doing so, she was a trailblazer. She broke a glass ceiling. She was the first African-American woman to ever command a patrol borough in all of New York City, which is amazing [cheers/applause] and throughout her decades of service to our city, she demonstrated amazing leadership skills and worked tirelessly to strengthen police and community relations. So I want to ask my good friend and the Chair of our Public Safety Committee Council Member Donovan Richards to say a few words, and then we're going to have the clerk read the proc. So, Council

COUNCIL MEMBER RICHARDS: Thank you, Mr. Speake, and I think if we had one word to describe Chief Holmes, it would be fabulous, right. It is only fitting that we honor you and as we start Woman's History Month. Well, actually, what day are we in? Oh, we're midway through already. Geeze, the days are going fast, but what a trailblazer. Chief Holmes was not only a commanding officer, a Chief, she also ran the Domestic Violence Unit, something a lot of individuals don't realize. In 2016, as the Speaker said, she became the department's first Black female borough commander when she took over Patrol

Borough of Queens North. Queens in the house?
[cheers/applause] And she was someone that could
bring everyone together. If that is-if there's no
clearer sign, look at how many people came up today
from proclamations from Queens from all over Queens.
She was the second black woman to be promoted to the
rank of Assistant Chief, and she also served the
people of New York City for more than three decades.
Although she only looks 25, and she had assignments
not only in Manhattan, but in Queens, she served in
the 111 th and 113 th and in Queens that's in Brooklyn
the 81 st Precinct,[applause] which is Rob Cornegy.
So, we just wanted to pay homage to you during
Woman's History Month, and as we look at diversifying
the ranks of the NYPD, may we not stop where she-
where she left. She's doing very good for herself
now. [laughter] I wish I was there, Councilman,
but-but on another note, you know, we need to
continue to push to make sure we amplify the voices
of women especially within the Police Department, and
I-it's an honor to be here to honor you for the work
that you've done and the way you've served our city
with dignity, with CPR and we're so appreciative of

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2 you, and today is a small token of our appreciation.

trailblazing achievements, and her stellar service to
the city of New York and to the community at large;

Whereas, every hour of every day the men and women of the NYPD work together to enforce our city's laws, keep our neighborhoods safe and protect 8.6 million New Yorkers. Whether safeguarding property or the public the public, they commit themselves to their daily duties, which often necessitate extraordinary risks that few others can fully comprehend. Assistant Chief Holmes has distinguished herself as on of New York's Finest for the last 32 years; and

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Whereas, appointed to the NYPD in July
1987, Officer Holmes began her career on patrol
covering the $9^{\rm th}$, $10^{\rm th}$ and $13^{\rm th}$ Precincts in Manhattan
In December 1995, she was promoted to the rank of
sergeant and assigned to the 100-the 113 th Precinct
in Queens. In 1998, she was assigned to patrol
Borough of Bronx's Investigation Unit, and two years
later began working in the 111 th Precinct; and

whereas, over the decade she honed her expertise in a variety of assignments while moving steadily up the ranks from Lieutenant to Capitan. In June 2008, she became the Commanding Officer of Police Service Area No. 2 in Brooklyn giving her the opportunity to demonstrate her leadership skills while continuing to strengthen the relation ships between the police and the communities. In 2009, she was promoted to Deputy Inspector, and the following year assigned as the new Commanding Officer of Brooklyn's 81st Precinct. Within two years she was promoted to Inspector; and

Whereas, Inspector Holmes excelled in her efforts to improve community relations and reduce crime within the 81st Precinct. In recognition of her success she was designated the Executive Officer of

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the Training Bureau where she oversaw numerous
training units within the department. During this
assignment she was promoted to Deputy Chief and
designated the Commanding Officer of the Chief of the
NYPD's Domestic Violence Unit where she used her
expertise to oversee and combat domestic violence

crimes throughout the five boroughs; and

Whereas, in September 2016, she was promoted her current rant of Assistant Chief and began serving as the Commanding Officer of the Patrol Borough Queens North making New York City history by becoming the first African-American woman to ever command a patrol borough. Upon her retirement she can be proud knowing that her incredible dedication and career will continue to inspire others in the year ahead.

Now, therefore, be it known that the New York City Council gratefully honors NYPD Assistant Chief Juanita Holmes for her outstanding service to the city of New York and to the community at large, and we wish her continued success in all of our future endeavors. SPEAKER JOHNSON: I am still the Speaker and the acting Public Acting Public Advocate. Thank you, Public Advocate Elect.

PUBLIC ADVOCATE ELECT WILLIAMS: No problem. Thank you.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thanks for being here.

Good afternoon. Thank you all for being with us this

Wednesday. We have a busy agenda ahead of us.

Before we begin I'd like to remember some of those

that we've lost in the last couple of weeks since our

last Stated Meeting. 27-year-old Kanu Gandhinau was

2 taken from us earlier this month. Kanu was a for-hire vehicle driver, and he was out picking up a late fare 3 in the Bronx when he was stabbed to death. 4 5 of violence breaks my heart. I know it breaks the city's heart, and we are sending our love and support 6 7 to his friends, and to his wife and his two-year-old son during this painful time. I also want to 8 acknowledge the passing of Labor Leader Kevin Lynch. 9 Kevin committed his life to the Labor Movement and 10 fought tirelessly for working women and men in New 11 12 York City. Kevin leaves behind his wife Queens 13 Supreme Justice Bernice Siegel and his daughters 14 Rebecca and Sarah Lynch. Since our last Stated 15 Meeting [coughs] we have lost three more 9/11 first 16 responders to illnesses they developed from serving 17 down at the pile. We lost Paramedic Lasandro Rios 18 who was NYU Downtown Hospital on 9/11. We lost Police Officer Kevin Birdy Joyce from the 52nd 19 20 Precinct, and we lost East Hampton Marine Patrol Member Frank Kennedy. The entire city, myself 21 2.2 included, will be forever grateful to these men for 23 their bravery and service. It's important to remember them and the sacrifices they made, and that 24 we keep their families and loved ones in our hearts. 25

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I continue to urge Congress to take action to honor the heroes who served our city in the aftermath of 9/11 by fully funding the 9/11 Victims Compensation Fund and I ask that we now take a moment of silence in honor of Kanu Ghandinau, Kevin Lynch, Losandro Rios, Officer Kevin Joyce and Frank Kennedy. [moment of silence] Thank you. Before we start on today's agenda, I want to make note that today is our first meeting in Women's History or we should say Herstory Month. The New York City Council is such a strong body because of the women who are on this Council to the impressive and inspiring members of the Women's Caucus and also the brilliant and hard-working women on all of our staffs. I would like to say thank you, and acknowledge the vital role that you all play here in this Council and throughout our-our city. Recognizing the accomplishments and contributions of women is important, and for far too long this city has failed in doing so, and we are changing that at City Hall. We need more women in this body, but we are changing that on the walls of City Hall. To kick off Women's Herstory Month, we unveiled eight new portraits of history making women that now hang on the walls downstairs on the Council side of City

2 These trailblazing women Antonia Patolla, Dorothy Lee, Shirley Chisholm, Beverly Sills, 3 Zuramiel (sp?) Herston, Frances Perkins, Alice Austin 4 and Dorothy Day all hold their rightful place on all 5 6 walls as part of our history. There is still so much 7 of Women's Herstory Month. We have lots to celebrate, and I'm excited for the Council's 8 celebration tomorrow evening, and I'm excited to see 9 what the women of this body will continue to 10 accomplish in the days, months and years to come. So, 11 12 I want to thank you all, and I want to give a round of applause for the women who are on the Council and 13 the women who work here at the City Council for 14 15 Women's History Month. [applause] It was said 16 earlier, but it's important to say again I have one last shout-out before we start today's Stated 17 18 Meeting. As everyone can see, our colleague and Public Advocate Elect Jumaane Williams is in the big 19 20 chair today. Jumaane has said it at the last Sated Meeting, and I'll say it again. You're going to be a 21 2.2 powerful voice [coughs] for New Yorkers as Public 23 Advocate, and I can't wait to continue to work with you, and look at you up there Jumaane. - 21 | a home rule message sponsored by Council Member and
- 22 Chair of our State and Federal Relations Committee
- 23 | Council Member Andy Cohen, which will authorize the
- 24 | State Legislature to pass a bill that will allow the
- 25 | city to deploy up to 750 speed limit enforcement

2 cameras in school safety zones across the city. Speed cameras have been shown to significantly slow 3 vehicular speeds and save lives. The bill would 4 5 improve the city's ability to collect fines for speed zone violations. You all know that last summer when 6 7 the State Legislature adjourned and did not act on expanding the Speed Camera Program, the City Council 8 stepped in working with the de Blasio Administration 9 and Governor Cuomo to enact a bill that would ensure 10 that the speed cameras would be turned on before the 11 12 first day of school. I am proud the Council took 13 action that, and I want to thank, as I always do, and 14 pay tribute to the women and men of Families for Safe 15 Streets who are here today who have been the real 16 advocates pushing for this and fighting for this. 17 They're here with us today in the balcony today, some 18 of the leaders, and I want to thank them for their presence as always. [applause] It's good to see you 19 20 all. Thank you for being here Amy and Mary Beth and think you very much Joan, and thank you all, Debbie, 21 2.2 thank you all very much. Moving on the Council will 23 vote on the following legislation: [coughs] Introduction 877 sponsored by Council Member Robert 24 Cornegy would require certain city agencies to 25

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provide materials regarding lead hazards including information on how to obtain a blood lead screening to the parents or quardians of a child under seven years of age when such parents or guardians seek service from certain city agencies. This entire package of bills we're doing today is to strengthen our lead laws in New York City. Introduction 709 sponsored by Council Member Jimmy Van Bramer will require the Department of Environmental Protection to provide an online interactive map with information regarding the know lead water service lines and make best efforts to identify all lead water service lines including privately owned service lines. also require the department to provide information to users about lead contamination prevention, lead water test kits and how to replace lead service lines. department must replace any known lead water service line that's owned by the department no later than December 31, 2025. Introduction 1063 sponsored by Council Member Bob Holden will require notice be given to the Council Board or local Council Member within five business days of discovering or becoming aware of a hazardous level of lead in soil. There was an issue in Council Member Holden's district just

2 before he took officer after he had already elected, and I also want to say today is his first bill that 3 4 he's passing as a Council Member, and I want to congratulate Council Member Holden on the passage of 5 this bill today. [applause] Great job, Bob. 6 [coughs] 7 Next, we're looking at Introduction 1117 sponsored by Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo, which will require 8 certain city agencies to provide materials describing 9 among other things building owners' responsibilities 10 under the city's Lead Laws. These agencies would 11 12 also be required to inform parents or quardians when they seek services that they can obtain without cost 13 14 or payment an inspection of their dwelling unit for 15 peeling paint, a deteriorated subservice or an 16 underlying defect by calling 311 and a lead testing 17 kit for drinking water from the Department of 18 Environmental Protection. We'll vote on the following two bills by Council Member Danny Dromm: 19 20 Introduction 881 will require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to establish an education 21 2.2 outreach program to increase awareness of childhood 23 lead poisoning prevention and Introduction 464, which would require the Department of Health and Mental 24 Hygiene investigate potential sources of elevated 25

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2 blood lead levels in children including the inspection of any dwelling where a child with and 3 elevated blood lead level spend more than 10 or more 4 hours per week. This bill would also require building owners to investigate and remediate lead 6 hazards when a child spends 10 or more hours per week in one of their units. Introduction 918 sponsored by 8 Council Member Ritchie Torres would span reporting 9 requirements under the city's existing lead laws for 10 the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene and the 11 12 Department of Housing, Preservation and Development. 13 This legislation would also strengthen the city's 14 auditing of landlords to ensure compliance with the 15 requirements under the city's Lead Laws. 16 Introduction 871 sponsored by Council Member Joe 17 Borelli would require that any testing of water for 18 lead that is required by law include a first draw sample from the such source. Introduction 920 19 20 sponsored by Council Member Mark Treyger would extend current requirements for daycares to test for lead 21 2.2 paint annually to other facilities with children 23 under the age of six including pre-schools, nursery schools, and where applicable elementary schools. 24 And Introduction 865, which I sponsored would reduce

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the minimum lead threshold the city uses when testing for presence of lead contamination. This has to do 3 with dust and paint. It puts us at the level that 5 Federal Standards are asking for, and I want to thank 6 the amazing staff. The staff worked really, really, 7 really hard on these bills for almost two years. I want to thank Terzah Nasser, Megan Chin, Ze-Emanuel 8 Hailu, Austin Branford, Samara Swanston, and Nadia 9 Johnson [coughs] for their incredible work on this. 10 I want to give a big round of applause for the staff 11 12 for their great work. They're right in the back over there. [applause] Thank you all very, very much. 13 are so lucky to have such incredible staff here at 14 15 the Council, and I want to say before turning it back 16 over to the Public Advocate, folks should feel, Council Members should feel very, very proud of this 17 18 package of bills we're voting on today. For far too long too many children in New York City have been 19 20 poisoned by lead, and city agencies have not done the necessary enforcement based off of previous 21 2.2 legislation that was passed under then Speaker 23 Gifford Miller, Council Member Perkins was a key leader in passing that legislation when he was in the 24 25 Council in his previous time here. Too many children

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predominantly children of color, predominantly in low-income neighborhoods, predominantly in the South Bronx and Upper Manhattan and Central Brooklyn, and Southeast Queens, have been poisoned, poisoned affecting them for the rest of their lives, behavioral issues, developmental issues, unable to attain their dreams that they have had or their parents have had for them, and today the City Council this package of bill we're passing is the most expansive, wide ranging, far reaching lead legislation in the entire country, in the entire United States of America this package of bills that we are voting on today. I am sorry that it's taken so long for us to do this not in this Council but as a city because so many young people, so many children have suffered and people think this is just children in NYCHA when actually 80% of the children that have been poisoned are children that are in private residential buildings in New York City. And so, today we are passing laws to be a leader for the city, but to be a leader for the entire country to show what can be done, to show what's possible, to show and hopefully blaze a path for what other municipalities can do to protect children across our

Today, we're voting on my legislation Intro 920 that will extend current lead paint testing and remediation requirements for daycare facilities operating in structures erected before January 1, 1978 to other facilities serving children under six including pre-schools, nursery schools and schools when applicable. The most common cause of lead poisoning is exposure to lead paint. My legislation will take common sense regulations about testing and remediation for hazardous lead paint at daycare facilities and apply them to other facilities that serve all children under six including schools, preschools and nursery schools. This bill is a measure to help us meet our responsibility to protect the health of every childe in our city. We have to make sure that our children are protected from unnecessary and avoidable harm to their health. I'm proud that this legislation is part of the Council's comprehensive approach towards fighting back against lead poisoning, and I thank the Speaker really for not just shepherding this through,

- 2 but pushing back against the pushback that we received over and over again. Speaker Johnson's 3 leadership was unwavering, and I really do appreciate 4 5 him and all the sponsors of all their bills, and I also-I give a shout-out and thanks to Jason Goldman, 6 7 Jeff Baker, Laura Popa, Ze-Emanuel Hailu. I want to thank my staff Anna Scaife, Vanessa Ogle, and Eric 8 Feinberg as well, and with that, I vote aye on all. 9

With the lead package today, I'm proud to be a part of something that I know we all are proud of, something that's going to dramatically change lives for the better, and our piece of this package, Intro 709 is one that came tome from constituents who wondered if the water their children were drinking in schools and in parks were safe, and they helped to craft our particular piece of legislation, which is requiring and unprecedented death when transparency in reporting lead poisoning by creating an interactive map on the city's website to identify all know lead water service lines in New York City, one that's accessible and searchable and would publicly report the locations of all know lead water service lines. People can search based on their address, their zip code and other identifying notes.
