3	CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Okay, good morning
4	and welcome to today's Finance Committee meeting. My
5	name Council Member Daniel Dromm and I'm Chair of the
6	committee. We've been joined by Council Member
7	Adrienne Adams, Council Member Keith Powers, Council
8	Member Francisco Moya, Council Member Barry
9	Grodenchik, Council Member Rory Lancman, Council
10	Member Andy Cohen, Council Member Steve Matteo and
11	Council Member Jimmy Van Bramer. Today the committee
12	will be voting on three items and Council Member
13	Robert Cornegy just joined us. Today the committee
14	will be voting on three items; the transparency
15	resolution, an expense budget modification and a
16	revenue budget modification. Let's start with the
17	transparency resolution which sets forth the new
18	designation and changes in the designation of certain
19	organizations receiving local, aging and youth
20	discretionary funding and funding pursuant to certain
21	initiatives in the budget. Organizations appearing in
22	the resolution that have not yet completed the
23	prequalification process conducted by the Mayor's
24	Office of Contract Services, the council or another
25	entity are identified in the attached charts with an

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2 asterisk. As with all transparency resolutions, 3 Council Members will have to disclose a disclosure form... will have to sign a disclosure form indicating 4 whether or not a conflict exists with any of the 5 groups on the attached list. If any Council Member 6 7 has a potential conflict of interest with any of the organizations listed, he or she has the opportunity 8 to disclose the conflict at the time of their vote. 9 As a reminder please disclose any conflicts you, you 10 may have ... [clears throat] excuse me ... with proposed 11 12 subcontractors used by organizations sponsored by 13 discretionary funding. These disclosures must be made 14 before the subcontractor can be approved. Marly 15 Marcellus from the General Counsel's Office is here 16 and can assist you with any questions or concerns 17 regarding disclosures. Also, regarding the 18 transparency resolution I'd like to call to member's attention that since the email you received last 19 20 night containing the charts attached to this resolution there have been two additions. First there 21 2.2 was an addition of 400,000 dollars to Man Up 23 Incorporated as indicated in chart four and second there were changes to the Dove Initiative as 24 25 indicated in chart ten. Next, we have two budget

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2 modifications, briefly the expense budget 3 modification, MN-6 would transfer 970.3 million dollars between various units of appropriation in 4 fiscal 2018. The net effect of these transfers on the 5 budget will be zero. The revenue budget modification, 6 7 MN-7 would recognize 783.8 million dollars in new revenues for fiscal 2018. These new revenues combined 8 with a 400-million-dollar reduction in prior year 9 payables and a 1.4-billion-dollar reduction of the 10 general reserve for a total of 2.58 billion dollars 11 12 will be added to the budget stabilization account to 13 prepay debt service for fiscal 2019. Yesterday this 14 committee held a hearing so that Council Members 15 could ask questions of the Office of Management and Budget and obtain additional details about the 16 17 actions in the modifications. As I stated yesterday, 18 that hearing was not business as usual, but it was necessary given that the modifications contained 19 large transfers of funding that had they been 20 included at budget adoption would have received more 21 2.2 public scrutiny and oversight than has historically 23 been given to budget modification actions. After the hearing there was some outstanding issues that 24 25 required follow up with the agency, the Finance

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2 Division sent OMB a list of questions and I 3 appreciate and thank OMB for the speed in which they responded. A list of the questions and answers were 4 5 emailed to you earlier this morning by council and 6 copies are also on the desks before you. OMB also 7 provided a hard copy and I'm showing you right here, a hard copy because it was not available by email of 8 the school service... support services contract which I 9 have here. In addition to the follow up information 10 OMB provided the administration has agreed to a new 11 12 process which will allow for increased information 13 sharing and collaboration with OMB prior to the 14 submission of budget modifications to the council for 15 approval. Broadly OMB has agreed to provide pre-16 modification briefings for Council Members, new 17 reports and data regarding requested modifications 18 and significantly changed programs, more time for discussion and negotiation on modification items and 19 20 to testify at hearings regarding budget modifications at the discretion of the council. These new 21 2.2 procedures will certainly lead to a more cooperative 23 process where members have the necessary information to make considered determinations to hold the 24 administration accountable for it's spending. I thank 25

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the Speaker for his leadership in ensuring that this 2 3 body has the tools it needs in order to conduct rigorous oversight and the administration for it's 4 willingness to work with us towards our shared goal 5 of transparency. Are there any questions now on 6 7 todays items? Before I ask Billy Martin, Committee Clerk to call the roll I'd like to remind my 8 colleagues that the Finance Committee will meet on 9 April 18th at ten a.m. in Council Chambers to hold a 10 11 joint hearing with the Committee on Education and 12 Land Use to review the recent council report planning 13 to learn, the school building challenge on several 14 related pieces of legislation, hopefully everybody 15 will show up for that. And with that now I'd like to 16 ask Billy to call the roll. 17 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: William Martin, Committee Clerk roll call vote Committee on Finance 18 all items are coupled, Chair Dromm? 19 20 CHAIRPERSON DROMM: I vote aye. 21 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Cohen? 2.2 COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: Mr. Chair can I 23 explain my vote for a second? 24 CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Yes, you may. 25

3	thank you and the Speaker obviously, I think
4	yesterday's hearing really was of value I think that
5	focusing a little sunshine it's a significant amount
6	of money that is being modified here, the budget's
7	being modified in a significant way so I just want to
8	applaud you and the leadership here, I think that we
9	did… our work was of value yesterday so I vote aye,
10	thank you.

7	COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Thank you. On MN-
8	7 I'm voting aye and on MN-6 I'll be voting aye but
9	I, I, I am reluctant to do so because of something I
10	think we highlighted yesterday in yesterday's
11	hearing which is that A, there are I think items in
12	this budget that we need to be able to review, I'd
13	highlight the school bus grant program which I think
14	has been a constant source of conversation debate and
15	I would be… and not doing my I think my due diligence
16	to, to make sure that the council's providing real
17	oversight about why we continue to fund that program
18	which I, I think my predecessor made a lot of valid
19	points around whether the legality of it and the
20	constitutionality of it for starters, you know second
21	I understand that we have a long list of items in
22	here and we have a we have a diligence to make sure
23	that the city is funded on our obligations and we, we
24	estimate the items in here that would allow for the
25	closure of a facility on Rikers Island, something I
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2 know you support and I support but the process by 3 which we are asked to vote on a billion dollar 4 readjustment with items in it that I think really 5 almost independently deserve independent oversight is a... is a... is a difficult thing I think for any Council 6 7 Member to, to be asked to do. I, I wanted to applaud you and the Finance Division and the Speaker for, for 8 I think the first time in a long time actually asking 9 questions and asking allowing us to do that so while 10 I, I support many of the items in here there are ones 11 12 that I think I, I, I wish this process were done in a different way to not have us have to vote on one 13 billion dollars of, of, of changes to the budget and 14 15 another I think 700 or so in, in new cost estimates 16 but to allow us to have these independent items 17 brought up and, and voted on independently and to 18 have more oversight and more time truthfully to be able to talk about these issues. So, thank you for 19 20 that work and I, I do hope a new process brings out a new result and an opportunity to look at these items 21 2.2 independently, thank you. 23 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Matteo? 24 COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Thank you, I appreciate my colleague's comments, I'm going to go a 25

I'm just fundamentally opposed to the 3 bus grant program, I have been since we voted on it 4 four years ago, I questioned the legality, for those 5 reasons I'm going to vote no on M-30 and aye on the 6 rest. 7 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Gibson? Preconsidered Resolution and M-31 are adopted by the 8 committee; 12 in the affirmative, zero in the 9 negative and no abstentions with M-30 being adopted 10 by the committee; 11 in the affirmative, and ... excuse 11 12 me... ten in the affirmative, one in the negative and 13 no abstentions. 14 CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Okay and with that we 15 are going to hold the vote open for another ten 16 minutes or so. Thank you. Thank you to all the 17 members and we'll see you a little later today, thank 18 you. COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Committee on 19 20 Finance, Council Member Gibson? COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Permission to 21 2.2 briefly explain my vote? 23 CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Yes. 24 COUNCIL MEMBER GIBSON: Thank you Chair Dromm and I want to commend our Chair of Finance just 25

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2 for holding yesterday's hearing, but I really want to make sure that I go on the record in regard to the 3 budget modification regarding the city's expense 4 5 budget. I do continue to have extreme concerns about the level of spending the DHS is providing just to 6 7 provide basic shelter services for individuals and families, 2.4 million dollars for cluster housing 8 every month is outrageous and as we talk about 9 drawing down and phasing out cluster housing we have 10 got to put together a real plan to manage the city's 11 12 homeless population. While we've made incredible 13 investments we have still not come to a point where 14 anyone should be satisfied with the level of millions 15 and millions of dollars that we continue to spend to 16 house homeless families and warehouse many of them 17 and so I am just really concerned as a representative 18 from Bronx County that has a high concentration of family shelters, single adult shelters, and cluster 19 20 housing, I really want to make sure I go on the record, we have got to put together a comprehensive 21 2.2 housing plan that even meets a fraction of the amount 23 that we're spending in DHS and it is not happening. While I know as a city we are obligated to house 24 homeless individuals and families we should also feel 25

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2 obligated to provide long term affordable housing for families and individuals in this city and so while I 3 4 support this I really want to make sure that my colleagues and I understand that we have got to 5 6 change this conversation. We need to whip DHS into 7 shape, they are not doing a good job where I'm satisfied to the point where we can continue to look 8 at these budget mods and these huge numbers and so 9 I'm looking forward to working with my colleagues to 10 make sure that we have a considerable amount of 11 12 affordable housing that goes along the same process 13 if we're talking about building 90 shelters in the 14 city of New York. And so, with that I am voting aye 15 on all and I want to thank our Chair again for having 16 a hearing on the budget mods, thank you. 17 CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you and may I 18 make a remark? Yep. I want to thank you also for all the work that you've done in this process and I 19 20 really just want to say that it wouldn't have been possible to do it without your help so thank you 21 2.2 very, very much. 23 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Rosenthal? 24 COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: Aye on all, 25 thank you Chair.
