2	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Good morning,
3	my name is Leroyare we ready to rolling, rock 'n
4	roll? Good morning. I'd like to welcome everyone
5	today's Consumer Affairs Committee meeting.
6	I am Leroy Comrie, the Chair of the
7	Committee. I am joined by my colleagues Council
8	Member Charles Barron from Brooklyn, Council
9	Member John Liu from Queens, Council Member Oliver
10	Koppell should be on his way up the stairs in a
11	minute, Council Member Jim Gennaro had a emergency
12	and cannot be with us today.
13	Today, we will be voting on Intro
14	380-A, a Local Law, which will amend the
15	Administrative Code of the City of New York in
16	relation to issuing licenses for the purchase and
17	possession of etching acid.
18	The problem of etching acid
19	vandalism is most prevalent on the city's mass
20	transit system where subway windows are frequently
21	damaged at a cost of \$130 per window and the
22	annual cost to the MTA of 11 million. Trains can
23	also be out of service for over eight hours while
24	replacement windows are installed and the number
25	of subway cars going out of operation for window

2	repair has increased dramatically in recent years.
3	New York City employs several laws
4	in its efforts to thwart graffiti. For example,
5	Local Law 124 of 2005 and Local Law 39 of 2007
6	specifically regulate the possession and
7	transportation of graffiti instruments by
8	individuals under 21. The police department also
9	enforces several important state anti-graffiti
10	regulations, such as penal laws criminalizing the
11	possession of graffiti instruments and the act of
12	producing graffiti.
13	Intro 380-A would supplement
14	existing laws by requiring sellers of etching acid
15	to keep detailed records of purchasers for one
16	year. These records would be made available to
17	the police for the purpose of enforcing anti-
18	graffiti legislation and would include the
19	purchaser's name and address, type of ID presented
20	at the time of purchase, the amount of acid
21	dispensed, and the date of the purchase. Sellers
22	also would be required to post a notice stating
23	that all persons purchasing acid must present
24	photo identification and that the aforementioned
25	information will be recorded by the seller.

2	We'd like to move to a vote,
3	Council Member Liu, we can vote now 'cause I know
4	you have a committee meeting, would you like to
5	vote on this issue?
6	COUNCIL MEMBER LIU: Thank you very
7	much for your indulgence, Mr. Chairman, yes, I
8	[Crosstalk]
9	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Oh, wait a
10	minute, huh, what, what?
11	MS. LACY CLARKE: Billy Martin
12	isn't here.
13	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Oh, Billy
14	Martin is not here, great. But Lacy is, you're an
15	attorney, you can take the legal record of what
16	happened and then we can move forward, correct?
17	[Off mic]
18	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Well we need
19	Billy Martin, geez, that means we lose John for a
20	half hour to 45 minutes 'cause
21	COUNCIL MEMBER LIU: No, no, I'll
22	be right downstairs, they will pull me out as soon
23	as I can come up to vote.
24	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: All right,
25	wellhere he is, here he is, oops, there he is,

3	MS. CLARKE: just make a quick
4	this is just
5	[Off mic]
6	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Oh I'm sorry,
7	there is a correction, it's not to issue licenses,
8	it's just to keep a log for the purchase and
9	possession of etching acid. I said issuing
10	licenses, it's just to keep a log book.
11	Okay. Would anyone like to make a
12	statement before we move to a vote?
13	Okay. Can Council Member Liu vote
14	first 'cause he has a meeting with a hundred
15	people waiting for him?
16	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: I want to
17	try to influence his
18	[Crosstalk]
19	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: You want to
20	try and influence his vote?
21	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Yes.
22	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: All right.
23	Well in that case
24	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: I want to
25	try to get him to vote no

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2	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Okay.
3	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON:unless
4	he's going to vote no, then you can go ahead and
5	vote.
6	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: I didn't ask
7	him how he was going to vote on this.
8	COUNCIL MEMBER LIU: Well, Mr.
9	Chairman, respectfully, I am thankful to Council
10	Member Barron for his insight and input. In this
11	case, I will respectfully beg to differ with
12	Council Member Barron. In the subways we do have-

14	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: You don't
15	even know what you're
16	[Crosstalk]
17	COUNCIL MEMBER LIU:we have an
18	ongoing issue with graffiti and scratchitti and it
19	is costing the MTA and, ultimately the subway and
20	bus riding public, money. And we need to do a
21	better job of containing the problem, so I vote
22	yes on this bill, with all due respect to Council
23	Member Barron. I hope that now that he knows that
24	I voted yes, that he will change his vote to yes
25	as well.

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2	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Well that's
3	interesting how you respect me
4	COUNCIL MEMBER LIU: Oh here we go.
5	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON:and
6	disagree with the position I haven't put out yet.
7	You're deep, John, I knew you were deep, but I
8	didn't know you read minds and you know
9	COUNCIL MEMBER LIU: No, Charles,
10	you just asked me to vote no, that's how I know.
11	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: I didn't
12	tell you why, but if you're in a hurry, I
13	certainly understand that, you can leave.
14	I'm just saying that this is not
15	the way to stop graffiti. It will not do what you
16	arethe intent of this bill that we now have to
17	give our information so that the police can have
18	information on anybody that purchase this etching
19	acid and even if it's an artist that's purchasing
20	it foror glassmakers purchasing it for decent
21	reasons, now the police will have access to that.
22	And I don't think that we should turn this thing
23	into a police state just to stop graffiti. I
24	think it's a stretch, it's not going to stop the
25	\$11 million because the people who are going to do

2	that, what are you going to do, collect all the
3	names of people that's buying this and then go to
4	their houses and say did you use this for
5	graffiti? It just doesn't make any sense, and
6	it's just giving more access to the police to
7	harass people and go to their homes 'cause they
8	purchased some etching acid. It doesn't make
9	sense, it's not going to work, it's just going to
10	bring more police harassment to the citizens of
11	New York, who may have legitimate reasons for
12	purchasing this. That's all I wanted to say,
13	John. [Pause] Okay.
14	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Did you change
15	your mind?
16	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: I guess
17	that means no.
18	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Okay, I
19	guess that means no. All right, we can move
20	forward. Mr. Martin, can you call the roll for
21	the vote at this point?
22	MR. WILLIAM MARTIN: William
23	Martin, Committee Clerk, Committee on Consumer
24	Affairs roll call. Introduction 380-A Council
25	Member Comrie.

2	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: I vote aye.
3	MR. MARTIN: Barron.
4	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: May I be
5	excused to explain my vote?
6	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Yes, you may.
7	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: I'm voting
8	no on this, this really doesn't make sense. It's
9	another one of them Peter Vallone doesn't make
10	sense bills that involves law enforcement [off
11	mic]innocent citizens to stop graffiti. This is
12	not going to work. There are already things in
13	placepenal laws in place already, and if we want
14	to stop graffiti, then I think we should have more
15	opportunities for these artists to develop their
16	artistic skills in other ways. Instead of this
17	law enforcement approach to everything, how about
18	putting more money into arts and recreation
19	programs and giving greater benefits for artists
20	to do other things than graffiti, like maybe build
21	more art centers in our neighborhoods, build more
22	theaters, build more things that will encourage
23	artists to do other kinds of things with their
24	talent, other than this law enforcement approach
25	to everything. This makes absolutely no sense,

2	it's not going to work and I encourage my
3	colleagues to say no.
4	I vote no on this bill.
5	MR. MARTIN: Koppell.
6	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: Some of us
7	recall the days not too long ago when our subways
8	and buses were horribly defaced by graffiti and
9	other vandalism, particularly graffiti. And while
10	some people viewed that as art, the fact is that
11	it really lowered the level of communities and
12	people felt they were in a lawless environment,
13	and that changed.
14	While I wasn't a great fan of Mayor
15	Giuliani, the fact is that cracking down on these
16	quality-of-life offenses like graffiti made a real
17	difference in people's perception of where they
18	lived in New York.
19	We have a problem and apparently
20	the graffiti is returning and it's not only
21	despoiling the environment, but it's creating
22	enormous costs.
23	The fact is, in my opinion at
24	least, that forcing someone to show their identity
25	in order to buy something that is a dangerous

2	product is a very minor intrusion into civil
3	rights or civil liberties. We require information
4	on people when they are in the possession of
5	dangerous instrumentalities. I mean, just
6	thinking about it, you can't drive a car, you
7	can't have a car even without registering it and
8	providing all kinds of personal information in
9	that connection; you can't get a gun without
10	registering in New York City at least and it
11	should be nationally. And there are other areas
12	where you just have to go through a process before
13	you're entitled to have possession of what is a
14	dangerous or destructive instrumentality and this
15	etching acid is one of those, we see the result of
16	it.
17	And so, while I don't particularly
18	like intrusion into people's personal lives, I
19	don't see any alternative at this point, quite
20	honestly, and so, Mr. chairman, I vote aye.
21	MR. MARTIN: By a vote of three in
22	the affirmative, one in the negative, and no
23	abstentions
24	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Mr.
25	Chairman, may I just

3	Council Members, please sign the committee report.
4	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Just one
5	point of clarification
6	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: I didn't
7	make a statement yet, so I'd like to make my
8	statement first, but actually I'll defer to you,
9	so
10	COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Just a
11	point of clarification, Ollie, they already have
12	to show ID to get this product. So this bill is
13	not about them showing ID to get the product, this
14	bill is allowing the police to get the information
15	of the consumer and it's a bit of a stretch from
16	etching acid to guns, I think that's a real
17	stretch to make a point.
18	I'm against graffiti and defacing
19	property, but the way to do it is to channel it
20	into something more positive and open up more
21	artistic places so that people who have these
22	talents will have the ability to express it in a
23	more positive and productive way.
24	So just a point of clarification,
25	they already have to show ID and it's a bit of a

2	stretch from acid to guns. Thank you.
3	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: Council Member
4	Barron, I have to agree with my colleagues,
5	Council Member Liu and Koppell, regarding this
6	bill.
7	I for one am not for total
8	intrusion into our lives, but I also realize that
9	are our lives have already been totally intruded
10	uponthere are computer box that monitor every
11	time you go on the Internet, we're already in a
12	society where people monitor you on everything you
13	do. I think this just gives the police department
14	another tool to go back and track records quicker,
15	to be able to connect the dots a lot quicker so
16	that they can deal with the fact that we do have a
17	new scourge of graffiti that's moving around the
18	communities and costing the MTA money.
19	The state right now is looking to
20	hopefully vote by tomorrow on a bill that won't
21	even deal with the fact that they're going to
22	close the gap in the MTA. I heard on the radio
23	there's going to be at least an 8% increase where
24	the fare is going up to 225, they're not even
25	dealing with the capital needs and the capital

2	needs are really part of the costs for the \$130							
3	per window and the eight hours of service when the							
4	train is down.							
5	I do believe in what you said about							
6	making more opportunities for artists, making more							
7	children, giving them artistic opportunities and							
8	after school opportunities and preschool							
9	opportunities, opening up more community centers.							
10	I think especially in this negative times we need							
11	to do everything we can to give children and							
12	people creative things to do, but I do think that							
13	this bill will just give the police another easier							
14	tool to track down those bad apples.							
15	I think that the percentage of							
16	them, I agree with you, will probably be less than							
17	10% of the people, but I think the other 90% of							
18	the people are law-abiding people that already							
19	have their IDs well-known by most of the people							
20	they interact with anyway. So that's why I'm							
21	voting aye on this bill.							
22	Just to move to the other topic							
23	that's not being discussed today, Intro 846, I							
24	know that's why most of you are really here today.							
25	I'll let you know that this hearing was deferred

2	and primarily due to do your issues, and your							
3	issues are being dealt with in the bill, that's							
4	why the bill has not been moved forward.							
5	They're trying to do everything							
6	they can to come up with a balanced bill for a							
7	neighborhood that really wants to try to do							
8	something to deal with the issues in their							
9	neighborhood, that they're working on							
10	collectively. They've been trying to work with it							
11	to deal with issues that they feel are necessary							
12	to improve the quality of life in their							
13	neighborhood and I think you need to try to work							
14	with them to come up with a solution that can							
15	work.							
16	I think that this is a city that if							
17	we sit down and try to work out problems, that							
18	there's no problem that can't be resolved. And,							
19	clearly, the Sunset Park areas have been trying							
20	fervently working collectively to try to come up							
21	with an issue regarding how they handle their							
22	communities, how they handle the quality of life							
23	in their communities, how they deal with sidewalk							
24	access in the community, how they deal with							
25	pedestrian traffic in the community. And I think

2	it behooves all of you that are here to make sure						
3	that you have your voices as part of that						
4	discussion.						
5	So, with that, I want to thank all						
6	of you for being here. Again, I want to let you						
7	know that 846 was deferred due to the issues of						
8	First Amendment rights and we will be getting back						
9	to it soon. I think it's an issue that, frankly,						
10	we need to try to keep tackling. That I've been						
11	wanting to have more meetings on the vendor's						
12	issue public hearings, just to try to come to a						
13	solution, but every time we go deeper into this,						
14	there are more problems than solutions. But I						
15	think that there clearly needs to be more						
16	conversation, positive conversation about						
17	solutions as opposed to just pointing fingers						
18	about this is our turf, or this is my turf.						
19	Clearly this is the city's turf and we have to						
20	make sure that as we're doing with VIN [phonetic]						
21	etching						
22	[Off mic]						
23	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: It's the						
24	city's turf, the city is the people, the people						
25	are the city.

2	MALE VOICE: How come you say the							
3	city's turf?							
4	[Off mic]							
5	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: The people are							
6	the city and the city are the people, and it's the							
7	city's turf. It's not any individual's turf.							
8	[Off mic]							
9	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE: So, again, I							
10	would just encourage all of you to make sure that							
11	you're a part of the discussion regarding the							
12	Greenpoint							
13	FEMALE VOICE: Sunset Park.							
14	CHAIRPERSON COMRIE:Sunset Park							
15	bid because I think that, again, it's necessary							
16	that there is real discussion and not finger-							
17	pointing and the solution-focused and not just							
18	problem-focused.

20	colleagues for being here this morning. I want to							
21	thank the Committee and congratulate all of the							
22	committee staff people that worked on Intro 380							
23	and also congratulate all of the people in the							
24	room for continuing to try to have some influence
