3 CHAIRPERSON LEVIN: Good morning 4 everybody or good afternoon. [background comments] 5 Good afternoon. Good afternoon. I'm Council Member 6 Steven Levin, Chair of the Committee on General Welfare and this morning we are also joined by 8 Council Members Corey Johnson, Fernando Cabrera, 9 Annabel Palma and Adrienne Adams, and we are 10 expecting a couple of other Council Members to join 11 They're across the street at Land Use vote. 12 Today, will be the last vote of the General Welfare 13 Committee for this session. I want to thank all of 14 my colleagues who have passed legislation and 15 participated in our oversight hearings in this 16 committee during the past four years. In this last 17 vote, we will be voting on five pieces of 18 legislation, three of which I am sponsoring, Proposed 19 Intro 1577-A, which is in relation to requiring the 20 Office of Operations or another agent, officer agency 21 to be designated by the Mayor to conduct a study 2.2 regarding client information management system. 23 Intro 1714-A, which is in relation to educational 24 continuity, and Intro 1739-A, which is in relation to 25 exits for domestic violence emergency shelters.

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will also be voting on Intro 572-A, which is sponsored by Council Member Elizabeth Crowley in relation to requiring the Department of Homeless Services to post shelter census data, and Proposed Intro 855-B, sponsored by Council Member Ben Kallos in relation to a study regarding the feasibility of notifying individuals who may be eligible for public assistance. The legislation we are voting on today covers key areas this committee has addressed this session, how individuals and families interact with multiple social services systems, homeless students, domestic violence, improving-improving the ability to apply for public assistance and the homelessness I look forward to continuing to work on all these issues in the upcoming session, and I want to ask if there are any member sponsors of the bills that are here that want to speak. We've also been joined by Council Members Grodenchik and Salamanca, and I want to also acknowledge committee staff who have been so extraordinary during this term: Andrea Vazquez our Senior Counsel; Tonya Cyrus our Senior Policy Analyst; Damara Newhof, our Financial Analyst; and Dohini Sompura, our Unit Head as well as Stacey Ward who is our Legal Fellow. They have all been

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extraordinary members of this committee staff who have done great, great work. And just for the record, none of this all gets done without the amazing work of-from the staff who put in many, many hours of research and prepare all the committee reports for the Council and who are instrumental in talking and meeting with leaders and advocates in the field to ensure that this Council is being responsive to the needs of the community. And in the case of this committee, that is youth in foster care, children involved in the child welfare system and their parents, individuals and children who and families who are-find themselves confronting the challenge of homelessness here in New York City, and again, it's the work of this staff that makes this committee possible. So, thank you all very much for your great work, and we've also been joined by Council Member Vanessa Gibson. Hold one moment. [pause] Okay, so we will ask the clerk to call the roll.

CHAIRPERSON LEVIN: [off mic] Who then enters it into a computer who then prints it out, and hands it to another person, and so the staggering fact is that a lot of New Yorkers are hungry, and when this is one of the wealthiest cities on the planet, I don't know why anyone needs to go hungry, why anyone needs to become homeless, why anyone needs to when there is a government safety net there to help people. And so, the first draft of this legislation was to provide benefits to people using the information government already knows from their tax returns, and so seeing that we might not be able to do that, we worked very closely with the Committee Counsel on an A version of the bill that just says: If you apply for one benefit in the city of New York, we have to screen you for at least 40 others and give you those benefits. Sorry, give you the applications for the benefits, and if you filled out one application, why do you have to fill out that application over again. You can just have the same

2 information put onto all 40 applications. 3 especially important when benefits vary from \$25 a 4 year for HEAP to hundreds if not thousands of dollars 5 a year in the case of senior citizen rent increase exemption or others. We had a great hearing. 6 7 past four years we have issued a memorandum outlining 8 the legal authority and federal regulations that allow us to do automatic benefits in partnership with NYU, Stewards for Change, the Robin Hood Foundation. 10 11 In 2016, we worked with Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services who released \$4.5 million 12 13 application to study this legislation, and its impact 14 on health outcomes, and despite the fact that the 15 city did not apply, we did manage to get New York Presbyterian, which is in my district an award of 16 17 \$4.5 million to move forward on this. Knowing that 18 we needed the software built, we worked with ah small 19 company called Intuit, which processes taxes for 20 nearly half of Americans to release their benefit 21 assist source code to the world at large and it's 2.2 available at the Department of Health and Human 2.3 Services' Get Help, and we've now moving forward, we look forward to getting this done next year. We are 24 passing, and this committee has passed legislation 25

2	for a study that we expect will be done this time
3	next year that will hopefully be our Christmas and/or
4	Hanukkah or other holidays that you might celebrate
5	at present, and from then on we hope to just get this
6	done. Just by the numbers there's 2.3 million who

the city estimates are eligible for SNAP, and 550,000

people who don't get it, and our hope and the 

hypothesis behind this legislation is that if people

knew about the benefits they could get, we could feed 

every hungry person. Again, I want to thank all the 

committee members for their positive votes, and the

Committee Chair and Counsel for their partnership on 

this.
