7	CHAIRPERSON MENCHACA: Buenas tardes. My
8	name is Carlos Menchaca, City Council Member and
9	Chair of the New York City's Committee on
10	Immigration. [background comment] Oh… [pause]
11	[gavel]
12	Buenas tardes. My name is Carlos
13	Menchaca; I'm a Council Member but also Chair of the
14	New York City Council's Committee on Immigration.
15	The Committee will hear Proposed
16	Resolution No. 1484-A, a resolution calling upon the
17	state and federal government to extend protections
18	for undocumented youth by passing the New York State
19	DREAM Act of 2017 at the state level, as well as the
20	federal DREAM Act of 2017 at the federal level.
21	As you know, this is a topic that is very
22	near and dear to my heart; I have been a champion for
23	undocumented youth and young adults, this Committee
24	has stood strong, and the individual Council Members
25	that represent immigrant districts have stood up.
I	

COMMITTEE ON IMMIGRATION DREAMers deserve the right to attain the American 2 3 dream and it is our job to ensure that these 4 hardworking youth and young adults are supported 5 every step of the way.

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Before going any further, I want to 6 7 recognize the following Council Members who are joining us today, from Queens, Council Member Danny 8 9 Dromm and from Brooklyn, Council Member Rafael Espinal and Mathieu Eugene. 10

11 Before going any further though, I want 12 to give you some background. The term DREAMer is 13 used to describe young undocumented immigrants who 14 were brought to the U.S. as children and know this 15 country to be their home. DREAMers assimilate into American schools and internalize American beliefs; 16 17 often they do not know that they are undocumented 18 until they get a driver's license or cannot get a 19 summer job because they lack a social security 20 number.

21 In the U.S., every child is entitled to a free K-12 public education, regardless of race, 2.2 23 nationality, native language, gender, or immigration status, and is free to enjoy an education without 24 fear of unlawful discrimination. Unfortunately, 25

2	federal laws require that the applicants for
3	financial aid be legal residents, so undocumented
4	students, including DACA grantees, are not eligible.
5	As a result, roughly 65,000 undocumented
6	youth graduate from U.S. high schools with little
7	hope of attending college, simply because they cannot
8	afford it, and are ineligible to receive assistance
9	with their financing. More than 4,500 undocumented
10	students graduate from New York State high schools
11	each year, yet only 5-10% pursues a college degree
12	due to tremendous financial obstacles that they face.
13	Without access to federal tuition assistance,
14	scholarships, grants, or loans, these bright students
15	are left in limbo and with few opportunities for
16	advancement. As new jobs increasingly demand
17	advanced skills, it has never been more critical to
18	ensure that all students have opportunities to
19	continue their education and gain practical
20	experience.
21	At the state level, the Assembly
22	introduced the New York State DREAM Act in January of
23	this year; it is the fifth year this legislation has
24	been introduced, and now more than ever it's time to
25	make this law. We stood out front on the steps of

2	the City Hall where Council Members, state-elected
3	officials, borough presidents, and even the
4	Comptroller representative stood up and said yes to
5	not only the state DREAM Act, but federal.
6	Additionally, it would create a fund that would raise
7	private dollars for scholarships to college-bound
8	children of an immigrant parent.
9	This work is important. Without a path
10	to legal immigration status or a meaningful
11	opportunity to continue their education and
12	professional development, DREAMers are forced to
13	remain living in the shadows. The passage of the
14	DREAM Act in New York would allow students who are
15	New York residents, regardless of their status, to
16	have equal access to various forms of financial aid
17	so that they can continue in their higher education.
18	The federal DREAM Act would provide a pathway to
19	citizenship.
20	If enacted, the benefits of these pieces
21	of legislation would greatly improve the quality of
22	life for our youth and young adults residing in New
23	York State. It is clear that an investment in New
24	York's DREAMers is an investment in New York's future
25	and it is time to end the state and federal

Before they go to holiday 3 season, we are saying a New York City, and tomorrow we'll vote on the floor of the City Council, that 4 5 they go back to session and make sure that we pass a clean DREAM Act. 6 7 And in solidarity: [00:05:57] Spanish. 3	who are dedicated, who have the courage, the ambition
4	to go to school to become somebody, to be part of the
5	fabric of this country; to contribute to the fabric
6	of this country; they want to be doctors, nurses;
7	elected officials, so we have to give them the
8	opportunity. We say all the time, the young people,
9	they are the future of this society; they are the
10	future of the nation; this is the opportunity for us
11	to give them the opportunity they need to become the
12	future of this City, the future of this nation. In
13	addition to that, we are talking about human beings,
14	children who don't have any recollection of where
15	they were born; they don't even know, some of them
16	didn't even know you know they were not American or
17	there exists a distinction between them and the other
18	young people. I think this is the right thing to do;
19	we've got to do, this is a win-win situation. And
20	they are intelligent, they are brilliant; if we don't
21	do that; we are going to do a disservice to this
22	nation, and I commend all of those advocates, those
23	people who have been there fighting, advocating for
24	the DREAMers, and I hope the state and the federal
25	government, you know our colleagues in the state and

2	the federal government will do the right thing. With
3	that, I vote yes.
4	COMMITTEE CLERK: Council Member Dromm.
5	COUNCIL MEMBER DROMM: I'd like to say
6	that I'm voting yes on this piece of legislation and
7	thank Council Member Menchaca and The Speaker for
8	introducing it; it is a very important piece of
9	legislation, and I'd also like to thank Chair
10	Menchaca for his dynamic leadership of this Committee
11	over the last four years; he's done an outstanding
12	job and has many accomplishments under his belt.
13	Thank you.
14	COMMITTEE CLERK: Council Member Koo.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: I vote aye and I
16	also want to thank Chairman Menchaca for his
17	leadership and his dedication on this Committee, and
18	I also want to thank The Speaker, because they both
19	worked together, passed many modern [sic] bills for
20	the immigrants. Thank you very much, Chair Menchaca.
21	COMMITTEE CLERK: Council Member Espinal.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: I'd just like
23	say; I don't think that Mathieu Eugene could've said
24	it any better, so I stand behind his words 100% and I
25	want to congratulate Carlos Menchaca on getting his

22	The Speaker's staff to central staff, thank you so
23	much and we'll see you in the New Year. Thank you.
