2	CHAIRPERSON LAPPIN: Good morning
3	and welcome to the Land Use Subcommittee of
4	Landmarks, Public Siting and Maritime Uses. I'm
5	not sure who I'm talking to, but welcome.
6	Welcome, Chairs. We are joined today by Elizabeth
7	Crowley, from Queens; Leroy Comrie from Queens;
8	Maria Arroyo from the Bronx; Gale Brewer from
9	Manhattan; Annabel Palma from the Bronx and
10	Charles Barron of Brooklyn. We have two non-
11	controversial items on the agenda; one is in
12	Council Member Brewer's District, which is why she
13	has been nice enough to join us today. I am going
14	to open the hearing on that time, which is the
15	Mickey Mantle Public School, but it's a
16	landmarking, not a public siting. It is item
17	number 1239. And I wanted to offer Council Member
18	Brewer the opportunity to make some remarks.
19	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Thank you,
20	Madam Chair. This is a school that stands right
21	on 82nd and West End Avenue. It is a school that

Madam Chair. This is a school that stands right on 82nd and West End Avenue. It is a school that has always been a school. For many years it was for students who were not successful in other environments, and now it is a school, part of the District 75 community, that focuses on young

people in wheelchairs and young people who have 2 3 physical challenges. It has a wonderful ramp that goes up the side, there's a side door, and actually a beautiful experience--very wheelchair 5 friendly when you get inside. It is recently 6 7 called the Mickey Mantle School, because he 8 himself had challenges, and the Mickey Mantle family is actually very supportive of the school 9 10 and once a year comes up and meets with the 11 students, many of whom really wouldn't have an 12 opportunity without it. But the architecture is what we're here for today. And it does stand as a 13 beautiful recognition of Architect Snyder. 14 15 think you can all read about it. And it's also, 16 and the Chair knows this, on an avenue, West End 17 Avenue, that is hopefully going to be considered a 18 historic district from 70th Street to 107th, along 19 with some side streets, by Landmark Preservation 20 Commission. So, to me this is exciting and 21 positive, because it's an example of the 22 architecture you'll read about, but also part of 23 our attempt to make that entire area more historically significant and let people know that 24 25 that's what it is. So the entire community is

supportive, and we look forward to itsdesignation, and thank you very much.

4 CHAIRPERSON LAPPIN: Thank you,

Council Member Brewer. It is quite a beautiful building. I think you mentioned, maybe if you didn't, built between 1894 and 1896. And what's interesting about it is one of the few remaining 19th century institutional buildings on the Upper West Side. And I am looking forward to having a larger discussion about the historic district on West End Avenue. Do any of my colleagues have any comments? Okay, seeking nobody here signed up to testify, this hearing on this item is closed. Thank you very much, Council Member Brewer, for coming. It's nice when members come to talk about items in their own districts. We always appreciate that. The second item on our agenda today is the former St. George's Syrian Catholic Church, which is located at 103 Washington St., in Council Member Gerson's district. Council Member Gerson is in support of this. There is no opposition to this landmarking. I'm going to open the hearing. The item is number 1238. And I do see that Jenny is here from the Landmarks

Commission. We did one of the items without you because it's almost 11:50. But you're here to testify on the church. So if you could come up and introduce yourself for the record and provide testimony that would be great. And if you want to submit written testimony on the Mickey Mantle School, that would be great. We can submit that

JENNY FERNANDEZ: Good morning. I apologize for my lateness. We had a fire drill in the municipal building and it's a public hearing day as well, so. And I'm out of breath. Good morning, Council Members. My name is Jenny Fernandez, Director of Intergovernmental and Community Relations for the Landmarks Preservation Commission. I'm here today to testify on the Commission's designation of the former St. George's Syrian Catholic Church at 103 Washington St. in Lower Manhattan. On January 13th, 2009, a hearing was held. The Landmarks Preservation Commission held a hearing on the proposed designation of the former St. George's Syrian Catholic Church. A total of 11 witnesses spoke in favor of the building's designation, including

historian Maryann Hake DiNapoli [phonetic], 2 Historic Preservation Consultant; Mary B. Durak 3 4 [phonetic], co-author of The Financial District's Lost Neighborhood; Joann Midvecci [phonetic], and 5 representatives of the Historic Districts Council, 6 7 Metropolitan Chapter of the Victorian Society in 8 America, Municipal Arts Society and the New York 9 Landmarks Conservancy. The Commission also 10 received several emails in support of designation, 11 including a message from Dr. Philip M. Kayal 12 [phonetic], chairman of the Department of Sociology Anthropology at Seton Hall University, 13 Kathy Benson [phonetic], Curator of a 2002 exhibit 14 15 on Arab Americans in New York City at the Museum 16 of the City of New York; and scholar of Arab 17 American History, Paula Hajar [phonetic]. witnesses spoke in opposition to designation. 18 The 19 building's owner testified but did not speak in 20 favor or in opposition to the building's 21 designation. On July 14th, 2009 the Commission 22 voted to designate the building a New York City 23 landmark. The former St. George's Syrian Catholic Church is the most significant remnant of the 24 25 Lower Manhattan Immigrant enclave known as The

Syrian Quarter, the mother colony of Syrians and 2 3 Lebanese in America. Immigrants from the former 4 Ottoman province of Syria, which included modern day Syria and Lebanon, began coming to this 5 country in the 1880s and over the next 40 years 6 thousands of them settled on or around lower 7 8 Washington Street in a neighborhood that was their commercial and cultural center in the United 9 10 States. Nearly half of these immigrants were 11 Melchite Greek Catholics, who recognized the 12 primacy of the Pope, but worshipped using the Byzantine rite. In Lower Manhattan in 1889 they 13 formed America's first Melchite Parish. By 1925, 14 15 as St. George's Syrian Catholic Church, they moved into this building, which had been purchased for 16 17 their use by George E. Bardwell [phonetic], an importer of fine linens and embroideries. 18 In 19 1929, the church engaged Harvey F. Casab 20 [phonetic], a young Lebanese-American draftsman, 21 to design a new façade for the building. Casab's 22 vibrant neo-gothic composition executed in bright 23 white terracotta features a polychrome relief of St. George and the Dragon and remains remarkably 24 25 intact today. The building that housed the former

St. George's Church was constructed around 1812, three stories high with a peaked roof. It served as an immigrant boarding house by the 1850s. 1869 it was raised to its present five-stories and continued to function as a boarding house and tenement until Bardwell's purchase and its conversion to a church. With the decline of Lower Manhattan's middle eastern population after World War II, St. George's was converted to a Roman rites church for a period and in 1982, the building was sold to Chapel Moran Inc. [phonetic], which operates a restaurant on the ground floor and maintains the building and unique Washington Street façade for the past 27 years. The building remains Lower Manhattan's most vivid reminder of the vanished ethnic community once known as the Syrian Quarter and of the time when Washington Street was the main street of Syrian America. Commission urges you to affirm the designation.

CHAIRPERSON LAPPIN: I didn't know that history on Washington Street. That's very interesting. Any questions? Okay. Thank you very much, Ms. Fernandez.

JENNY FERNANDEZ: Thank you.
