CHAIRPERSON CORNEGY: Good morning, everyone. Thank you for coming. I'm Council Member Robert Cornegy, Chair of the Council's Committee on Housing and Buildings. We're here to hold a vote on two bills related to protecting the city against another Legionnaires' Disease outbreak. In 2015, the city faced the largest Legionnaires Disease outbreak in its history. As a result of the outbreak, 124 people contracted Legionnaires' Disease, and 12 people actually died. Legionnaires' Disease, which is a severe form of pneumonia is spread through mist. The 2015 outbreak was tied to cooling towers, which are part of a building's air conditioning system. Cooling towers near the outbreak site were inspected and nearly half tested positive-positive for Legionella, the bacteria that causes Legionnaires' Disease. Following this Legionnaires' Disease outbreak, the City Council enacted Local Law 77 of 2015, which mandates the registration and inspection of cooling towers. Two bills we are voting on today help to ensure compliance with Local Law 77 to prevent further outbreaks of Legionnaires' Disease.

Proposed Intro No. 1149-B will require that the
individuals who conduct cooling tower inspections
report the date certain cooling tower inspections
were conducted to the Department of Health and Mental
Health, DOHMH. This will ensure that these vital
inspections are regularly conducted. This bill would
also give the public the right to review results of
all cooling tower inspections. Finally, this bill
will require DOHMH to send owners and operators of
cooling towers an electric reminder before they are
required to submit annual certifications for their
cooling towers. This reminder would also include a
link to the site where the certifications can be
submitted. Intro No. 1158 would expand cooling tower
owner education by requiring DOHMH in consultation
with the Department of Buildings to hold bi-annual
information sections for building owners regarding
the maintenance, cleaning and inspection of cooling
towers. This bill would also require DOHMH and DOB
post the information online. I believe that we have
an opening statement by Council Member Ben Kallos.

COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: Thank you, Chair

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I want to thank the Committee staff on this, particularly the Council for tough negotiations, and Council Member Yeger for being a pre-introduction cosponsor. New Yorkers can breathe easier as warm weather and cooling season approaches as cooling towers that are a breeding ground for Legionnaires' will finally have to report compliance with 90-day inspections meant to thwart the spread of the deadly disease. According to WNYC, in June 2018, more than 1,000 cooling towers representing 20% were out of compliance with 90-day inspections that must be conducted while operating. Introduction 1149-B would require the New York City Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to send owners and operators of cooling towers an electronic reminder 30 days prior to filing deadlines for annual certifications with a link to where these certifications can be submitted. The bill would also require cooling towers inspectors to report to DOH-DOHMH when the 90-day inspections occur. DOHMH must make this date available on the city website in an open data. Finally, this bill would require building owners to make cooling tower inspections results available for public examination. When it's you, your aging parent or child on the

3	being inspected to catch Legionnaires' before it can
4	spread and kill anyone. I hope that reminding
5	building owners coupled with this immediate
6	enforcement for failing to inspect every 90 days can
7	prevent anyone else from getting Legionnaires'
8	Disease. Thank you.
