CHAIRPERSON DEL CARMEN ARROYO:

Thank you, Sergeant. Good morning. I believe we're going to be here all of maybe five minutes if we all behave and do what we're came There to do. Good morning. I'm Maria del Carmen Arroyo, chair of the Committee on Aging.

We can dance. Today we're voting on proposed
Intro 737-2008A, whose sponsor is my partner,
Jimmy Vacca, who chairs the subcommittee on Senior
Centers. And I want to thank Jimmy for his
foresight and his work on this bill, and all 35
members who have signed on in support, and
encourage everyone else who hasn't to do so.
Proposed Intro 737-A takes a significant step
forward in addressing elder abuse, which is
unfortunately an issue which doesn't receive as

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much attention as it should. Elder abuse takes many forms, including physical, mental, sexual abuse, financial exploitation as well as neglect and abandonment. Somewhere between one and two million Americans aged 65 and older have been abused, and unfortunately usually by someone whom they depend on for care and protection. Intro would offer more resources to those who find themselves in abusive situations and help senior service providers gain greater understanding in identifying the symptoms of elder abuse and helping those who have been abused. Specifically it would require the Department for the Aging to train senior service providers in detection and reporting of elder abuse as well as offer more mandated training in the counseling of elder abuse victims. The bill would also mandate that Department for the Aging require senior centers to hold at least two elder abuse educational sessions per year, in which senior center members and participants would be instructed on how to receive counseling and aid for instances of elder abuse as well as how to detect and report instances of abuse. At the first hearing on this bill back in

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June, all who came to testify, including the

Department for the Aging, spoke in favor of this

bill and I echo their sentiments. I strongly

recommend that the Committee vote in favor of this

legislation. And now I'd like to turn it over to

bill's primary sponsor, Councilmember Vacca, for a

statement.

JAMES VACCA: Thank you, Chair Arroyo. I introduced this bill because I felt that senior citizen centers could play a pivotal role in making sure that we address elder abuse. So many of our seniors go to senior centers. percent of our seniors in the City of New York visit senior centers every year. However, our senior centers serve as a point of reference. They serve as an outreach mechanism, and they're there to make sure that people know their rights and people start to understand how they can outreach to others who may be isolated at home or who may not go to a senior center. So this bill attempts to start a serious discussion in this city about elder abuse. It's something that many seniors don't recognize and it's something that many don't talk about. They think it can never

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happen to them. And too often elder abuse is a senior being victimized by a family member, something that's unspeakable. And it becomes even more unspeakable when the senior does not want to admit or recognize that a family member could possibly do something like that to them. abuse is just not hitting a senior, it's just not physical abuse; it's also mental abuse, it's financial abuse, it's psychological abuse, it's neglect; it's abandonment. And with many seniors being cared for by family members who often have a variety of their own social issues and problems, we face seniors without services. We face seniors who feel even more isolated and more victimized. The senior center can make a contribution. I suggest, and the law requires, that we start training our senior center employees. Anyone who has contact with a senior citizen has to recognize, not just the bruise, but recognize the change in attitude, recognize whatever indications become evident, of seniors possibly not having money where before they did, seniors who are in a state of confusion. So I want to train senior center employees; and three times a year this bill

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would require such training from DFTA for all senior center employees who have contact with the elderly. And secondly, this bill then requires that once the senior center employees are trained, they then have to give workshops in the senior centers to the membership of the senior center; and that those members will now gain from the knowledge that the staff members have acquired, and hopefully those members can go out to their friends, to their churches, to their other clubs with this information. They can help be eyes and ears when it comes to attacking elder abuse. is a problem that is more prevalent than you would Unfortunately it becomes more and more think. prevalent, especially during poor economic times; so rather than having situations where the elderly are preyed on, this bill starts to try to turn this around and I urge the council to vote yes. think this bill is a very good start; a very good attempt by this council to recognize a problem that many may not speak about, but we know exists in this city every day. And I thank the many members who have co-sponsored the bill. I thank the administration and DFTA for their cooperation,
