SPEAKER JOHNSON: Okay, so we are going to start our first ceremonial if, if the folks here who we are very excitedly going to honor from African American Women in Cinema, it's an organization that for the last 20 years has provided incredible work for the vibrant and important work of African American filmmakers. I want to hand it over to Council Member Jumaane Williams.

Speaker. I just want to congratulate African

American Women in Cinema, this is their 20th

anniversary, for those who do this work know how

hard it is to last for one year much less 20th

anniversary. We have the President here, Terra

Renee, we also have Nancy Shinholster and Rob

Williams, you know Hollywood is now finally

beginning to recognize the contributions of women

and the people of more color both of those things
combined but African American Women in Cinema is
has and has been around for 20 years. For those
who don't know I have a, a huge love of cinema and
theatre in particular, I'm a thespian, it's my
first love and so whenever I have an opportunity to
merge the two I like to do that. And so the African
American Women Cinema have given me the opportunity
to do that and I've been able to come to their
event every single year and present and I thank
Terra Renee for that but this is just exciting and
we want to thank them for being an inspiring
example for not just women, not just women with
more color but everybody in the arts and so I just
want to say thank you so much and we're very proud
that we can give you this proclamation at City Hall
and so we're going to ask now for the proclamation
to be read.

12	and whereas for two decades now the African
13	American Women in Cinema film festival has been a
14	vital opportunity for artists to create and
15	showcase their work in a field that too often
16	neglects the contributions of women of color. Now
17	as the industry finally begins to recognize the
18	importance of representation and, and inclusion it
19	continues to lead the way forward in it's
20	passionate advocacy for women and people of color
21	and whereas we commend this great organization for
22	its unwavering dedication to fostering greater
23	access to and greater appreciation for women of
24	color in all aspects of film and wish it continued

GOUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you, I'm going to ask Terra to say a few words just read it quickly of how important representation is when I was doing theatre over 20 years ago one of the reasons I switched... I ended up being a film production minor but at that point a major was because the roles I was being auditioned for often times were drug dealers and murderers and I said, you know I can perform more than that and I'm going to create my own films to... but I got sidetracked

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into politics and... but this means a lot to me to see someone like you there pushing forward a message that's different than has been played for so often so thank you so much and I'd love to hear a few words.

Thank you, thank you, thank TERRA RENEE: you, this is such an honor, I'm holding back the tears because 20 years ago when we started there was really not a lot of opportunity at all and we forged ahead and it is such an honor to have Council Member Jumaane Williams to have been by our side for all this time, Letitia James god bless you and Public Advocate, thank you, thank you for the caucus, the Black and Latino Caucus, thank you for the Speaker, thank you for this amazing recognition. We have been able to offer filmmakers who have been struggling and trying to get opportunities, distribution deals, platforms and networking with major Hollywood prominent industry professionals and we did it with the help as you can see here today and also sponsors. We look forward to a historic event that's coming up next week, our 20th annual film festival so happy to hear about that. I am just so humble, there's so

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much I want to say, I know I can't say it but a big
thank you so very much and we appreciate that on
the behalf of myself, Terra Renee and African

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you very much, thank you, thanks Jumaane. Congratulations. So, our next ceremonial is going to be with Council Member Torres, Emmanuel Mensah and the FDNY, we are honoring the life an indelible memory of a hero, private Emmanuel Mensah as well as members of the FDNY for their heroic response to that horrific tragic fire that took place in the Bronx in Council Member Torres's district on December 28th where we lost 13 New Yorkers. I want to turn it over to Council Member Torres.

COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: Thank you Mr.

Speaker. The community of Belmont has historically been a neighborhood of new arrivals and new beginnings. A neighborhood of, of, by and for immigrants, a beacon of hope for immigrants from every walk of life; Jamaica, West Africa, Albania, Montanaro, Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic, Italy to name a few. Among the immigrants imbued

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2 with the intrepid spirit of Belmont is Emmanuel Mensah. On the evening of December 28th, 2017 3 Belmont was abruptly shaken by the most destructive 4 fire the city has seen in nearly three decades. Emmanuel himself rushed into a burning building to 6 7 rescue his neighbors even though doing so would likely mean losing his own life and lost his, his 8 life he did in a rare act of heroism. Emmanuel was 9 an immigrant who came to the United States from 10 Ghana only a few years ago, upon becoming an 11 12 American he joined the Armed Forces, he did not die 13 on the battlefield, but he did die after displaying 14 the kind of courage and heroism that few of us 15 possess but nearly all of us cannot help but 16 admire. He lived as an American, an immigrant, a 17 soldier, a patriot but he will be remembered as he 18 died, a hero. Please join me in expressing our deepest gratitude to Emmanuel's father, Kwabena 19 20 Mensah for his presence here today in recognition of your son's heroic service to the city of New 21 2.2 York.

LO	part of the New York City family and we are so
L1	sorry for your heart wrenching loss but I've seen
L2	you since this tragedy happened less than three
L3	months ago at the Mayor's State of the City and
L 4	here today and at other events to honor your son
L5	and of course we are heartbroken for you but we're
L6	also so proud of, of your son and we are sure that
L7	your son got that brave courageous moral spirit
L8	from his father and from his family so I really
L 9	want to thank you for being here today.

obviously as I noted the Belmont fire claimed 13
lives making it the most destructive fire since
Happy Land in 1991 which was also in the Bronx but
far more lives would have been lost were it not for
the heroism of our first responders, the
firefighters, the EMS workers, this fire was so
destructive that it required a response from 160
firefighters and the FDNY and the EMS responded
within minutes so I just want to thank you on
behalf of my constituents, on behalf of the members

of the city council for your service.

JAY JONAS: Hello, my name is Jay Jonas,

I was the Deputy Chief in charge of the fire on

December 28th, 2017. On behalf of all those who

responded and performed miraculous and heroic acts

at this fire I would like to thank you for

recognizing them. It's a... any time we lose one

person at a fire everybody at the scene takes it as

a loss, we lost and there were many firefighters

who were desponded for weeks after this fire due to

the tremendous loss of life but as the incident

commander and Jeff Facinelli here who was my Deputy

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Incident Commander we were witness to this massive rescue effort that was put forth by the FDNY both fire suppression and emergency medical service, so on behalf of all those who responded to this fire we thank you for your recognition.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: The invocation will be delivered by Father Jonathan Morris of our Lady of Mount Carmel Church at 627 East 187th

Street in the great borough of the Bronx, quite in the chambers.

JONATHAN MORRIS: I begin as I do in my own faith tradition in the name of the father and of the son and of the holy spirit, amen. Almighty god, merciful god, father of god as leaders in our community we have been given so much and we acknowledge when we are humble that much will be asked of us, much more than our constituents or our parishioners ask of us, that you will ask of us. Today I ask you to awaken us from our slumber, awaken us ole lord from the slumber of selfishness that can grip each and every one of us. As community leaders we can easily be mesmerized by power, fame, money and the deadly desire of being liked and praised by all. Yes, much will be asked of us by you, what is it that you ask of us, lord at least I say this to you now I believe that you

2	are asking of me and of my brothers and sisters
3	here that we be servant leaders. To be servants not
4	of ourselves of our agendas but rather to be
5	servants of the women and men that we represent.
6	Servant leadership is not an easy standard, we know
7	god because left to our own powers or desires it is
8	so tempting to serve our own interests but today I
9	ask you almighty god as a friend of these community
10	leaders to descend upon these civic leaders in
11	front of me and to give them a new desire, make it
12	a miracle, a new desire and commitment to be
13	servant leaders, give them a burning desire to
14	sacrifice their own interest to serve the interest
15	of everyone of their constituents even when it's
16	not helpful or convenient to them and to do so by
17	measuring up their daily objectives, what they do
18	each day with the common good of society, what is
19	good, beautiful and true for those that they
20	represent and lead based on the dignity of every
21	human person. Finally, I pray that these women,
22	that these men in this great chamber will never
23	ever forget to give preferential treatment to the
24	poor, the weak, the disadvantaged, the defenseless
25	in our city Amen amen

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PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Amen. Please be seated. Quite in the chambers please. A motion to spread the invocation, Council Member Torres?

COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: Thank you Madame Public Advocate. Father, Father Jonathan Morris is a religious leader of national stature, but I know him as the Pastor of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church, a century long fixture in the very heart of Belmont. As the Head of Mount Carmel, Father Morris has been on the frontlines of comforting families who lost their loved ones and their homes amid the devastation of the Belmont fire. One cannot begin to imagine the anguish of a father or a grandfather struggling to cope with the loss of a child who lived only for seven months. It is family like those who have felt the consoling impact of Father Morris, not only has he been a central presence in countless wakes and funerals and candlelight vigils he has also taken it upon himself to raise more than 200,000 dollars to support the displaced families of the Belmont fire. And so, I ask my colleagues to join me in expressing the deepest gratitude to Father Morris for serving the Belmont

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community, for serving the city of New York in a

3 moment of greatest need.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: I don't know if... along that journey and it hasn't been easy so Ritchie congratulations to you, this is community leaders of all types working together, we need you and we need servant leadership that you've provided.

COUNCIL MEMBER TORRES: Thank you.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: And I don't... I don't know if he's still here but we, we, we were also joined earlier today by the father of Emmanuel Mensah, who rushed into a burning building so that he could save his neighbors, he was only in this country for a few years, he was a soldier but at a time when immigrants are vilified Emmanuel Mensah represents the very best that our city and our country has to offer and so I don't know if he's here but if you can join me in expressing our deepest gratitude to his father as well so...

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Quite in the chambers as we now hear from the Speaker, Speaker Corey Johnson.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Good afternoon, I am happy to see everyone braved the storm yesterday, last night and through the night of another nor'easter. We have lost a few brave New Yorkers in the past week and I would like to recognize each one of them. Just the other day an MTA worker named St. Clair Richards-Stephens died after he suffered a head injury from a fall as he was cleaning tracks near the East 125th Street subway station. We are saddened by this deeply tragic loss of life and our thoughts are with this young man's family and friends. New York lost two first responders who courageously answered the call on September 11th, 2001, we honor firefighter Thomas Phelan who on September 11th evacuated hundreds of people from the attacks. Thomas was working as a ferry captain when tragedy struck ground zero, he died last week from a 9/11 related illness and our thoughts are

2	with Thomas's family, friends and our FDNY family.
3	We also lost Keith Young, a retired firefighter who
4	also succumbed to a 9/11 related illness this past
5	weekend. Keith bravely saved many on that fateful
6	day and was known as the beloved firehouse chef who
7	showcased his culinary skills on two famous shows;
8	Chopped and Throwdown with Bobby Flay. Our thoughts
9	are with Keith's children who tragically lost their
10	mother to breast cancer six years ago, may Keith
11	rest in peace. The FDNY also lost two of its own in
12	last week's devastating helicopter crash in Iraq.
13	Fire Marshall Christopher Tripp Zanetis and
14	Lieutenant Christopher Raguso who also served as
15	Captain Master Sergeant of the New York National
16	Guard respectively. We also mourn Staff Sergeant
17	Dashan Briggs, Captain Andreas O'Keeffe, Captain
18	Mark K. Weber, Master Sergeant William R. Posch and
19	Staff Sergeant Carl P. Enis. I would also like to
20	honor the life and legacy of a legendary newsman,
21	Les Payne who died earlier this week. Les broke
22	ground as one of the first to report on racial
23	inequality in New York City, he was fearless, he
24	was passionate, and his loss leaves a void in
25	journalism, we in the council will never forget Les

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2	and his reporting and our thoughts are with his
3	family during this difficult time. And also, we
4	lost someone in another country, we lost a Council
5	Member named Marielle Franco in Rio de Janeiro,
6	Brazil who was assassinated because she spoke out
7	against police brutality in the city of Rio, her
8	loss has been covered around the world for her
9	fearlessness and for this political assassination
10	because she was stepping up and speaking truth to
11	power. If we could all, please rise and take

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Take a moment of silence for all the folks that we have lost. Thank you all. So, we are going to jump into our docket for the day. The council will vote on a number of finance items. First the council will be voting on five Article 7 property tax exemptions, the first exemption is for a property located at 346 East 21st Street in Council Member Carlina Rivera's district, it is going to preserve 30 units of affordable rental housing. The second exemption is

2 for Red Hook Gardens property in Council Member Carlos Menchaca's district which is going to 3 preserve 62 units of affordable rental housing. The 4 third, fourth, and fifth exemptions are for three 5 different Manhattanville projects and properties 6 7 located in Council Member Mark Levin's district, each are going to construct 20 units, seven units, 8 and 15 units for low income households. Second the 9 council will be voting on it's operating budget as 10 prepared by the city council's administrative 11 12 services division. This budget will help the New 13 York City Council fulfil its mission to the people 14 of New York City. The increases largely stem from 15 adding staff to help the council fulfil its mission 16 in the Land Use Division, the Legislative Division, 17 the Finance Division, and the New Oversight 18 Investigations Division. For example, two of the core functions of the council are of course to 19 20 legislate bills through our legislative process and to negotiate the city's budget and to that end 21 2.2 adding staff and resources to those two divisions 23 is critical to fulfilling these functions moving 24 forward. I said I was going to do this throughout the Speakers race and I am fulfilling my promise 25

2	and as I said I'm also adding staff money for a
3	potential Charter Revision Commission and creating
4	an Oversight and Investigations Division and Unit,
5	these are things that I promised and that I'm
6	committed too. I am proud that the council is
7	taking this step today, it is important for us to
8	do this for our charter mandated responsibility, it
9	is important for us to do this to pay our staffs
10	well, it is important for us to do this to continue
11	to do good work that we've done in of course the
12	last four and eight years but especially the last
13	three months so I am glad that we are doing this. I
14	want to thank the staff that worked on this,
15	Marcello Testa, Latonia McKinney and Rebecca Chasan
16	all played a vital role in crafting this, we didn't
17	do this overnight, we spent the last three months
18	speaking to every single division understanding
19	what their exact needs were and that is how we
20	crafted this. The council will also be voting on a
21	number of Land Use Items. The council will vote to
22	rezone 35-10 Astoria Boulevard located in Council
23	Member Costa Constantinides's district and Sea Park
24	North which is located in Council Member Mark
25	Traygar's district In addition the council will

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vote on proposed sites for the construction of two
primary schools in Council Member Jimmy Van
Bramer's district and to redevelop the former spot
for a juvenile detention center into 700 units of
affordable housing and light manufacturing space in
Council Member Rafael Salamanca's district who is
our Land Use Chair, it is a big deal to turn a
former detention center into affordable housing and
to a place for economic, vibrancy and activity and
opportunity. I want to congratulate Council Member
and Chair Salamanca on this very big win, on this
hard-fought victory and I want to invite Council
Member Salamanca to spend a minute talking about
his project and then Council Member Van Bramer to
talk about the construction of two new schools.

Speaker. I am extremely excited to be here today to announce what we've been able to do with this juvenile detention center that's been in my district for over 50 years. It was an eyesore and an embarrassment to the South Bronx. In 2011 this juvenile detention center was closed and since 2013 I have been working on this project as a District Manager for Bronx Community Board two now as a

2	local Council Member alongside with Community Board
3	two and local community based organizations, HPD
4	we're transforming this dark piece of land to over
5	740 units of 100 percent affordable housing MIH
6	option one, 40 percent of these units will remain
7	permanently affordable instead of 20 percent, a
8	commitment from, from a 40 year to a 60 year
9	regulatory period for the balance of the
10	residential units that are not permanently
11	affordable per MIH. There will 10 percent homeless
12	set aside for independent living and I've ensured
13	very deep affordability with rents going as low as
14	396 dollars a month. This project or this
15	development will have a full set of incubator space
16	like manufacturing, youth and wellness space, labor
17	will do the demolition phase and other skill-based
18	phase outs. The project will create over 200
19	permanent houses for this. I want to thank I'm
20	sorry, over 200 permanent jobs will be created out
21	of this project. I would like to thank the land use
22	staff Raju, Amy, Jeff and Julie; I want to thank
23	Bronx Community Board two, their Chair Crespo, the
24	District Manager Raphael Acevedo and their Land Use
25	Chair Nick Matteo I want to thank Urban Health

district 30 particularly in Long Island City. We

are I hope about to approve two brand new

24

elementary schools, hearly 1,200 additional seats
being voted on and sited today as results of these
votes, well over 100 million dollars in investments
in new school buildings. As many know district 30
is among the most crowded school districts in the
city of New York. I also have a portion of district
24, two of the most crowded school districts in New
York City. Long Island City is one of the fastest
growing neighborhoods in New York City if not the
entire United States of America, but you can't have
good neighborhoods without good schools and parents
knowing that they'll have a good school to send
their children to. So, todays vote is really
historic for our district, but it also marks the
$13^{\rm th}$ and $14^{\rm th}$ new school buildings open, funded or
sited in my district in the last eight years. So,
we are [cross-talk]

SPEAKER JOHNSON: We're going to remove folks if you... if you yell out, we... this is a... this is a place that everyone gets the opportunity to speak here, if folks yell out we're going to remove you. We had hearings, people have the opportunity to speak, if you could please finish Council Member Van Bramer.

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COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much Speaker Johnson. So, once again we are thrilled for the children and families of my community, thrilled with the 13th and 14th new schools badly needed, long fought for, well deserved for the parents, families and children of district 30 in Queens and in particular for Long Island City and we are not done. I want to send a message to the parents and families and children in Court Square and other parts of Long Island City that are seeing large scale development, we are going to continue to fight and press for more new schools, we are not done with these two but thank you in advance to my colleagues for their support of these two very important new schools in my district, thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE JAMES: Congratulations.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Congratulations Council Member Van Bramer it's a very big deal of course to get one school so to get two schools and I know you've gotten over a dozen schools in your district since you started here in the council, it is tremendous and going to help so many people so congratulations. We are also going to vote today to

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rezone Jerome Avenue in the Bronx located in
Council Member's Fernando Cabrera and Vanessa
Gibson's districts. I know this has been a
tremendous amount of hard work for both Council
Member's Gibson and Cabrera. I want to congratulate
them on their efforts in delivering two new public
schools, critically needed capital investments in
parks, the preservation of affordable housing, the
construction of new affordable housing, the saving
of jobs and many other things so I invite Council
Member's Cabrera and Gibson to take a minute each
and to speak on this.

much Mr. Speaker. I'm proud here... to be here today. This is a great moment for the West Bronx, the rezoning of Jerome Avenue is a major victory for the people of the West Bronx and I want to congratulate and thank my colleague Council Member Vanessa Gibson for her hard work in partnership with me in this effort. After years of community planning and dialogues with thousands of residents, business owners, nonprofit organizations, unions, community board four, five and seven and elected officials we had created a shared vision of the

2	future of our neighborhoods in which all residents
3	are served. Jerome Avenue is a major, major part of
4	the commercial life of my district and work to
5	expand the original footprint of the rezoning area
6	to its current 95 block area. Our communities will
7	benefit greatly for major investment in preserving
8	2,500 units of affordable housing and the creation
9	of new affordable housing, school community school
10	district ten, one of the most overcrowded school
11	districts in the district will get a brand new 458
12	seat primary school which will include a youth
13	community center to house an after-school program
14	and a new gymnatorium at PS 247. My district
15	Envisions community center has served the community
16	for decades providing much needed social and
17	community services frequently hosting community
18	events. To invest in this important facility and
19	make it accessible we are investing 1.9 million
20	dollars to install an elevator and expand the
21	building to a full second floor and more than 30
22	million will be invested in this district 14 parks.
23	The investment throughout this process I affirm my
24	commitment to this community recognizing the
25	tremendous needs and challenges that we face. The

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Jerome Avenue rezoning is a prototype of future		
rezoning projects setting high standards for		
collaboration and community input, proud of the		
work that we have done to build a bright future for		
the West Bronx. I want to give a special thanks to		
Speaker Corey Johnson, Chair Rafael Salamanca,		
Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz Junior and to		
the Land Use Division Raju Mann, Amy Levitan and		
Jeff Ewing for all their hard work and my Chief of		
Staff Greg Faulkner, Deputy Chief of Staff Anthony		
Springer and Claire McLeveighn, Legislative and		
Director Legislator Director. Thank you so much		
Mr. Chair Mr. Speaker.		

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Congratulations,
Council Member Gibson.

COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Thank you so much Mr. Speaker. Good afternoon to all of my colleagues and everyone who is here. I am so honored to stand before you as a member of the New York City Council representing district 16 and all of the work that the Jerome Neighborhood Rezoning Plan will achieve. I have always stood firm on my values and my principles and certainly my faith and I am so glad that after three years of hard work, countless

2	hours of meetings, dialogue, fellowship, all of the
3	open houses, visioning sessions, round tables,
4	community meetings, demonstrations, press
5	conferences here we are today, 189 million dollars
6	of capital investments and infrastructure work for
7	a borough like the Bronx and in particular the West
8	Bronx. Many of us recognize for far too long the
9	Bronx has been the forgotten borough, we have faced
10	enormous challenges, we have lived through the dark
11	era of the price out and the burn out and now that
12	we have brighter days ahead and we're seeing
13	neighborhoods change tremendously across the city
14	of New York, now this is an opportunity for the
15	Bronx to get what it has rightfully deserved for
16	decades and decades when no one gave a second
17	glance at the Bronx. I am proud of what we have
18	achieved in the West Bronx because this is the
19	largest and most comprehensive zoning that is
20	facing the West Bronx for decades since the 1960's
21	we have not had a major investment like this and so
22	I stand before you proud and honored at all of the
23	work that has been achieved. This has not been an
24	easy journey, this has been one of the most
25	difficult and challenging decisions I have ever

made as an elected official, but do you know what
at the end of the day I'm going to leave office
making sure that my district is better than the way
I got it when I was elected in November of 2013. I
am proud of what we have achieved, two brand new
elementary schools for school districts nine and
ten when we know our families are starving for
school seats in the West Bronx. Working alongside
our colleague Council Member Fernando Cabrera and
all of the decades of broken promises that the
Bronx has faced this neighborhood plan will bring
real and lasting contributions to the West Bronx
and all of it's people. I am proud to say that this
final plan includes significant investments in
creating and preserving affordable and deeply
affordable housing while expanding on the

COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Thank you Mr.

Speaker and thank you Madame Majority Leader and I think... you know many of you can understand the challenge that we've had over the past three years

certainly many of you recognize why I pray so much
because this has not been easy. The West Bronx
cannot be allowed to be stuck in the past, we
deserved investment yesterday, we deserve it today
and we deserve it tomorrow and our community
deserves to be a part of the future of the city of
New York and while many of the conversations during
the planning process focused on housing creation
and zoning changes this plan goes far beyond that.
In addition to the 5,500 units that have already be
preserved we are committed to an additional 2,500
units of affordable housing that are to be
preserved over the next two years. I talked about
the two public schools which will be a great
benefit for all of the families in school districts
nine and ten and also the commitment that all
housing that's built on publicly owned land will be
permanently affordable to low income and very low
income families, set asides for formally homeless
families as well as seniors, we are reaching those
families that are at the lowest end of the spectrum
an agreement to map the MIH option one as well as
the deep affordability option in this area. When
dovolopore build thoy will have to get agide 20

percent of their units for permanently affordable
units of housing for families at the extremely low
and low-income brackets. We are appointing a Jerome
specific workforce development coordinator whose
responsibility will be to work with all of the auto
businesses and small businesses in the corridor for
local hiring and employment opportunities for our
people. We have secured 1.5 million dollars to help
our auto businesses that we recognize may
potentially be displaced as a result of this
zoning. We've also given community groups funds to
provide training for our auto businesses to prepare
for the jobs of today and tomorrow. We don't want
our auto workers to be employees for the rest of
their lives, but we want them to eventually become
owners and take ownership of their property. We are
creating a working group on Jerome local hiring and
responsible contracting that will be led by Council
Member Cabrera and myself, we are going to secure
real and meaningful local hiring provisions for
construction projects along the corridor and
elevate the responsible contracting conversation
across the city. We have secured 60 million dollars
for parks in community boards four and five and I'm

2	very proud that we're getting 25 million dollars
3	for Grant Park and for 4.6 million dollars for
4	Corporal Fischer. We are creating a Southwest Bronx
5	housing task force that will be led by the Bronx
6	Borough President, Council Member Cabrera and
7	myself to address the long-term quality of life
8	issues that tenants are facing today in our
9	communities. We are creating a Jerome Avenue public
10	health task force to be addressing health
11	disparities along the Jerome corridor. I am so
12	proud of the work that has been done to get us to
13	this point, there are a lot more amenities in this
14	plan but certainly if anyone wants to talk to me
15	offline I'm more than happy to share that with you
16	but I want to commend the incredible team that
17	worked with us and walked with us every step of the
18	way; the Land Use Division Raju Mann, Jeff Ewing,
19	our project manager and Amy Levitan have been
20	absolutely exceptional. Our Land Use Chair Rafael
21	Salamanca and our Subcommittee on Zoning Chair
22	Francisco Moya have been amazing in guiding me
23	along this process, all of the colleagues I've had
24	the honor of talking to that proposed previous
25	rezoning's that have been helpful to me I want to

2	thank you. from GCP I want to recognize Carol,
3	Michael and Sean from City Planning, my Chief of
4	Staff Dana Wax, my Deputy Chief of Staff Wendy
5	Gallegos and many of the advocates, stakeholders,
6	community groups, and everyone who I listened to
7	and will still listen to after today. There is a
8	lot of work that remains to be done to ensure that
9	we hold the administration accountable for all of
10	the agreements that they made in this document that
11	has 69 different points of commitment that many I
12	didn't describe today but I truly want to thank all
13	of you for your support, for your prayers, for your
14	guidance, for your input, and I ask you to join
15	Council Member Cabrera and I in supporting this so
16	we can leave a lasting legacy of what this body has
17	done to improve a borough like the Bronx. The time
18	is now, there's so much at stake, we have a lot of
19	opportunity and I want to make sure that my borough
20	is left in better hands as a result of the Jerome
21	Neighborhood rezoning plan. I ask you for your
22	support and I thank you in advance for your
23	support. Thank you, colleagues, thank you Mr.
24	Speaker.

2	SPEAKER JOHNSON: Congratulations Council
3	Member Gibson. I also want to thank Jeff Ewing who
4	spent an enormous amount of time on this from the
5	land use division as the project manager; Amy
6	Levitan, our Deputy Director Land Use; Julie Lubin,
7	our General Counsel; Brian Paul; John Douglas;
8	James Lloyd and of course Raju Mann. Next the
9	council will vote on Introduction 605-A sponsored
10	by Council Member Steve Levin which will require
11	the NYPD to report on a quarterly basis the number
12	of arrests and summonses issued for low level
13	marijuana possession is aggregated by the offense
14	charged, race of the offender, gender of the
15	offender, age of the offender, borough in which the
16	offense took place and the precinct, housing police
17	service area or transit bureau where the offense
18	was enforced. From the staff I want to thank Beth
19	Galum Deepa Ambekar, Casey Addison and Steve
20	Riester for their help on this. We are also going
21	to vote on Introduction 262 sponsored by Council
22	Member Donovan Richards which will amend the Local
23	Law 27 of 2015 requiring the Department of
24	Education to report on various data regarding the
25	provision of special education services requiring

2	them to report the number of students in each
3	school who have an individualized education program
4	or an IEP. From the staff I want to thank Elizabeth
5	Hoffman, Smita Deshmukh, Andrea Vazquez and Terzah
6	Nasser. finally, we will vote today to extend rent
7	regulation laws in New York City. Rent regulation
8	is the most critical tool we have for maintaining
9	affordable housing in our city. My legislation,
10	Introduction 600-A and Resolution 188-A would
11	extend the finding that a housing emergency exists
12	in New York City requiring the extension of rent
13	regulation laws for the next three years. I am
14	proud that three years ago before I was Speaker I
15	carried these bills extending rent protections for
16	the 2.5 million New Yorkers who live in rent
17	regulated or rent controlled apartments, we of
18	course know we have an affordability crisis that is
19	gripping our city, we talk a lot about affordable
20	housing on this side of city hall and on the other
21	side of city hall, the easiest way to protect
22	affordable housing is to preserve the affordable
23	housing that we have and to strengthen the rent
24	laws. We need to strengthen our rent laws, there
25	are up for renewal and expiration in June of 2019

and I am fully committed to standing with many of
the advocates and activists that were here today
for a press conference in a campaign over the next
15 months to strengthen the rent laws getting rid
of and repealing vacancy decontrol, getting rid of
the issues around preferential rent on a major
capital improvements and ensuring that we protect
even more New Yorkers and not lose the critical
rent regulated housing that we have. We've lost
hundreds of thousands of units since the early
1990's and I am committed to ensuring that we don't
just pass this renewal today which extends it on
the city level for three years but next year we
actually strengthen our rent laws. So, I ask you
all to vote in favor of this legislation
Introduction 600-A and Resolution 188-A. I want to
thank from the staff Megan Chin, Kaitlyn Fahay, and
Jose Conde. That completes the highlights of our
docket and I look forward to proceeding with todays
vote, thank you all very much.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: A lot of good 3 bills today so I want to congratulate everyone who had them and including the Speaker for the 4 leadership he's put on this bill and in the ... and in the council thus far, of course the marijuana 6 7 reporting is extremely important and the Jerome rezoning, I'm going to be voting age on all so 8 congratulations to Gibson and Cabrera. I do want to 9 say the problem is, I believe this body and the 10 Mayor failed by passing the MIH that we have 11 12 passed, I believe we chose politically expediency 13 as opposed to doing what we know needed to be done. 14 The problem is I can't hold individual Council 15 Members responsible for a job that we all failed 16 at, I do hope that we do look at MIH and revisit it 17 and I'm glad that the council members chose the 18 best option which is option one. Of course, deeper affordability exists if and when property owners 19 20 choose to use the term sheets which looks like they 2.1 will use for some time because the market doesn't 2.2 bear anything else but at that time when the market 23 changes they will no longer have to use those term sheets and that is a problem, so my hope again is 24

that this body... I'm proud to have been part of the

2	voice that pushed MIH as far as it did, I'm also
3	proud to be one of the few that voted against it
4	and my hope is that we very much look at it to fix
5	some of the loopholes. I also want to lift up Ricky

7	know him a tenant leader way back when I was in
8	tenants and neighbors, I was very surprised,
9	saddened to see his death as I looked through his
10	photos I saw a picture of him and his young child
11	holding a picture of me for reelection and that
12	really touched my heart, he was a very big
13	supporter of mine from when I first ran and I'm
14	very sad that we lost him, the tenant world has
15	lost a great leader and a great champion, my
16	prayers to his wife and his entire family. As I
17	said before and when it comes to rent regulation
18	the Governor and has failed us and I'm shocked as
19	I move around the state to see how much he's failed
20	on this issue across the state, I'm glad that we're
21	doing what we can do here but we have to do a lot
22	more. Congratulations to all those who… about
23	affordability. I've always been impressed by
24	Council Member Salamanca, all of his projects have
25	had very deep affordability, congratulations

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Generally, I say that Brooklyn's the best borough because of my dreams I now have to give some shout outs to other boroughs like the Bronx. With that I vote age on all.

COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Permission to vote on all Land Use call ups and I'm voting no on 600 and aye on the rest.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE CUMBO: Permission granted.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Cumbo?

council Member Cumbo: I proudly vote aye on all and I just want to congratulate the Bronx for a huge win, Council Member Salamanca this is a huge victory to see a correctional facility turned into a housing development speaks volumes about the growth and development that the Bronx has seen and to Council Member Gibson as well as Council Member Cabrera, Cabrera, I just want to thank you all for

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your courage, your tenacity and your perseverance this has been an incredible project, the ability to bring two, two 458 seat primary schools to address overcrowding, a commitment to preserve 2,500 units of housing over the next two years, AMI's as low as 40 percent, 60 million in parks investments, 50 million in DOT improvements, this is going to speak volumes. Council Member Cabrera and Council Member Gibson this is certainly a legacy project that you should feel proud of and I'm proud to stand in support of you and to see our borough in the Bronx doing so well is quite an accomplishment and I thank you for your courage and tenacity and I proudly vote aye.

COMMITTEE CLERK: Speaker Johnson?

SPEAKER JOHNSON: I vote age on all and I would ask all Council Members we're going to have a, a democratic conference after this so if folks could stay and potentially limit the general discussion unless you must really speak today it would be helpful for us to be able to... because folks have to go back to their districts for us to be able to meet together so I vote age on all.

Thank you. 14 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Majority leader you've 15 done a great job filling in, thank you for being up 16 there. 17 PUBLIC ADVOCATE CUMBO: Thank you. Now the introduction and reading of bills. 18 SPEAKER JOHNSON: All bills have been 19 20 referred to committees as indicated on the agenda. PUBLIC ADVOCATE CUMBO: Discussion of 21 2.2 Resolutions. Resolutions 188-A, an amended 23 resolution in determining that a public emergency

requiring rent control in the city of New York

continues to exist and will continue to exist on

any other way.

2 COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: Mr. Speaker and 3 Majority Leader and all my colleagues today I am introducing Intro 734 to ban smoking while walking 4 on city sidewalks. We all had the experience of getting stuck behind a smoker while walking down a 6 7 crowded city street, this bill looks to keep the nuisance of public cigarette smoke confined to more 8 manageable spaces. If you want to smoke stand off 9 to the side, people can easily walk past you but if 10 you are walking down the sidewalk you are carrying 11 12 the smoke with you and everyone behind you is 13 sniffing it in. I've seen too many mothers with 14 strollers and parents holding hands with their 15 children walking behind smokers who are blowing 16 clouds of smoke behind them and swinging their arms 17 while holding a lit cigarette. One of my staff was 18 actually burnt by a careless smoker who touched her arm with a lit cigarette. In a perfect world every 19 20 smoker will have the self-awareness to realize that smoking and walking down a crowded sidewalk 21 2.2 subjects everyone behind you to breath... to 23 breathing in the fumes, enforcement will be minimal and up to the discretion of police, we are not 24

looking to throw the book at smokers but we cannot...

2 no, the fact that we live in a city of over eight 3 million people and we all share the same sidewalks. One person's actions impact everyone around them, 4 this is a... this is a quality of life issue that can 5 use a stronger hand. other cities around the world 6 7 have similar laws, Tokyo has banned smoking and walking on sidewalks they even have signs on 8 streets reminding you not to smoke and walk like 9 this. So, I hope you join me in signing on this 10 11 bill, thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE CUMBO: Thank you Council Member Koo, thank you.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Peter I love that clip art.

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COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: I'm going to talk a little bit about the individual that Margaret mentioned earlier who we lost in our district. I want to express my deep sadness for a beloved son of the Lower East side, Ricky Leung who we lost last week. Ricky Leung was born and raised in the

2	LES moving to Brooklyn to start his family. I had
3	the honor of knowing this wonderful individual who
4	cared about his family, his community, in doing the
5	right thing for tenants and low-income families.
6	Ricky and I had the same mentor, Marie Christopher,
7	a local activist who died in January 2013. Before
8	she left us, she told Ricky to look out for me and
9	to continue his work around organizing and advocacy
10	and Ricky never faltered. He was active with
11	tenants and neighbors in good old Lower East Side
12	and a big part of empowering campaigns around
13	housing and land use specifically the Seward Park
14	Urban Renewal area now called Essex Crossing and
15	around activating space in our community for local
16	youth. Ricky Leung was an architect who brought
17	compassion and reason to urban planning, he
18	understood New York City real estate but always put
19	people over profit. His expertise and grit brought
20	him to D.C. where Congresswoman Nydia Velazquez had
21	him testify before congress on the importance of
22	the section eight program. Ricky was a caretaker
23	looking after his parents and he always mentioned
24	his true loves, his wife Sam and his son Jason.
25	Ricky will be profoundly missed, he was respected

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and loved, and his departure left a big loss in our community and citywide. He will live on through his accomplishments and he will always be in our

hearts. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER WILLIAMS: Thank you, I will cut short my laundry list at your request, but I do want to lift up Marielle Franco, her assassination really did touch me because of similarities of so many of the issues that we fight off. She was 38 years old, she was a black woman, she was part of the LGBTGNC community, she lives up... lifted up the voice that so many of us lift up here, she's a feminist, she fought the LGBTGNC rights for black... for the black community, for the poor community, she was part of a 51 member delegation, she won the first time she ran, she was assassinated coming back from a black empowerment event. Someone I know who works in the Favelas gave me such a rundown of the beautiful work she was doing and even said she was being... she was one of the people who was probably going to be head of the committee that over... had oversight in the police

2	department. It touched me a lot because many of us
3	think of ourselves as courageous when we're
4	fighting for those issues, she is a star ward of
5	courage, thankfully I'm always recognizing the
6	country I'm in the city I'm in, you do have to have
7	some courage. Thankfully for the most part not the
8	type of courage she had to have had to continue to
9	move forward even when danger was near. Her sister
10	said she was doing what she loved to do, she also
11	said that she believes she was assassinated because
12	she was becoming a menace, she was the only black
13	woman on the body even though the Brazilian
14	population is half black or mixed race and I hope
15	we continue to lift up her name, the work that she,
16	she was doing as we can see the work that we speak
17	of is around the world and we've heard the words
18	menace, we've heard the agitative, we've heard a
19	lot of those words before but that usually means
20	you are doing something right unfortunately she
21	lost her life, she was assassinated for the very
22	things we fight for here and that really just
23	struck a nerve with me and I want to make sure we
24	continue to lift her up and the things she was
25	fighting for. Thank you.

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PUBLIC ADVOCATE CUMBO: Thank you and may her soul rest in peace. Council Member Yeger.

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you Madame President, I'll be brief as Mr. Speaker requested in the interest of time in getting us all back to our districts. Today I'm introducing Resolution 244 of... approximately a little over a month and a half ago we watched what happened in Florida when a lone gunman walked in to a high school and assassinated, murdered 17 children, left many more injured. I've spoken about this on the floor, many of you, my colleagues have spoken about this here on this floor and, you know as, as I've said we... there's not really a lot we can do as a government body as the legislature to make guns... to, to lessen the availability of weapons and ammunition in the hands of those who shouldn't have them but what we can do is keep the pressure on those who can and so my resolution calls on the congress to enact the safe law just like we have in the New York States, not the best solution but it's a good solution. It's, it's a law that makes it more difficult not an outright ban, doesn't take them all away but it makes it more difficult for people who shouldn't

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have guns, who shouldn't have 30 round clips,
nobody should have 30 round clips to enact that
into law. Now I don't think this congress is going
to do it but I think that if we start speaking now
and we start the ball this year and we keep on
talking about it maybe, maybe, maybe next year we
get a congress that will pass this and so I urge my
colleagues please to sign onto Resolution 244 so
that we can get a hearing as soon as possible so
that we can speak with one voice and get that
rolling in Washington. Thank you, Madame President.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE CUMBO: Thank you. And our final speaker if there are none others will be Council Member Ben Kallos.

differed and hopes others might but to, to modest success. The remaining legislation is a package of democracy legislation that may seem familiar from last term and may have been referenced by another elected official seeking to do it on their own. The first is fixing a flaw in our otherwise great campaign finance system in the country, Introduction 732 with co-primary sponsor Cabrera and Powers will allow for the first time a candidate to run a campaign for city office solely on small dollars. Introduction 733 with co-primary sponsors Treyger and Rosenthal would expand the council's initiatives originally proposed by Council Member Rosenthal to actually register high school students

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in school. Introduction 731 would require landlords
to distribute voter registration forms with leases
and Introduction 730 would put candidates on the

belt when they qualify for public match.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE CUMBO: And
