Council Member Salamanca, which will require notice community—notice to community boards before meter parking is installed in the new neighborhood. This will provide greater transparency to decision making and allow for community input on metered parking. Council Member Salamanca will address this bill in a moment, and I also encourage a yes vote on this bill.

Finally, we will vote on Intro 1646-A introduced by myself and—and other council members, which will require all for-hire vehicle company to include a tipping option on whatever million (sic) riders choose to book a car. For a long time, some of the largest companies operating in our city did not include an ability for passengers to tip the drivers in the app they used to book their ride.

Meanwhile taking—I'm sorry—taxis and green cab drives

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have long enjoyed the ability to receive tips for their work on the passengers facing payment options using the taxi TV screens. Thanks for the others app services including Lyft have also employed this practice to the benefit of the drivers. This bill not only helps to bring parity to the industry, it helps to restore dignity to drives who have experienced a race to the bottom of the wage and working conditions in the industry. As a former livery driver myself, I know the value of earning a few extra dollars for-for every ride. This money soon stacks up and helps all those working to make a living and support their family. At the end of the day, we don't want driving a car in New York City to be a gate where workers are left to the whims of the We want to ensure that this remains a market. profession for all those who want to make a career out of driving a car and raising their family to be the next middle-class. With this law, we willensuring a new standard for the industry and become a model for the rest of the country on this measure. Drivers deserve the dignity of being able to earn a living through driving, and I'm proud to support this effort. I want to thank the Independent Drivers

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Guild, and—and all those who have pushed to make this a reality. I also want to thank the staff who worked on this bill, as well as my committee staff Counsel Faiza Malik; Policy Analyst Jonathan Masserano; and Emily Rooney. Finance Chima Obichere and Brandon—Brandon West as well as my staff Jose Lewis and Rosa Murphy, and Stephanie Milliano. I now would like to call my colleague Council Member Menchaca to speak about on his bill. I'm sorry, Salamanca.

[background comments] Yes, he's got my vote, too.

(sic) [laughter] Thank—thank—than you Mr. Chair for the opportunity and for the support. I wan to thank my colleagues as well. I just wanted to speak briefly. You know, this bill it's—it's a year in the making. Prior to be a Council Member I was a District Manager, and we saw many times when the city of New York, the Department of Transportation would just come up, would just pop up and install a muni meter without properly advising the local community board or the community as a whole. When I first became a Council Member, I experienced that as well where we did get notice about a muni meter being installed. I gave opposition. The Borough

Commissioner guaranteed me that that muni meter would
not be installed, but the following week, the muni
meter was installed. So, immediately I-I-we needed
to bring some type of transparency to this process,
and that's exactly what this bill does. It—it gives-
it requires that the Department of Transportation
properly notify the local community board and the
Council Members. Now, this bill does not give us
veto power, but it gives us an opportunity where if
requested, the Department of Transportation has to
come to that local community board, and make a formal
presentation, and recommendations will be put in, and
that gives the community the power or it gives them
the opportunity to object to the muni meter if—if
necessary. So, I urge my colleagues to please vote
in favor of this bill. Thank you. [pause]
CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: And I would now

like to call our Committee Clerk to call the roll, and I recommend a yes vote on all the bills.
