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3 CHAIRPERSON GENTILE: Good morning. Council Member Vincent Gentile Chair of the Committee 4 5 on Oversight and Investigations. We welcome you all 6 today. We are joined by committee members and Council Members Pill Perkins from Manhattan, from Queens 8 Daniel Dromm and Rory Lancman, and the sponsor of 9 119-B Jumaane, Council Member Jumaane Williams. I 10 welcome you all to the committee this morning. 11 are here today to vote on Proposed Intro 119-D, 12 sponsored by Council Member Williams, a bill that has 13 already been heard twice by this committee. First in 14 May of 2014 and again in June of 2015. The reality 15 is that lawsuits against the Police Department have 16 dramatically increased over the past decade. 17 According to a report by the Comptroller, the City 18 paid out over \$216 million in Fiscal Year 14 to 19 resolve claims involving the Police department. 20 existing practice in place is costing the city financially in part due to the lack of cross-checking 21 22 and comprehensive analysis by departments of multiple 23 data across many agencies and administrative units. 24 Currently, the Law Department, the Comptroller, the 25 Police Department, the Civilian Complaint Review

1 COMMITTEE ON OVERSIGHT AND INVESTIGATION 2 Board and the Commission to Combat Police Corruption 3 all collect information on police misconduct through 4 complaints in litigation claims. However, there is limited coordination and analysis on how to use this 5 information to improve police practices and ideally 6 7 reduce costs to the city. This bill does not make 8 information about individual police officers newly available. The reporting by the Law Department that this bill requires complies-compiles information that 10 11 is already public. The bill would require the 12 Inspector General for NYPD in consultation with the 13 Law Department, Police Department, Comptroller, CCRB 14 and CCPC to review the information on police 15 misconduct and develop recommendations to the disciplining or training or monitoring of police 16 17 officers. To facilitate this review, the Law 18 Department would be required to publish information 19 on civil actions every six months. This in essence is 20 a reporting bill, and has no negative intent. 21 Instead, by establishing the collaborative and 2.2 transparent system with appropriate timelines to 2.3 review information, Intro 119-B seeks the spot ways in which the Police Department can fine tune their 24

policies to help police officers possibly with better

and more relevant training. The bottom line of this proposed modus operandi is would be to use this formalized cooperation to evaluate the data already collected in order to improve police practices and to identify patterns to assist in the early intervention benefitting the department, civilians and New York City taxpayers. So, with that, I'd like to hand it off to Council Member Williams for his opening statement. So, thank you. Council Member Williams.

Chair. Intro 119 was introduced February 26, 2014.

As was mentioned, we had two hearings on this. We are now up to 119-D as in David. The bill will require an Inspector General for the Police

The PBA hasn't come to either one. haven't provided any testimony except for right now, and I know many of my colleagues have received some calls from the PBA trying to oppose this. never seen one piece of legislation that there a policing that the PBA has supported, and they very rarely, if ever, engage in any discussion around these bills. They simply say no. That then leaves it us-up to the people who will talk with us to find the best legislation that we can put forth. legislation doesn't harm any individual officer. doesn't provide any new information. It compiles already public information into a user-friendly way for us to just see if there's any patterns that we can stop, any patterns that are negative that we can stop before they go further. That's all this does, and still the PBA wants to push back and make it difficult for people who want to do the right thing, and I think that's a very disingenuous way of proceeding with this discussion. Now, again, I have never denied the PBA an opportunity to discuss issues with me. I've never denied them or tried to deny them the opportunity to come and talk before us when
