This is a

horrific, horrific tragedy. It is heartbreaking and
I know I speak for everyone here when I say our
condolences to the surviving members of the Pollidore
family. This fire took place in Council Member
Perkins' district and I know that he is working with
the FDNY and OEM to help the community in this very
painful and difficult time. I ask everyone here to
please keep this family in their thoughts and
prayers. I also want to thank the FDNY for their
efforts. About 100 members of the fire department
responded to the scene within three minutes and tried
valiantly to rescue the family but the fire was too
much. Again, our deepest condolences go out to the
Pollidore family and as we always do here at Stated
today, we're gonna acknowledge those sadly who have
succumbed to 911 related illnesses.

This week, I mean this is hard, this week
I'm sad to report we have lost nine first responders,
nine first responders from 911 related illnesses.
They are Air Force National Guardsman Mark Pelton, 52
years old; Belmore Merrick, EMS Chief; Thomas
DeFrancheski [phonetic], 61 years old; New Jersey
State Police Sergeant Brian McCoy, 57 years old;
Captain Howard Vanetski [phonetic] a 23 year veteran

of the Fire Department; NYPD Detective Charles
Humphrey; NYPD Officer Patrick McGovern, 43 years
old, a 19 year veteran of the police force; NYPD
detective Lisa Rossotto [phonetic], 51 years old;
NYPD office Jeffrey Healey, 52 years old and a 21
year veteran of the NYPD; NYPD detective Lawrence
"Larry" Cummings, 74 years old. These are heroes.
These are people who served our City and my
condolences go out to them to their friends and to
their family. I want to take this time to applaud
the work of the New York Congressional Delegation in
pushing for fully funding the 911 victims'
compensation fund. I urge the rest of Congress to
finally please follow their lead. This is an issue
for New York City. It's an issue for the entire
country and it is so important that we take care of
these people who sacrificed so much for our City in
one of the darkest, most painful moments of American
history and one of the most painful moments our City
has ever had to deal with.

On Tuesday, Lawrence J. Hanley, the international president of the Amalgamated Transit Union passed away suddenly. He began his career as a bus driver in Brooklyn and he quickly became involved

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in the labor movement. He spent his life fighting for worker's rights and for that we all owe him a huge debt of gratitude. We extend our deepest condolences to his family. In addition, New York City lost two long-time public servants this past weekend. Queens' district attorney, Judge Richard Brown, passed away Saturday. He was 86 years old and he had spent decades in public service including at the State legislature. He worked so hard on behalf of this City. He loved this City with all of his heart, decades of public service at every level of government and I am extraordinarily grateful for Judge Brown's service and I wasn't able to be there yesterday for his service. I was in Albany but I heard it was beautiful and that people were really able to remember what an amazing man he was, public servant he was.

On Sunday the City Council lost our beloved colleague and friend, Lew Fidler. From 2002 to 2013, Lew represented the 46th District in Southern Brooklyn but his advocacy extended far beyond his neighborhood. Lew was a champion for young people that society often neglected and he saved many, many lives. He was a voice for the

2 voiceless. Being chair of the Youth Services Committee was one of Lew's proudest accomplishments 3 and he put his heart and soul into advocating for New 4 York City's children and teenagers. The idea that we 5 needed to have adequate emergency and transitional 6 7 housing for runaway and homeless youth was barely a blip on the radar screen until Lew Fidler came along. 8 He toured shelters relentlessly, talked and met with 9 young people, worked with service providers and 10 fought like hell for the City to fund beds and 11 12 services for those in our system that society had 13 forgotten. Importantly, Lew made sure that LGBTQ 14 youth had places to stay where they would feel safe 15 and accepted. Lew believed that every young person 16 deserved mentorship and job opportunities and he 17 called for the expansion of the Summer Youth 18 Employment Program. It became a mantra of his during every budget season that he served in the New York 19 20 City Council. He was also a champion for our environment at a time when legislatures were just 21 2.2 beginning to understand it was imperative to act in 23 order to take care of our planet. Lew sponsored groundbreaking legislation banning Styrofoam, 24 expanding the designation of recyclable plastics and 25

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requiring DSNY to do significant outreach and education on the importance of recycling. saving our planet meant taking care of our children and future generations. For Lew, it was always about kids and I know that because of the love he had for his own two kids, Max and Harry, and for his wife, I know we all loved Lew and we are going to We lost one of our own. miss him. He was smart. was funny. He was very funny. He was kind. loved a good argument and loved the Mets. He was totally committed to New York City and to his family. I was looking back actually when I got the news over the weekend and I found a message that he sent me a week after being elected Speaker and he said when, how quickly can you pass a bill to raise the age for young people to be able to stay in the youth shelters and not go into the adult shelters and the day of the hearing he showed up here and he sat through, he sat on the riser right there. He sat through the entire hearing and he talked to every single young person after they testified. This was one of his life missions. He was so deeply committed to this and when I go around the City of New York, when I go to the Ali Forney Center or to Covenant House or to any

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of these organizations that do this work, Lew Fidler is literally their hero. He was their hero, their champion, their pit bull whose advocacy and passion on this issue did not just last for the time that he was on the New York City Council but five and a half years after he was out of the City Council, still showing up at events, still showing up at youth shelters, still coming to budget hearings and to oversight hearings. He led with his heart. Lew Fidler was one of a kind. I am deeply grateful for his friendship. I'm deeply grateful for everything he did for this body, for his district in Brooklyn, for the borough that he loved and for the City of New York which he was a champion for and I want to give a big round of applause to our friend and colleague, Lew Fidler.

And to his wife, Robin, and two sons, Max and Harry, we send our deepest condolences. I know there was a funeral service yesterday. Again, I was in Albany, but I heard it was very beautiful and I'm thinking of his family at this very painful and difficult time and finally I want to add that Robert Pear, a New York Times reporter passed away last

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night from a sudden stroke. I was a huge fan of his He's probably the most accomplished healthcare writer in the United States of America. He covered the Affordable Care Act and had been writing for the New York Times for 40 years. Readers and his colleagues have been writing tributes all day long on social media and what they've said is he's probably one of the greatest journalists to ever have his name in the New York Times but also they say he was the kindest human being because they said he was the nicest guy to all of his competitors. He would help his competitors with stories and it is a big loss for this country to lose someone of that sterling reputation who is covering issues of importance to the United States of America. We extend our deepest sympathies to his colleagues, his friends and his family so in honor of the Pollidore family, National Guardsman Mark Pelton, Chief Thomas DeFrancheski [phonetic], Sergeant Brian McCoy, Captain Howard Vanetski [phonetic], Detective Charles Humphrey, Officer Patrick McGovern, Detective Lisa Rossotto [phonetic], Officer Jeffrey Healey, Detective Larry Cummings, Lawrence J. Hanley, District Attorney and Judge Richard Brown, the amazing Council Member Lew

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Fidler and Robert Pear, I ask that we all rise and take a moment of silence.

Keeping one of the largest private employers in New York City in mid-town is a big deal so I want to thank him for his leadership and I want to thank J. P. Morgan for listening carefully throughout this process.

Moving on, the Council will be voting on the following pieces of legislation and resolutions. Resolution 828 sponsored by Council Member Carlos Menchaca, the chair of our Immigration Committee, commends the New York State Office of Court Administration for promulgating rules that require a judicial warrant for any civil arrest in New York State court and it calls on the legislature to pass and the Governor to sign the Protect our Courts Act in order to protect people from civil arrest while at such court proceeding. The new OCA rules in this bill in Albany will help ICE stay out of our courts which is important. Their presence in and around our courthouses breaks trust between immigrant communities and local law enforcement and courts and I'm really proud we're doing this today. I want to

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thank the staff who worked on this, Harbani Ahusia

[phonetic] and Elizabeth Kronk.

We're gonna vote on Introduction 562
sponsored by Council Member Mark Treyger which would
require that owners of multiple dwellings post notice
in the common area of the building stating the
relevant hurricane evacuation zone number for that
building and providing information on the presence of
evacuation centers. Congratulations, Mark, and I
want to thank the staff who worked on this bill, Brad
Reed and Joshua Kingsley.

Introduction 1533, sponsored by Public
Advocate Jumaane Williams would extend the June 1,
2019, compliance deadline by which workers and
supervisors must obtain a portion of the training
required by Local Law 196 of 2017 to December 1,
2019, and allows the Department of Buildings to
further extend that deadline by another six months if
necessary. I want to thank the staff who worked on
this bill, Gene Zilca [phonetic] and Meghan Chin.

The next package of bills is near and dear to my heart because we're dealing with really critically important housing issues and I'm very proud we're taking action today to protect tenants.

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All too often, landlords who are using unscrupulous methods to get people out of their apartments to try and increase or unlock the value of their buildings use multiple strategies to get that done. methods which the New York Times exposed about a year ago in a detailed and meticulous series include construction as harassment, taking advantage of lax enforcement of laws meant to protect tenants, landlords lying about the existence of tenants on construction documents, landlords making unfair buyout offers to tenants and a lack of due process in housing court proceedings. Today, we are doing something about that. Building upon the Council's work last session to address tenant harassment, the Council is passing 17 pieces of legislation that addresses these unscrupulous methods and finally hold unscrupulous landlords accountable. The first three bills we will be voting on are by Council Member Helen Rosenthal. I want to congratulate her. Introduction 1279 will require the Department of Buildings and the Department of Housing, Preservation and Development to verify that building owners are correcting dangerous building and housing maintenance code violations. Introduction 1280 would require

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that construction permit applications contain a statement signed by the owner and applicant identifying any occupied units in the building and the bill would also establish specific civil and criminal penalties for lying on these forms to obtain a building permit. Introduction 1107, when a building owner wants to do major construction in a building with residential tenants, the owner must submit a tenant protection plan with the building permit application. This bill would shift the responsibility of retaining a design professional to prepare a tenant protection plan from building owners to contractors. It would require statements by building owners and contractor regarding the occupancy of a building and the scope of work of a construction project. Next up we're gonna vote on Introduction 1242 sponsored by Council Member Diana Ayala which would expand the Department of Housing, Preservation and Development's online property owner registry by requiring inclusion of a Department of Building violation related to construction as harassment including violations of work without a permit and work in violation of a stop work order. It would also require each fee to include rent

5	It's a very important bill so congratulations Diana.
6	We're gonna vote on two bills introduced by Council

11	permit application that the building is unoccupied
12	and Introduction 1241 currently under DOB's

17	certifications to the offending registered design
18	professional supervisor as well as the professional
19	personally. Introduction 1278 sponsored by Council
20	Member Carlina Rivera would require the Department o

22	construction and to periodically inspect construction
23	sites to ensure compliance with the plan.
24	Introduction 1275 sponsored by Council Member Keith
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Powers will deny permits for one year for a building

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following a determination that a false statement about the occupancy status was made on a construction application for that building or following a determination that the work was conducted without a permit while such building was occupied. We're gonna vote on three bills by Council Member Robert Cornegy who is the chair of our Housing and Buildings Committee. Introduction 1258, currently the only way for a tenant to know when they are being evicted is by being served with court papers. This is basic due process for anyone being sued. Unfortunately, we have heard many reports of tenants not being notified when a landlord starts an eviction proceeding against This bill would require the Department of Consumer Affairs annually audit the records of at least 20% of license process servers who have served notices for a housing court proceeding. This bill would require that DCA post on its website and notify process serving agencies when a process server's license has been suspended, revoked and a license renewal is denied. Introduction 59, owners often try to persuade tenants to vacate their units by offering them a sum of money, a practice known as a buyout This bill requires that landlords offering

2 buyouts to tenants disclose that there is no quarantee that the tenant will find a similar 3 apartment in the same community district with the 4 same number of bedrooms, for the same rent that the 5 tenant is currently paying and that additional 6 7 factors may impact their ability to obtain other housing and Introduction 1257 would require DOB to 8 issue a stop work order if an inspector is unable to 9 gain access to a construction site and has reason to 10 believe that the work is being done in violation of 11 12 the law. Introduction 1247, sponsored by Council 13 Member Fernando Cabrera, would require owners of residential buildings to provide copies of any notice 14 15 of violation issued against a property to the 16 residents of that property. Additionally, the 17 Department of Buildings must create a pamphlet or 18 flyer explaining the adjudication process for such violations to be distributed with copies of notices 19 of violations so tenants can participate in the 20 adjudication process. I know Council Member Cabrera 21 2.2 worked hard on this bill and I want to congratulate 23 him for its passage today. Introduction 977, sponsored by Council Member Antonio Reynoso, would 24 permit the Department of Buildings to sanction 25

an unusually high number of amended building permits.

2 If DOB finds that an owner has made a false statement, DOB must notify the City Council, the 3 Department of Investigation, the Division of Housing, 4 Community and Renewal and the tenant protection unit 5 and also refer the matter to the relevant district 6 7 attorney and attorney general for potential criminal prosecution and report on the punitive actions it 8 took in every case in which it found evidence of a 9 falsified application for a building permit. 10 Introduction 975 sponsored by Council Member Justin 11 12 Brannan would require the Department of Buildings to 13 deny construction permits for buildings with a 14 significant number of open dangerous building and 15 maintenance code violations. The law would allow for 16 permits for work to correct the violations or for 17 emergency work and finally we'll vote on two bills by 18 Council Member Mark Levine, Introduction 1274 will require owners of multiple dwellings to provide 19 tenants with a previous four years of rent history 20 from the State where available for their apartment, 2.1 2.2 very important, and Introduction 551 which would 23 require that where owners enter into buyout agreements with their tenants the owners must submit 24 certain information about the terms of the agreement 25

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with the Department of Housing, Preservation and Development within 90 days. A lot of staff worked on this package of bills for a long time and I want to thank all of them. They're here somewhere I believe. I want to thank Austin Brandford, Gene Zilca, Christopher Chartory [phonetic], Audrey San, Gesere Aganapathy [phonetic], Brenda McKinney, Nicholas Connel, Megan Chin, Brad Reed, Jeff Baker and Laura I want to thank the amazing staff for their really hard work on this complicated package of I was in Albany yesterday. I met with bills. Speaker Hasty. I met with the Housing Committee Chair, Steve Cymbrowitz in the Assembly. I met with Majority Leader Andrew Stuart Cousins and the focus of those meetings was a strengthening of our rent laws over the next six to seven weeks and ensuring that we do not lose more rent regulated units. repealed vacancy decontrol to get rid of the vacancy bonus. We eliminated MCI's and IAI's. We pushed for good cause eviction and all the other bills that tenants have been pushing for years. It was a very good day and sadly we don't have authority because of the EarthStat law over our rent laws but we do have authority in this area so to use this package of

bills coupled with hopefully the strengthening of our
rent laws, will make a big difference on behalf of
tenants. We're in a housing crisis. We're in a
homelessness crisis. We have to keep people in their
homes and we're in the midst of an affordability
crisis so I am really grateful and the person who ran
this package of bills for us is Rob Newman, my
counsel, so I'm really grateful for his hard work and
leadership in shepherding this through after I
brought this to him a little more than a year ago
after I saw the New York Times story so I want to
thank everyone. Before we conclude today's agenda,
Jake Kern is leaving. He works in the Press office.
It is his last Stated and he has been a press
officer. He is moving to D. C. to get back into grad
school and I've known him since he was a volunteer on
my first campaign in 2012. He was a high school

TPP's they exist to really preserve the quality of life of New Yorker's and that New York Times article, that series from May 2018, it featured a photograph in the print edition of a press conference that I was at on Ridge Street where the conditions were borderline unlivable and why this issue is so personal to me is that that building was directly across the street from the building where I spent almost my entire life so this issue has become incredibly important to me. I've seen my neighborhood change and really, I just want to thank everyone for the work. That work lead me here, right to the City Council and I thank everyone for their support and I thank you in advance for voting yes on these 17 bills that we so desperately need. Thank you.

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COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: Thank you Majority Leader. I want to thank Speaker Johnson and my colleagues for moving Intro 562 forward for a vote before the Council today. This vital piece of legislation is coming forward at a critical time as our planet is warming at record speed, creating unpredictable and inclement weather patterns leading to an increase in natural disasters. We learned from the City's responses to super storm Sandy that critical information like how, when and where to evacuate to never trickled down to the most vulnerable communities at their front lines of the storm's devastation. During Sandy, my district along with other coastal neighborhoods throughout the City did not have adequate access to information about evacuation procedures, when to go, where to go, how to get there or where the nearest emergency center was located. Amid the chaos and confusion, we saw many high rise apartment building residents who did not or could not evacuate stranded without power, some time for days. As a matter of fact, 37% of residents in Zone A, flood Zone A, did not evacuate

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Seeing none, I will begin with reading our first
Resolution onto the record.

An amended Resolution 828-A commending the New York State Office of Court Administration for promulgating rules that require a judicial warrant for any civil arrest in a New York State court and calling on the State Legislature to pass, and the Governor to sign, the "Protect Our Courts Act" (A.2176 / S.425), in order to further protect certain interested parties or people from civil arrest while going to, remaining at, or returning from the place of such court proceeding. All in favor, say aye.

CITY COUNCIL: Aye.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: All opposed?

Abstentions? The ayes have it. Thank you and we will now move into general discussion. I have on the docket for general discussion beginning with Council Members King, followed by Kallos, followed by Yeger.

and thank you Madam Majority Leader. Last week Mayor Bill de Blasio announced a ban on our alcohol advertising on City property, including bus shelters, newsstands, phone booth, WiFi LinkNYC, kiosks and recycling kiosks. Why, as the Deputy Mayor

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[Inaudible] said, alcohol advertisement can influence how much alcohol people drink and how young they are when they start. This executive order closes a loophole and reaffirms this administration's commitment to advance policies that promote health equity and build healthier communities. While I applaud these efforts as well as MTA's decision in 2017 to ban these ads on our buses, subways, we need to go a step further. As someone who is a youth advocate, educator and firmly believes that our children are our future as we all do believe and have our own children in our household, today I introduced some legislation that will amend Chapter 5 of Title 28 of the Administrative Code which will ban alcohol advertisements within 500 feet of any school. reasons why, the same reason as the administration that we need to promote equity, build healthier communities and assure our boys and girls are not influenced by pictures and messages designed to make alcohol look cool. How often do you look at a school and right across the street a bodega is advertising Budweiser, Heineken in addition to the hooker bars, smokes and so forth so I'm asking us all to do our part and help us save our children by signing on this

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piece of legislation that can stop advertisement and can do the most harmful thing to our children, start them to drinking alcohol at an early age. If we can do this with City builders, if we can ban Budweiser on any [Inaudible] bus stop but not stop the bodega right down the street or across the street from a school, then we're a failure to our schools and our children that attend schools so I'm asking us all today, let's be consistent and I ask you all to sign on to our Intro today to make sure that we save the lives of our children. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you Council Member King. Council Member Kallos, again followed by Council Member Yeger.

COUNCIL MEMBER KALLOS: I believe in climate change. I believe it was caused by humans and that we can do something about it. It's time for New York City to join nearly 400 cities, districts and countries across the world representing over 34 million people collectively that have recently declared or officially acknowledged the existence of a global climate emergency. Please join Environmental Committee Chair Costa Costantinides and I on Resolution 864 declaring a climate emergency,

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2 calling for an immediate emergency mobilization to restore a safe climate and continue much of the work 3 that our Environmental Committee Chair Costa has 5 already been doing with this Council in leading our great nation and the world. Thank you. 6

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you, Council Member Yeger.

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you Madam President. I'd just like to briefly echo Mr. Speaker's remarks earlier. Very grateful for those who have expressed their condolences on the passing of former member of this body, Lew Fidler. As Mr. Speaker said, he was a hero to many. He was my leader. He was my friend. He was my mentor. started a lot of careers in public service, including my own so if anybody wants to blame him for that, feel free but he was a tremendous public servant. every way he lived, he lived to serve the people and even to his last moments we were speaking the day before he passed away just about public service and about things that I was planning and I'm gonna speak about one of them right now but again I am grateful for everybody here in this chamber, the extended Council family and to my fellow New Yorkers for their

kind words over the last lew days. Madam President,
I am introducing today Introduction 1556 along with
Councilman Chaim Deutsch and a number of other
members of this body who have already signed on.
This is the House of Worship Security Act and it's
quite simple in its application. It is structured
similarly to the Non-public School Safety Act that
was enacted a number of years ago in this body
sponsored by my predecessor, Councilman Greenfield
and what it would provide is that any house of
worship in this City which wishes to hire a private
security guard can submit for reimbursement to the
City of New York. What we've seen over the last
several months, especially over the last several
months, from most significantly Pittsburgh, New
Zealand, Sri Lanka, San Diego, too numerous to
mention churches all across these United States that
have been subject to attack. People who go to the
one place and Madam President, I know my clock is
gonna tick out, I just beg your indulgence, people
who go to the one place where they know that

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: The one place where I believe that it is universally accepted that people are safe without worry behind them is in the sanctuary of prayers that they attend, whatever religion they are and what we've seen over the last several months in particular, Jews, Christians, Muslims, in their houses of worship viciously attacked, targeted, people praying. This bill, if enacted, would give people in our City the comfort knowing that they can go into their house of worship and feel safe. It's not to say that our police can't protect us. It's to say that the resources of the police department are limited. We know that, that they can't put a police car in front of every house of worship. They can't put a police officer standing in front of every house of worship. It's another way to look at it, an opportunity to hire a private

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2 security guard and ask the taxpayers, us and the

3 people we represent to pay a little bit to get this

4 done. I would urge my colleagues to sign on to

5 Introduction 1556 to get this done for the people of

6 New York. Mr. Speaker, again thank you for your

7 indulgence, Madam President, and for allowing me to

8 express my thoughts on Lew. Thank you.

He worked for the borough president and he was working on a project to fund mobile showers to help homeless individuals who are in need and he wanted to make sure that that was advancing in the Brooklyn Delegation and in the City That's the type of person Lew Fidler was Council.

and will always be and just to know Lew, we're gonna
work to make sure that that happens in this budget
and so our prayers and our thoughts are with his
beautiful family and all those impacted by this
tremendous loss to Brooklyn and to New York City.

When I was 22 years old I was running to be a county committee member. was born into politics and it's where I met Lew Fidler who was extremely loyal to the party leader at that time and I was an insurgent, new to the game, and many rules were being changed the day I went to the county committee meeting and I remember specifically Lew Fidler standing up and thinking a lot of the changes that were being made were unnecessary and unjust. A person who morally sided with me, even though we were on different camps when it came to the work that we were doing in county committee and I've never forgotten that day when he

never left my mind since I've known him and it will

never be forgotten even after so thank you again for

taking the time, for allowing me to speak on the life

of Lew Fidler.

much. I just want to take a minute or so to pay tribute to former colleague, Lew Fidler. He did

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support my organization. He became one of the strongest supporters of my organization that was not in his district and that was remarkable and when I became a City Council Member, I was a member of the Youth Services Committee, I witnessed his dedication, his love in serving young people and making sure that all the young people they have the resources that they need to grow up and to become positive citizens. When I became the chairman of the Youth Services Committee, I was also inspired by Lew Fidler and I just want to take this moment or so to join my colleagues and the Speaker to pay tribute to Lew Fidler. Thank you very much.

Member Eugene. I just want to close out with, many of you may have seen the little three year old girl who was tragically murdered and I wrote a statement about it and I just wanted to read it. It says the African proverb says the ruin of a nation begins in the homes of its people. A mother, Sharon Coleman and her entire village are traumatized and forever broken as they mourn the loss of their angel, Zoe. While no prayers or condolences can bring her back or comfort her family, we can no longer condone or

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simply accept the killing of black women or children because of the very real symptoms of the posttraumatic slave syndrome that impacts all of us each and every day. I am outraged, angry, saddened and depressed. The most powerful way that we can demonstrate that black lives matter is to show that black lives matter to us, especially our babies. matriarchs all over the world are getting ready to celebrate Mother's Day with their family and children, this black mother deserved to celebrate this holiday and special occasion with her angel. Please continue to express your outrage and do not accept this type of behavior as your norm. silence equates to our acceptance and we should not accept this. I do not accept this and I certainly want to, as a Mom, my heart and my prayers go out to this mother and her entire family and the devastation that all of us must be feeling at this time. you and I will now call on Speaker Corey Johnson to close today's meeting.
