4	that's bouncy. Good afternoon, I'm Councilman
5	Larry B. Seabrook, Chair of the City Council's
6	Committee on Civil Rights. I would like to thank
7	everyone for attending this afternoon's vote on
8	proposed introduction number 826-A, a local law to
9	amend New York City's administrative code in
10	relation to the prohibition of activities to
11	prevent access to reproductive health care
12	facilities. In preparing the legislation to be
13	voted on today, the Council had to consider the
14	rights of New Yorkers as protected by city, state
15	and federal law. The first area is the right to
16	access reproductive health services. This is an
17	important personal right, recognized by the City
18	and protected by both state and federal law.
19	There's also the right to peaceable protest and
20	express one's views as established and protected
21	by the First Amendment. Proposed introduction
22	826-A will strengthen the protection afforded to
23	those seeking and providing reproductive health
24	services, while preserving opportunities for
25	expression of opinion protected by the First

2	Amendment. Because of the rights at issue, the
3	Council worked with the broad coalition of civil
4	liberties and reproductive right groups. I would
5	like to thank those organizations as well as my
6	colleagues and Council staff for their hard work
7	on this legislation. For that we will commence
8	with the Committee on Civil Rights, voting on the
9	proposed introduction 82-A. Thank you, I'd like
10	to introduce the members of the Committee who are
11	here this morning: Dr. Mathieu Eugene from
12	Brooklyn; Councilman Mike Nelson from Brooklyn;
13	and Councilwoman Julissa Ferreras from Queens, our
14	new member to the Committee, and welcome on board.
15	And so, without any further ado, we're going to
16	take a vote on this proposed Intro 826-A.
17	COMMITTEE CLERK: William Martin,
18	Committee Clerk. Roll call to Committee on Civil
19	Rights. Council Member Seabrook.
