## A P P E A R A N C E S (CONTINUED)

Bhairavi DeSai, Executive Director, New York Taxi Workers Alliance

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CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Okay, good morning and welcome to todays Finance Committee meeting. My name is Council Member Daniel Dromm, and I'm Chair of the committee. We have been joined by Council Member Vanessa Gibson, Council Member Keith Powers, Council Member Andy Cohen, and Minority Leader Steve Matteo and Council Member Barry Grodenchik. Today, the committee will be voting on 20 Article XI Property tax exemptions, and holding a hearing on a Preconsidered Introduction. Let's start with the Preconsidered Introduction sponsored by Council Member Rodriguez in relation to reducing the Commercial Motor Vehicle Tax for medallion taxicabs. This bill would reduce the M-CMDT imposed on medallion taxicabs from \$1,000 to \$400 to match the annual tax levy on all other vehicles used for the transportation of passengers. If passed, the bill would be retroactive and deemed to be effective as of May 31, 2019. The Administration while not here in person today, has submitted written testimony supporting the legislation for the record. This is one piece of a package of legislative items that the

2 Council will consider to ease the burden on struggling medallion owners, many of whom have 3 significant debt. The Council is hopeful that by 4 providing a \$600 annual tax deduction to each 5 Medallion taxicab owner. It will help ease that 6 burden. Next we have an Article 20 and Article XI 7 exemptions. The exemption applications are with 8 Speaker Johnson's district, and the districts of 9 Council Members Cabrera, Ayala, Gibson, Perkins, 10 Reynoso, Torres, King, Cohen and Gjonaj. 11 12 Collectively, the projects would receive Article XI 13 exemptions to support either the construction or 14 preservation of 2,059 affordable units of housing 15 throughout Brooklyn, the Bronx, Manhattan and Queens. All of the Council Members in their relevant 16 17 districts are supportive these actions. For specific 18 details on each of these projects please see the memorandum prepared by the Finance Division staff, 19 20 which is available online at the Council's website and part of the official record. Representatives of 21 2.2 HPD are here to answer any questions we may have the 23 Article XI exemptions. Do any Council members have any questions? Okay, if there is anybody who would 24 like to testify on the Preconsidered Introduction, 25

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to start?

we'll hear testimony from the public, and I believe we have one person, and that is Bhairavi DeSai from the New York Taxi Workers Alliance. Okay, and if there's anyone else, please go the sergeant-at-arms, and fill out a form like this, and we will have you up to give testimony. Okay, Ms. DeSai, would you like

BHAIRAVI DESAI: Yes, good morning everybody. My name is Bhairavi DeSai. I'm the Executive Director of the New York Taxi Workers Alliance. We represent the drivers in the taxi and for-hire vehicle industry. We have over 21,000 members, and while half of them drive for Uber, Lyft, Via or Juno, you know, over 10,000 of them still work in the Yellow Cab industry. We all know that that there is an unprecedented crisis. There's been a race to the bottom for drivers across this industry, and there's been a really unprecedented crisis particularly for the Yellow Cab owner/drivers. you know, nine professional Yellow Cab and for-hire vehicle drivers committed suicide in a-in a year and a half period because of the economic crisis and despair. Four of the nine drivers were all owner drivers. Even though owner drivers actually

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represent the smallest percentage of drivers in the entire industry. While reducing the-we call it the tax stamp in the industry. While reducing the tax stamp, you know, by-by \$600 certainly is really just barely a drop in the bucket compared to the massive crisis that people are facing. It is still at least one more step forward, and it's-it's that we're appreciative of this proposal. What we would say is, of course, particularly for the individual owner drivers for it to be an exemption of-of 100% that they shouldn't have to pay anything particularly right now. You know, we've been helping-we've been working with our members on hardship intakes in order to get the banks to reduce the loans. What we're finding is that on average they—they pay about \$6,000 a month for their operating expenses. That's just operating expenses alone. What they're booking on the meter now days goes almost entirely to their operating expenses. Half of those expenses are for the medallion mortgage. So, we've been fighting to have that amount reduced. We've-we've seen that on average, owner drivers ending the year after operating expense taking all their family household income into consideration, they're in average in debt

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of \$28,000 a year. So there's a massive crisis in terms of their annual earnings. A big part of that is just their month-to-month cash flow, and that's why the reduction in this tax would be important to As you know, the payment for this tax is coming up within next couple of weeks. Given people are literally living at this point day-to-day, week-toweek, if they're fortunate, they're now living monthto-month. Any kind of a reduction in these fees is something that we consider helpful. Again, I would just reiterate that it be brought down, you know, to zero particularly for individuals owners, and that the city not take any action against them such as the suspension of the medallion for non-payment because once you're suspended, you obviously can't go to work. It just becomes a deeper cycle of debt that families are, you know, really struggling at this point to desperately get out of. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you very much, and, you know, we feel very sensitive about the issue with the taxicab drivers and I have a district that has many drivers as well I represent Jackson Heights and Elmhurst, and so the issues that they're facing right now are very dear to my heart also. I think

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this is the first step that we're taking and there will soon be a package of items coming up to further address the issue, and we look forward to continuing to work with you on that as we move through the process. Thank you. Yes, Council Member Grodenchik.

Mr. Chairman. I want to thank you for being here today. You have been the face of many faceless individuals. Like Chair Dromm, I have many, many people who I've met with on a one-to-one basis who own medallions who are suffering greatly in Eastern Queens. So, I think this is a very logical first step and only a first step to paring down the enormous deb that these folks are facing, and so I look forward to seeing that package of legislation as well, and we as a Council will be moving forward on this. Thank you for being here this morning. Thank you, Mr. Chairman.

CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Okay, thank you very much for coming in and giving testimony. Okay, we have been joined by Council Members Lancman, Van Bramer and Majority Leader Cumbo, and with that, I'm going to ask that we vote on the Preconsidered Resolution. We are not voting on the reduction in
