CHAIRPERSON ROSENTHAL: Thank you. Good I am Council Member Helen Rosenthal, Chair morning. of the Committee on Women. Today, we're meeting to vote on Resolution 84 sponsored by the Public Advocate Letitia James. The Resolution urges the New York State Legislature to pass, and the governor to sign the Reproductive Health Act. As I've said before, an individual's right to choose to have an abortion is an essential component of their personal health, economic mobility, educational opportunities and career aspirations. New York was once a leader in protecting these rights. In 1970, three years before Roe v. Wade our state was the first in the nation to legalize abortion, but there were some flaws in the original 1970 law. Passing the Reproductive Health Act would address many of those serious flaws. With Reproductive Health Act, abortion will be regulated in the Public Health Code rather than the Penal Code. Self-induced abortion will no-no longer be criminalized. The health of the pregnant person will be an exception to late term abortion restrictions. It will be made clear that

2	nurse practitioners, physician assistants and
3	licensed midwives can perform abortions. The
4	testimony this committee received when the resolution
5	was first heard on September 20 th , makes it clear why
6	this matters. This is a basic health issue affecting
7	individuals, families and everyday New Yorkers. As
8	State Senator Liz Kruger, the State Senate Bill's
9	sponsor, put it in her testimony before this
10	committee at our September 20 th hearing: "This bill
11	is critical. Even without being at the door of
12	losing our rights, we are indeed at an emergency
13	action, first responder stage." And it is time that
14	the state take action. I would like to thank the
15	staff or the Committee on Women including Counsel
16	Brenda McKinney; Policy Analyst Chloe Rivera; and my-
17	and Finance Analyst Daniel Kroop for all their help
18	in preparing for this hearing as well as my
19	Legislative Director Ned Terrace. I'd also like to
20	acknowledge the Committee members, Brad Lander, who
21	is here, and ask Billy Martin to call—to do roll
22	call. I would like to wait on calling him to do roll
23	call until one more member is present. Thank you.
