23	legends, living legends in our own time. And as
24	we look into the age of information and how

information has been a part of our community and

how it has allowed us to survive in America, we've had this opportunity through radio, because that's how we get our information, that's our source of information.

And we have been truly blessed in this city to have a station that has been at the forefront of providing an opportunity and a vehicle, not only with music, but with cultural enrichment and certainly information. And so we want to bring up first the General Manager of KISS-FM radio station 98.7, 98.7. Come on over here.

Alexis Cameron who has been outstanding in allowing information to be disseminated throughout our community and allowed two award-winning shows to be a part of KISS-FM. And she is a pioneer, one who understands the importance of radio and what it means to our community and what it means as it relates to information and the importance of it. to reflect on the extraordinary contributions and
influence that black musical artists have made to
the United States and around the world. It is a
time to pay tribute, not only to the enduring
legacy of African American musicians, singers, and
composers who have shaped our culture and our way
of life, but also to honor the organizations and
individuals who have promoted them, fostered
public discourse, and celebrated them throughout
the year; and

WHEREAS, in the New York tri-state region, 98.7 KISS-FM has played an instrumental role in these efforts through its instrumental programs--the OPEN LINE show and The Week in Review; and

WHEREAS, the OPEN LINE show is a live call-in show hosted by Bob Slade, James
Mtume, and Bob Pickett who enliven the 98.7 KISS-

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FM airways in New York, New Jersey, and
Connecticut every Sunday morning from 10 a.m. to
noon. It has been recognized by many leaders and
journalists as "one of the most important talk
shows in America." The show also won the New York

11	stopped to talk a little bit about the Sergeant's
12	service to the country and he said he was going
13	back. Were you to Iraq or Afghanistan? To Iraq,
14	and I said that when he got home safe and in one
15	piece that we wanted to have him back here to the
16	City Council so we could celebrate his safe return
17	and thank him for his service to the City Council.
18	So I was thrilled when I heard that
19	we would be doing this ceremonial because it meant
20	you got home safe and in one piece, which I know
21	is all that your family wished for.
22	I was also thrilled because it gave
23	us all an opportunity to thank you, and in
24	thanking you, to thank the other men and women who
25	serve our country every day. We start every

Stated Meeting where we remember any member of the armed services from New York City who has passed away in service to their country. And so having you here today to thank, given that we do that every Stated is incredibly important.

I just wanted to take one other second, at the Queens Pride Parade on Sunday I was marching with a woman, her name is Emily Tauro and she had a pin on and the pin was a picture of Private Isaac T. Cortez, who was her son who died-he was 26 years old, he was in the 1st Squadron of the 71st Cavalry Regiment, the 1st Brigade Combat team in the 10th Mountain Division. In his civilian life, he also does security work for the MTA protecting our bridges and tunnels. Sergeant Padilla is a true defender of our country and of our nation and I'd like to just say, you know, to quote President Coolidge, a nation who forgets its defenders is soon forgotten, and I'm glad that we're here today recognizing Sergeant Padilla as one of our defenders who will never be forgotten. WHEREAS, Sgt. Ryan Padilla, a native Staten Islander, was raised in Westerleigh along with his three brothers, where they attended P.S. 30 and graduated from Susan Wagner High School; and

WHEREAS, in March 2000, Sgt.

Padilla launched his distinguished military career with the National Guard. He attended Basic Combat Training at Ft Benning, Georgia, and Advanced Individual Training at Fort Gordon, Georgia. On September 11th, 2001, then-Private First Class Ryan Padilla was activated and served with the ground security forces at Ground Zero; and

WHEREAS, Specialist Padilla's military record advanced further in May 2004 when he was deployed under Operation Iraqi Freedom and

served with the legendary 42nd Infantry "Rainbow"

Division at Forward Operating Base Danger in

Tikrit, Iraq. He was soon promoted to Sergeant E
5; and

WHEREAS, after Sgt Padilla returned home in December 2005, he joined the MTA Bridges & Tunnels' Internal Security Department, where he was responsible for installing, maintaining, and troubleshooting all security cameras and devices protecting the system's facilities.

In June 2008, he was deployed for a second tour of duty in Iraq, assigned to the 10th Mountain Division and serving as a door-gunner in a Blackhawk helicopter with B Company 3rd 142nd Assault Helicopter Battalion, with over 300 combat flight hours, providing air assault, Medevac air support, troop movements, and VIP missions; and

Padilla has received many military awards, including the Army Commendation Medal, the Army Achievement Medal, the Global War on Terrorism Expeditionary Medal, the Iraq Campaign Medal, and the Army Service Ribbon, and the Thomas Powell Memorial Award from the New York State Grand Lodge

Our thoughts and prayers are with Mildred and Al
and their entire family.

On June 2nd, 2009, Army Specialist
Roberto A. Hernandez, 21, of the Arverne section
of Far Rockaway--he's lived in both Council Member
Sanders and Council Member Ulrich's district--died
of wounds sustained when his Humvee was attacked
with an improvised explosive device and a small
arms fire while serving in Afghanistan.

Specialist Hernandez was assigned to the 549th Military Police Company, based out of Fort Stewart, Georgia. Specialist Hernandez is a graduate of I.S. 59 and the August Martin High School, was a proud and active member of the

Christian Cultural Center in Brooklyn.

When he joined the Army in September 2007, he followed in the footsteps of his grandfather, his mother, his aunt, and two uncles, who had all served their adopted country.

In 1969 Specialist Hernandez's grandfather joined the army and, over time, using his military paycheck, he brought over other family members from their native Panama. His mother is an Air Force veteran Paulina Richards, she cried uncontrollably as she said that although he volunteered to go to Afghanistan, he was scheduled to return home on leave in just a few weeks. Excuse me, she cried, he was my only child, the last time I talked to him was Mother's Day, he called to wish me a good day and he was excited about coming home. He had lots of plans for the future and wanted to go into law enforcement in the NYPD.

His aunt, also a veteran, said the military brought us to this country, Roberto paid our debt.

On May 28th, 2009, off-duty police officer Omar Jamaal Edwards, 25, of Brooklyn was

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shot and killed in East Harlem. He was shot by a
fellow officer in a tragic case of mistaken
identity while chasing a suspect who had just
broken into a car.

From the time he was five years old, it was Omar's dream to be a police officer. By the age of 10, as a Member of the Youth Council, he was already hanging around the 73rd Precinct asking what the codes on the radios meant.

When he realized his dream and graduate from the police academy in 2007, Omar proudly wore his badge around his apartment. As Police Commissioner Kelly said at the funeral, onduty or off-duty, even at home, he was a police officer.

Police Officer Edwards was assigned to the Housing Bureau and proudly played on the NYPD football team. His aunt said, "Omar became the man that we anticipated him to be and there is no higher honor."

On June 4th, a funeral Mass for Police Officer Omar Edwards, at that funeral--excuse me, at the funeral, he was promoted to

2	Detective First Grade. It was held at the Our

diversify the revenue stream in the city of New
York to make us less reliant on Wall Street.

The expansion of this Empire Zone, when we couple that with the biotech tax credit that we are trying to pass in Albany, we believe it will make the East River Science Park a very attractive place for biotech firms to establish themselves and bring hundred, if not thousands, of jobs to the city of New York.

I also want to thank everyone in the Mayor's office who worked on this legislation.

And let me call on the Chair of our Economic Development Committee and sponsor of the legislation, Council Member Tom White and, again, thank him.

Bank fire. I think folks will remember a couple

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of weeks ago we introduced a package of a dozen pieces of legislation. These are 12 bills which seek to respond to the tragic lessons we learned at the Deutsche Bank fire.

They address the issue of making the rules and regulations around demolition and asbestos removal stronger and tighter in the city of New York. They deal with making the regulations around the need for egress at abatement projects clearer and stronger, and we all know what a tragic issue that became at the Deutsche Bank fire. They also speak to increasing coordination between city agencies, particularly between fire, Department of Buildings, and Department of Environmental Protection so when firefighters or others go into a building they know what the situation is and when we're assigning inspectors we know the full picture of the building when we're making those decisions, and also deal with tightening the restrictions around smoking or even having lighters or tobacco at construction sites.

I want to thank, in addition to the staff, all of the Council Members who have worked

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on these pieces of legislation, in particular,
Chairperson Jim Gennaro, the Chair of our
Environmental Protection Committee, which oversaw
three of the bills. Also Chairperson Jimmy Vacca,
which oversaw two of the bills that we are passing
today. I also want to thank Council Member Miguel
Martinez, who was the Chair of the Fire and
Criminal Justice Committee when we began this
effort and this work.

And, as I said earlier at the preStated Meeting, these bills continue a tradition
that Chairperson Martinez started and Chairperson
Vacca is continuing, that whenever we lose a
firefighter or a fire officer in the city of New
York, we go and analyze what happened at that fire
to see if there are legislative actions we can
change or take to prevent something like that from
ever happening again. So thank you, Chairperson
Martinez, for setting that standard.

I also want to thank Council Member
Stewart and Council Member James who are two of
the lead sponsors of these pieces of legislation
we are acting on today. We have a number of
members who has obviously contributed to this who

Administration for their great cooperation and

focus in getting us here. I'm happy to have

played a small role in getting these bills through

the committee.

And I certainly, like you, would like to thank, Council Members James, Stewart, and Martinez for being the lead sponsors of these bills, but I wish to thank you in a special way, Madam Speaker, and your team for getting these bills done. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Chairperson Gennaro. Let me next call on Council Member Tish James, who--

## 2 COUNCIL MEMBER JAMES:

[Interposing] Thank you, Madam Speaker. This bill prohibits smoking at construction sites, it's a common sense bill which attempts to codify existing industry standards. In addition, the second piece of legislation would prohibit smoking on any floor of a building where abatement activities are taking place.

Further, this legislation would prohibit tobacco inside the workplace at such areas as defined under DEP's asbestos control program rules.

Additionally, this legislation would prohibit lighters and matches in these areas and DEP would be required to promulgate any new rules or amend existing rules to carry out this new section.

I thank the two Chairs, I thank the Speaker for her great leadership. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. Let me next call on Council Member Miguel Martinez.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARTINEZ: Thank

you, Madam Speaker. I also want to thank you and

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your staff and Chairman Gennaro for working with us on this piece of legislation.

As you know, this legislation will require now that whenever there is asbestos removal or abatement taking place before the demolition of a building, that the contractors go to the Environmental Protection Agency to get certification and allow for that information to be shared, not only with the Environmental Protection Agency, but with the Buildings Department and the Fire Department, making it more safe in the city of New York whenever there is a demolition project taking place in terms of knowing everything that's going on in the building before the building is demolished.

I want to thank you for working with my office and your staff in making sure that this piece of legislation becomes a reality.

Thank you, Madam Speaker.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Council Member Martinez. Next we're going to hear from Council Member Kendall Stewart, the sponsor of Intro 1005.

COUNCIL MEMBER STEWART: Thank you,

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Madam Speaker. I would like to ask my colleagues to support this bill because of the fact that it would amend the Administrative Code of the city of New York in relation to the simultaneous performance of demolition work and asbestos activities within the same building. This timely legislation is the result of major concerns and issues regarding egress at abatement projects.

We all remember the devastating fire in the former Deutsche Bank building at 130 Liberty Street in Manhattan that led to the deaths of two New York City firefighters and injuries to several others—that was on August 18th, 2007. Subsequent FDNY investigation revealed that the cause of the fire and the ensuing tragedy was the result of a discarded cigarette on the 17th floor. This was further aggravated by the fact that there was no working standpipe in the building at the time of the fire.

This tragedy and the findings of the fire department have led us today's vote on what I consider to be an important piece of legislation. This is the culminating of a series of collaboration between the Administration and

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the Council and will enhance, improve, and strengthen construction, demolition, and asbestos abatement procedures and rules in the city.

I want to thank Speaker Quinn and all of my colleagues who understood the importance of this legislation, not only in respect to safeguarding the lives of our firefighters, but also in relation to how the city handles asbestos removal and containment, as well as stricter oversight on empty buildings and construction and demolition procedures.

I want to thank you all for supporting this bill.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, Council Member Stewart.

Jimmy Vacca, who, as Chair of our Fire and
Criminal Justice Services Committee, oversaw the
passage of Intro 1002 and 1007, the one that
Council Member Tish James referenced prohibiting
smoking at construction sites; and Intro 1007,
which is the piece of legislation that speaks to
interagency notification and coordination between
DEP, DOB, and the fire department.

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And I particularly want to thank
CouncilChairperson, excuse me, Vacca for his
constant focus on the need to have better
coordination, which will lead to greater safety in
the city of New York, but also better usage and
more thoughtful and effective and cost effective
usage of staff between agencies. So thank you
very much and call on Chairperson Vacca.

COUNCIL MEMBER VACCA: Thank you,
Speaker Quinn, and Members of the Council. I'd
like to thank the Speaker and the Mayor's office
for their cooperation in both 1002 sponsored by
Council Member James and 1007, which I sponsored.

Council Member James spoke about her bill concerning smoking on construction sites and I think that what she indicated stresses the urgency of the legislation involved.

Concerning 1007, I think all of us have examples over the years where one agency goes to a site to issue a violation or to make the site safe or to do an assessment of a construction site and that agency does not have information as to what other city agencies may have done there. It often happens, for example, that Buildings goes to

a construction site and doesn't know that the fire department and DEP have violations pending or that they've made site safety inspections where issues of concern have arisen.

This bill requires these agencies to share that information. It's important that the right hand know what the left hand is doing at all times and I think tragically over the course of many years, many events have pointed out that when that did not happen, the public suffered.

So I urge my colleagues to pass both bills and I thank the Members of the Fire and Criminal Justice Committee for their supporting this and the Speaker and the Mayor for expediting this bill's introduction today and final passage. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. Lastly, we are going to speak about Intro 927-A. I want to thank Lyle Frank and Jeff Haberman for working on this legislation. Just to be noted, Jeff Haberman worked on every piece of the legislation we are passing at today's Stated Meeting, so thank you, Jeff.

This is a piece of legislation that

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was passed through the Parks Committee and I want to thank Chairperson Foster for her swift attention to this legislation, and Minority Leader Jimmy Oddo, who is the prime sponsor of this bill.

927-A is a piece of legislation
that deals with Special Natural Area Districts, of
which there are four in the city of New York--two
of which are on Staten Island, one in Queens, and
one in the Bronx; why Brooklyn doesn't have one or
Manhattan, we can't answer today, but we will of
course get everyone an answer to that question.
But they are important areas in the city of New
York that have a unique geological or
environmental set of factors that we want to do
everything we can to protect.

927-A addresses a problem that's occurring of people removing trees in Special Natural Area Districts and seeks to create higher fines and greater regulations that will prevent that from happening and prevent the undercutting of importance Special Natural Area Districts in our city.

I want to thank Chairperson Oddo-Minority Leader Oddo for bringing this to our

piece of legislation.

As the Speaker said there are four Special Natural Area Districts, one in Fort Totten in Queens, two in my district in Staten Island, and one in Oliver Koppell's district in Riverdale and Fieldston in the Bronx. And City Planning created this text in 1974 to protect or to offer a guide for development in these areas that are environmentally sensitive or have unique natural features, whether they're rock, outcroppings, or wetlands, or steep slopes, and there are rules in place currently to protect trees.

What this does is, in addition to the homeowner, this places a responsibility on the contractors or the entities who actually go out and saw down the trees. If a homeowner wants to put in an in-the-ground pool let's say and doesn't

violates the law, he or she would get a fine, what this bill does is put the onus as well on the contractor. And the hope is that, instead of having a 35-year-old tree cut down and then somebody get a fine, that before they cut down that street, a tree we can't recapture, that they will think twice if they will pay a heavy price.

I want to thank the Speaker, I want to thank the Administration for working with us and I think this is a worthwhile piece of legislation. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Minority Leader Oddo.

Let me just conclude Communications with the Speaker with something that happened yesterday that I want to share with my colleagues. Yesterday I was lucky enough to get to participate in the NYPD's Annual Medal Day ceremony and I was that the NYPD Medal Day ceremony because our own

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Thank you very much, Madam Chair. I speak to express my opposition to the Dock Street project in DUMBO. I think development should start from the community up and, in this particular project, while they're talking about affordable housing, the 80/20 formula to me is not affordable. That's bringing

more luxury housing in, I think developers get away with getting all kinds of floating tax-free bonds and breaks and then when we talk about affordability, it's a 80/20 formula.

To me, developers should pay more or do more with affordability and then when you're going to change the character of a community and build a 17-story building, I think that communities should be considered more.

And I don't like the fact that this debate was reduced to some wanting a better view of the Brooklyn Bridge and not affordable housing. I've met with some of the opponents, they have no problems with affordable housing or schools, but it didn't have to go down like this. I think the building could have been made much shorter. While some will lose their view, none of the opponents that I've met with was overly concerned about a view, there was more concern about they having a stronger voice in the development of their community. And it shouldn't come from city planning down, it should come from the community up.

So with that, I just want to voice

7 COUNCIL MEMBER GARODNICK: Thank 8 you very much, Madam Public Advocate.

I rise in support of Intro 940, which is the expansion of the Chinatown Empire Zone to include the East River Science Park.

As many of my colleagues know, we frequently talk in this chamber about broadening New York City's economic base from simply relying too heavily on Wall Street. According to the IBO, from 2003 to 2007, when Wall Street profits were expanding, along with the financial asset bubble, the city's business income tax receipts grew by 163%, from 2 to 6 billion—by far the fastest growth in these tax's history. But from 2008 to 2010, business tax collections are projected to fall by a cumulative 2.4 billion, or 40.7%, which is the fastest decline in the history of these taxes.

The East River Science Park is

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being developed to allow New York City to get a
foothold in the biotech industry, diversify our
economy, breathe life into an important industry
for New York City, and create jobs. And the
expansion of this Empire Zone, along with the
value of accompanying investments in wages paid
and property improvements, particularly for the
first billion, this is estimated to be a benefit
of around \$51 to \$68 million over five years to
the city of New York. So I think this is an
important thing for us to do, it's an important
thing for us to do now.

And I want to thank Council Member
Alan Gerson for his support of the partnership
between Chinatown and the East River Science Park,
and I encourage my colleagues to vote yes. Thank
you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE GOTBAUM: Council Member Yassky.

COUNCIL MEMBER YASSKY: Thank you.

I am speaking in opposition to the four Land Use items relating to the proposed building next to the Brooklyn Bridge in the DUMBO area of Brooklyn which I represent.

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My concern does have to do with views, but it's not people's views from their apartments, it's the views that New Yorkers, tourists, but principally New Yorkers, enjoy as they walk or drive or bicycle over the Brooklyn Bridge. And the example that comes to mind when I think of what's at stake in this application is the Verizon building on the New York side of the Brooklyn Bridge, that any of us who have walked over on the Manhattan side, any of us who have walked over the Brooklyn Bridge toward Manhattan know that the experience of the bridge is marred by the presence of a big ugly building that's right in your view as you walk over that bridge, that is of a scale to kind of dominate the structure of the bridge.

I am not saying that the building that's being proposed here will be as unattractive or as devastating as that building, but when you have one of the handful of treasures in the entire city, that is the experience of walking over the Brooklyn Bridge, I think it would just be a mistake to tamper with it in any way. And for that reason, I am opposed to this.

And it's not a local issue, it's
not simply the neighbors, we had testimony from
Ken Burns, the documentarian from David McCullough
the author of the Pulitzer prize-winning
definitive book on the Brooklyn Bridge; from
Christian Roebling, the great-great-grandson, I
guess, of the bridge's designer and builderall
of whom came here, none of them live in the area,
none of them were talking about their impact on
their particular apartments, they were here to say
the Brooklyn Bridge is one of our most important
treasures in the city and we should protect it.
Thank you.
PUBLIC ADVOCATE GOTBAUM: Council
Member Gerson.

Madam Public Advocate. I, too, want to urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of Intro 940, the expansion of the Chinatown Lower East Side zone to encompass the biotech center on the Upper East Side. And I welcome Council Member Garodnick, the partnership between the Lower East Side and Chinatown in the Upper East Side, which bodes well for the entire city and region, and I

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welcome the opportunity of working with you on this.

As our Speaker and Council Member Garodnick pointed out, this extension will make a major step forward in the diversification of our economy by helping to make New York City more of a center for science and technology. It will do so by the extension of this enterprise zone and it will do so by two very important commitments made by EDC, the New York City Economic Development Corporation, in agreement with us in conjunction with this bill. Specifically, NYC EDC will now move forward with the process that could lead to the establishment of an Asian Pacific Trade Center within the current Chinatown Lower East Side enterprise zone, and we will start expeditiously on the feasibility analysis.

And also at the same time, NYC EDC, in conjunction with the City Council, will convene an important panel of scientists, academics, development experts to examine ways in which we can similarly anchor other technology—nanotechnology, environmental technology, robotics, the range of other science and

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technology elsewhere in our city, including
possibly on Governors Island, and particularly on
Governors Island I should say, as well as in Lower
Manhattan.

So in conjunction with these agreements, this bill will do well by making New York City one of the nation's and world's leading science centers. Thank you.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE GOTBAUM: Council Member James.

COUNCIL MEMBER JAMES: I urge my colleagues to vote in support of the Doc Street project because it holds the promise of hundreds of new middle school slots, seats for public school children in downtown Brooklyn. This project proposes to build a 300 seat public middle school in a privately funded, lead-certified, green residential building that will also create DUMBO's first, first ever affordable housing.

The developer plans to donate a significant portion of the cost of the school to the city as well--a financial contribution worth over \$40 million.

Further, he has already reached out

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to the surrounding community regarding job

opportunities, women and minority businesses, and

other economic development benefits. The Dock

Street project is exactly the kind of smart,

innovative, carefully crafted, and planned

partnership for the future of this city,

particularly at this time of challenging fiscal

needs.

And I'm also well aware of the concerns expressed by some project opponents about the building's proximity to the Brooklyn Bridge. So I took the time to walk the neighborhood, to evaluate their issues and consulted with numerous community leaders and residents and I concluded quite comfortably that Dock Street DUMBO does not pose any kind of threat to the Brooklyn Bridge, which is a position clearly shared by both the local Community Board, City Planning Commission, along with numerous design professionals, area parents who support this overwhelmingly, and others throughout the neighborhood. I firmly believe that this project's new public middle school and affordable housing represents significant benefits for the area's residents and

21	resolutions that call for banning the practice of
22	placing prison inmates in solitary confinement.
23	One resolution calls on the state of New York to
24	ban this practice in state prisons, the other
25	calls on the president and the United States

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Congress to ban this practice in federally operated prison systems. Both resolutions call for the provision of supportive services for all inmates leaving solitary confinement.

Studies have shown that the practice of this confinement is akin to torture and that the degenerative psychological effects of isolation are long-term and lead to serious mental illnesses and social incapacitation. Solitary confinement is a punitive measure that should be banned altogether.

A 2006 study by the Commission on Safety and Abuse in America's prisons found that there are practically no benefits, in general safety and otherwise, and that the harm caused is great. Many prisoners who experience long-term solitary confinement are later released into society having become more likely to commit additional crimes.

I urge my colleagues to join me in supporting Reso 2006 and 2007.

The third resolution I'm asking my colleagues to support is Reso 2005 calling upon the New York State Thruway Authority, the

2	Triborough Bridge and Tunnel Authority and the
3	Port Authority of New York and New Jersey to
4	create a system that allows users to immediately
5	transfer their E-Z Pass tax to another vehicle.
6	This one is quite simple, if you
7	have an E-Z Pass account and use multiple

The other thing I want to mention

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is Dr. George Tiller, who was killed in Wichita,
Kansas, he was a medical director of the Women's
Health Care Services. It's an unbelievable
tragedy, I think we all read about in the paper,
but my sympathies are certainly with his family.

I had occasion to meet him a couple of times here in New York and know that he was somebody who really deserved to carry on his work and will be missed tremendously and it's a horror that he was killed.

afternoon to let you know that on June 18th the

Education Committee will be holding a hearing on
the new high school graduation rates. But also on
the 18th in the beginning we will be voting out a

resolution on the Muslim holiday resolution.

I ask you to join us on the Education Committee concerning those two very important subjects. One as I indicated earlier, the new graduation rates for high schools and, two, a resolution on the Muslim holiday bill, which basically will honor two holiest holidays of Muslims, asking them to be incorporated into the school calendar.

In addition, my colleagues, I rise to ask you to support and sign on to Resolution number 2010 sponsored by the Public Advocate Betsy Gotbaum and myself and this resolution calls upon the New York State legislature to amend the state education law to require local education agencies, in this case the Department of Education, to

2	provide military recruitment opt-out forms to all
3	high school students beginning in the ninth grade,
4	along with the annual emergency contact forms.
5	And, as you know, that information is readily
6	available and is given to all of the U.S. military
7	recruitment automatically and a student has to
8	request a form in order to opt-out. We want these

19	ask my colleagues to sign on to Resolution 2009
20	regarding designating the Newtown Pippin, which is
21	an apple, as the official Apple of the Big Apple.

Folks may not know that in the early 1700s there was a lot of apple orchards here in New York City and right in Queens. This apple was developed and grown here for the first time

around 1730 and it became the preeminent apple of early colonial America and it was a favorite of George Washington, a favorite of Thomas Jefferson.

They're still grown all around the state and all through the northeast, and it is one of the best known apples with regard to people who are connoisseurs of fruits.

And it also will help to connect

New York City to its agricultural past, and also

the Newtown Pippin is a green apple and we are

very much becoming a green apple with all things

that we're doing regarding sustainability. So

what better apple than the storied Newtown Pippin

to be the official Apple of the Big Apple. We are

the Big Apple, we should have an official apple,

and I dare anyone to bring before me any apple

that would be a better candidate for this

designation.

So I'm asking people to sign on to Resolution 2009 to designate the Newtown Pippin as the official apple of New York City. Thank you.
