3	CHAIRPERSON MARGARET CHIN: Good morning.
4	Today the Aging Committee will vote on Proposed Intro
5	1180-A sponsored by Council Member Ayala, and
6	Resolution 714-A, which I'm proud to sponsor.
7	Proposal Intro 1180-A would require each casework at
8	a city-funded senior center to complete a mental
9	health training course older adults offered by the
10	Department of Health and Mental Hygiene or any other
11	successor agency. These training courses are offered
12	for free by the agency and with trained caseworkers
13	to identify mental health triggers and warning signs
14	in the older adult population they work with
15	everyday. Caseworkers would also need to complete a
16	refresher training course at least once every three
17	years so long as the course is offered by DOHMH.
18	This bill would take an important step on serving the
19	mental health needs of our senior population
20	especially those seniors coming out of our senior
21	centers. Resolution 714-A calls upon the United
22	States Congress to pass and the President to sign S.
23	485 and H.R. 1230, the Protecting Older Workers
24	Against Discrimination Act, also know as POWADA. The
2.5	Age Discrimination and Employment Act of 1968 ADA

protects individuals age 40 and older from age	
discrimination in the workplace. Sadly, the	
protection put forth by ADA will weaken during a 200	9
U.S. Supreme Court decision in <i>Gross v. FBL Financia</i>	1
Services, Inc., in which the court decided that	
plaintiffs seeking prove age discrimination in the	
workplace proved that age was the only motivating	
factor for the employer's action. This determining	
decision makes it more makes it more difficult to	
prove age discrimination and puts all seniors at ris	k
including our city's seniors. In Fiscal Year 2017,	
age discrimination accounted for 21.8% of complaints	
made to the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity	
Commission with more than 18,000 complaints filed.	
As reported by the New York City Commission on Human	
Rights or CCHR of the 193 queries CCHR received abou	t
age discrimination in 2017, 119 of them were related	
to age discrimination in employment. With these	
alarming statistics our federal colleagues should be	
making age discrimination laws stronger not weaker.	
POWADA would reverse the 2009 U.S. Supreme Court	
decision and help protect our country's older adults	
from age discrimination in the workplace. We will

COUNCIL MEMBER AYALA: Thank you. want to say I'm really proud of this bill. It's a been along-time coming. As many of you know, before coming to the City Council I actually worked in senior services, and I had the privilege of working at a homebound program where I was interning with a bunch of social workers who really knew how to deal with mental illness, and so having had that experience and then entering into the senior center where because of limited resources staff is not really equipped to identify those. It became pretty evident that was a drop of real need for this type of resource, and it isn't something that is unheard of. We trained caseworkers every year on CPR and mental health shouldn't be taken any lighter than, you know, that a person having a heart attack at a senior center. Mental health is important, and it's important that the people that working with the most vulnerable be equipped with the tools that they need to ensure that proper treatment and referrals are being made, and so I'm really proud of this. I'm proud of the staff. Thank you all for taking the
