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CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN:and welcome
to today's Finance Committee hearing, I'm David
 Weprin, I'm Chair of the Committee

We have a number of our colleagues here today, we have Council Member Helen Sears from Queens, Council Member Maria Baez from the Bronx, Council Member Inez Dickens from Manhattan, Council Member Joel Rivera from the Bronx, Council Member Gale Brewer from Manhattan, Council Member Eric Gioia from Queens, Councilman Jim Oddo from Staten Island, and Brooklyn, Council Member Vincent Ignizio from Staten Island, Council Member Albert Vann from Brooklyn.

Today, the Finance Committee has two items on its agenda, a Local Law to establish a Business Improvement District in Brooklyn and a resolution relating to the adopted fiscal 2009 expense budget.

Let's begin with the Business

Improvement District, Intro 906, establishes the

Bed-Stuy Gateway BID located in Council Member

Albert Vann's district. Proposed resolution 1739
A, approved and adopted by this Committee on

January 27th, set today as the first hearing date

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so that we may hear from all those who may be affected by the establishment of the BID who wish to speak.

After we hear from our witnesses, we will adjourn the hearing for at least 30 days, which is statutorily mandated time during which property owners objecting to the establishment of a BID may file objections. In the absence of significant objections, if the Committee and the Council can answer the following four questions affirmatively, it may adopt a Local Law establishing the BID. The four questions are that we're prepared to ask: were all notices of hearings for all hearings required to be held published and mailed as required by law and otherwise sufficient; two, does all the real property within the district's boundaries benefit from the establishment of the district except as otherwise provided by the law; three, is all real property benefited by the district included within the district; and four, is the establishment of the district in the best interest of the public.

If the Committee finds in the affirmative on these four questions and the number

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of objections required to prevent the creation of the bid are not filed, then the legislation can be adopted.

Our next piece of legislation relates to the adopted fiscal 2009 expense budget. In an effort to make the budget process more transparent, this Committee will vote on a Preconsidered resolution approving certain changes in the designation of organizations receiving funding in the fiscal 2009 expense budget. Specifically, the resolution before us today sets forth new designations and or changes in the designation of certain organizations receiving local aging and youth discretionary funding, as well as new designations and or changes in the designation of certain organization to receive funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the fiscal 2009 expense budget.

Council Members should have the list of these new designations and changes which is attached to the resolution. For clarification purposes, it is to be noted that organizations appearing in the resolution that have not yet completed the pregualification process conducted

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by the Mayor's office of contract services or by
the Council are identified in the attached charts
with an asterisk. Additionally, as with all
transparency resolutions, Council Members will
have to sign a disclosure form indicating whether
or not a conflict exists with any of the groups on
the attached list. If any Council Member has a
potential conflict of interest with any of the
organizations listed, he or she might want to
disclose the conflict at the time of their vote.

Members of Council Finance are available to answer any questions you may have regarding the transparency resolution and Noran Camp is available to answer any questions you may have regarding the conflict of interest disclosure form.

We will hear from the Department of Small Business Services, Assistant Commissioner Jeremy Waldrup, who is here to testify about the Bed-Stuy Gateway BID.

L5	you, Mr. Chairman.
L6	Good morning to my colleagues and
L7	to my friends and neighbors and business persons
18	from Bedford-Stuy. I'm very enthusiastic in my
L9	support for the Bed-Stuy Gateway Business
20	Improvement District, which will be located in the
21	heart of the commercial area of my district.
22	This Gateway, the Bed-Stuy Gateway
23	Business Improvement District is a mixed-use
24	district consisting of properties lining two major

thoroughfares and Bedford Stuyvesant. Properties

on eight blocks on the north and south sides of
Fulton Street, which extends from Carson Avenue on
the west to Troy Avenue on the East. Then there
are properties on four blocks on the East and West
sides of Nostrand Avenue, which extends from
Halsey Street on and the north through Atlantic
Avenue on the south. The buildings within the
proposed boundaries of the district are
predominantly mixed-use in classification and
range from one to six floors. The ground floors
of most buildings are occupied by retail or
professional uses with upper floors for
residential use.

Restoration Plaza, a mixed-use complex owned by Bed-Stuy Restoration Corporation. This is, you may recall, the nation's, not only the oldest, but its first comprehensive community development corporation. Restoration Plaza occupies the entire block bounded by Brooklyn Avenue, Herkimer Street, New York Avenue, and, of course, Fulton Street. It was formerly a milk bottling plant--I remember passing by there as a young kid and being amazed by how the bottles were being filled with

making this whole machinery that was going on, not too many people in this room can say that, but I can, thank God I'm still here. For the formerly milk bottling plant, it was developed in 1972 as a commercial and civic center for Bedford Stuyvesant and contains a diverse mix of retail office and cultural uses. It includes a Super Food Town, a suburban style shopping center; Applebee's, a neighborhood grill and bar and restaurant; Duane Reade Pharmacy; Washington Mutual Bank; Chase Bank; Citibank; Billie Holiday Theater; College of New Rochelle; School of New Resources; the offices of Bed-Stuy Restoration and some very outstanding clients as well.

The Gateway is one of the busiest hubs of commercial activity outside of downtown Brooklyn, with the intersection of Fulton and Nostrand Avenue receiving the second highest levels of pedestrian activity outside of downtown Brooklyn.

The BID's formation is really quite timely, it comes at this economically hard time in our city when businesses are relying on government to toe the line to help them to continue to

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survive, indeed to thrive. This has been in the making for quite some time, I know Joe Long has to be happy. In fact, there have been efforts in the past to create a BID in Bedford Stuyvesant as early as in 1989 there were concerted efforts to get this BID, but a lack of timing and local consensus thwarted that effort, but, Joe Long, I think we're on target now.

I have to credit the leadership and focus efforts of the Bedford Stuyvesant Restoration Corporation and their work towards supporting and structuring a bridge with the Nostrand Avenue Merchants Association. Over the past four years, Restoration has worked to build relationships and to gain a solid understanding of the needs of the merchants in the area. Their efforts have led to a successful strategic partnership between the city, Restoration, and the Fulton-Nostrand merchants. In the past two years, Merchant Association Steering Committee Chairs, Mr. Braithwaite and Mr. Noah Katz, have really lead this effort, in many instances have gone door to door amongst their neighbors to gain support for the BID and I thank them for that. I also

know that their hard work is paying off and, of course, we undoubtedly expect a resultant economic boom for the area, if not right away, in the near future. We understand what's happening globally, nationally, and, indeed, in our city, we are very cognizant of that, but we continue to move on.

Where things are under way in the district the BID's creation dovetails with the economic development occurring in Bed-Stuy. The reconstruction of Nostrand Avenue is promised by the Administration right away, the recent rezoning in the district, and also a recent EPA Smart Growth Planning Grant for urban sustainability that we recently have been awarded.

So we welcome the BID, invite people from all over the city to come to the area, come to Bed-Stuy to shop and learn more about this very thriving community. We've been discovered, people from all over the world seem like they're trying to move in and we're trying to accept some of them graciously.

I would like to thank Commissioner
Rob Walsh and his staff for all of their hard work
and time [phonetic] management in helping to get

SBS supports the establishment of the Bed-Stuy Gateway Business Improvement District in the borough of Brooklyn. Geographically, the proposed BID includes properties along both sides of Fulton Street from Classon Avenue to Albany

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Avenue, north side of Fulton Avenue from Albany
Avenue to Marcus Garvey Boulevard, the south side
of Fulton street from Albany Avenue to Troy
Avenue, and Nostrand Avenue from Halsey Street to
Atlantic Avenue. Services to be provided in the
Bed-Stuy Gateway BID include sidewalk sweeping and
maintenance, graffiti removal, security, marketing
and promotion to the local area, sidewalk and
streetscape improvements, administration, other
services as to be required for the promotion and
enhancement of the district.

The Bed-Stuy Gateway District

Management Association will manage the district

and the budget for the first year of operations is

expected to be 675,000.

As required by law, the Bed-Stuy

Gateway BID Steering Committee mailed the summary

of the City Council resolution to each owner of

real property within the proposed district at the

address shown on the latest city assessment roll,

to such other persons as are registered with the

city to receive tax bills concerning real property

within the district, and to tenants of each

Restoration has been a steward of
Central Brooklyn for the last 41 years. We have a
comprehensive slate of programming that spans
housing preservation and development, arts and
culture, youth education, workforce development,
personal asset building, and local economic
development. Restoration has sought to ensure
that Central Brooklyn is a community built on a
wide and solid foundation.

been a desire from many segments of the community for physical and economic improvement in this business district. Merchants get ticketed constantly for the litter strewn on the sidewalks and facade graffiti that goes unpainted.

Neighborhood residents who live only two blocks away bypass the shopping district for farther, more visually appealing destinations, such as Park Slope's 7th Avenue or Myrtle Avenue and Fort Greene, Clinton Hill. Our potential business

owners and residents and retailers are scared away by signs of physical disinvestment and open their new businesses elsewhere, despite the 100,000 customers that live only a 10 minute walk away from Fulton Street.

This proposed BID will strengthen

Central Brooklyn's local economy by encouraging

residents to shop locally and our entrepreneurs to

invest locally. The 2008 Bed-Stuy Gateway LISC

MetroEdge Retail Scan that we commissioned in

consult with the Business Vitality Network of the

Coalition for the Improvement of Bedford

Stuyvesant found that Bed-Stuy had nearly \$600

million of concentrated buying power per square

mile--this is 30% greater than Brooklyn at large

and roughly 50% greater than Queens at large, but

we cannot get our local residents to shop on

Fulton Street because they leak their dollars away

elsewhere for various reasons.

In mid-2006, the Fulton-Nostrand
United Merchants Association--the president is
Hardy Joe Long here in the middle of the table-decided to enter into a working partnership with
Restoration to begin the Bed-Stuy Gateway BID

8	MR. DABU: Thank you, Mr. Chair.
9	So to repeat, in 2006, the Merchant
10	Association decided themselves to enter into a
11	partnership with Restoration to begin this
12	process. And from there, in 2007, they formed the
13	Steering Committee, the Bed-Stuy Gateway BID
14	Steering Committee, of whom Noah Katz and Edmon
15	Braithwaite are the co-chairs and we have several
16	members of the Steering Committee here in the room
17	as well. They decided to create the BID and
18	Restoration is providing the technical assistance.
19	The first think that the Steering
20	Committee did, the very first task was to set out
21	a vision that unambiguously terms the purpose of
22	their work and for the BID to be created and I'm
23	just going to briefly read that vision.
24	We declare that the Bed-Stuy
25	Gateway Business District is the business and

cultural destination of choice for all residents of Bedford Stuyvesant, Clinton Hill, Northern Crown Heights, Ocean Hill and Brownsville.

Through the services of the BID, we are committed to a safe, clean, and aesthetically attractive commercial and cultural destination; fostering thriving and profitable businesses; providing a variety of retail goods and services from a mixture of national brand and locally-based companies, including minority and women-owned small businesses; and, finally, valuing the diverse history, culture, and styles of the residents of the Bedford Stuyvesant and wider Central Brooklyn communities by offering goods and services that respond to the community's wants and desires.

There's no mistake that this

Steering Committee had on its mind neighborhood

change and they wanted to transform the look and

feel of the business district while also making it

sure that it's responsive to the neighborhood that

it's in. This is the vision of the bid.

So in the two years that have elapsed we have done significant outreach. We

have had three informational mailings, we've had three public scoping meetings, two public hearings, we have a host of outreach portions where we've had numerous opportunities to solicit that input. We welcome that input. Our Steering Committee co-chairs have stressed that they want all input, whether it's negative or positive, and that we invite them to join in the BID Steering Committee, which will be the board, to make this a success. The BID's budget and the vision is truly ambitious, but it's affordable, yet large enough to make an impact—it's \$675,000 annually, it's big enough to effect change from day one without really bankrupting our businesses from day one.

The last thing the Steering

Committee wanted to see was within one or five

months of the BIDs being formed, that our members

can come back and say I don't see a difference—

that would be a tragedy, that'll be a waste of

money, that's not what this BID Steering Committee

wanted.

And the BID is to be called Bed-Stuy Gateway to differentiate the BID from other Fulton Street entities throughout the city, to

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reflect on the role of the streets in this BID
that they play in bringing people to the
neighborhood and also to connect the BID to its
Bedford Stuyvesant location.

Lastly, one of the primary goals of the creation of this BID is, in addition to increasing local consumer spending, is to create the conditions in the district to attract further public and private investment. In this regard, the vision for the BID is already successful from day one.

With funding from the Office of
Management and Budget, Borough President Marty
Markowitz, New York City's Comprehensive
Neighborhood Economic Development Initiative, and,
of course, our Councilman Vann, we have been able
to attract more than \$9 million for a streetscape
beautification project that you see right here
that EDC is project managing for us. The
condition for granting this money and that
Councilman Vann has been able to get it for us is
that we have an entity to maintain the new and
beautiful streetscape after it's put in and it's
been emphasized to me in the meetings that you

have to have the BID, DOT will not sign off unless they know there's a maintenance agreement in place.

So we have emphasized to our community members that you cannot let almost \$10 million walk away because you're not able to pony up to give your neighborhood a contribution.

So in sum, this streetscape will begin by the end of this year if the BID is in place.

So I stand here on the shoulders of many people who have worked tirelessly before me in Bedford Stuyvesant over the last 25 years and more to bring the benefits of BID management to Central Brooklyn's main street. In addition to the people that I mentioned at the beginning of my remarks, we have Angel Melendez from Flowerworks Florists and landscape contractors Edna Johnson, Wes Gibson, a local resident, Hardy Joe Long, Stephanie Faulkner, Noah Katz, Jim Robinson, Jeremy Waldrup, and, SBS, thank you for your help. I also want to thank Bernice McRae, my colleague, for her knowledge and guidance in the previous efforts, the members of Community Board 3 and its

2	chair, Henry Butler, the Brownstoners of Bedford
3	Stuyvesant Civic Association, and, of course, the
4	late Tohma Faulkner, who among other roles, was a
5	member of our Steering Committee and was one of
6	our tireless advocates and she's recently passed
7	away, but I know her spirit's with us today. And
8	all of their support and all of their work has
9	brought us here today and I urge you to vote in
10	over 30 days to approve this BID.
11	So respectfully yours, I thank you
12	for this opportunity to speak. Thank you.

And as of the years that has been gone, bypassed, we have always been trying to do what we're about to achieve now, is to bring a better Business Improvement District to Bedford Stuyvesant.

Over the years, I could sit here--I guess Vann, I'm the only one can say that I remember the building when it was a mill company there before Restoration took over and over the years that I've seen that how Restoration has been very instrumental in our community and making sure that the stores that are there will maintain their businesses and some that has gone on beyond that, they have been able to survive. Right as of now I sit here to say that I know and hope and pray that the Council will look into what we're trying to do to pass in 30 days that we will be able to bring a better Business Improvement District to Bedford Stuyvesant.

This is my vision over the years that I've been there and I don't know with the economy the way it is today and with my individual

business, I don't know whether I will be able to be successful for the rest of the 2009, but if I don't be there, I know my spirits will be there and my hard work that I've done over the 50 years of being in Bedford Stuyvesant in the business that I've been able to say that I have been able to see what has been accomplished over the years.

And I just want to thank you, Al, personal for putting your input in where we are at this time. Before you became Council, you worked with us from Assemblyman district and we know that this is going to be a successful BID because of all the hard work and especially from the Steering Committee that has put in, that it will be successful.

So I want to thank each and every one that gives us this opportunity to come here to speak on behalf of the Nostrand Fulton Merchants Association, along with Restoration Gateway project that this will be successful for Bedford Stuyvesant residents and also to bring in more residents, more commercial strips that people can be able to do shopping there. Thank you very much.

24	the owner of a couple of businesses in the Bed-
25	Stuy area

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My presence here this morning is
more than just being a representative of the
organizations I just mentioned. My presence here
is as a business person to indicate to folks here
that over the past six or seven years, we have
made a tremendous amount of progress in improving
the business district in which we function and in

which we make our living.

And before I even go any further, I wanted to tell a little story of something that happened as recent as Monday morning and to me this illustrates why it is that we as a community need to take control of what we do and how we do business. I opened one of my businesses on Monday morning at 10 o'clock and the first two customers that walked in about five minutes later, one was a gentleman of about 60 something years old I would imagine and the other one was a young man of no more than 22 or 23 years old and they both walked in pretending as if they were going to buy lottery tickets and as they're standing there together side-by-side, I noticed something strange. investigating, they're actually selling drugs, the younger man was selling drugs to the older man and

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I stood and I watched them and I turned and I said to them not in my business, I said not here, go do it someplace else, and the older gentleman looked at me in an aggressive manner as if he was ready to argue, but the younger man looked at me and said, I'm sorry, we're not going to do it here again, right? And that is what I was greeted with first thing Monday morning as I opened my business and that is the type of event that illustrates why it is that we need to take control of our business district. That is an indication as to why it is that we as business folks need to understand that we have over the last couple of years, is it Joel, that have worked diligently to begin the process to where we are now.

I do believe that we've come to the point where we need to work with our government, we're not looking for handouts from the City Council or from our Mayor. We have made a decision that we will take responsibility of our district and ensure that the 60% of residents who live in Bedford Stuyvesant, who shop elsewhere, we will reduce that number, we want 100% of the residents in Bedford Stuyvesant to shop in Bedford

2	Stuyvesant. Right now, we don't have that. With
3	the implementation of this Business Improvement
4	District, we are going to make progress in that
5	and we urge your support and we urge that in 30
6	days you pass the bill that will allow us to
7	control our own destiny.

We will improve the district; we will have a clean, beautiful environment for customers to shop; we will create opportunities in Bedford Stuyvesant and it will translate into jobs and that is how we kind of see this thing working and we're thrilled to be part of it and please, I humbly request that you vote in favor of it next month.
