They helped bring some representatives from the trans community in Cuba here to New York to do an exchange with members of the LGB

They've been a great partner on so many different issues. Proclamation. In observance of World AIDS Day, the

Council of the City of New York is proud to honor the

Latino Commission on AIDS for their outstanding

commitment to the fight against HIV AIDS and for

raising awareness about the disproportionate impact

of the HIV AIDS public health crisis on Latino

communities everywhere and whereas tragically more

than 200,000 Latinos in the U. S. and Puerto Rico are

living with HIV AIDS. Latinos are the fastest

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growing ethnic group in America, now representing 17% of the U. S. population yet they account for nearly 20% of AIDS cases. For Latinos living with HIV or AIDS and their loved ones, the challenges are often exacerbated not only by social stigma and poverty but compounded by language barriers, immigration statispheres and access to care, testing and increased infection rates. In 1990, Latino leaders came together to address the critical unmet need for HIV prevention and care in their community and to address its unique challenges by forming a coalition for collective action, the Latino Commission on AIDS; and

WHEREAS for the last three decades the

Latino Commission on AIDS has spearheaded health
advocacy promoting HIV education, developing model
prevention programs for high-risk communities and
building capacity and community service organization.

In addition to these endeavors, the Latino Commission
on AIDS has made tremendous progress by employing a
very effective intersectional approach. Addressing
the urgent need for better health care, education,
employment, opportunities and housing while
mitigating other disparities and advocating for LGBT

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and immigrant rights, they recognized that winning the fight for true social and economic justice is essential to eliminating HIV and reaching an AIDS free generation at last; and

WHEREAS in this era when the President of our United States aspires to build walls, the Latino Commission on AIDS continues to strengthen the inextricable bond between our nation and others. In September 2017 in partnership with Council Speaker Michelle Mark-Viverito and the LGBT caucus, the members of the Latino Commission on Aids were crucial to bringing a delegation of Cuban LGBTQ leaders to New York City and helped facilitate a meaningful learning experience between us and our Cuban visitors; and

WHEREAS during the seven day program, the Latino Commission on AIDS helped guide the delegation of thirteen community based organizations and cultural institutions where they discussed how to work together to strengthen and protect the LGBTQ community. The delegation's visit culminated in a community summit at City Hall with two illuminating panels and in-depth conversations on building better bridges between the LGBTQ communities in New York and

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Cuba between diligently fundraising to cover the

expenses for the trip, to tirelessly [Inaudible] and translating for the delegation, this historic opportunity would not have been possible without the

6 leadership of the Latino Commission on AIDS.

Very often people talk about what they might do if tragedy strikes them. don't know until it happens and I think, I don't know if anybody can show the amount of grace and courage that Ms. Diana Wright has shown. As mentioned, she was awarded Teacher of the Year P.S. 109 in 2014 in my district. On June 30 of 2015, she lost a leg after a horrific car accident. She's battled back. She shows a role model to her students, many of which are here, her peers, her community. She wears her new leg not with shame, with a source of pride and inspiration for the kids. She uses it to give them inspiration. She was noticed by Dove and she has a video called "Me Diana" which was directed by Shonda Rhimes and it spreads a message to millions. This is

namesake ever since. After attending New York City

public schools, she earned her bachelor's degree from

Suneo [Inaudible] and her master's degree from The

College of Mt. Saint Vincent, then return to Gotham

to be one of our true contemporary super heroes, a

6 New York City public school teacher; and

WHEREAS in addition to being a wife, a devoted mother of two little girls and an athlete,
Diana Wright has excelled as an educator for the last ten years. In 2014 she was named Teacher of the Year at P.S./I.S. 109 in East Flatbush. Before long, however, she would be tested physically, mentally and spiritually; and

WHEREAS just days after school let out for summer vacation, Ms. Wright was involved in a horrific accident that left her unconscious in Kings County Intensive Care Unit. When she awoke she learned that she had lost her left leg above the knee. With the love and support of family and friends, clergy and colleagues, she persisted. Slowly but surely she regained enough strength and balance to allow her to return to work ahead of schedule by December 2014. Drawing on her faith and her commitment to her family she wanted more; and

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WHEREAS Ms. Wright resolved to reclaim her independence and recover the physical strength and endurance she needed to keep up with her eight and seven year old daughters, remembering the resilience of her students and the relentless work ethic of her father who supported a family of seven, she was determined to balance on her new prosthetic leg and regain the ability to walk, lift weights and juggle the very demanding responsibilities of wife, mother and full-time employee of the New York City Department of Education; and

whereas Ms. Wright's unwavering confidence and commitment soon garnered the attention of T.V. titan Shonda Rhimes who produced a short film about her triumph over the near fatal accident. The short film called "Meet Diana" was distributed online for Dove's Real Beauty campaign and it continues to be widely shared today. On YouTube alone, Ms. Wright's story has already inspired more than two million people; and

WHEREAS Ms. Wright has constantly told her students, strength and growth come only through continuous effort in spite of the struggle. Today as

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she imbibes that message, she is teaching people of all ages around the world.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT KNOWN that the City of New York, sorry, that the New York City Council gratefully honors Diana Wright for sharing her extraordinary story inspiring millions to persevere.

We'll also vote on a package of bills on criminal justice reforms and transparency. Criminal justice reform is a hallmark of my tenure as speaker and the council will pass three bills that address

two crucial issues rectifying erroneous criminal 2 records and addressing the roughly one million 3 outstanding criminal warrants for low level offenses. 4 Intro 1723A which I sponsored will require the 5 Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice to make efforts to 6 address outstanding criminal warrants and to issue an 7 annual report related to these activities. It also 8 requires the Department of Correction to respond to 9 certain requests for records relative to erroneous 10 warrants within three business day. Intro 1636A, 11 sponsored by Council Member Corey Johnson would 12 require the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice to 13 take a variety of actions to address issues related 14 to erroneous criminal and juvenile records. It would 15 also require the New York City Police Department to 16 quickly respond to records requests necessary to 17 18 rectify erroneous records and Intro 1712A, sponsored by Council Member Rory Lancman, will require the 19 Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice to issue a bi-2.0 annual report comprehensively addressing criminal 2.1 2.2 summonses issued by all city agencies. I want to thank Jeff Baker, Brian Crodes [phonetic], Eva 23 Ambacar [phonetic], Casey Adison, and Steve Rister. 2.4 And finally the council will vote to prohibit 25

conversion therapy. Conversion therapy is barbaric
and inhumane and right here in New York City we will
insure that all individuals would be able to live
without fear of coercion and to change into someone
who they are not. Intro 1650A which I sponsored will
prohibit any person from charging consumers for
services intended to change a person's sexual
orientation or gender identity. My partners in New
York City government and I will continue to be the
model for acceptance across the nation as we ban
conversion therapy once and for all. I want to thank

MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Thank you. Quiet in the chambers as we now turn to the discussion of general orders beginning with Council Member Barron.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you Madam

Public Advocate. I rise to talk about Land Use 808812. Just as a background, we know that in New York

City we've got approximately 60,000 homeless people 2 and a huge percentage of New Yorkers who are rent 3 burdened. In Community Board 35, the median income 4 for the neighborhood is about \$44,000. According to 5 ANHD, 50% are rent burdened and more than 50% are in 6 danger of displacement. The Bedford Armory 7 [phonetic] Project, the city owned property have 8 presented an opportunity as the community wanted to 9 have a community land trust established or to have 10 development by a not for profit organization and they 11 wanted a multi-purpose community facility and they 12 wanted a 100% affordability. This vote today that 13 we're taking does not leave any of what the Community 14 Board voted to have. 15

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COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: In 2005, the Federal

MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Sh-hhh. Quiet please.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: In 2005, the Federal government indicated that where rezonings take place in so-called transit zones, there is gentrification. That's what the federal government said in 2005. The City proposed that market rates

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are needed in order to sustain rentals that are 2 affordable supposedly to the people who live in that 3 community. I don't accept that premise and I've not 4 allowed that to happen in my community district. 5 Affordability is a dangling partisan. Affordability 6 is a dangling partisan. It needs to stay affordable 7 to whom so ANHD has said that in New York City the 8 households that meet income for market rates is 9 approximately 29% of New Yorkers and if we look at 10 the district where this proposal is being brought, 11 there are about 20% of the people currently living 12 there who can afford market rate rentals so this 13 proposal, I think, deserves 40% for market rate and I 14 think it's not affordable to the people who live 15 there. I think the City is not fulfilling its 16 obligation to address the issue of homelessness and 17 18 people who are rent burdened and for that reason I cannot vote for this and I think that the long term 19 lease that the City has agreed to does not benefit 20 the community. Thank you so much. 2.1

MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Council Member thank you. Sh-hhh, Sh-hhh. Council Member Garodnick.

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much. I rise to speak on a few items very quickly, not that quickly.

COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: that I had the opportunity to have been involved in and the first was Intro 799, a bill that will reform the commercial rent tax and reduce the tax burden on Manhattan's small businesses. Currently, the commercial rent tax imposes a 3.9% surcharge on rent paid by businesses starting at rents of \$250,000 per year. This bill would double the threshold at which businesses become subject to the tax bringing it to \$500,000. As our effort is targeted to helping small businesses in particular, this new threshold applies to businesses with less than five million dollars per year in total income, businesses that make between five and ten will receive a partial credit again their tax liability. This will be a big help for small businesses and I ask my colleagues for their support today. The second, Intro 1300 requires noise mitigation plans to be filed with the DEP and posted on the outside of construction sites. Noise is one of our City's top quality of life issues and

2 construction noise is a major contributor to the overall noise problem. Currently all construction 3 sites must have a noise mitigation plan associated with their work and those plans must be kept on file 5 but they need not be filed with the City or posted 6 publicly. This bill would change that requiring 7 noise mitigation plans to be filed with the DEP, 8 published on line and posted on the outside of 9 construction sites. It will add transparency and 10 accountability for people affected by construction 11 noise and will allow DEP to enforce plans more 12 efficiently. The third bill is Intro 955 which 13 raises the maximum fines for companies that fail to 14 repave and repair streets properly after companies 15 dig them up. Big entities like Verizon, ConEd, Time 16 Warner often dig up our streets to lay wires, fix 17 18 cables and check on pipes. That's important work but once it's done they have an obligation to the public 19 to repair the streets according to standards and 20 specifications set by the Department of 2.1 2.2 Transportation. That's not always done or done well and that's why this bill doubles fines on certain 23 violations and I ask my colleagues to support all 2.4 three. Thank you. 25

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COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: New Yorkers are tired of out of control, out of scale, overdevelopment destroying affordable housing and our neighborhoods. Today we have an opportunity to stop the march of super tall buildings from commercial districts on East 57th Street into residential districts where they would displace rent regulated residents to build the buildings for billionaires. In 2015, we formed the East River 50's Alliance which has grown to 45 buildings in the area, 2,600 individual members from 500 buildings all over the City with support of friends of the upper East side, historic district Seville and City wide organizations like the Municipal Arts Society. Council Member Dan Garodnick, Senator Liz Krueger, Manhattan Borough President Gale Brewer joined me as co-advocates and Congress Member Carol Malone has joined in support. We worked with the Department of City Planning on several options for providing affordable housing as part of proposal. DCP ultimately advised that with the change to a tower on base to produce affordable housing with the existing inclusionary housing

2	framework which we agreed to improve and is what
3	we've proposed. We removed the grandfathering
4	provision that the City Planning Commission had added
5	erroneously and City Planning has voted that removing
6	this provision was in scope. This rezoning will
7	protect oxygenarians like Hernd [phonetic] and Wurth
8	and seniors like Charles Fernandez and his sister who
9	face displacement from their affordable rent
10	regulated units. Your vote today is in support of
11	residents over real estate developers, putting
12	affordable housing for real New Yorkers over
13	buildings or billionaires. Thank you.

MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Thank you. Council Member Lander.

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COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you Madam
Public Advocate.

MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Quiet please. Council Member Lander.

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Thank you Madam

Public Advocate. I arise today to ask my colleagues

to support Intro 152C which would require a

certificate of no harassment before landlords get

permits for a demolition or a substantial alterations

of their buildings. This council has taken

2 significant steps together to prevent tenant harassment by extending the right to council by 3 putting the burden of proof on landlords, by 4 expanding the definition, by focusing on 5 constructionist harassment. Unfortunately in too 6 many cases, unscrupulous landlords still persist 7 because the bucket of gold at the end of their 8 efforts of harassment by getting out low income and 9 working class tenants and tripling or quadrupling the 10 rent is just too big so the certificate of no 11 harassment policy looks to block them from making 12 that mint to profit from the harassment by denying 13 them the building permits that they need to do so. 14 Before landlords of covered buildings will be able to 15 get those permits they would have to demonstrate they 16 had not harassed tenants out of the building and if 17 18 they're found to have harassed tenants out, they would not be able to get their building permits for 19 five years unless they agree to make 20 or 25% of 2.0 their building affordable to low income tenants 2.1 2.2 beyond any MIA [Inaudible] 21A requirements with no public subsidy. A program like this has been in 23 place in Hell's Kitchen since 1974 and it is the 2.4 result of the work of some tremendous tenant 25

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSE: Thank you. One of the most sacred duties of government is the protection of the most vulnerable of our society. Ιt is therefore critically important that the agency tasked with this responsibility of protecting the safety of our children which is the Administration of Children's Services, has the absolute best processes in place to safeguard and secure their wellbeing. For decades we have been looking at only at the sizes of the caseloads and that has not been enough. must have a better understanding of the complexity of worker caseloads, digging deep to analyze this type of data is the heart of Intro 1607A which authorizes ACS to conduct the study and make best practices recommendations based on data gleaned from the study which will happen no later than September 30, 2019. In particular, this study will analyze the number of children per family caseload and their prior ACS involvement of the family, analyze the relationship

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between the size of the family and prior ACS
involvement to the complexity of the case and to
access best practices and make recommendations based
on this data to improve child safety and wellbeing
outcomes. It is my hope that this study will help
adjust caseworker's workload by taking into account
the complexity of their cases and the corresponding
additional work that complex cases require and will
enable ACS workers to better carry out their mission
of insuring the safety of our children and to prevent
unneeded deaths. I want to thank Speaker Melissa
Mark-Viverito and the General Welfare Committee
Chair, Steve Levin for their support of this
important legislation and all who worked to make this
a great bill. Thank you.

MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Thank you. Council Member Chin.

council MEMBER CHIN: Today we are voting on Intro 1278A legislation that will dramatically increase information available, about, and transparency on social adult day cares. This bill continues this council's effort to address the need of millions of caregivers across the City. Yesterday during the council committee's hearing about unpaid

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caregivers, I heard heart wrenching stories about a husband who forsake his own health to bring his wife to the doctors and adult children who take turns using they vacation days to ensure that their mother is never alone. Social adult day cares offer caregivers, a majority of whom are women, a break for a couple of days to take care of their own needs. However, as the state made it easier to access these services with little oversight, some unscrupulous providers open programs that endangers multiple seniors, threatened the funding of good senior centers and good social adult day cares and opened the door to Medicaid fraud. Intro 1278A require DIPTAS [phonetic] to create an on-line database of all social adult day cares in the City. The database would also indicate the number of violations issued at a given day care and the outcome of that Most importantly, Intro 1278A would allow violation. people to submit complaints about bad social adult day cares electronically and directly to DIPTAS [phonetic] social adult day care office person. offering greater levels of transparency, 1278A can help identify bad actors in the system and allow families to make informed decisions for our senior

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and caregivers. I want to thank our Speaker Melissa

Madam Public Advocate that an individual accused of a crime is innocent until proven guilty is one of the bedrocks of our Criminal Justice System. An erroneous criminal record completely undercuts that foundation in our society. Erroneous criminal records with basic bureaucratic errors burden over two million New Yorker with an assumption of guilt for crimes they were never convicted of or in some cases for which they were not even prosecuted. That no City agency is responsible for maintaining the accuracy of these records is possibly even more disheartening than the inaccuracies themselves. My bill Introduction 1636A would require the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice to address erroneous

criminal records but it's not enough to merely 2 correct the current errors because in many cases the 3 professional or personal damage has already been 4 This bill will also require that office to 5 address the root causes of these inaccuracies to 6 prevent this from happening in the future and to 7 report on these actions. I also want to talk about 8 another bill that I am passing today. New Yorkers 9 who rely on our City's safety net of social programs 10 are an incredibly vulnerable population. It includes 11 people who are homeless or pending eviction or 12 utility shutoff. These folks come to us to help keep 13 their roof over their heads, putting food on the 14 table, or paying their medical bills. We have to do 15 everything in our power to make sure these New 16 Yorkers receive the help that they need. My bill 17 18 Introduction 1635A would require HRA, the Human Resource Administration, to issue a receipt to 19 everyone who comes into a service center seeking 2.0 assistance. This receipt will consolidate the 2.1 confusing array of information individuals often 2.2 receive. It would also require HRA to publicly 23 report wait times at service centers and clarify the 2.4 process for individuals to make a complaint. 25

There is a democratic process and when I was standing to the side, people asked if I was scared, if I was concerned but when I think about that every time I come into this chamber I walk in with the knowledge and the understanding that my predecessor, the late James E. Davis, was shot and killed here in City Hall so this level of yelling, of screaming, of being inappropriate, of disrespecting one another creates a very dangerous environment for everybody involved and we have to as a City, as a City Council, as a nation, we have to bring respect back and listening to one another and conversation and meetings and discussions but to disrespect one another, to yell at, to shout out, to over talk, to threaten, this is not what democracy is and this is not what democracy looks like. We have a process that we go through to get to the solutions that are gonna make this City a better place. Crown Heights

in Brooklyn, New York is in crisis. We are in the 2 largest affordable housing crisis that we've ever 3 There are people that are languishing in our 4 known. homeless shelters. We have over 30 known gangs and 5 sets and crews surrounding the Bedford Union Armory. 6 We have a lack of educational and athletic 7 opportunities and outlets for our young people in the 8 community. It is a community in crisis, a community 9 that cannot wait five to ten, fifteen, twenty years 10 for opportunity, opportunity that must happen right 11 What we're talking about and what we're voting 12 on right now is I fought with my colleagues to make 13 sure that we ended luxury condominiums. There are no 14 luxury condominiums for sale as part of the Bedford 15 Union Armory. Sixty percent of the housing is going 16 to be for individuals making between \$27.000 and 17 18 \$57,000. We could not get to 100% because 40% had to be set aside in order to pay for the world class 19 recreational facility. I wish that there was another 20 way to pay for things other than to pay for things 2.1 2.2 but right now we still have to pay for things. also are going to have a world class recreational 23 facility that our young people, so many of them who 2.4 have become involved in gangs, teenage pregnancy, are 25

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now going to have an outlet. We tell them to say no to so many things but give them so few options to say yes to. They will now have an opportunity to say yes to something. I negotiated to have a 25,000 square foot brand new medical facility for those who are uninsured. They will have an opportunity to have affordable healthcare right in their own backyards. I fought to have a 10% set aside for those transitioning out of our homeless shelters so that those that are languishing in our homeless shelters who need housing now and who cannot wait for the bureaucracy and cannot wait for all of the arguments and the rallies to end, who need a home right now, will have that. We're gonna create over 720 construction jobs within this particular development, local hiring from the very communities in which people live. In addition to that, there will be over 200 permanent jobs created after that. progress. This is an opportunity. This is getting something done in our term. Every council member runs on a premise of creating jobs, education, making sure that we have affordable housing and this project does just that.

I'm pleased also to vote yes 11 with Council Member Cumbo on the Bedford Union Armory 12 and I want to note that her advocacy here seems to 13 have helped win some broader policy change, not only 14 that there will not be condos at the Bedford Union 15 Armory but we hear reported at least that perhaps 16 there won't be proposals for condos in the future on 17 18 publicly owned sites when they are disposed. think this is an area where collectively as a council 19 and as a City we can do better to set standards. 20 Mandatory inclusionary housing sets minimum standards 2.1 2.2 for development in privately owned sites when they are rezoned and then Council Members and 23 neighborhoods can advocate to go up from it. 2.4 should do more of that on publicly owned buildings as 25

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Not only that there shouldn't be condos but 2 that we seek to have them developed or owned by not-3 for-profits or community land trusts, that we 4 maximize affordability to the extent possible when 5 given other amenities like the recreation center that 6 we ensure permanent affordability. There should be 7 policies that we all do together. I want to thank 8 you for helping push us in that direction and hope 9 that we will keep walking forward in it. I vote aye. 10

Advocate. When people hear about affordable housing, the first question is always who is it affordable for. My new bill will make sure our housing lottery process is much more transparent, we'll finally know exactly who qualifies for affordable housing and perhaps more importantly who doesn't and why. With my bill HPD will have to report on housing lottery outcomes broken down by AMI, eligibility for preference and demographics. The number of applicants who are accepted, rejected or put on a

waiting list will also be available and the data will 2 be broken down by a variety of income levels 3 including extremely low income applicants, very low income applicants, low income applicants and moderate 5 income applicants. I'm also pleased to introduce 6 another bill that will help many families here today. 7 It's more expensive than ever to raise a family in 8 our City and diapers are a call to necessity. Having 9 clean diapers for your children is not a luxury but 10 it is a need. Council Member Julissa Ferreras-11 Copeland made our City better, a more equal place, 12 with her legislation that provided free feminine 13 hygiene products for so many people in our City. 14 Like feminine hygiene product, diapers are also a 15 necessity that should be available at no cost. 16 Diapers are a huge expense and my bill will provide 17 18 for free diapers for our most vulnerable families and childcare centers and our family shelters and I thank 19 you for your time and also I want to just welcome 2.0 Council Member Adams to the coolest row in the City 2.1 Council as well. 2.2

MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: That's where I used to sit. Not seeing Council Member Williams, closing remarks to Speaker Mark-Viverito.

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CHAIR SPEAKER MARK-VIVERITO: Thank you
to all my colleagues and definitely as I think
Council Member Cumbo said, you know, we need to
be respectful to each other and unfortunately the
situation today is one that has happened to other
