25	voting on three pieces of legislation today that

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2	continue in our efforts around reforming and
3	improving the Department of Buildings. Let me say
4	before I comment on these three pieces of
5	legislation that deal specifically with crane
6	safety, that I think it's important that all of us
7	note as we start today's meeting that we lost
8	another construction worker earlier today.

BETSY GOTBAUM: Quiet please.

SPEAKER QUINN: There was a construction accident in my district in the West 40s. We obviously don't know all of the circumstances of that death yet. There will be an investigation, but obviously that worker and his family are very much in our mind today, particularly since we are voting on these three pieces of legislation, Intro 794, 5 and 96-A, all are part of our ongoing effort to make sure no more lives are lost as a result of construction or construction work in our city. These three pieces of legislation directly relate to the two tragic accidents that occurred in Council Member Lappin's district. These three bills will go a long way to making the mantling, dismantling, jumping and operation of cranes safer in the City of New York.

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They'll require very specific initial and ongoing training for all individuals who work in or around They'll also require specific and detailed communications between people on the jobsite and the Department of Buildings about crane safety. They'll require that people who are using cranes to build buildings develop specific plans for any time they mantle, dismantle or jump the crane, and will require that the Department of Buildings conduct inspections to make sure those This plans are documented and on site. legislation will also significantly limit the times in the City of New York when nylon slings can be used with cranes. Many of us know that one of the incidents that occurred in Council Member Lappin's district was relevant to the use of a nylon sling. So together, these three pieces of legislation are going to make sure we have better communication, better coordination between construction workers and city agencies, better trained workers and also make sure that the materials and products that we're using are the highest quality and the safest ones that are available. I want to thank Bob Aham [phonetic],

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Bed Goodman [phonetic], Jeff Haberman and Rob 2 3 Newman, who all worked on this legislation. also wanted to thank the Mayor's office of legislative affairs; they have been partners with 5 us in every Department of Building piece of 6 legislation we've done. I also want to thank Erik 7 8 Dilan, who has worked tirelessly on this issue since taking over as chair of our Housing and 9 10 Buildings Committee. I also want to thank Council 11 Member Lappin, the prime sponsor of these bills, who responded in an incredibly focused manner 12 after these two incidents occurred in her 13 district. Let me first call on Council Member 14 15 Lappin and then Chairperson Dilan.

Madam Speaker. I want to thank you and Chair
Dilan for all of your work. I wanted to thank Rob
Newman for hours and hours and hours of tireless
meetings over the last six months. Construction
in this city is happening at an incredibly rapid
pace and our oversight and safety regulations have
to keep up. And there are those that would say
construction is a dangerous business and leave it
at that. But I think we have a responsibility to

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do what we can to make construction and to make crane operations safer. And I think these bills certainly bring us one step closer to that goal. The average person on the street should know that once these bills are enacted, the people working on those cranes will have training. It seems crazy to think that now there is no requirement that those workers be trained; and that's going to change. In terms of the safety protocols and putting together a plan; one to have a plan, and two, to make sure that everybody sits at the table, reviews the plan, knows exactly what their task is during a dangerous operation, is critically important. And I wanted to note, it has been almost six months since the first crane These bills were not put together collapse. They were put together over a long hastily. period of time, over multiple hearings with incredible amount of consultation with those in the industry, in labor, with the Mayor, with my colleagues, all of us working together to draft legislation that really will make a difference and do it in a sensible way. So I'm very proud to be the sponsor of this legislation and to be able,

after the vote, to go back to my community, to look my neighbors in the eye, those who are still feeling the impact of these tragedies and tell them that we, as a body, have done something and done something that matters.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Council Member Lappin. If I can next call on the Chair of Housing and Building Committee, Erik Dilan; but if I could get a little quiet in the Chamber. There's a little bit of a din and it's hard to hear the members.

Madam Speaker. If I could just very briefly, I just wanted to thank the members of the Housing and Buildings Committee for meeting over the summer on these bills to allow these three items to come to the floor of the Council in a very expeditious manner. To some six months might seem like a long time, but I think that these bills were carefully crafted and they weren't knee jerk reactions, and they were appropriate, all three, based on the knowledge that we have as a result of the two accidents, at this point, without the benefit of a completed investigation. All three

COUNCIL MEMBER DILAN: --will help cranes operate in New York City better. And so far it's been a three-pronged approach; it's been the Council, the Mayor and the industry in Real Estate. S o at this time I just want to just thank Lou Coletti, and Amber Loy [phonetic] for their work on these bills. I'd like to thank James Conway of the Operating Engineer for their input and their work on these bills, obviously Council Member Lappin for bringing these bills to my Committee. And I know they have a citywide benefit, but I think that her constituents should be proud of her today, in acting on their behalf in such a rapid manner. And in light of what happened in the Speaker's district today--BETSY GOTBAUM: [Interposing] Quiet please.

COUNCIL MEMBER DILAN: --I'm glad that we're passing these bills because we need these bills to be enacted as soon as possible to prevent any further fatalities. And I look

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forward to working on new pieces of legislation in the future that will continue the safe practices of all building practices throughout the city, not just cranes. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

I want to thank Alix Pustilnick and Oona Peterson for their work on this bill. Many of us saw the news reports of, not once but twice, individuals scaling the side of the New York Times building. And we also saw countless police officers and emergency service workers responding to try to get those individuals—

SPEAKER QUINN: It was very worrisome to see on TV all of these public safety workers going out there, potentially risking their own lives to get these individuals off of the Times building without them being injured and

before they fell and perhaps injured pedestrians
or others. And when these individuals ended up in
court, as has happened with some other individuals
who climbed other buildings, the law isn't as
specific or clear as it should be, about what
these individuals can and should be charged with.
So with the common sense of Council Member
Vallone, Intro 721-A will make a very clear Class
A misdemeanor relevant to that type of behavior.
And some may say, well it's up to the individual;
if they want to put their own life at risk, that's
up to them. But the truth is they're also
endangering other individuals, pedestrians, others
in the buildings and it is not a choice for any of
those public safety workers in our city, and
there's no reason why those individuals have to
respond to something that isn't even clearly a
crime in the laws of the City. And I want to
thank Chairperson Vallone for his work on this and
call on him to speak.
COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE, JR: Thank

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today, we are voting on intro 737-A, a piece of legislation introduced by Council Member Vacca, the chair of our Senior Center Subcommittee, passed out of our Aging Committee, which is chaired by Council Member Arroyo. You know elder abuse is a problem in every neighborhood in every borough in this city, from Staten Island to the But it's a problem that often seniors Bronx. don't feel comfortable sharing. It's often a time when seniors don't know where to turn, because often the individuals who are acting in this horrible and abusive way are family members, caregivers, people to whom they are very, very This piece of legislation will require close. that the Department for Aging develops and conducts very specific training programs, training programs which will help those who run senior centers and conduct services for seniors in the City of New York, help make sure they can identify the signs of elder abuse and help connect those New Yorkers in need with services that will help them get out of harm's way and get them free of the abuse that they're suffering. I want to thank Kris Sartori, Terzah Nasser, and Shaniqua Owusu,

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who all worked on this bill. Let me first call on the Chair of our Committee, Council Member Arroyo, and then the bill's sponsor, Council Member Vacca.

COUNCIL MEMBER DEL CARMEN ARROYO:

Thank you, Madam Speaker. I want to thank Council Member Vacca for his foresight and his work on this legislation, as you've mentioned, the committee staff and all of their work to develop legislation that makes a great deal of sense to address an issue that is very serious in our city and in this country. As you pick up the paper and you see the kinds of crimes that are committed against the aging residents of our city and in this country, and I think the next level of this conversation is raising the penalty and/or the crime level of crimes against seniors. I want to take this moment to express my condolences to Shaniqua Owusu and her family for the loss of her grandmother. Shaniqua worked really, really hard on this as policy analyst for the Committee on the Aging and Subcommittee on Senior Centers. her family our deepest condolences. And again, congratulations, Jimmy, good work.

COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA: I'd like to

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thank the Council and to thank my many colleagues who are supporting this bill. We have 327 senior citizen's center in our city. And if we're going to start an effective fight against senior abuse and recognize that senior abuse exists to a large degree in communities throughout our city, it makes sense to have senior centers serve as a focal point for our efforts to recognize and address senior abuse issues. My legislation would require that employees at senior centers be trained three times a year on what to look for when it comes to senior abuse, be it mental, be it financial, be it physical, be it family related. Many times our seniors are abused or taken advantage of by family members. We need to have recognition of when that happens. And we need to have people who are in senior centers who can reach out and help. Secondly, once they're trained those senior center employees would be required to conduct training for senior center participants. 20 percent of our seniors attend senior citizen centers. But in addition to that, they also attend churches and other community organizations. Their knowledge, their eyes and

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ears will be key in our efforts to address elder
abuse and to make outstanding outreach efforts in
the senior community, recognizing what it is and
getting help. So I want to thank everyone
involved, Rob Newman, the staff, the Aging staff,
the speaker, the Mayor's office. I hope that this
keeps a spotlight on something many of us may not
speak about, something that many of our elderly
people do not want to confront. It's another
opportunity for us to reach out to those who are
isolated, living alone, who may have family
crises, this is an opportunity for us to really
deal with something that exists in our city and
that demands our attention. Thank you.

In fact, occasionally something that's old and unique is just a shameful, disgraceful, hunk of junk. We are going to vote on the NOHO historic district today. And that is going to include one piece of property that we should be ashamed of and not be landmarking. That property on the Bowery houses 22 people who are living in subhuman conditions. And despite the best efforts of Council Member Gerson, whom I hold in the highest regard, by subjecting this building to the landmarking process, it will be impossible at worst, delayed at best, that this building will be This building has walls that don't go renovated. to the ceilings, has interior rooms, is vermin invested, rodent infested and cannot be rehabbed without a gut renovation of the building. The tenants of that building now, it's an SRO, have legal rights, if this building gets developed, that will get them out of this subhuman housing. If we landmark this property they will have to go through a process, promise that it will be expedited, the result cannot be guaranteed, where the Landmarks Preservation Commission will delay

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their ability to get out of this property, delay
the renovation of this property. It makes
absolutely no sense. This property, whatever it
was built for in the 20s, is falling apart and has
absolutely no value to the City of New York. It
makes no sense to landmark it and then send it
through a process for a hardship labor on an
expedited basis. Those things are absolutely
inconsistent and I urge people to vote no on the
NOHO historic district. Let it come back without
that property in.

BETSY GOTBAUM: Anybody else?
Council Member Mendez?

COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you,
Madam Public Advocate. My colleague Alan Gerson
is not here. The NOHO historic district covers a
part of my district and mostly his district; but
there's an invisible line that goes up the Bowery.
And while it divides most of it into his district,
I still consider that my community. And these
blocks that are being considered today for
historic status as a historic district is part
that has been kept out. We have NOHO historic
district 1, NOHO historic district 2, and this is

2	the NOHO historic extension. This building with
3	all these blocks makes sense to be included
4	because it is part of the historic nature of the
5	history of the Bowery and of flophouses. And
6	while the building is in bad repair and needs to
7	get fixed, it is difficult but not impossible. We
