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CHAIRPERSON REYNOSO: I'm Council Member Antonio Reynoso the Chair of the Sanitation Committee. Today, we will be voting on an Introduction sponsored by Council Members Lander, Chin, Treyger and myself to enact a fee for carryout paper bags. As we heard at yesterday's hearing, the Department of Sanitation estimates that 10 billionagain, billion with a B single use bags or some ten-100 thousand tons of paper and plastic bags are used and discarded in New York City per year costing the city over \$12 million per year. Passing this bill was a huge environmental win. Bags cause terrible harm to our environment when introduced into waste stream, clogging recycling machines, storm drains and sewers, contaminating recyclable, recyclable materials and seeping into the ocean where they threaten marine life, and many of these bags are ending up in landfills where they contribute to the over-growing crisis of climate change. The state has banned the sale of single-use plastic bags and has also authorized municipalities to pass local legislation requiring vendors to charge a 5 cent fee

COMMITTEE ON SANITATION AND SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT for paper bags. The bill that we are passing today will opt New York City in this fee. The fee is in now way targeted towards raising revenue. We actually don't want anyone to buy paper bags. cent fee is merely an incentive to change behavior encouraging people to bring reusable bags for their shopping needs. So, to facilitate this, DSNY will be handing out thousands of bags in the coming months. For those that do choose to buy bags, I would urge them that when they're finished with the bag that they place it in the recycling. The city currently only captures about 25% of all paper bags in recycling meaning that the remainder are going in landfill. As a city we need to take our zero waste goal seriously. We cannot achieve zero waste if we simply change the use of single plastic bags to single use paper bags. As New Yorkers we need to challenge ourselves to think long and hard about the consumption habits keeping in mind that our decisions have real world consequences for the future health of our planet. The passage of today's bill is a crucial step towards meeting the Zero Waste Goal, and I look forward to this committee taking additional action

So, it's just an extra tax even using the reusable bags, and in addition to that, I just want to say for myself and for many of my constituents with many New Yorkers who have large families it is really a hardship to walk around with dozens of reusable bags, and they're in their pocket, and I tried this yesterday. I had about a dozen bags in my pocket, and I looked like I was floating around, and it's really-really a hardship, and yes. You know, the city wants to change people's behavior. There's a lot of other ways to change behavior. support the environment, but there has to be certain ways that we have done in the past that we have accomplished to help our environment. But this five cent charge on paper bags is a-is yet another tax on hardworking New Yorkers. So, although I support our environment, and I think we should do everything that we can, and for those that can use reusable bags, to go shopping and to walk into a store to buy a few items, they-they should, but for large families it'sit's really almost, really almost impossible to walk around with bags in your pockets. I mean I just
