CHAIRPERSON RICHARDS: All right. I am council member Donovan Richards from the 31st district in Queens. Southeast Queens, that is. I am the Chair of the Public Safety Committee. are joined this morning by council members Brannan, Deutsch, Powers, Menchaca, Cohen, Miller, and Cabrera. We are here to take up one last piece of legislation introduced at the joint hearing we held a few weeks ago on the potential statewide legalization of marijuana. Unfortunately, there was no legalization bill passed along with the state budget, but I am hopeful that there are signs that Albany intends to take time outside of their hectic budget process to craft a bill, not only legalizes marijuana, but devotes a sizable share of the economic opportunity from the new legal cannabis industry to the individuals and communities most harmed by the war on drugs. For now, all we can do is try to minimize the negative consequences of marijuana prohibition beginning with incarceration.

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People who are on probation have been given a chance to rehabilitate and find a path to a successful lawabiding life instead of being held back by time we stayed in jail. While we are working to decrease the population on Riker's, we should be finding reasons to keep probationers out of the system, not looking for more hurdles to trip them up and set them back. As we are hopefully on the verge of legalizing marijuana and recognizing that adults using marijuana is simply not criminal or wrong, we should stop testing probationers who are doing what they need to do to stay out of trouble. Introduction number 1427, which I am cosponsoring -- which I am sponsoring along with my colleagues, would prevent the Department of Probation from requiring individuals on probation to submit marijuana testing unless a determination is made that abstinence from marijuana is necessary to leading a law-abiding life. passage of this bill would help close one trapdoor that too many people have fallen into while working to lead a better life for themselves and their families. Remember, these are people who are otherwise not violating their probation conditions. That means they are working or seeking work, avoiding

1 COMMITTEE ON PUBLIC SAFETY 2 police contact, and following all the conditions set out for them by their probation officers. These are 3 people who don't need marijuana testing to keep them 4 5 on a straight path. The only thing marijuana testing 6 can do is risk getting them violated and sent back to jail. And last year we saw over 200, nearly 300 of 7 those individuals sent back to jail. And for those 8 who really do need to be abstinent, there is a 9 10 narrow-- Let me say that again. A narrow exception to allow for testing. Last year, five former 11 12 probation commissioners express a need to change the marijuana testing policy. When five former city 13 14 probation commissioners and Chief Judge Lippman agree 15 that testing people who are on probation for 16 marijuana serves no public safety purpose, it's time 17 we stopped doing it. I rest my case. With that 18 being said, we will open the vote. COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: 19 Lee Martin 20 Committee Clerk will call vote Committee on Public Safety Introduction 1427. I don't think that on, just on the basis of someone that is in probation that is trying to work, was trying to do the right thing, many of them that we work, personally work with, that they should be sent back. I don't think it's productive. I don't think what happens in our prisons really help them in their future. And so for that reason, I-- Again, I want to commend you for this bill. I think to help. The 600-- And also the stipulation that is placed here that the Department of Probation or the Judge seeing-- deem it necessary based on their particular circumstances to put the stipulation that that's the position I think is very,

So, this time I will vote aye. 8 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Menchaca? 9 COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: Please add me 10 to the bill as a cosponsor and I vote aye. 11 12 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Miller? 13 COUNCIL MEMBER MILLER: Permission to 14 explain my vote, please. 15 COMMITTEE CLERK MARTIN: Yes, sir. 16 COUNCIL MEMBER MILLER: I'd like to 17 thank you, Mr. Chair, for once again your leadership 18 on this marijuana conversation. A conversation not just about marijuana legalization, but, more 19 importantly, about marijuana policy. As you can see 20 by the votes that have already been entered into my 21 2.2 colleagues here who clearly been opposed to 23 legalization of marijuana, we had [inaudible 00:06:37] beneficial conversation about policy of 24

marijuana that is disproportionally impacted

This is just another thing that 3 4 hinders communities, not just individuals, but the 5 lack of progress and upward mobility that has been diminished because of these marijuana related either 6 7 convictions are ongoing subsequent parole violations because of marijuana. It's definitely a hinder, not 8 just to those individuals, but to the communities 9 10 that have already been disproportionally impacted and I think because we have had really robust 11 12 conversation about the impact we can get to a point that, whether or not we agree on legalization, we 13 14 agree on policy that has been disproportionate and 15 had bad impacts on certain communities throughout. 16 And, with that, I gladly vote aye.
