Alliance who is being honored for its commitment to transforming parks and green spaces into dynamic community assets for its strong voice on a range of park related issues. We want to welcome you and say thank you for being with us. Council Member

COUNCIL MEMBER CONSTANTINIDES: Thank
you, Council Member Dromm. It's my great pleasure
and honor to recognize the great work of the Astoria
Park Alliance. Founded in 2007, they really have
been the preeminent volunteer organization to the
jewel that is Astoria Park. Sixty acres of heaven in
Astoria but it needs maintenance and it needs love,
and it needs someone to steward it, and the Astoria
Park Alliance has taken it upon themselves to be
those good stewards whether it's raking leaves,
whether that's a leaf fest, shredding Christmas, you
know, Christmas trees that have been used or holiday
trees that have been used, cleaning the shoreline,

there's an event I would say every two weeks in
Astoria Park that's run by the Astoria Park Alliance,
and now branching and doing programming as well
making sure there are activities in the park for our
kids, for adults and really loving the park, loving
the community. So, I really want to thank Martha
who's one of the co-founders, and founded, you know,
on the idea of just making sure that the park could
be beautified. Anthony and Doug as well, really just
making sure that Astoria Park gets the love that it
needs, and will continue to be educating young people
about sustainability, about going green, about the
importance of green space in New York City. So, I
really want to thank, of course, our Parks Chair
Martha Green and Annabel. Thank you all for being
here and I'm really excited to honor the Astoria Park
Alliance for your great work, and here's to another
ten years of-of volunteers and I'll be with you guys
next Saturday. [laughs] [applause] Thank you,
Danny.

COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Thank you and I had to say I was there about a week or so ago for the Cusack (sp?) Kickoff for the—there's a 5-K Run and the park looked really, really, really nice, and I

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was amazed at how clean the shoreline is. Now, I
know why. So, thank you for doing that, and I'm
going to with that ask the Clerk to read the
proclamation aloud.

CLERK: Council City of New York Proclamation.

Whereas, New York City is home of the most dedicated and civic minded people in the United States. Many of these New Yorkers give countless time to community park groups to help advocate for and maintain their local green space. Today our beloved public parks spaces owe much of their success to area residents who have harnessed their collective energy to work together as a community based organization. The Astoria Park Alliance has excelled as such an organization for the last ten years; and

Whereas, Astoria Park Alliance was
established in 2007 by Jules Corkery and Martha Lopez
Gilpin through the Catalyst program, a project of
Partnership for Parks aimed to enhance community
participation. Astoria Park Alliance is dedicated to
the conservation and sustainability of Astoria Park
by empowering public partnerships. Its passionate
members come from all different cultural,

generational and socio-economic backgrounds, yet

share a common belief that building community starts

in the park; and

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Whereas, from the start Astoria Park
Alliance has served as strong voice for the community
and has spoken up on a range of park related issues
including safety, ecology, park usage and sanitation.
The organization is also active in helping with park
beautification, spending thousands of volunteer hours
each year on activities like shoreline cleanups and
other bi-week-bi-weekly cleaning activities from
spring to autumn; and

Whereas, over the course of the last ten years, Astoria Park Alliance has become an aggressive supporter for improvement to Astoria Park and has seen significant results. Many upgrades including the recently refurbished Bocce court have been financed through funds raised by the Astoria Park Alliance. The Alliance is also at the forefront of discussions on the apportionment of the \$30 million received by Astoria Park through the Anchor Parks Initiative; and

Whereas, Astoria Park Alliance has received many previous accolades for its tireless

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efforts including the Golden Trowel Award from the
City Parks Foundation earlier this year. This honor
was bestowed upon the Alliance where its volunteers'
commitment to transforming the parks and green spaces
into dynamic community assets; and

Whereas, today Astoria Park Alliance. Is guided by some of the most dedicated community servants in the entire city: Chair Martha Lopez Gilpin; Vice Chair Anthony Liberatoscioli; Marketing and Communications Director Doug Monaco:

Astoria Park Alliance reflects on its first decade of
growth and success, it also prepares for its future

COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: Alright, thank you very much, and we'd like to give an opportunity for someone to say a few words.[applause]

thank Council Member Constantinides for his dedicated devotion to the community to green space, to sustainability, and we look forward to work very hard with our 501 (c)(3) to do even more to recruit more people for our organization, and to always make that home away from home city parks part of our lives, and part of the lives of anyone who wants to visit.

Thank you very much. [applause]

much. Let's give them a big round of applause. Now, it is officially proclaimed for the Astoria Park Association. Thank you. [pause] Okay, yeah we have some more. Now, I'd like to bring up my group that's going to be honored here today, and I ask Ebony Underwood, a filmmaker to come up, and bring her family with her. Many people here know that one of the issues of passion for me has been working with the incarcerated and formerly incarcerated and Emily—

2 Ebony, excuse me, has been doing a great job with 3 film [pause] and I had the pleasure earlier of 4 meeting her mother who was here full of love, concern so Ebony Underwood is a filmmaker, and she's being honored today for her work in the forefront of Reform 6 Initiatives supporting children lf incarcerated parents, and for her founding of We Us Now, a non-8 profit that utilizes engaging 21st Century multimedia content to build greater awareness about the 10 11 destructive effects of mass incarceration on children 12 and parents. And I also want to say that we're 13 joined today by Liz Gaynes, the Executive Director and CEO-the President and CEO of the Osborne 14 15 Association and Tanya Krupat-I should say Krupat in 16 honoring Ebony today. Three years ago, Ebony began 17 to speak about the pain she suffered as a result of 18 her father's incarcerations. She has successfully 19 used film and social media to tell her story and her 20 life experience. Her work has expanded into a 21 movement built by, led by and four children impacted 2.2 by parental incarceration. There is a great need for 2.3 Ebony's work. Let me say that again. There is a great need for Ebony's work. In the United States 24 2.7 million minor children have an incarcerated 25

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parent, and another five million have a parent on parole or probation. It is estimated that one in 28 children have an incarcerated parent, and 1 in 9 African-American children, 1 in 28 Latino children and 1 in 57 white children have an incarcerated parent. Now, those are incredible numbers, and we need to reduce those numbers quickly. October is See Us Support Us Month, a time to support and awareness about the thousands of children in New York City who have a parent incarcerated and to build our citywide capacity to meet the needs of these children. think of no better time to recognize Ebony's outstanding advocacy and hope that you will join me in applauding her and her work. Let's give her a big round of applause [applause] and I want to ask the clerk to please read the proclamation aloud.

proud to honor Ebony Underwood for advocating for and

on behalf of children and families whose lives have

been impacted by the incarceration of a loved one;

Whereas, in addition to being a lifelong
New Yorker, Ebony Underwood is the founder of We Got

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Us Now, a filmmaker creative consultant and a Soros

Justice Fellow at the forefront of reform initiatives

supporting children of incarcerated parents; and

Whereas, in 2014, Ms. Underwood began to speak publicly about the trauma she suffered from her father's incarceration. She shared her remarkable story through film, television, and social media advocacy. She directed and produced the video Open Plea to the President, created a documentary short both for Father's Day and launched a website about her family's ordeal. She has contributed to a number of newspapers, magazines and blogs to tell her story, and spearheaded the [coughs] spearheaded the Google initiated digital #Love Letters Campaign to demonstrate the unbreakable bond between an incarcerated parent and their child on Mother's Day and Father's Day; and

Whereas, Ms. Underwood's work has
expanded into a movement built by, led by and for
children impacted by parental incarceration #We got
us now. With a mission to educate, empower, and
advocate for issues and policies that affect children
of incarcerated parents, and keeping families
connected We Got Us Now is a non-profit that utilizes

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engaging 21<sup>st</sup> Century multi-media content to build greater awareness about the destructive rippling effects of mass incarceration on children and families; and

Whereas, the need for Ms. Underwood's advocacy is great. In the United States it is estimated that 1 in 28 children have an incarcerated parent. In New York State at least 148,000 children have incarcerated parents. Research indicates that parental incarceration can have a devastating economic consequence for children, protected factors including support programs, resources and access to parents through visits can make a lasting positive impact on a child's life despite having a parent who is incarcerated.

she has done with the incarcerated—for those who
have—are incarcerated for their children. Thank you,
Ebony. Would you like to say a few words?

EBONY UNDERWOOD: Yes. Thank you so much I am so humbled to be here. I want for honoring me. to thank Council Member Dromm. Thank you so much for the work that you're doing to support children of incarcerated parents, and their parents. I want to thank Tanay Krupat and especially Liz Gaynes for doing incredible work with the Osborne's New York Initiative for Children of Incarcerated Parents. I want to thank my brother Anthony who was the first person in our family to actually vocalize it. He's here right now and [applause] speak out in support of our family and our father being incarcerate, but there's-there's someone that I really want to recognize. She was doing this work way before I ever had the courage to do it. I never knew about her until I had the opportunity to sit with her mom and talk to her about this issue, and that is Imani

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Davis, and so I want to say thank you to Imani Davis for being the first—one of the first voices that advocated for Children of Incarcerated Parents.

Because of her and her mom, Liz Gaynes, we are now doing incredible work, and we'll continue to do incredible work nationally. We—we got us now. We got us now, and thank you for See Us, Support Us

Month and this campaign to highlight this issue

around Children of Incarcerated Parents. [applause]

LIZ GAYNES: I just want to thank Council Member Dromm who has taken his love of children and his concern about mass incarceration and merged them to do this support for Children of Incarcerated Parents. Really, you're standing alone on this in ways that are very appreciated. Ebony, you're extraordinary. I want to say, though, and I appreciate your mentioning my daughter, but the truth is that what allows children to stand up like this is having a mom like Sherilyn (sp?) to support you, and to say it's okay and to make sure that you can visit your incarcerated parent, and have contact with that person, and having your brother Anthony at your side, and most of all, I would really like to acknowledge your dad and Underwood, because if he hadn't been a

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- 2 father, a fully out father from where he is, we would 3 not be standing here today.

able to do this and recognize your work. It's really
important work. Thank you very, very much. I

NYPD Officers Brian Coffey and Mark Maderik are being
honored for their bravery at a house fire in Queens.

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Quiet, please. Keep it down. [background comment, pause]

much my colleagues. I invite all of you to join us up here at the dais. Today, we are honoring two police officers, New York's finest [applause] and their families. They brought their beautiful children and their families are here with them as well. From the 106<sup>th</sup> Police Precinct in Ozone Park in my district for their heroism and their courage involving an incident that happened this past summer

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that some of you may have seen on the news. was a house fire on July 20, 2017, and there was a motorist who flagged down a patrol car. The two officers that we're honoring today got out of the car, and saw a house engulfed in flames. They kicked down the front door. They saw the smoke, they saw the fire, they ran in anyway because they were the first responders to arrive at the scene, and they actually went back into the home and saved and elderly woman, her grandson and their dog. So, theythey saved three lives that day. [applause] They are just one of many men and women who serve our city and the Police Department and the Fire Department who do extraordinary work, who put their lives on the line to keep people and property safe in the city. very grateful for their contributions to what they've They were honored by several of the local papers and some other local organizations, but I'm very proud to honor them here in this magnificent Chamber, and inside City Hall, such a beautiful and historic building and present them with a proclamation, but I'll ask the clerk to read the proclamation first and then we'll have them say a few words. We'll have the City Clerk read the proc.

3 Proclamation.

Whereas, every hour of ever day the men and women of the NYPD worked together to enforce our city's laws, keep our neighborhoods safe and protect their fellow 8.3 million New Yorkers. Whether safe get—safeguarding property or the public, these heroes and heroines commit themselves to their daily duties, which often necessitate extraordinary risks that few others can fully comprehend. NYPD Officer Brian Coffey, and NYPD Officer John P. Maderik, Jr. are two such heroes; and

Whereas, Officer Coffey served our nation with the United States Army for two years at Fort Carson, Colorado, including an 11<sup>th</sup> month—11-month deployment to Bosnia, Herzegovina. After graduating from the Police Academy in 2002, he was assigned to the 106<sup>th</sup> Precinct in Ozone Park, Queens where has since honed his expertise in wide range of tasks, from patrol to the Anti-Crime Unit and his current role as a Neighborhood Coordination Officer; and

Whereas, Officer Maderik graduated from the Police Academy in 1988 at the age of 20 following the footsteps of his father who served in the NYPD

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for 36 years. Officer Maderik began his career in the 109<sup>th</sup> Precinct in 1988 and has been assigned to the 106<sup>th</sup> Precinct since 1995. When his father retired in 2001, he received his father's Shield Number, and whereas, Officer Maderik currently a Neighborhood Coordination Officer with detective training, and has made more than 800 arrests. In addition to being a Police Benevolent Association Delegate for 12 years and the 106<sup>th</sup> Precinct Club President, Officer Maderik is also a member of the Brotherhood for the Fallen, and represents the NYPD at funerals honoring fallen officer across the country; and

Whereas, on July 20, 2017, around noon,
Officer Coffey and Officer John Maderik were at the
corner of 112<sup>th</sup> Street and Rockaway Boulevard in
Ozone Park when a motorist flagged them down to alert
them to a nearby house fire. The officers
immediately parked their vehicle and ran to the home
to discover the first floor engulfed in flames. When
bystanders said someone was inside the house, they
ran in and up the smoke filled stairs to find an
elderly woman, her grandson and dog. The officers
brought them downstairs and out of the house to

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safety, then re-entered the home to check the rest of the second floor apartment for other people. Once they had cleared the second floor, they went to the first floor apartment. As they kicked in the door, they were hit with a blast of heat and thick black smoke, but yelled out to see if any potential victims were inside. With no response from the apartment, the officers exited the building. Within minutes, the FDNY was on the scene and the fire was extinguished; and

Whereas, we commend both of these Queens born officers for their incredible bravery and their unflinching commitment to the safety of our city. They are truly among the finest of New York's finest and they have earned the esteem and enduring—and have earned the esteem and enduring gratitude of every New Yorker.

Thank you so much, and now moving onto the docket of the day. The City Council is going to begin this afternoon by voting on the reappointment of Dr. Robert Cohen to the Board of Correction, and on multiple land use items including the rezoning of Lower Concourse North in the South Bronx. As a representing Council Member for this project, I can speak first hand to the serious time and effort that has gone into developing plans to turn the Concourse into a major help for the surrounding community. really credit the Land Use Team for their work, for their district office, Community Board 4, local advocates and interested developers on getting this

project moving forward and implementing the
modifications that will ensure this becomes a
community asset for generations including the siting
of a new-of a new approximately 570-seat school at
639 Saint Ann's Avenue, and at present the remainder
of the project is slated to include 600 units of
affordable housing with 70% of the units at or below
80% of AMI in phase 1. Community facility is phased
to house a universal hip-hop museum and local non-
profit Bronx Works, and around 2.6 acres of open
space including a waterfront esplanade, an extension
of Mill Pond Park and public plaza along Exterior
Street. The Council will also be considering
Resolution 1675, 2017 today authorizing myself, the
Speaker to file our joint amicus briefs on behalf of
the Council in litigation challenging the rescission
or modification of the Deferred Action for Childhood
Program also known as DACA. As the futures of
Dreamers across the nation have been repeated
attacked, we at the City Council have made it clear
that we stand with undocumented immigrants throughout
the city and throughout the United States as they
seek a legal means remain in the country, and they

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will continue to do so at whatever level becomes
necessary going forward.

On the legislative side, the Council will be voting on Introduction 1728 sponsored by Recovery and Resiliency Chair Mark Treyger, which would establish a Hurricane Sandy Recovery Task Force to analyze the recovery efforts in New York City in response to Hurricane Sandy, and make specific recommendations for preparing the city for future recovery efforts. I want to thank staff Jeff Baker, Malaika Jabali, Patrick Mulvihill, Jonathan Seltzer and Jim Wilcox.

Governmental Operations Chair Ben Kallos would amend the date on which Candidate Financial Disclosure Reports are due to 25 days after the last date for filing and designating or independent nominating petition. It would similarly provide a 25-day filing period providing candidates in primary elections and 20-day filing period for candidates designated to fill a vacancy. I want to thank staff Elizabeth Kronk, Zachary Harris, Rachel Cordero, Jeff Baker and Brad Reid. Our first legislative package for today

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continues building upon our previous work to improve construction site safety standards.

Introduction 1404-A sponsored by Housing and Buildings Chair Jumaane Williams would increase the minimum civil penalties and fines for violations of the site safety provisions of the New York City Building Code and the Administrative Code of the City of New York.

Introduction 1429-A, sponsored by Council Member Julissa Ferreras-Copeland would require that workers at construction sites that require a site safety manager, site safety coordinator, or a construction superintendent receive free shift instructions including a discussion of safety concerns regarding the tasks and activities to be performed during that shift.

Introduction 1444-A, sponsored by Council Member Mark Treyger, expand the requirement that workers at construction sites that require a site safety manager, site safety coordinator or a construction superintendent receive site specific safety orientations and periodic refreshers to all construction sites.

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And Introduction 1437-A, sponsored by Council Member Carlos Menchaca, which would double the civil penalties for construction sites with excessive violations. I want to thank the staff Megan Chin, Guillermo Patino, Jose Conde, Sarah Gastelum and Jeff Baker.

Moving on, Introductions 1509-A, 1510-A and 1511-A, sponsored by Small Business Chair Robert Cornegy, would require the Commissioner of Small Business Services to post on the city's website online business tools and resources including accounting, recording keeping and bookkeeping service. The package would also require the Commissioner of SBS to prepare and disseminate a State of Small Business Survey by September 2018, and to create a comprehensive workforce development plan based to the extent practicable on the results of that survey. For staff I want to thank Sylvester Yovanna, Michael Kurtz, Jeff Baker, Aliya Ali, Crilhien Francisco, Terzah Nasser and Ayisha Schaumburg.

On affordable housing and HPD reporting the Council will be voting on Introduction 336-A sponsored by Council Member Brad Lander, which would

require the Department of Housing Preservation and
Development to report on the amount and location of
affordable housing provided through its Inclusionary
Housing programs. The report would also include
certain information about affordable housing such as
the amount and type of government financial
assistance provided. We will also be voting on Intro
942-A sponsored by Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez,
which would require HPD to provide housing
development project information in a non-propriety
format that permits automated processing.
Additionally, this legislation requires HPD to report
to the Council on the completion dates, location,
developer information and the source, type and value
of all city financial assistance and other financial
assistance provided by the city for housing
development projects.

And finally, Intro 1645-A sponsored by

Council Member Donovan Richards, which would require

HPD to annually report on contributions to the

Affordable Housing Fund. Staff, I want to thank
