4 CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Okay. Good morning and welcome to today's Finance Committee meeting. My 5 6 name is Council Member Daniel Dromm, and I'm Chair of 7 the Committee. We have been joined by Council Member 8 Jimmy Van Bramer, Council Member Robert Cornegy, 9 Council Member Vanessa Gibson, Council Member Helen Rosenthal, Minority Leader Steve Matter, Council 10 11 Member Keith Powers, Council Member Barry Grodenchik 12 and Council Member Adrienne Adams. Today, the 13 committee will be voting on 11 items, 3 resolutions 14 relating to the Banking Commissions recommendations 15 on interest rates and 8 Article XI property tax 16 exemptions. Let's tart with the Resolutions that 17 would set certain interest rates for Fiscal 2020. 18 Every year the Banking Commission provides 19 recommendations to the Council relating to the 20 discount received by property owners who pay their 21 taxes early and the interest rates paid by the 22 property owners who pay their taxes late. For Fiscal 23 2020, the Banking Commission has made the following 24 recommendations: A one-half percent discount rate 25 for those who pay their property taxes early; a 7%

2 interest rate for the late payment of property taxes on properties with an assessed value of \$250,000 or 3 less, which is approximately 95% of all properties in 4 the city, an 18% interest rate for the late payment 5 of property taxes on properties within an assessed 6 value of more than \$250,000. After careful 7 consideration of the Banking Commission's submission 8 to the Council, the Council is recommending that the 9 interest rates be approved as set forth by the 10 Banking Commission's recommendations. As per state 11 12 law, the interest rates for the late payment of water and sewer bills will match the rates set for the late 13 14 payment of property taxes. A representative of the 15 Banking Commission is here to answer any questions 16 that we may have on interest rates. Lastly, we have the Article XI Property Tax Exemptions. The first is 17 Fairstead at 48<sup>th</sup> Street in the Speaker's district in 18 Manhattan, which would-which would provide a partial 19 20 40-year exemption to preserve 54 units of affordable housing. The second is Fairstead 53<sup>rd</sup> Street in the 21 Speaker's District in Manhattan, which would provide 2.2 23 a partial 40-year exemption to preserve 51 units of affordable housing. The third is Jennings Terrace 24 Gardens in Council Member Gibson's district in the 25

2 Bronx, which would provide a full 30-year exemption to preserve 41 units of affordable housing. 3 The 4 fourth is Walton Avenue Senior Housing also know as 5 the Fanny Lou Hammer Apartments in Council Member Gibson's district in the Bronx, which provide a 6 7 partial 40-year exemption to preserve 75 units of The fifth is Black Spruce -8 affordable housing. Central Harlem in Council Member Perkins' district in 9 Manhattan, which would provide a partial 30-year 10 exemption to provide 224 units of affordable housing. 11 12 The sixth is Black Spruce Washing Heights in the districts of Council Members Levine and Rodriguez in 13 Manhattan, which would provide a partial 40-year 14 15 exemption to preserve 420 units of affordable 16 housing. The seventh is 5 Teller HDFC in Council 17 Member Salamanca's district in the Bronx, which would 18 provide a partial 40-year exemption to preserve 42 units of affordable housing. The eighth is Lexington 19 20 Courts in the districts of Council Members Ayala and Perkins in Manhattan, which would provide a partial 21 2.2 30-year exemption to preserve 229 units of affordable 23 housing. Each of the Council Members are supportive of the projects in their districts. Representatives 24 25 from HPD are here to answer any questions that we may

Jennings 17 Terrace Garden co-op apartments in my district are 18 co-op apartments that were formerly scatter site owned by the Housing Authority, and over the years 19 20 since I've been in the Council I've have had a great relationship with President Kathy Johnson, and we're 21 2.2 done tremendous work on behalf of her and her board, 23 and all of the shareholders, and I'm really proud 24 that today we not only vote to preserve these affordable homes, but we continue to invest in the 25

2	Bronx, and Wilton Avenue Senior Apartments with
3	Samuel Hammer is operated by Midblock (sic) Senior
4	Citizens Council in my district, but it's been a
5	longtime provider of affordable senior housing, and
6	I'm grateful that today we are affirmed to preserve
7	41 more units, and these are housing units that are
8	average about 50% AMI for many of seniors and single
9	and one-bedroom units. So, I'm very, very proud of
10	that, and I want to thank HPD and certainly the
11	management's Midblocks (sic) and Jennings Terrace for
12	their support through this process, and making sure
13	that once again as a collective the City Council
14	continues to invest in the city and specifically
15	preserve housing in the Bronx. So, I vote aye on
16	all, and urge all of my colleagues please vote yes on
17	Walton Avenue Apartments and Jennings Terrace. Thank
18	you so much.
