11	ladies and gentlemen, please find seats.
12	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Sergeant at
13	Arms, you ready?
14	SERGEANT AT ARMS: Close Sir.
15	[Pause]
16	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Good afternoon
17	and welcome to today's Finance Committee hearing.
18	My name is David Weprin and I chair the Committee.
19	Let me introduce my colleagues that are here and
20	we'll have more joining us. We have Council
21	Member Robert Jackson from Manhattan; Council
22	Member Lew Fidler from Brooklyn; Council Member
23	Oliver Koppell from the Bronx; and Council Member
24	Diana Reyna from Brooklyn and Queens.
25	We also have a special delegation

2	in the audience who I met with this morning to
3	talk about our budget and the City and finances in
4	the City and this is a special delegation of City
5	Council Members from the City of Johannesburg,
6	South Africa. Welcome.
7	[Applause]
8	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Today we have
9	three items on our agenda. We have two Land Use
10	items, both of which are seeking a property tax
11	exemption from HPD. And we also have a
12	housekeeping item relating to the Coin Operated
13	Amusement Device tax, also known as the COAD tax.
14	C-O-A-D. Let's begin with the Land Use items.
15	The first item is a Resolution
16	approving a full exemption from real property
17	taxes for affordable rental housing for the
18	elderly located at Finley Plaza in Council Member
19	Helen Diane Foster's District in the Bronx. The
20	property tax exemption will be used to make the
21	rehabilitation of the three buildings in Finley
22	Plaza which consist of 162 units more affordable.
23	Council Member Foster supports this Land Use item.
24	The next Land Use item is a
25	Resolution approving a partial exemption from real

2	property taxes for low income families at the
3	Lavonia Terrace Apartments in Council Member
4	Charles Barron's District in Brooklyn. The
5	property tax exemption will be used to make the
6	rehabilitation of the 17 buildings in the Lavonia
7	Terrace Apartments which consists of 171 units
8	affordable. Council Member Barron supports this
9	Land Use item. Representatives from Council
10	Finance are available to answer any questions you
11	may have regarding the Land Use items.
12	The last item on our agenda is
13	Intro 598, a housekeeping item that repeals the
14	Chapter related to the Coin Operated Amusement
15	Device tax in the Administrative Code of the City
16	of New York. This Act amends the Administrative
17	Code to remove those portions relating to the
18	duties and responsibility of COAD owners under the
19	COAD tax. The tax was imposed for the privilege
20	of maintaining Coin Operated Amusement Devices
21	such as jukeboxes, pinball machines or mechanical
22	rides placed outside of stores in the City.
23	Although the tax on COADs was
24	eliminated over ten years ago and rendered
25	ineffective by Local Law 48 of 1997, Chapter 15 of

2	the Administrative Code of the City of New York
3	and Section 11-4013 of the Administrative Code
4	still remains on the books. These sections of law
5	set forth duties and responsibilities relating to
6	the imposition of the tax on the Coin Operated
7	Device, the requirement that COAD owners display a
8	stamp indicating payment of the tax. As a result
9	many owners of such devices in New York City have
10	complained that they have erroneously received
11	summonses for their failure to comply with the
12	Section 11-4013 of the Administrative Code which
13	requires COAD owners to conspicuously display the
14	stamps on their COADs.
15	Intro 598 which I am the proud
16	sponsor of would repeal the provisions of the
17	Administrative Code relating to the COAD tax.
18	Specifically the bill would repeal in its entirety
19	Chapter 15 of Title 11 of the Administrative Code
20	which relates to the COAD tax and would repeal
21	Section 11-4013 of the Administrative Code which
22	requires the conspicuous placement of a stamp on
23	the COAD to indicate payment of the COAD tax.
24	Representatives from the Department
25	of Finance are available to answer any questions

2	you may have on Intro 598 but before that I'd like
3	to call upon Kerry Kessler, an attorney, who
4	represents several businesses who have received
5	Code summonses and who is a strong advocate for
6	this legislation. Mr. Kessler.
7	MR. KERRY KESSLER: Thank you Mr.
8	Chairman. Good afternoon Honorable members. My
9	office prepared a detailed summary of why this
10	legislation is crucial. The good news is I'm not
11	going to read into the record all of my remarks
12	but I would just rather highlight some of the
13	exhibits to show the Honorable Finance Committee.
14	Mr. Chairman, it was 12 years ago
15	that I last appeared before the Finance Committee
16	regarding this tax. To the credit of the City
17	Council, and I would be remiss if we didn't
18	recognize Finance Chairman Berman and the late
19	Councilman Howard Lasher, this tax was repealed.
20	The tax was actually costing the City money
21	because the administration of the tax was so
22	cumbersome that it was taking scores of Finance
23	Department personnel to administer the tax. It
24	also created an underground illegal industry of
25	people who would somehow manufacture phony stamps,

2	put it on amusement devices and then take them
3	from one location to the other so that they
4	couldn't properly get the money that they were
5	supposed to collect from these operators. And who
6	did it fall on? The legitimate owners.
7	Now what happened was when we
8	repealed the tax in 1997 and I was present when
9	the Mayor repealed it, unfortunately we left out
10	some language. The police when they do their job
11	and they do their job very well, they still see
12	certain sections of the law on the books. And
13	even though we have tried to tell the NYPD that
14	there's no tax to produce tax stamps and there's
15	no records to keep since there is no tax stamps
16	and there is no tax, they're still writing the
17	tickets.
18	Matter of fact I thought I was
19	going to be late this morning because there I was
20	in Queens Criminal Court representing a young man
21	who got a ticket for, you know what, failure to
22	keep a tax stamp. And yes I'm sorry, I thought
23	some one had a question, I apologize.
24	[Background noise]
25	MR. KESSLER: I apologize. The

2	good news is that thanks to Chairman Weprin, we
3	had to take the time of the Committee and the
4	staff and the Council in general to say please, it
5	may not be the most earth shattering legislation
6	but the industry needs it. More importantly the
7	people who get the tickets aren't even connected
8	with the industry. They're more often than not
9	bartenders, barmaids. The police will give a
10	ticket to anybody. And they have to take a day
11	off from work and I'm only going to highlight one
12	specific case which is in your package here, an
13	attorney who represented this particular woman
14	back in the spring didn't realize the tax was
15	repealed, had her plead guilty to a what's called
16	a disorderly conduct, which is a lesser offense,
17	these are unclassified misdemeanors under the
18	Code.
19	I saw this and I heard about it and
20	I said, and I found out from one of my clients, I
21	said well who is this young lady. Oh she's going
22	to law school in August. I said that's just
23	great. On her record going into law school she
24	has now a disorderly conduct under the penal law.
25	And in this packet you will find my motion and the

2	decision of the judge having to exonerate her
3	totally, refund her fine and make sure the record
4	is expunged so that this young lady if she makes
5	it through three full years of law school, passes
6	the bar exam, doesn't have to go to the Committee
7	on Character and Fitness, as anyone who's been a
8	lawyer knows, and having to explain why she got a
9	ticket for not having a tax stamp. And believe it
10	or not it could hold up her admission to the bar.
11	And lastly, members of the
12	Committee, I want the Committee to know that I'm
13	one of the few attorneys that actually have gone
14	to 25 Elm Street where the Department of Finance,
15	I don't know if they have it any more but they had
16	a huge operation there, this is not a criticism of
17	them. They're very good. They know how to the
18	best of their ability to collect tax. But when I
19	saw the amount of paperwork generated by these
20	good civil servants, you know, this is going back
21	of course 15 years; they would actually send
22	Department of Finance people to all parts of New
23	York State tracking down a tax stamp. It became
24	almost laughable the amount of time we were
25	spending.

2	The good news is that we proved to
3	the City budget people both here and in the
4	Mayor's Office that when you don't have tax
5	stamps, the members, the owners and operators buy
6	more machines and the sales tax far exceeds any
7	money that you would possibly lose by a tax. And
8	I would only urge its adoption and hope that
9	sooner or later that this just becomes a distant
10	memory and hopefully laughable at that. However
11	until that time, and I can attest to this, I'm in
12	court, a judge's attention, an assistant district
13	attorney's attention, court clerk's attention, and
14	all the people involved in a court proceeding have
15	to pay attention to a collectionto a ticker
16	rather regarding a tax stamp for a tax that
17	doesn't exist. Thank you Mr. Chairman.
18	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: We have been
19	joined by some additional Council Members. We
20	have Council Member Jim Oddo and Vincent Ignizio
21	from Staten Island and Council Member Vincent
22	Gentile from Brooklyn and Council Member Leroy
23	Comrie from Queens. Mr. Kessler you referred to
24	the prior Chairman of this Committee and Herb
25	Berman, and our thoughts and prayers are with him

2	today because he just lost his wife. I understand
3	the funeral was earlier today. So please we
4	should all have Herb Berman and his family in our
5	thoughts and prayers today 'cause he served this
6	City with great distinction for many years both as
7	a member of the City Council, as Finance Chair,
8	and a number of other positions at the State level
9	as well.
10	MR. KESSLER: Mr. Chairman if I
11	mayif I can indulge just one moment, I was also
12	remiss in not thanking Council Member Comrie who's
13	Chairman of the Consumer Affairs Committee. This
14	industry of the amusement machines, jukeboxes and
15	whether it's kiddy rides or a Pac-Man, maybe I'm
16	showing my age when I say Pac-Man, provides a
17	certain amount of good entertainment for adults.
18	And we're trying our hardest to bring in more
19	revenue to the City of New York without the
20	necessity of bureaucracy. And I want to thank
21	Chairman Comrie who's working with us on that.
22	Forgive me Councilman for not mentioning that
23	before. Thank you.
24	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Thank you.
25	We've also been joined by Council Member Maria

3	Mr. Kessler before he leaves with that big stack?

8	MR. KESSLER: Thank you Mr.

15	Member Comrie has a statement or a question
16	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE:
17	[Interposing] I just want
18	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN:and we've
19	been joined by Councilman Jim Gennaro from Queens.
20	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: I just want
21	to make a brief statement then. CongratulateI
22	just want to congratulate Mr. Kessler for his
23	efforts to continue to fight to give the amusement
24	owners every opportunity they can to continue to
25	exist and make business and profit for City owned

3	Kessler.
4	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: We've also
5	been joined by Council Member Eric Gioia from
6	Queens. I'd like to couple the three items before
7	us, the two Land Use items and Intro 598. If you
8	could couple all three items and readcall the
9	roll.
10	MR. WILLIAM MARTIN: William
11	Martin, Committee Clerk, roll call on the
12	Committee on Finance. Council Member Weprin.
13	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Aye on all.
14	MR. MARTIN: Reyna.
15	COUNCIL MEMBER REYNA: Aye.
16	MR. MARTIN: Baez.
17	COUNCIL MEMBER BAEZ: Aye.
18	MR. MARTIN: Comrie.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER COMRIE: Aye and can
20	you please add me to the Intro 598 please? Please
21	add my name as a sponsor to 598.
22	MR. MARTIN: Fidler.
23	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: Mr.
24	Chairman if I may, I just have to say that the
25	testimony we just heard is absolutely mind-

2	bogging. You'd think that we were living in the
3	Twilight Zone. It is just amazing the amount of
4	time and effort and energy that has been wasted by
5	an Administration that clearly, you know, can't
6	see the forest for the trees. And I guess in the
7	Bloomberg world where we balance our budget by
8	fining New Yorkers, willy-nilly, I just hope he
9	doesn't veto this bill.
10	[Laughter]
11	COUNCIL MEMBER FIDLER: And I'd
12	like to ask that my name be added as a sponsor as
13	well if it's not already. And I vote aye on all.
14	CHAIRPERSON WEPRIN: Thank you.
15	MR. MARTIN: Gennaro.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: I vote
17	yes.
18	MR. MARTIN: Gioia.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER GIOIA: I vote yes.
20	MR. MARTIN: Jackson.
21	COUNCIL MEMBER JACKSON: I vote aye
22	and please add my name as a sponsor of that Intro
23	also.
24	MR. MARTIN: Koppell.
25	COUNCIL MEMBER KOPPELL: I would

2	just observe this would be good for Kafka if he
3	was still writing stories. I vote aye.
4	MR. MARTIN: Yassky.
5	COUNCIL MEMBER YASSKY: Aye.
6	MR. MARTIN: Gentile.
7	COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: I would
8	also, Mr. Chairman, wish to be added as sponsor of
9	that, of the bill and just to add too that this is
10	just another example of the continuing scenario of
11	overaggressive ticketing of this Administration.
12	Regardless of what the law says or doesn't say,
13	tickets are flying out theoff the books into the
14	hands of merchants and motorists and so on and so
15	forth and home owners too. So I vote, proudly
16	vote yes on this.
17	MR. MARTIN: Ignizio.
18	COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: Those that
19	put your faith in government being the solution,
20	take heed today as we see this, and those who want
21	to put your lives and socialized medicine in the
22	hands of government, just use this as a reason for
23	not doing so. I vote aye on all.
24	MR. MARTIN: Oddo.
25	COUNCIL MEMBER ODDO: I'd just like

2	to associate myself with the remarks of Council
3	Member Gentile and just say that at the end of the
4	Dinkins Administration in 1992 when I was a
5	staffer to former Council Member John Fusco, there
6	was a similar situation. There were bars and
7	tavern owners on Staten Island receiving summonses
8	for not having No Spitting signs on the wall. And
9	the No Spitting signs when back to the days of the
10	spittoon. And this is the worst climate in terms
11	of overzealous enforcement of tickets that I've
12	seen since the days of 1992. And when you have
13	ticket agents in commercial strips in the outer
14	Borough literally standing, waiting for the meter
15	to count down to hand a ticket, that's not
16	creating turnover for parking, that's revenue
17	generation. And that's wrong. We can't talk with
18	one side of our mouth and talk about helping small
19	businesses and with the other side do what this
20	Administration has done. And that's why I'd like
21	to associate myself with the comments with Council
22	Member Gentile and vote yes.
23	MR. MARTIN: By a vote of 13 in the
24	affirmative, 0 in the negative, and no
25	abstentions, all items have been adopted. Council
