Good afternoon Chairperson Adams, Councilmember King, and members of the Land Use Subcommittee on Landmarks, Public Siting, and Maritime Uses. I am Julie Friesen, Deputy Commissioner for Administration at the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on the Department's application for site selection for a full-service animal shelter at 2050 Bartow Avenue in the Bronx.

The Health Department is charged with managing and caring for the City's population of ownersurrendered, abandoned, homeless and lost animals. In 1995, the City created a nonprofit entity – now known as Animal Care Centers or ACC – to operate the animal shelter system. The services the Health Department carries out through a contract with ACC include receiving and sheltering animals, providing medical services, and animal placement. ACC also performs a vital public safety function by handling potentially dangerous animals; accepting suspected rabid animals for observation or preparation for testing; and working with City and State agencies in wildlife management. ACC performs these services by operating full-service animal shelters in Manhattan, Brooklyn, and Staten Island, admissions centers in the Bronx and Queens (which transfer animals to the Manhattan and Brooklyn shelters daily), and field operations throughout the city. ACC is required to accept all animals, without regard to their condition, age, temperament, or adoptability.

On June 26, 2018, the Mayor signed Local Law 123, which requires the Health Department to maintain and operate a full-service animal shelter in all five boroughs by 2024. The proposal before you today would help us meet this mandate by establishing a full-service animal shelter in the Bronx.

Currently, the Bronx only has an Admissions Center, which is too small to adequately support the current intake of animals. This new shelter will add critical capacity to the citywide system, allowing for an additional 6,000 animals to be cared for in the Bronx every year. The fullservice shelter will provide counseling services to help people keep their pets and provide adoption services for people to adopt new pets. This proposed project will also include an animal medical clinic, the first in the City's animal care system.

This application is years in the making. Starting in 2014, the Health Department worked closely with the Department of Citywide and Administrative Services (DCAS) and ACC to carry out an exhaustive search to find a site in the Bronx that would accommodate all of the programmatic needs of the proposed animal shelter. We also worked with the Department of City Planning to evaluate these locations for zoning requirements.

In the first round of our search, we identified and considered 21 sites that met our minimum criteria. Upon this initial review, ten of those sites were eliminated because their lot size was too small, or they were only available for lease, therefore they would not be appropriate candidates for the significant capital renovation needed to build a full-service animal shelter.

In the second round of our search, the eleven remaining sites were further reviewed, using the following criteria:

• City Owned vs. Private Lot. The ideal site is a City-owned lot, preferably vacant, to avoid demolition, speed up construction, and reduce the time and cost of land acquisition.

- Lot Size. It is critical that we identify at least an 80,000 square feet lot, to accommodate all the needed functions of the project. This includes:
 - Approximately 30,000 square feet of ground floor built area to avoid moving animals on elevators and minimize the spread of disease.
 - External space for dog runs to facilitate animal exercise and good health, sufficient parking for clients and staff, and loading bays for animal transfers.
- Location. To reach the greatest number of potential adoption customers, the animal shelter needs to be in an easily accessible, highly visible, and well-trafficked commercial corridor, much like a retail store.
- Accessibility. The site should be accessible via car and public transportation, convenient to Bronx residents, and located within zoning districts where animal shelters can be "as-of-right", such as in districts C8, M1, M2 or M3.

Based on the criteria above, the 2050 Bartow Avenue site was the ideal fit for the needs of a fullservice animal shelter. It is City owned, and is currently a vacant lot being used to store NYPD police trailers. At 88,200 square feet, it is large enough to accommodate all animal shelter functions and critical HVAC infrastructure on a single story, with plenty of space for dog runs, parking, and aesthetic improvements added to the surrounding built environment. It is also accessible to Bronx residents via car, eleven bus lines, and a fifteen-to-twenty minute walk to the subway. Finally, it is located virtually in the middle of the Co-op City shopping center, a busy commercial thoroughfare which will bring foot traffic as well as provide shopping and retail opportunities for the staff and visitors of the animal shelter. This last feature is key, as a highly visible location can increase animal adoption rates by one hundred percent.

As you can see, the proposed design for the Bartow Avenue site is both aesthetically pleasing and functional. It will fit well in to the mix of commercial, residential, and industrial land uses in the surrounding neighborhood. Additionally, the final design would be subject to community input and approval by the Public Design Commission, and we would be pleased to work closely with the community during that process.

We are looking forward to bringing this intricately designed, state of the art animal shelter online to serve the 1.4 million residents of the Bronx in the near future. If this site were to not move forward, we would begin our search again, delaying our timeline for completion by several years and well past the 2024 deadline set by this Council under Local Law 123. At 2050 Bartow Avenue we are able to serve the health and welfare of the city's abandoned and surrendered animals while providing a much needed service to residents of the Bronx.

Thank you again for the opportunity to testify. I am happy to answer questions.

Testimony of Jeff Dupee, Deputy Commissioner, Mayor's Community Affairs Unit

Good afternoon, Chair Adams and members of the Committee. My name is Jeff Dupee and I am a Deputy Commissioner in the Mayor's Community Affairs Unit. I am joined by colleagues from the Departments of Health and Mental Hygiene, Dept for Citywide Administrative Services, and Animal Care Centers of NYC, the organization contracted by the City to run our open-admissions shelters. On behalf of the Administration, thank you for the opportunity to testify.

We are pleased to be here today to discuss the siting of a first ever full-service animal shelter in the Bronx, which will bring much-needed services to a borough that has been underserved for decades. This history behind our journey here is a long one but we believe before the Council is an application that can successfully achieve the objective of delivering a multi-unit animal care operation in an efficient design on the same level of nationally regarded facilities

The issue of animal welfare is a priority of this Administration—one that, like Council, we are committed to addressing.

I also want to take a moment to thank the City Council for its own leadership on behalf of animal welfare and for its consistent and strong commitment to making sure our City

The Mayor has a long record of supporting progressive animal welfare reforms and during the Mayor's first term, the Administration has worked together with the City Council to enact a variety of policies to make life better for the animals of this city—and for the people who care about them.

- We have worked closely with Council to regulate pet shops so that they only sell spayed or neutered dogs and cats, and no longer sell rabbits, or dogs and cats from puppy or kitten mills.
- Required that new pet shops and 24 hour veterinarian clinics have life-saving fire sprinklers.
- We have also ensured that animal crimes are appropriately addressed by implementing the animal abuse registry and creating the NYPD's Animal Cruelty Investigation Squad.
- With the support of the Council, we have increased the operating budget for the City's openadmission animal shelters to a record level, so they can save more animals and be a model to open admission shelters across the country.

• Finally, in 2015, the Mayor announced our intention to bring full-service animal shelters to all five boroughs. With the support of then-Health Committee Chair—and now Speaker—Johnson, \$1.2 Million was included in the Fiscal Year 2016 budget to develop plans to meet the animal sheltering needs of The Bronx and Queens. \$59M was added in the capital budget to design and build the Bronx shelter. This capital funding was determined by the OMB Capital Project Scope Development study performed by Mott MacDonald working with Shelter Planners of America, to address the specific animal care needs of the Bronx. Just 4 months ago, on June 7—after this ULURP had begun—the City Council voted unanimously to pass a bill requiring full-service shelters in all five boroughs. The Mayor eagerly signed that bill, with the understanding that we already well on our way to making that law a reality.

This is what brings us here today.

The selection of this Bronx site represents a multi-year process involving the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene, the Department of Citywide Administration Services, The Department of Design and Constructions, the Office of Management and Budget, and City Hall. It included a search of both private and public sites through out the Bronx and was guided by a comprehensive set of criteria to ensure we were considering all avenues and developing a sound and thoughtful proposal. We enlisted the help of Bronx residents, land use experts and others to solicit ideas and after all the work we successfully found a site to that would allow us to move forward.

The site in question is a City-owned property currently used for NYPD storage. It is situated along a commercial corridor, among the stores of the Bay Plaza Mall, and across the street from the Bartow Mall Shopping Center. Having an animal care center in a commercial zone will raise its profile, provide additional foot traffic for the local businesses from employees and visitors, and make it easier for the residents of the Bronx to take advantage of the services being provided.

Behind the Bartow Mall Shopping Center is the southern border to Coop City. During our community engagement during the ULURP, we have heard objections to this siting from some Coop City residents. They have made it clear that they would rather the site be used for a community center. We have taken these concerns to heart and have been engaging with residents to discuss how we can expand youth, adult, and senior programming as part of this land use application—and are eager to meet the needs, as part of the site selection process, while addressing the animal care needs of the entire Bronx and complying with the law passed by City Council in June.

Our work to ensure animal welfare is ongoing and our goal is to make sure that all animals in the City of New York are treated with dignity.

Thank you again for the opportunity to testify. I look forward to discussing with the Council ways to continue to work for the betterment of the animals in New York City, while ensuring that local residents' needs are also met.

You will now hear from the Julie Friesen, Deputy Commissioner for Administration at the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene—the applicant on this ULURP—as well as Aurora Velazquez, the Chief Operating Officer of Animal Care Centers of NYC.

Following Aurora's testimony, my colleagues and I will be happy to take questions.

Dear Chairperson Adams and Council Members,

My name is Brian Shapiro, NY State Director for the Humane Society of the United States. I am speaking here today on behalf of our members and supporters in New York City and Bronx County.

The HSUS enthusiastically supports the proposed full-service animal shelter at the designated Bartow Avenue location. Our organization receives dozens of calls and emails every year from residents of the Bronx seeking information and assistance with animal care related issues. There is a dire need for animal care services in this historically underserved borough. All New Yorkers deserve, and are legally entitled to, equal access to animal care services, as the current Bronx Resource Center on East Fordham Road does not meet the needs of the community. Following a thorough review, the City Planning Commission, through the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure, has found that the proposed shelter and adoption center would not have a significant environmental impact. Failure to support the CPC's recommendation will leave this project in limbo for years. This is something that the residents of the Bronx cannot afford. There is a dire need for a pet food pantry, low cost vet clinic, dog training, surrender prevention counseling, and other essential community services the proposed modern, state-of-the-art facility would provide.

The Humane Society of the United States, and our members and supporters in the Bronx, respectfully urge the City Council and Speaker to vote in favor of the proposal located at the Bartow Avenue location.

Introduction

Good afternoon Chairperson Adams, Councilmember King, and members of the Land Use Subcommittee on Landmarks, Public Siting, and Maritime Uses. My name is Aurora Velazquez and I am the Chief Operating Officer of Animal Care Centers of NYC (ACC). Thank you for the opportunity to testify today. ACC is grateful for the commitment of Mayor de Blasio towards ensuring the success of ACC in our shared mission to end animal homelessness in NYC through the construction of a full service animal shelter in the Bronx. We believe the addition of an animal shelter in the Bronx will provide more services to a greater number of NYC residents looking to engage with our organization; and further protect and promote the health and safety of the community and its animals.

Background

ACC was incorporated in 1995 as a 501(c)(3) not for profit organization dedicated to the health and welfare of pets and people in NYC. For over 20 years, ACC has been the city's sole contractor charged with operating the existing municipal animal shelters and providing animal rescue and welfare services to all five boroughs, 7 days a week, 24 hours a day. Our mission is to end animal homelessness in NYC. Twenty years ago, only 25% of animals entering the shelter system were placed and programs were minimal. Today, ACC is a dramatically different organization and in 2017 achieved an unprecedented placement rate of 93% for cats and dogs. We offer a full complement of services and programs that benefit not just animals but people and communities as well.

Overview of ACC

By contract with the city, ACC operates under an "open admissions" model. This makes ACC unique among all other animal welfare organizations in NYC because we accept *any* animal brought to our five locations, whether the animal has been abandoned, surrendered, found as a stray, brought in by the public, NYPD, or our animal rescue team, and regardless of age, health status, breed, species, temperament or physical condition. We operate three city-owned, fullservice Animal Care Centers located in Manhattan, Brooklyn, and Staten Island, and two Admissions Centers, located in the Bronx and in Queens respectively that provide limited services to help find lost pets, take in surrendered pets and offer surrender prevention alternatives.

ACC currently employs over 250 staff across thirteen departments each with a specific role as it relates to our overall mission. We have staff at all levels of qualification including individuals with excellent skills in animal handling, customer service and social work, as well as advanced degrees and experience in animal welfare, veterinary and shelter medicine and not for profit business. We are a national leader for open admissions shelters and have been recognized for our progressive, compassionate, lifesaving approach to animal welfare. We engage over 500 active volunteers, who not only support the work we do, but who also experience very real benefits as individuals, on a personal level, something we hope to extend to Bronx residents through this new facility.

Community Based Programs

In addition to providing basic animal services to the City of New York, we also provide many community enhancing programs, which we strive to position and deliver in a way that is responsive to the needs and wishes of the communities in which we're located. These programs aim to be inclusive and relevant to New Yorkers with varying interests and priorities.

Community Kids

Through the Community Kids Program, ACC acts as an educational resource and an inspiration for kids and teens in NYC by providing valuable experience through the lens of working with animals. While providing meaningful enrichment to the animals, programs such as reading to cats, also helps promote literacy and comfort in public speaking for school age children, among other benefits. With a local state-of-the-art shelter, ACC will be able to educate and inspire many more young residents of the Bronx, with the added benefit of investing their efforts into their own communities.

Senior-focused Programming

In addition to participating in the variety of volunteer positions offered by ACC (e.g., Cat and Dog Companions, Pet Photography, Pet Biographers, miscellaneous office/admin support), ACC is developing specifically-tailored programs for seniors. This programming will include visits to senior centers by ACC representatives with some of our easiest-going animals and opportunities to assist with elements of the Community Kids Program, which will realize the benefits of pet therapy as well as help keep our seniors active and engaged in their communities.

Community Pet Program

Through our Community Pet Program, ACC hosts pop-up clinics throughout the Bronx, providing free vaccinations for dogs and cats as well as microchips and referrals for free spay/neuter surgeries. At these Community Pet Clinics, ACC strives to learn more about other citizens may have, and to connect them with resources that are offered as part of our overall program. Through this program and in partnership with local pet trainers, ACC also offers free workshops for dog owners and their canines to help create safe neighborhoods. These kinds of offerings support maintaining stable family units, inclusive of pets, which yield benefits not only to those individual families, but to their greater communities as well.

As an additional component of our current surrender prevention efforts, ACC plans to utilize the larger space in the new Bronx shelter to host a "Pet and People Support Night" once a month where members of the community can ask ACC's admissions counselors questions regarding pet ownership, and any challenges they are facing. These sessions would also be welcome to individuals who are not pet owners, but who may be looking for advice on pet issues they are experiencing or tips on how to live more harmoniously with their pet loving neighbors.

Commitment to Being a Good Neighbor

All of these programs have been developed, in part, as response to things we heard within the community. ACC has been operating animal shelters in NYC neighborhoods for over 20 years. We are next to churches and schools and develop relationships with small businesses and neighbors. While our mission is animal-centric, we recognize that not everyone's is and work hard to ensure that our activities, promotions, and efforts are positioned appropriately, which is what we hope to do in the Bronx.

Closing Remarks

On behalf of everyone at Animal Care Centers of NYC, thank you for the opportunity to testify today in support of building a full-service animal shelter in the Bronx. ACC welcomes the opportunity to expand our full complement of animal and community services to the Bronx and better meet the needs of those residents. The physical layout of a state of the art care center combined with our programmatic expansion would make NYC and in particular the Bronx, a model for animal sheltering nationwide.

Dear Chairperson Adams and Committee Members,

My name is Joyce Friedman and in addition to being on the Board of Directors of Voters for Animal Rights, I am a long-term professional in the animal and social work fields. I'm a former manager of the Safety Net helpline, a NYC pet surrender prevention program which assisted over 10,000 people with resources they needed to care for their pets.

You will hear those who oppose this shelter location on Bartow Avenue say today that we must put people ahead of animals. Please don't accept this misleading and inaccurate framing of the issue. The full-service center will provide a multitude of services to Bronx residents, thereby helping people and the animals they love. It is not either-or. I will explain.

I am testifying in full support of the Bartow Avenue location for this shelter because if this location is denied, the construction of a Bronx animal shelter will be delayed for years, and this will hurt many thousands of people in the Bronx. I know this because for the 7 years I managed the Safety Net helpline, we received thousands of requests from pet owners in need of our free and low-cost resources. A very significant portion of these calls were from Bronx families who were desperate not to give up their beloved pets while struggling through a crisis because the Bronx lacks such resources.

One of these callers was an elderly woman named Sherice who lived alone with her 10-year-old beloved dog Petunia who was her primary companion. When Petunia got an infected paw, Sherice was unable to afford vet care or travel to a vet. Because Petunia was in pain, she also started nipping, and while Sherice knew she didn't mean it, she was getting worried how to handle all this. Our program provided her with a low-cost vet, transport to the vet, and a free dog trainer to help resolve the nipping. When Petunia was back to normal, Sherice told us in tears that she had thought she had to give up her companion and was terrified of how lonely and depressed she would have become.

I can tell you hundreds of Sherice-type stories which demonstrate that lack of pet services leads to the otherwise unnecessary surrender of beloved pets. This new shelter will provide these very services to the thousands of Sherice's in the Bronx who are not sitting here today who will benefit from the shelter's pet food bank, free dog training, low cost veterinary and spay neuter clinic, and surrender prevention counseling- all services which Animal Care Centers has already proven are successful at keeping pets and people together and reducing the intake numbers.

Studies by the Humane Society of the United States have found that there are approximately 23 million pets living in underserved communities like the Bronx, and that approximately 77% have not seen a vet. This is not because their families care any bit less about their animals as anyone else, but because they do not have easy access to veterinary care and other services many people take for granted. In fact a 2017 study by the NYC Economic Development Corporation found that the Bronx has the least number of veterinarians (1 for every 89 dogs, as compared to 1 for no more than 34 dogs in the other 4 boroughs) (https://www.nycedc.com/blog-entry/new-york-citys-dog-population).

Extrapolating from national statistics that 68% of households have pets and 95% of those consider their pets family, we can approximate that almost 1 million of the 1.47 million Bronx residents have one pet they consider family. This shelter will provide support to them, and it will also make adoption finally accessible to Bronx families who want to adopt a homeless dog, cat or rabbit, instead of having to travel outside the borough for this. Residents of Co-op City or elsewhere who do not have or want pets can benefit from the shelter's 100 new jobs and youth and senior volunteer programs; we all know how beneficial these bonds are as evidenced by the pet therapy programs many nursing homes and schools have. For those who do not care to adopt or volunteer, the shelter will hurt none of them, but it will help their neighbors and friends. So, it's not people versus animals. Please don't deprive Bronx residents of such a fabulous community resource center for both people and animals, and please vote yes on the Bartow Avenue location. Thank you.

DEBORAH THOMAS TESTIMONY TO CITY COUNCIL IN SUPPORT OF NYC ANIMAL CARE CENTER BRONX SHELTER – OCT. 9, 2018

Good Morning. My name is Deborah Thomas and I am a long-time volunteer at the Animal Care Centers Manhattan Shelter, having volunteered there as a cat adoption facilitator for more than 12 years. I am here today to speak in support of the plan to build a full service animal shelter in the Bronx.

I was very excited earlier this year, when the Mayor announced a location for a fullservice animal shelter in the Bronx, and I feel that the proposed location at 2050 Bartow Avenue in the Bronx is an excellent location for the shelter because it would be visible to all, and can be easily reached by many modes of transportation.

Animal advocates including myself have fought for this to take place for more than a decade. A full service shelter in the Bronx is badly needed because unlike the current Bronx Admissions Center on East Fordham Road, which is mainly used for animal intakes, this brand new, state-of-the-art facility would be much larger and accommodate cat, dog and rabbit ADOPTIONS. This would greatly lessen the overflow of animals in the Manhattan shelter, and would in turn prevent animals in the overcrowded Manhattan shelter from getting sick. Increased adoptions would save scores of animal lives, and could help the ACC to fulfill its mission to end animal homelessness in NYC once and for all. Also, many Bronx residents who want to adopt a pet would have a shorter commute to the new Bronx shelter than to Manhattan. The new shelter would also provide jobs to the community and multiple volunteering opportunities, as well as school tours, animal training classes, and other public services to educate the community about animal care and animal issues.

I would like to ask Council Member Andy King and members of the Bronx community where the proposed shelter would be built to keep an open mind regarding this issue, because a new animal shelter in their midst would only be an asset, connecting the community, which I am sure is a compassionate one, with many loveable four-legged New Yorkers. I also want to set the record straight that having an animal shelter in the neighborhood would not mean having animals running around the neighborhood loose causing dirty sidewalks, making noise and harassing neighbors. As is evident around the Manhattan shelter on E. 110th St., no one would even know there was an animal shelter there until they open the doors and enter. The animals there are securely kept inside and cleaned up after when they are walked.

I understand that community residents would prefer a Community Center or other such structure instead, and although such a Center may be needed, I would like to ask, "Are there any definite plans for a community center at this time?", and "Have funds been approved to build such a community center?" If the answer to these questions is "no", then I would answer that there ARE definite plans for a new shelter, and long-and hard-fought-for funding HAS been approved for a new shelter, so the common sense next step for the City Council would be to approve the land use for the new shelter and proceed with the long process of building it.

The animal-loving community of NYC has fought for full service shelters in all five boroughs for many years, and the City Council has finally supported this cause with funding. Please do not allow all we have fought for to go down the drain. I respectfully urge the City Council to continue its support of this very important project, because many, many (four-legged) lives are depending on it.

Testimony from Sharon Discorfano, Esq. at Hearing to be held on October 9, 2018 Regarding Bronx Animal Shelter, Bartow Ave. Site

Good afternoon. My name is Sharon Discorfano. I'm a NYC resident, member of the NYS Bar and of the NYC Bar Association's Committee on Animal Law. I'm here today testifying in a personal capacity **in support of the Bartow site for an animal shelter**.

As you will hear from supporters today, the proposed site will ensure the humane treatment of animals and also serve the public good. With nearly a million and half residents, The Bronx is long overdue for a shelter of its own. And the benefit extends to New Yorkers beyond the borough, as this shelter will relieve overcrowding in other NYC shelters. In addition to noting the impact on our human population, I want to add that the *animals* of The Bronx are deserving of their own shelter: these nonhuman New Yorkers deserve a local safe haven where they can receive essential care and the opportunity to be adopted into loving homes. The pet food pantry and programs ACC offers will be a resource for humans and animals of The Bronx, and even work towards reducing the intake of animals in the first place – a "win-win" as it serves animal welfare while also reducing the city's burden of care and re-homing.

But opposition today has more to do with the proposed location than the legitimate function of animal shelters in a society. So to specifically, clearly, support the proposed site: with respect to animal shelter services, The Bronx, to date, is an underserved community; there is nowhere nearby offering the services needed, on the scale it's needed. The proposed site will be suitably accessible in terms of proximity to residents and availability via public transportation.

With its recent vote mandating each borough have its own full-service shelter by 2024, City Council recognized a specific need of our communities. Approving the proposed site puts the city on track for fulfilling this need in The Bronx. *Not* approving this location will most assuredly result in a delay of several years. Especially in light of the Council's own 2024 mandate, such a delay is simply out of bounds.

For these reasons, I wholly support the proposed site for a new animal shelter The Bronx can call its own.

Thank you to the Council members and all those whose efforts have gotten us to this point today.

My name is Edita Birnkrant, and I am the Executive Director of NYCLASS, an animal advocacy and political action non-profit organization with supporters and activist chapters in all five boroughs of New York City and I'm a resident of Queens.

We believe that the greatest city in the world deserves a world-class animal shelter system, and our supporters and volunteers in all five boroughs vehemently agree. That's why we were in strong support of Intro 401, which passed in June of this year, under the leadership of Council Member Paul Vallone and which mandates that every borough have a full-service animal shelter operational by 2024.

The Bronx desperately needs a full-service animal shelter, but it wont get one unless this committee votes YES on the Bartow Avenue site. It took the city three years to select Bartow Avenue site as the location for the Bronx shelter, after visiting 50 other locations. Denying this proposal would mean a shelter cannot possibly be built by 2024 and perhaps not ever.

The new Bronx shelter would enable thousands more homeless animals to be saved and adopted each year and would relieve severe overcrowding at the other three Animal Care Center locations in Manhattan, Brooklyn and Staten Island. It would also provide much-needed services to the community such as lowcost veterinary care for vaccinations, wellness checks, and a spay/neuter clinic, pet food bank, free dogtraining and pet surrender prevention counseling to prevent pets form being surrendered due to lack of resources.

There is a crucial need for these services in the Bronx. Many residents of the Bronx consider their pets their family members and they deserve adequate access to pet care resources which this shelter would provide. Every time there are low-cost/free mobile spay/neuter and mobile vet clinics in the Bronx, there are extremely long lines of community members waiting to treat their beloved pets, many waiting cannot be accommodated—this shows the dire need for a full-service animal shelter and the resources that go along with it. It's simply unfair to deny all these people a shelter.

In addition to these badly needed resources in the community, the Bronx shelter would provide over 100 jobs ranging from managerial, to union jobs to minimum wage jobs, many with excellent career path options. The Bronx shelter would also provide youth and senior volunteer programs, and it is well established that such programs offer positive impacts on those involved.

Please vote yes on the Bartow Avenue location of the new Bronx animal shelter. This is not a "people versus animals" situation—the reality is that the new shelter will greatly benefit both people and animals.

I have been a volunteer at the shelter for over 17 years now.

First of all Andy King bussed people in for this meeting and I'm sure it is not out of his own pocket. So whose pocket are the funds coming out of? My tax money or developers? The shelter does not have nor would use their funds to do that.

Have any of you ever stepped foot in any of our shelters or even better adopted a pet from one? If you had you would see how much a new shelter is needed even more so in the Bronx. If you were to walk into the shelters the vast majority of the kennel cards say the stray was found in the Bronx. A shelter in that neighborhood instead of faraway in Manhattan would help the residents either bring the animal to-the shelter instead of just dumping them or give them counseling on how they could keep their pet which has been a very successful program by the way.

I am a dog trainer and I have gone to seminars around the country and in Canada and visited other city shelters and even the smallest of them put ours' to shame and not for the lack of our staff working hard. I recently had a friend come visit who is an ACO in the city of Calgary and she saw the shelter, as diplomatically as she could, said she was shocked that we could even function with the facilities we have.

People would want to visit the shelter if it was new and beautiful. I don't know how many times I have heard from people that "they would never be able to visit a shelter as it would be too sad" which I must say the current state of our shelters is depressing and sad even though all of the staff try to make it as inviting as possible.

The funds are already in place.

It is on city owned property so all funds will be available to build the shelter.

It will offer employment to 116 local residents.

It would greatly reduce the overcrowding and disease in our current shelters.

There would be a food pantry for pets at the shelter.

It will provide 68 parking spaces.

Advocating for the Bartow Ave site for the Bronx Animal Care Center

Hello I'm Craig Seeman of Voices For Shelter Animals.

No single neighborhood and certainly no real estate interest should be permitted to impede the city's badly needed animal shelter.

While the siting of some city services are steeped in controversy due to health and public safety risks there are no such tangible concerns here.

No matter how an entity tries to skew this hearing by transporting opposition, they do not democratically or proportionally represent a city of 8.6 million people and an estimated 1.1 million companion animals.

This not only impacts the nearly 1.5 million people of the Bronx, who, with the convenience of a Bronx shelter can provide loving homes to these animals and have access to badly needed affordable veterinary care or, in the most dire of circumstances, have a place that can assist them in re-homing companions who would otherwise face an uncertain future.

Currently with only a drop off center in the Bronx, the Manhattan Animal Care Center is overburdened with intake which increases the spread of disease at an inadequately equipped facility. This creates a ripple effect throughout the entire shelter system resulting in the death of healthy treatable animals. We are not only depriving these animals of their lives, we are depriving New Yorkers of those potential family members.

A new Bronx shelter with state of the art health facilities that includes proper Isolation care where sick animals can heal and, with a proper HVAC system, can prevent the spread of CIRDC and URI that plagues the shelter system. It will, in turn, alleviate the burden of the less well equipped Manhattan shelter and therefore increase live outcomes throughout the city shelter system.

The people of the Bronx have been denied a promise for a centralized location to adopt those family members for 18 years since the original shelter bill was passed. It will be 24 years by the time the Bronx shelter is finally completed. Do not prolong that wait indefinitely. This Bronx shelter can be here, and the city is ready and waiting. This affects all your constituents. Your obligation to them both human and non, is to support this site.

Thirdly - I believe our property values would plummet.



None of the business including Red Lobster adjacent to the proposed site has expressed any concerns to this animal shelter next to their shopping center.

This facility would be a community resource center that provides a pet food bank, dog training, youth and senior programs and low cost pet care. This is a needed service for the entire Bronx including coop city. Coop city has the highest concentration of service pets not including emotional pets as well

The community board that voted against the site listed the full scale animal shelter on its statement of needs. It did not list any youth center for Coop city on its needs. Neither the Borough President nor the city council member King allocated one penny for any youth center in coop city.

A campaign has been raised to promote a youth center that there is no money budgeted for it nor ever listed in the community board statement of needs. For almost 20 years no action was taken for any youth center in that site or much less anywhere in coop city. Now that the city proposed this animal facility at this site, a youth center is promoted to create competing needs as a shield for the developer who wants this site.

amNewYork reported the developer paid over \$200,000 in lobbying fees to acquire this site for a wellness center for homeless men. Just recently the developer made a presentation to Riverbay on its proposed development which is a building over 30 stories high.

The Bronx surrenders the most animals in the city and it overburdens the other existing shelters. This results in less space, less time and less care for the animals throughout the city. In fact, many animals get sick because the shelters are crowded and many are euthanized because of lack of space.

The opposition including city council member King and the Borough President stated they would proposed an alternative site. However, in every meeting they still couldn't provide any alternative site and even suggested that the animal advocates should search for one. It took the city over 2 years to find this site and as per their testimony there isn't any other parcels with the requirements in the Bronx for an animal facility.

Riverbay has over 300 acres of land and millions in the bank to build a youth center on their property. As a former President of the Riverbay funds wrote " when Riverbay Board of Directors approved using the Bingo Hall for a youth, elected officials did nothing to make it happen.

Now the elected officials can make this animal shelter happened on Bay Plaza and also help coop city build the youth center on their property. The false narrative of competing needs is political and disingenuous

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics there is 1 vet to every 89 dogs in the borough of the Bronx. Manhattan and Brooklyn are two of ACC's locations and in those areas of NYC there is astronomical difference. Manhattan has 1 veterinarian per 20 dogs and very similarly Brooklyn has 1 vet to every 31 dogs. This paints a clear picture.

I know this shelter will become a safe haven for folks who don't know where to turn with their animals when they've hit a roadblock medically, behaviorally, and personally. I know that a shelter in this location can alleviate the community cat epidemic. I know this shelter will save thousands of NYC animals' lives. Dear Councilmember Salamanca,

I want to submit my written objection to the proposal by the City of New York to build a 47,000 square foot structure that would house an Animal Shelter across the street from Co-op City, the largest residential housing complex in America. Co-op City has a no-pets policy except for service animals. At the May 24, 2018 meeting of Community Board 10, cooperators who were first presented with the proposal that night, responded by emphatically saying, "NO!"

Our Co-op City community, housing some 50,000 residents, has changed a lot since the original occupancy began back in December of 1968. With 15,372 apartments, we have a waiting list that extends to more than 3 years. Our garages are full, and the waiting time for curb parking is insane. With the addition of the still-growing Bay Plaza Shopping Mall, traffic, at certain times, is a total nightmare.

With buses being the only means of public transportation into Co-op City, this animal care center will only serve to heighten the already intense vehicular traffic situation, coupled with the probability of having multiple large pets sharing the same bus space with riders who (like my granddaughter is allergic to pet dander) may be at some risk because of an unanticipated adverse medical reaction. Please, do not take this possibility lightly.

Many Bronxites living outside of the Co-op City community see Co-op City simply as just a naturally occurring retirement community (NORC). There are some 8,000 young people living here in Co-op City who could take full advantage of having the community center that was promised to our community by individuals who, unfortunately, no longer represent Co-op City. The Co-op City community needs its own multi-purpose community center for our youngsters.

Back on July 19th, Bronx Borough President Ruben Diaz Jr. held a meeting at his office as part of the ULURP (Uniform Land Use Review Process). Your colleague, and our Councilman, Andy King, wrote a letter in opposition to the proposed shelter, as did New York State Assemblyman Michael Benedetto, State Senator Jamaal Bailey and U.S. Congressman Eliot Engel.

Therefore, it is on behalf of the vast majority of shareholders and cooperators who reside here in Co-op City, that as a duly elected representative of those shareholders, and as a 41 year resident shareholder, I respectfully request that the Committee on Land Use, *vote not to overturn* the proposed Animal Shelter's non-compliance with NYC Zoning Resolution. Under Article III: Commercial District Regulations, and under Chapter 2, Use Regulations - Section 32-25, Animal Hospitals (and Kennels), are determined to be categorized as U.G. (Use Group) 16, and further, that U.G. 16's are only permitted as of right in C8 zoning districts.

Page -2- Objection to Proposed Animal Shelter

"Not in my neighborhood," is not exactly our community's response. No one from the City of New York ever reached out to or considered meeting with anyone from the Co-op City community for our thoughts or recommendations. Instead, our community, like many others in the southern part of our beloved borough, was served up a healthy dose of benign neglect and complete disrespect.

To all of those who would argue that "not in my neighborhood" is exactly what Co-op City residents are saying, I would point out that in all of the comments I've heard made by others not living in Co-op City to date, no one has ever uttered the phrase, "Why don't you bring the animal shelter to my neighborhood!"

Together with our neighbors in Community Board 12, it's very possible that we could have offered a better site, very close to the one that the City is now seeking.

Mr. Chairman, and members of the committee, I would also like to point out other ways in which Co-op City operates in favor of the City, and its taxpayers, in at least two ways that are like no other.

We are 330 acres of land. Co-op City could easily require several police vehicles from the 45th Precinct. Instead, Co-op City's shareholders contribute \$14 million dollars a year of our own hard-earned dollars, and pay for our own 100+ uniformed police officers, their vehicles, their equipment, and their training, saving the city of New York millions of dollars annually.

With our 35 high rise buildings and 236 townhouses, we have some 42 garbage pick-up points. To best facilitate both residents and the NYC Dept. of Sanitation, at shareholders' expense, we built a single location pick-up depot, again saving the City millions of dollars in manpower and energy annually.

In 2006 or thereabouts, the community, through the Gloria Wise Boys & Girls Club, agreed to negotiate a deal to preserve the land for a community center for youngsters. That occurred under the Bloomberg administration.

Had the city of New York have reached out to Co-op City in their initial planning of the proposal that's currently before your Committee, there might have been a much different outcome than the one you are currently deliberating.

As I have previously stated, Mr. Chairman, I am respectfully requesting that you, and the Land Use Committee, uphold the NYC Zoning Resolution, as set forth under ZR 32-25, in that an Animal Shelter is only allowed in a Use Group 16 (U.G.16), within a C8 Zoning District, and find that the proposed site, which is currently out of compliance within the existing C4-3 zoning district's regulations, not be further considered.



Testimony in support of this proposal. PLEASE VOTE YES.

My name is Heather Greenhouse and I'm on the board of directors of Voters For Animal Rights. I'm here today to urge you to approve the Bartow Ave location of the Bronx animal shelter. This shelter would provide so many benefits to the community in addition to saving thousands of animals' lives.

The Bronx is a pet-care resource desert. Pet owners in the Bronx deserve to have access to pet care services that this shelter will provide - community services such as low-cost vet for vaccinations, wellness checks, spay/neuter clinic, pet food bank, free dog training, and pet surrender prevention counseling to prevent pets from being surrendered due to lack of resources. People in the Bronx who want to adopt pets will now be able to do that locally, not having to travel far to the other boroughs. This shelter will relieve overcrowding at the other 3 ACC locations, saving so many lives, and significantly reducing the number of animals who are euthanized due to lack of space. It would provide over 100 jobs and important volunteer programs, especially for the youth and seniors. It's well known that having a pet and being around animals positively impacts people's lives, heath, and well-being. This shelter will be nothing but beneficial for the community in so many ways.

I realize that the location is being opposed here. You should know that the city took 3 years to carefully choose this ideal location, from over 50 sites visited. It will NOT cause more traffic. The fact that co-op city technically does not allow pets is irrelevant as this shelter is for ALL of the Bronx. The opposition would have you believe that they want to build some other community center here such as a youth center. But the truth is that a youth center was already voted AGAINST by Riverbay Corp. board of directors. There will never be a youth center here. In all these years, the site remains vacant. Why? Corporate interests – real estate developers – want this site for condos. That's it.

Council Member Andy King is representing them and is misleading the community to oppose this animal shelter on false pretenses. He's purposely hiding the benefits it will provide to so many in the community for selfish corporate profits. Animal Shelter statement to City Council Sub-Committee on Landmarks, Public Siting and Maritime Uses

October 9, 2018 By: Leslie Peterson, Co-op City Resident

I am here in support of the Co-op City Community, my home. During this process the NYC Community Affairs Unit has been doing much of the presenting regarding this issue, however the Community Affairs Unit never bothered to reach out to the community. Additionally they did not reach out to our Community Board 10 or our Bronx Borough President.

We actually found out by way of an announcement in January 2018 in the newspapers. In my opinion that is the height of disrespect. It is also an example of why there is so much apathy when it comes to voting. Still, I am proud of the Co-op City Community who have stayed the course during the Uniform Land Use Review Procedure in order to have a say about their quality of life.

Recently the City Planning Commission voted their approval stating the Animal Shelter and Adoption Center would not have a significant environmental impact on our community. They know it will have an impact but not **"significant" enough** to cause **them** concern. The traffic congestion we experience trying to get home can make a 5 minute ride a half hour to hour ride by car. The proposed Hotel and Metro North railroad entryway will also use this main road, Bartow Avenue, further adding to the congestion.

We are located in the extreme north east Bronx. During their presentation the Community Affairs Dept. and Animal Care speakers said a criteria for this selection was its location. This location is neither centrally located nor easy to get to. In fact this location is away from adequate public transportation and will be especially difficult for those living in the West Bronx. Our Borough President has stated what is key is a more centralized location to maximize accessibility for Bronx residents.

Next-There should be boundaries between commercial and residential establishments. The facility has allocated eight thousand six hundred (8,600) feet for an exterior courtyard and outdoor dog run for open air space. You cannot dictate where the animals will relieve themselves so between that and the barking, lodged next to Red Lobster and a Senior Facility is inconsistent with the character of the community and the rights of those nearby and should be taken into account.

Lastly- I want to correct statements made at previous hearings. A youth center was requested, in fact Capital funding was allocated around 2005 of 7.5 million for development of a youth center by the former City Councilperson and the Bloomberg Administration and again in recent years. We have been told that architectural renderings for the youth center included a competitive swimming pool, track and Specialty performance areas. In my opinion you can never have too many facilities for our youth of which there are approximately over 8,000 in Co-op City under the age of 18 years old.

So what have we learned? This location is not zoned for this and an override would further exacerbate the anticipated high density commercial developments planned such as the new Starbucks, shake and go, Burlington, chipotle, Hotel and Metro North. We learned that approximately 20 other properties were looked at, about 11 city owned and others private although not given the locations. We have also learned that the cooperators, Community Board, Councilman and Borough President all know this location is not centrally located or easily accessible to the majority of the Bronx residents it proposes to want to serve. Are there other large square footage city locations, YES! They have stated this and so has our Borough President.

Our Borough President Reuben Diaz Jr. said that had he been aware that this process was underway, a suitable site that satisfies all stakeholders could have been identified. Give our Borough President and Councilman that opportunity.

There is also a former golf driving range that is vacant city owned land that was previously, (but no longer) leased to the MTA. This area includes several acres of land suitable for not only the Animal Care Shelter but also a Bronx Performing Arts Center that would help generate funds and should satisfy the NYC Economic Development Corporation by generating funds and jobs.

It would be an important component in revitalizing the Bronx and bring a host of cultural experiences to those in and surrounding the community. It can provide opera, ballet and symphony orchestras a new audience, allows for theater space and cabaret opportunities. Most of all parking would not be a problem and members of the community and Bronx would have solved two wishes instead of one.

Youth could participate in arts training classes, scholarships, in-school residencies, professional development, and family and children's programming, allowing students, teachers and families to interact with professional artists and explore the various genres of music, theater, dance, poetry and more. Most importantly it would not interfere with community homes and traffic congestion and the shelter would have more space available to them with no demolition necessary, keeping their timetable on track.

We are a no pet complex, located in the far north east Bronx, zoned as a commercial area, scheduled for a great many more commercial and development prospects, bombarded by traffic concerns and while we respect the efforts of the City and especially our Council members on advocating and passing a law for an animal shelter in every Borough, there are approximately six (6) years left before this bill must be fulfilled so this is not a fait accompli. Give our Borough leaders an opportunity to find a more suitable, accessible location.

For the record, a center was never voted down, the location is not accessible and the CB 10 meeting was shut down because of the derogatory and racist remarks being made by the advocates in favor of the shelter and not due to our Councilman who after a brief statement, listened during the CB 10 meeting.

Dear Chair Adams and Committee Members:

We are a coalition of Bronx based animal advocates who are speaking for the abused, neglected and abandoned dogs and cats that are all too often left on Bronx streets, Bronx parking lots, tied to park fences, left in abandoned properties, and used for dog fighting. According, to Animal Care and Control the Bronx has the highest rate of abandoned dogs, in the City, as well as countless feral and stray cats. The City of NY, has designated 2050 Bartow Avenue, as the proposed location for the Bronx Municipal Animal Shelter. Currently the site is vacant land being used by NYPD for storage of vehicles.

This ULURP process has not been without controversy and we understand the concerns and appreciate the advocacy of the Co-Op residents who have participated in the ULURP process, as well as their expressed desire to have a youth center built at the site. However, no funding mechanism has been put forth, no financial backing has been presented, no specific information provided and although a youth center is a worthy cause, it may not be feasible. Further, the area has youth facilities operated under the auspices of local non-profit entities. We suggest, the real motivation behind not wanting the animal shelter at the Bartow location is as reported by journalist Lisa B. Colangelo, in the June 27, 2018, edition of *amNewYork* in her article entitled: *A Bronx property the city wants for an animal shelter is being eyed by a developer*, in that article it is disclosed that a lobbyist was paid a substantial fee to "*to perform governmental relations and consulting services related to the potential development of 2050 Bartow Avenue*. The developer, as reported by *amNewYork* is **The First Hartford Realty Corporation.** Once again, we are witnessing the influence of lobbyists and money on government decision making.

We unequivocally support the application of the New York City Department of Health and Mental Health and the Department of Citywide Administration Services, and which application was unanimously approved by the New York City Planning Commission, for the use of the City owned vacant land at 2050 Bartow to be the site for the Bronx County, Full Service Animal Shelter, Veterinary Clinic and Accompanying Office Space.

The delay of many years before another suitable location is found and approved will needlessly cause a housing shortage for thousands of dogs, cats, rabbits, birds, reptiles and other animals, and will cause tremendous heartache to Bronx families who are so in need of pet support services which this modern, expertly designed animal shelter would provide.

It is well-known that the Bronx is the most under-served borough in terms of pet-related services. Pet families in the Bronx are often in dire need of affordable vet care and spay-neuter, dog training, and even pet food. A 2017 study of the ratio of veterinarians to the number of pet dogs in each borough revealed that while Manhattan has 1 vet for every 20 dogs, Staten Island: 1/25, Brooklyn: 1/31, and Queens: 1/34, the Bronx has only 1 vet per 89 dogs. (https://www.nycedc.com/blog-entry/new-york-citys-dog-population).

The new center on Bartow Avenue would provide much-needed community services such as a low-cost vet clinic, pet food bank, free dog training, and pet surrender prevention counseling to help keep pets in the homes they already have. NYC ACC has already proven successful with such services. The center would also enable thousands more homeless animals to be saved yearly and relieve overcrowding and stress on animals at the other ACC locations. Currently, Bronx families have to travel into Manhattan just to find an animal to adopt. They deserve equal access to adoption centers just as every other borough has. In addition, this center would create over 100 new jobs plus hundreds of volunteer opportunities for youth and seniors. The city

carefully took years to choose this ideal location which is easily accessible by public transportation and by car.

What is truly disturbing is that the real estate interests who are opposing this wonderful community-oriented animal shelter are completely misleading Co-Op City residents and being insincere when they tell them such falsehoods such as, 'all the pit bulls will escape the shelter and attack you' (never has this absurdity happened at other ACC locations), and that the alternative will be a youth center. The alternative will be condos, instead of programs youth and seniors can enjoy at the animal shelter. As well, the frequently uttered statement that Co-Op City has a no-pet policy (except for service animals) is irrelevant; residents can still volunteer at the shelter, and other local Bronx residents can adopt. Co-Op City and Bronx residents, and all involved, need to know the truth - that the opposition to this shelter are purely profit-driven, deceptive, and do not have the community's best interests at heart.

In order to meet the mandate of a Bronx and Queens full-service animals shelter by 2024, we need to get moving on this Bartow Avenue location. Homeless animals and Bronx pet-owners cannot wait another several years, with a sure risk that there will not even be a completed shelter by the mandated 2024. Please approve the Bartow Avenue location for the modern, state of the art, full service Bronx animal shelter. The Bronx deserves this wonderful, needed addition to the community for both people and animals.

On behalf of the Humane Society of Westchester I am writing in support of the creation of a municipal animal shelter in the Bronx. With an estimated population in 2018 of 1,471,160 people it is absolutely unacceptable that the Bronx does not have an animal shelter to service the community.

Humane Society of Westchester in New Rochelle often gets animals brought to our shelter by someone saying it was found in the Bronx or in Pelham. We believe that some of the dogs, said to have been found in Pelham, may very well have been found in the Bronx. The person who found the animal is reluctant to bring it to the Bronx believing that the animal's fate there is not good, and that it has a much better chance of being adopted at our shelter. Some of these dogs may, in fact, be owner surrendered, people who cannot keep their dog, but again do not want to bring it to the drop-off facility in the Bronx.

Humane Society of Westchester does take some of these dogs, but are not always able to do so as we are committed to taking dogs from the nineteen communities in our contract area. People who lost their dog in the Bronx may have no idea to contact a shelter in Westchester, which means they may never be reunited with their pet. Those we cannot take may very well become stray, abandoned animals, which is cruel and inhumane.

Again, we urge a full service animal shelter be built in the Bronx; one which will relieve over-crowing at other NYC shelters and provide desperately needed services including an adoption center, low cost vaccinations, a spay/neuter clinic and other vital assistance to NYC animals in need.

I'm Mia Lancaster, director of Place For Cats, a 501(c)(3) rescue and adoption organization, founded in NYC in 1990, and receiving our not-for-profit status in 1994. Since 1990, we've rescued and found homes for approximately 1400 felines. Place For Cats is a partner in Mayor's Alliance for New York City Animals and in New Hope, an adjunct organization to NYC Animal Care Centers.

Having been in rescue for decades, I can attest to the vast number of stray cats in the Bronx. Every week we get calls from people in the Bronx who find strays in their yard or on their street and want us to come to get them. Based in Manhattan, we are a tiny group and are not able to accommodate the huge numbers of cats in need that inhabit the Bronx about whom we receive calls from concerned citizens. Many of these citizens would like to do the right thing but due to time, distance or age, cannot easily travel with a stray animal down to Manhattan to surrender the found animal.

Bronx is in *dire* need of its own shelter - a real facility and not a way-station, where Bronx residents would have the option to pick up that stray found in their yard or on their street and transport it locally, to the nearby shelter instead of calling small rescue groups scattered in other boroughs, hoping that one of us small groups would have the resources to travel and collect animals seen on the streets in a location distant from our base.

Bronx desperately needs its own shelter. Will you *please* help to see that it gets one.

New York City has pledged many times over the years that it would become a "No Kill" City, as many cities across the nation are successfully doing. The latest pledge was that it would happen by 2015. To Speaker Corey Johnson:

My community leadership started 15 years ago in Van Nest, Bronx by getting TNR Certified. This helped my community and the animals by lowering the feral cat population and educating others. As a Bronx animal rescuer, my experience with being "in the trenches" is overwhelming, exhausting and neverending. The Bronx does not have many TNR Certified rescuers therefore it is always in crisis mode. With my rescue on Petfinder, *Animals Saved by Grace*, since 2005, I can prove by the emails I receive daily, that people are STILL not informed. It is heartbreaking to know that the families and animals suffer when resources can not be found. Now as a Board Member on Community Board 11 for nine years, I work at educating as many that will listen!

This Bronx Animal Shelter is so needed as a resource hub for the people and animals of the Bronx. The Lowcost Veterinary care is essential to ALL Bronx animal owners! The Bronx has the highest poverty rate and many animal owners are not aware of the financial assistance that is available to them. Many of the animals I have trapped have been "pets". Bronx residents are surrendering and "dumping" their animals.

The Bronx needs this shelter to be built as soon as possible.

There is no alternative site. To not support and not move forward with this specific location will prove a major setback that will probably end in our Bronx Animal Shelter never being built. This will truly be a tragedy to every Bronx resident who owns or might adopt an animal. The 100+ jobs that this shelter will provide will help so many Bronxites. The animal rescuers have been standing in the gap for the last 25+ years. We are all getting older and many are not able to continue rescuing.

The City Council, has again, passed a law mandating shelters in all 5 boroughs.

NYC history has shown us that having a shelter-mandating law doesn't guarantee shelters. It takes political will up and down City government, including The City Council voting "YES" on this proposed site at 2050 Bartow.

Not-In-My-Backyard (NIMBY) objections: "Seniors that are allergic to dogs; Dog Poop; Barking; Dogs escaping; "no-dog" lease community." These complaints do not hold water. Shelters are built to insulate and are doing so successfully in Manhattan for MANY years. Three examples: 1) ASPCA at 424 E 92nd St, New York, NY 10128. Located in the middle of the block right next to the Courtyard Marriott Hotel and to the left high-rise condominiums since 1994. 2) ACC at 326 East 110th Street located in the middle of the block, to its right is St. Ann's School and Church; to the left high-rise apartments since 1995. 3) Human Society of New York at 306 E. 59th St, New York, NY 10022 right next to high-rise apartments, to its left a business. All of these Animal Shelters and Animal Facilities would be out of business if ANY of the above complaints about what a shelter will bring held ANY truth to them.

<u>A "no-dog" lease community</u>: Coop City was built from 1963 to 1977 with many original owners having animals. In 1963, Riverbay Management told new owners that you can have up to five cats. In 2015, Riverbay Management tried to evict owners who had Companion and Service animals and had to pay \$85,000 in losses because this action was illegal. So presently in Coop City, you have MANY owners with dogs, cats and other service animals.

<u>Youth Center Promised 25 years ago:</u> Coop City ALREADY HAS Community Centers and now they want another one for teens! Why not work on the ones in progress and fund more teen programs? Let this site be for all the Bronx and not just for Coop City's needs. There is ample transportation to this location.

"The Devil that you know or the Devil that you don't know?": What if this Lobbyist Patrick Jenkins & Associates is telling the truth? This manipulation of the Public and Community Board 10 to think that you are fighting for a promised Youth Center when in reality its about a future Homeless Veterans Housing building with a possible "youth center of some sort" which could even be a supervised drug injection site!

Please do not permit this site to go to this or any developer – this developer is proposing a 30-story building!

Testimony of Susan C. Wolfe, Bronx Resident, in Support of An Animal Care Center at 2050 Bartow Avenue, Bronx, NY

To the Residents of City Council District 12

After living in the East Village for over twenty years, I decided it was time to move. The neighborhood I wanted to move to, and live in, was East Harlem. I had been a volunteer at the Animal Care Center for a number of years, and I wanted to spend more time there, as much time as I possibly could walking dogs and socializing with cats and helping people find their perfect pets. If I lived nearby, I could zip over before work or after work every day – it was my dream.

But I was too late; the neighborhood had already gotten too expensive and I was out of luck.

I tell you this to give you a sense of what the Animal Care Center can bring to your neighborhood. It will bring loads of volunteers like myself; it will bring adopters, and of course it will bring the devoted staff who work there. All of these people need to eat and snack and pick up things after work to bring home. It will create opportunities for small businesses to grow or pop up.

In the past decade or so there has been a tremendous change in the attitude toward and culture of animal care and animal shelters. People have begun adopting rather than buying pets at exponential rates; they prefer to adopt rather than support a cruel pet trade, and they adopt in order to save wonderful cats and dogs and give them loving homes. As a result, beautiful, state-of-the-art "shelters" have sprung up in cities across the country, Los Angeles, Chicago, Washington D.C. In fact, two very fancy, smaller animal shelters have opened up in downtown Manhattan. You should see the Battersea Shelter in London; it's a tourist attraction.

I know that the community is hoping for a youth community center. But this could be a community center; a place where people can take their children as a treat, a place where pet lovers can volunteer. Maybe you just don't like pets, so I know I can never convince you. But if you do like or love them, and if your housing doesn't allow pets, this is a place where you can satisfy what's missing in your life. I suspect, with some community support, there could be all sorts of programs to promote the human-animal bond. The Care Center has a huge foster program, where people foster cats and dogs who need some time out of the shelter, either because they are recovering from a cold or because they are kittens who need to be in a more sterile environment until they've had all of their shots and can be adopted. The closer you live to the Care Center, the easier it is to foster.

I want to share with you my idea for a program: it would be called the "Kitten Orgy" room. You get to go in a room with a bunch of fuzzy, soft, crazy little kittens and have a play session with them. There are places in Manhattan and Brooklyn called cat cafes where people PAY \$15 just to spend a half hour in a room with adolescent and adult cats. You could get that for free-- if we can convince someone to start the program.

I forgot to tell you where I ultimately moved to: the Bronx, but the next District over, #11, and I am so jealous that this great community asset was not offered to my neighborhood.

I am a retired NYC Public School Educator as well as a NYS Licensed Health Professional who is now transitioning to the Career and Workforce Development Industry.

Since retirement, I have held many volunteer and paid positions that involve caring for and helping others; animals included.

I have been certified in Trap Neuter Return by Neighborhood Cats and Mayor's Alliance for more than 4 years and have adopted and fostered cats from a colony that I have been caring for more than 7 years.

I became a volunteer at the 92nd street ASPCA in 2017 as a way of giving back to the community that helped me with finding homes for kittens from my colony. I also give credit to the Center for Animal Care (ACC) who came and picked up a few kittens and Wheels of Hope for Transporting my precious cargo.

There is a need for the shelter in the Bronx (Bartow Avenue) to be built. In addition to the services already provided by the ACC and ASPCA, this facility would provide better functional space, housing and medical care for animals of NYC at an affordable price to pet owners.

This new facility could also serve multiple populations and purposes:

- 1. Youth Education: Vocational training that would lead to a career pathway in the Veterinary and Health Sciences
- 2. Educational Institutions: High School Health/ Veterinary Career Centered Curriculum to introduce youth: especially, "At Risk" including those currently in the Juvenile Detention Centers. This can be an alternative to Detention or Prison for the older population.
- 3. Businesses: Veterinary Hospitals, Centers (ASPCA, ACC), Private Clinics, Schools (Cornell) that will provide Hands On Training and Internships leading to the employment of a Skilled Workforce.
- 4. Co op City Their youth population would benefit from these collaborations as well.
- 5. Rescuers/Pet Owners A Food Pantry would be of great help to Animal Care Givers.

It is my dream to see this new facility built and my passion as a Workforce Developer to be a part of the collaborations that would make efficient use of the money spear headed for this project.

Another shopping mall or building is not needed in this already developed area.

1-Our taxpayer's dollars are not adequately servicing our pet owners of the Bronx and Queens including 600 service animals of Co-op City and at least a thousand more cats and small animals there as well. We get networking calls for help to handle lost or abandoned animals in Co-op.

2-The Bronx has been a historically underserved area and continues to be a service desert for the city's animals.

3-The animal shelter will serve as a community resource, not just for animals but for human residents of the Bronx. 4-The Bronx has the largest intake of animals into the crowded ACC system each year.

5-Many of these wanted animals would be retrieved within a day if we had a local shelter. Instead they are whisked out of the borough making it very difficult if not impossible for loving families to reunite with them.

6-ACC programs include a pet food pantry, community training and education, surrender prevention counseling, and community programming for youth and seniors. Many of these and future community programs will actually prevent animals from entering the shelter in the first place. A new full service shelter in the Bronx will relieve overcrowding in other shelters and has the potential to save thousands of animal lives a year.

7-The ongoing development of empty properties and vacant buildings is pushing the abandoned animals into the streets. Foreclosures and people moving increases abandonment.

8-The Residents of the Bronx (as the poorest borough) do not have the internet capability needed to find a lost pet before it is shipped to another borough which is also expensive and time consuming to get to. Many people simply can't afford days off from work and a cab to possibly search all shelters for their pet.

Lost Pet in the Bronx

- Run around block calling dog
- Call neighbors to look out and hold or tie to fence and call
- Photo and Flyers posted in neighborhood
- Call 45th Precinct to see if sighted
- Online multiple networked Facebook Pages for lost and found Bronx dogs
- Need to work fast before ACC on Fordham shipped out to Brooklyn or Manhattan sometimes held in queens? No direct number for ACC on Fordham.
- Call and are told to visit the various shelters to recognize your pet.
- Check ACC/ASPCA within 3 days or pet can be euthanized, pulled by rescue or adopted
- Some online Facebook pages share the description that is posted on ACC ASPCA
- At this point if it is a pit bull or other large breed and owner does not have car the dog is probably abandoned. From the Bronx to ACC is an expensive trip by cab.

When we get a local shelter walk or drive in with carrier and retrieve lost pet or take (local)cab home if large dog.

Found Pet in the Bronx:

- Most found dogs are by rescuers who notice them and take the time to get involved.
- Get dog in car or tie up to fence to retrieve later.
- Photo and send to network of Facebook Lost found pages Bronx and Bronx Manhattan
- Share photo and info on local Facebook community pages.
- Flyers are helpful to let neighborhood know where the dog is.
- Bring to rescue or vet to get scanned for chip
- If delivered to Police or they pick up they bring to ACC on Fordham Rd. Intake Center.
- Due to zoning of that site all animals must be removed before closing to Man. Brooklyn, or held in Queens? Sometimes in Staten Island.
- This makes it near impossible for owners to relocate their pet.

When we get a local shelter we can allow Police to deliver to it without fear of pet getting lost in the system or euthanized, pulled or adopted out in 3 days.

Review: Our taxpayer's dollars are not adequately servicing our pet owners of the Bronx and Queens and the Bronx has the largest intake of animals into the crowded ACC system each year. Many of these wanted animals would be retrieved within a day if we had a local shelter.

A FULL SERVICE ANIMAL SHELTER/VETERINARY CLINIC PUBLIC HEARING

My name is Hattie Overman a residence of Coop City. I spoke briefly, the two minutes allotment time at the City Council Public Hearing on Tuesday, October 9th, 2018. However, I felt the need to express the unfairness of the way the community of Coop City was treated.

This community attended the CB10 meeting held on May 24th, 2018 regarding the proposed animal shelter to be built at 2050 Bartow Ave, Bronx NY. The representative from the Dept. of Citywide Administrative Services indicated 51 available City Owned and privately owned sites were looked at and out of all of the sites only 11 potential sites. Coop City location 2050 Bartow Ave was considered as having met some of the Animal Shelter criteria.

After this initial meeting, the next Public Hearing with CB10 was July 19, 2018 at coop City. The concern is the notification of a Public Hearing by the City Planning Commissioner was received by a robo phone call from Riverbay, the management company to the Community on Tuesday at 4:59pm and we were informed the hearing is the next Morning, Wednesday, August 9, at 10am.

Mind you, Tuesday was the Crime Night out across this nation. A storm arose and rained the people out. Therefore because of the late notice a few of our residence made it to the public hearing and we were unrepresented.

To add insult to injury, another strange happening, We received notice, City Council Public Hearing would be Tuesday, October, 9, 2018, fine, but we also were scheduled for the MTA Fast Forward Bus workshop 6 to 9pm on the same day, again we were unrepresented at the City Council Public hearing because some Cooperators were not physically able to attend both on the same day. City Council need to know what took place in this whole process as you consider a decision regarding the wishes of our community. Actually, who was responsible for keeping this community informed of these Public Hearings in a timely manner?

Also noted how the City Representative in the two to three years of planning refuse to admit that the people were never contacted by anyone regarding building in our community until May 24th. The community agrees that it was a total disregard and respect for our people and these actions should not go unnoticed.

It was noted specification of the animal shelter was to be centrally located. The site 2050 Bartow is located in the Northeast Bronx, which does not meet this requirement.

We would ask that the City consider 1250 E.229 Street, which has 327,784 SF and is 3 times the size of the Bartow Site and is also surrounded by trees.

599 Westchester Ave, 90,000- SF which accommodates building and parking.

Also please note: the proposed animal shelter would be unfavorably located in the midst of three restaurants, the Red Lobster, the Paneria Bread and Sangeria. A possible safety and Health issue.

We love animals as well, but our community development lease agreement does not allow dogs except for service animals. The City would spend \$60 million more or less for an animal Shelter over the needs of a State of the Art Community Center for our youths ,this request was made known to Mayor DeBlasio no longer than last year of 2017.

We will be celebrating 50 years of Coop City existence, yet no state of the art facility for the youths of the future, to offer them hope, resources and skills to become productive citizens for now and generations to come. Let's give our youths the opportunities to reach their goals in life. This would truly be a legacy we would leave our children and youths.

As a community, we would ask the City that these many sites be revisited and 2050 Bartow Site remains vacant until the request for a State of the Art Facility is honored and built for our youths, that has been denied them still fifty years later.

I am writing to express my strong support for NYC/DOH's plan to build a new Animal Care Center (ACC) shelter in the Bronx. Some Co-Op City residents are opposed, but the need for, and benefits of, this shelter far outweigh their reasons for opposing it.

Opponents want the property used for a youth center – even though the Bronx already has numerous youth centers. What this borough of over 1.4 million residents does not have is a fullservice animal shelter. Currently, Bronx animals must be transported to shelters in other boroughs, which creates burdens for reuniting lost pets with their guardians and for adopters, who must travel to another borough to adopt a pet from one of the city's full-service shelters. It also creates a great deal of unnecessary stress for the animals.

The new shelter will also alleviate staffing and medical burdens placed on shelters that take in Bronx animals. One particular problem is contagious illnesses, such as URI's (Upper Respiratory Infection), commonly found in crowded, indoor shelters. URI's are usually treatable, but because they are passed through the air and can lead to secondary illnesses such as pneumonia, these animals are at high risk for euthanasia. The Bronx shelter will have space for 70 dogs, 140 cats, 30 rabbits, and 20 animals of other species, which would greatly ease overcrowding and ultimately, reduce the euthanasia rate. Less overcrowding will also ease the medical, financial, and staffing pressures placed on rescue groups that partner with ACC – the vast majority of which operate with very limited financial, human, and space resources.

Co-Op City residents argue that it is inappropriate to open a shelter next to their complex when they themselves are not allowed to have pets. But by this logic, those without children should oppose the construction of a new public school on their block – even though it is needed for hundreds of other families living in the borough. And an apartment building full of 20 and 30-somethings should oppose the construction of a senior center next door to them because they do not qualify for that housing – even though it is vitally needed by the many elderly residents in the larger community. And residents should oppose the building of a new religious facility on their block because none of them are adherents of that religion – even though many others in the community belong to that faith and do not currently have a house of worship. The fact is, we live in a city with 8.5 million people squeezed into 302 square miles. Everyone has to make compromises for the benefit of the broader community and the city as a whole. A small, yet vocal, group of Co-Op City residents should not be allowed to block the construction of this desperately-needed animal shelter – something that will benefit a far greater number of Bronx residents and other New Yorkers, as well as improve the lives of our city's homeless pets.

Hearing before the New York City Council's Subcommittee on Landmarks, Public Siting, and Maritime Uses

October 9, 2018

Good afternoon. I am Michelle Villagomez, New York City Legislative Senior Director with the American Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (ASPCA). I would like to thank the Landmarks, Public Siting, and Maritime Uses Subcommittee for the opportunity to speak in support of the Bartow Avenue animal shelter location in the Bronx.

The ASPCA has long advocated for full-service animal shelters in all 5 boroughs, which is necessary to meet the needs of animals in every community and to give every homeless animal their best chance at finding a loving home. Combined with the funding for the development and renovation of full-service animal shelters, the plan to build a state-of-the- art animal shelter in the Bronx at 2050 Bartow Avenue, it is clear that NYC is increasing its commitment to protecting the lives of its at-risk animals. Nearly the entire City Council agreed and supported legislation and dedicated funds to build and operate shelters in all five boroughs.

Building a full-service shelter in the Bronx will alleviate overcrowding in existing shelters, increase opportunities for people to adopt animals, increase opportunities to reunite lost pets and their owners, decrease the number of dogs and cats euthanized, as well as enable Animal Care Centers of NYC (ACC) to save more lives and prevent animal suffering. The ASPCA has recognized that the people of the Bronx need access to the types of services a full-service animal shelter would provide to the borough's pets and people. In 2017 the ASPCA performed 8,900 spay/neuter surgeries and treated 986 patients at our primary pet care clinic in the Bronx. To date this year, we have performed 7,040 spay/neuter surgeries and have seen 2,600 patients at our primary pet clinic. These figures show that there is a clear need for animal welfare services in the borough. This lack of a key resource has shortchanged taxpayers for far too long, depriving them of a basic municipal service in their own communities.

The proof of ACC's effectiveness is in the numbers; in 2017 it realized a 93% placement rate, in which adoptions, transfers of animals, and pet retention programs played a key role. ACC is evolving beyond an animal shelter and becoming a crucial community resource. In fact, pet retention is a growing area of focus for both ACC and the ASPCA. In 2017, the sheltering system was able to keep 2,531 pets with their families by providing critical services to pet owners in need.

The ASPCA has partnered directly with virtually every program at ACC and we find that its leadership is steadfastly committed to helping pet owners access care and ensuring that New York City animals live better lives. The ASPCA will continue to work with ACC, the NYC Department of Health, the Council, and the rescue community in hopes of creating a more humane city.

Good Afternoon. My name is Isadora Martinez, I'm a Coordinator for the ASPCA Community Engagement program and a Bronx resident. Through case management and outreach, our program connects NYC residents with access to free pet wellness services and resources to help retain and improve the welfare of their pets. Due to the lack of resources for pets in the Bronx, our program focuses strongly on providing free veterinary services, supplies, transportation, etc. for owned animals in the Bronx, and in 2018 YTD we have assisted approximately 900 pets in the Bronx.

For the past four years, I've worked with pet owners in the Bronx and have helped intervene in cases where individuals are at risk of losing their homes due their high volume of animals or are faced with the legal repercussions involved with having to abandon their pet(s) after being evicted from their homes. Recently, we received a case referral from the Administration for Children's Services in the Bronx concerning a mother who was at risk of losing custody of her young children due to having 50 intact cats in her home. Many of these cases could be easily avoided if there were a full-service Animal Care Center in the Bronx.

An ACC shelter at Bartow Avenue would be a valuable resource for the Bronx community, where individuals could access spay/neuter and veterinary care, obtain pet behavior and retention support services for their pets, in addition to free pet food through ACC's pet food pantry. It would offer youth and individuals of all ages, an opportunity to learn and become involved in their community and pursue careers in the field of animal welfare.

Both living and working in the Bronx has given me insight to the hardships that so many low-income families and seniors living on fixed incomes are faced with when trying to provide adequate care for their beloved pets. Apart from working with owned animals professionally, I dedicate my spare time to trap-neuter-release and caring for feral cats in my neighborhood – large colonies of community cats, which is an epidemic in the Bronx. For many, a pet companion is all they have, and many people are forced to part with their beloved pets due to a dire need of resources. With this said, I urge you to please consider the hundreds of thousands of Bronxites that are in critical need of the resources a full-service ACC facility would offer and vote YES to have it built on 2050 Bartow Avenue by 2024.

While there are many veterinary clinics in the Bronx, none are affordable. If in need of emergency care, one has to travel into Westchester County or Manhattan. Currently, Riverbay allows its residents to house small dogs. Many of our residents are elderly, retired individuals living on a fixed income. Where are these animals to go if their owners cannot longer support them? How can they afford to care for their pets? Hell, I am employed full time, paid biweekly, and saw myself forced to cancel my cat's yearly check-up and vaccinations appointment because I could not afford the \$200.00 the visit would cost me.

I believe that now more than ever having a pet companion has become a necessity for our mental well being since the country is going to hell in a hand basket. One can easily see the stress and disgruntlement of fellow commuters every single day. Coming home to unconditional love, AND being able to reciprocate this love with proper care is paramount. Having this state of the art facility will allows us affordable access to care, and will open the doors for other activities such as volunteering and education to our community.

I read somewhere that increased traffic in the area is a concern, which is total nonsense. Traveling to and from Co-Op City, in my experience, has always been a hassle. The entrances and exits unto 1-95 were badly planned from Country Club until Exit 11-Bartow Ave, in my humble opinion. The Bruckner Blvd and Bruckner Expressway as well as the Cross Bronx Expressway have been struggling with the ever increasing volume of motorist traveling through our area for a while. This did not stop anyone from expanding the Bay Plaza Mall and adding malls everywhere.

An animal shelter is a very real need in the Bronx. We do not need anymore retail stores, restaurants, banks, gyms, or whatever else developers think will bring more money to their coffers.

My name is John Kristofik. I live in the Woodlawn area of the north Bronx and I support the construction of the state of the art animal shelter on Bartow Avenue.

For many years, my neighborhood has been a dumping ground for many unwanted dogs and cats. In July of 2017, a gentle middle aged cat was dumped on my street. He had one eye missing and the other was developing a cataract. We traced his owner via a microchip as being the 94th Street ASPCA. "Mel" had been adopted just one month earlier by a couple in the Bronx. When we asked if he belonged to people living in my neighborhood, we were told he came from a neighborhood 4 miles east of mine. These owners were either too lazy or just couldn't find the time to do the right thing and drive the distance to East 94th Street in Manhattan and return the animal. Double the shame on them.

The location for the proposed shelter couldn't be in a better place for accessibility for residents of the north, east, south east and central Bronx.

The New England Thruway is just 3 blocks away and east/west bound thoroughfares like Gun Hill Road, Pelham Parkway, Baychester Avenue, Westchester Avenue, and Bruckner Blvd would allow residents easier access rather than going thru the nightmare of a trip into Manhattan.

Traffic flowing away from Manhattan is always more preferable than the traffic flowing to Manhattan. Animal abandonment could be further kept to a minimum.

And it would have parking!

It's location next to a shopping mall in that commercial area would not infringe on resident's living spaces and being on a 3 lane roadway would bring no significant additional traffic issues. (I have yet to sit in this "traffic jam" the residents' claim is perpetual and ongoing.)

Too much money has already been invested and if this were to be further delayed it would present additional burdens on the taxpayer to "start from scratch" all over again.

My name is Helene Hartman-Kutnowsky, I am a Norwood resident of the Northwest Bronx. I have served as Chair of Sanitation & Environment for many years in CB7. One of our top priorities has been to have an Animal shelter in the Bronx.

Today I would like to speak briefly about why this is such an urgent need:

- My community has many stray animals and we have active Trap, Neuter and Return (TNR) volunteers who work tirelessly to save these animals. These volunteers maintain colonies, feeding the animals, usually cats, and taking care of their medical needs when necessary.
- Help is needed medically and financially for the TNR community. There are tremendous costs involved when colonies can have many cats in them. Please remember that these cats also help to keep down the rodent population, in addition to bringing joy and a sense of community to the neighborhood.
- Many animals are left in empty apartments when people move or they are put out in the street. This is something that could be avoided if we had a full-time animal shelter where animals could be surrendered.
- I would also like to see a program where if a person is on a fixed income that they can get assistance with money or food to feed their pet or pets. This would help in cutting down on the stray population. It would also help with seniors or persons suffering from depression who would benefit from having an animal.
- Having a Animal shelter with reasonable Vet fees would be a big help to the Bronx. The TNR people could Bring in their animals as well as the regular pet owners.
- Finally, a big selling point is also that the youth could be involved in the shelter by reading to the dogs (a proven win-win, adoptions are cut by 6 days when dogs are read to because it helps them get socialized), learning animal tech duties or just volunteering to help out.
- In closing, I want to quote Mahatma Gandhi by saying

"The greatness of a nation and its moral progress can be judged by the way its animals are treated." The Bronx is on the rise and having a shelter of its own, will be another thing that this wonderful borough can be proud of!


