CHAIRPERSON DROMM: [[gavel]] OK, good afternoon, and welcome to today's Finance Committee hearing, where we will be adopting the 2020 Budget. I'm Council Member Daniel Dromm and I chair the committee. Let me introduce my colleagues. We have Council Member Farah Louis, and welcome to the committee. Thank you for joining us. Let's give her a welcoming round of applause [applause], Council Member Mark Gjonaj, Council Member Adrienne Adams, Council Member Helen Rosenthal, Council Member Jimmy Van Bramer, Minority Leader Steven Matteo, Council Member Barry Grodenchik, and Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo. Thank you again for being here. Today the council committee will take the necessary actions for the City Council to adopt the fiscal 2020 budget, which totals approximately 92.8 billion dollars. all, this committee will vote on 11 budget-related items. In addition, we will also be voting on a fiscal 2019 transparency resolution, Intro 1607, to reduce the commercial motor vehicle tax for taxicab

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medallions and one Article 11 property tax exemption. But before we begin, I would like to take a moment to recognize everyone who helped us get to today's budget adoption. First and foremost, I want to thank Speaker Corey Johnson for his tireless commitment to advocate for a budget that represents the values of this council and this city. It is because of his leadership that we are passing a budget that is both equitable and supportive for everyone and safeguards the city's fiscal health. Today truly marks a victory for us all. I also want to thank the speaker's chief of staff, Jason Goldman, for all the work he did during this budget process on behalf of this institution and its members. Thank you to my fellow finance committee members for their partnership. In particular, Council Member Vanessa Gibson, who chairs the Subcommittee on Capital Budget and who has been with me every step of the way. Thank you also to Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo, Minority Leader Steven Matteo, Council Members Keith Powers, Helen Rosenthal, Francisco Moya, Barry Grodenchik, Rory Lancman, Jimmy Van Bramer, Adrienne Adams, Robert Cornegy, Mark Gjonaj, and Farah Louis. Together at the Executive Budget hearings we heard

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over 60 hours of testimony from agency heads on the operations and goals for the upcoming fiscal year and their ability to perform core services. We also heard from over 100 members of the public on the last day of the executive budget hearings on how the budget would affect them. We took what we learned at the budget hearings back to BNT and delegations then negotiated a budget that we can all be proud of. of course we must thank the staff in the finance division. They are spectacular. I know that they have worked long hours, answered a lot of questions from members, and many reports and spreadsheets to prepare. But I want to assure that your dedication is recognized and very much appreciated. you all of the financial analysts, economists, and administrative support staff who worked so hard. special thanks to the finance division's leadership team who spearheaded the effort - Deputy Director Regina Pareda Ryan, Deputy Director Nathan Taut, Deputy Director Paul Simone, Deputy Director and Chief Economist Dr. Raymond Justin, Assistant Director Emra Edev, Supervising Economist Paul Stromm, Unit Head Isha Wright, Dohini Sampura, Cheema Obachari, Kulian Francisco, and John Russell, and

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Senior Counsel Rebecca Chasson. And of course to the incomparable Latanya McKenny, who leads them all. thank you very, very much. [applause] And thank you to Chuck Davis and Fran Galavekia and the appointments investigation team for vetting every organization receiving discretionary funding, and to the entire office of the General Counsel, who assisted us with our disclosures. And last, but not least, my staff, Robin Forst, Sebastian McGuire, Mic Malan, my chief of staff, Carolyn Tran, and everyone in my district office who kept everything running throughout this process. Now with everyone properly thanked let's adopt this budget. The fiscal 2020 adopted includes many significant wins for the counsel and for the people of the City of New York. This year we entered into budget negotiations focused on securing a responsible, equitable budget for all New Yorkers. The council was determined that the final budget demonstrate a commitment to strengthen the city's reserves and improve the quality of life for all residents. I feel strongly that we have negotiated the budget that accomplishes these goals and incorporates initiatives that will benefit all New Yorkers. As a result of our tenacity and

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persistence throughout this negotiation process the council 2020 budget agreement includes, among other victories, a path for achieving pay pariety for all early childhood education employees, both teachers and non-teachers alike with a commitment that whatever collective bargaining agreement is reached will be appropriately funded. A path towards pay pariety for public defense and civil legal service providers with an agreement to build a four-year full implementation plan to reach pay parity by March 2020. And support for human service providers by funding individual community-based organizations' request for documented indirect cost above the current 10% ceiling. These investments will make a real difference to the not-for-profit workers, many of whom are women of color, who provide the critical work and expertise that keep key services running. But these are not the only investments that we are making in the budget. For our youth the council successfully negotiated for 30 million dollars for 285 new social workers, including 100 Bridging the Gap social workers, 100 social workers for middle schools, and 85 social workers who will focus on mental health issues funded by reallocation 10

million dollars from Thrive NYC. 4000 additional
COMPASS slots with 14.2 million dollars in baseline
funding, bringing the total number of slots to
51,000. Seven new Title 9 coordinators with \$857,000
in baseline funding, and 1 million dollars for an
inclusive LGBTQ curriculum. These are incredible
wins for us all. This budget really contains
something for everyone. Among the other of the
council's priorities that will be included in the
budget are 43 million dollars in the city's parks to
support 50 new urban park rangers, 80 parks
enforcement patrol officers, 150 maintenance workers
and gardeners, forestry management, and the Green
Thumb program. 33 million dollars in additional
funding for the three library systems. 12.8 million
to fund foster care initiatives. 16.6 million in
funding for the New York Immigrant Family Unity
Project. 11.7 million in baseline funding for senior
meals. 26.7 million dollars for culture
institutions. 8.6 million investment to fund
additional trash pickups on corner litter baskets and
40 million for census outreach advertising and
community engagement to ensure that every person in
New York City is accounted for in the 2020 census

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Throughout the negotiations we were not only focused on where spending could be most significantly have a positive impact on New Yorkers' lives and protect the social safety net, but we also made it a priority to ensure that the city be better prepared for any economic downturn that may come in the future, and our persistence paid off. The adopted budget will include an additional 250 million dollars for reserves. This meaningful balanced package of spending is a tribute to the council's commitment and dedication to the people of New York City. We should all be proud of what we have accomplished fiscal 2020. Now before we move on I'd also like to acknowledge that none of this would have been possible without the administration's willing to work with us to get this budget done. For that I'd to thank the OMB director, Melanie Harzog, and her entire staff. Now with all of that good news laid out, let's discuss the items that the Finance Committee will vote on today. Finance Committee members should have a budget package that contains all budgeted related, budget-related legislation that must be voted on by the committee and again by the full council at the Stated Meeting. The packet also

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includes supporting schedules that are not voted on but filed with the committee as well as other nonbudget-related items that are being voted. I want to strongly emphasize that Finance Committee members will be only, will only be given one budget package. So after you vote on the packet items you must bring your packet and all of its contents to the Stated Meeting to vote again. Council members who are not on the Finance Committee will be given their budget packet at the Stated Meeting. A description of all the items were emailed to you by the senior committee counsel, Rebecca Chasson, so I will simply list the items that are on the agenda today that require a The first item is the resolution adopting the fiscal 2020 expense budget. The second item is the resolution adopting the fiscal 2020 contract budget. The third item is a Reso A for the fiscal 2020 capital budget, approving the schedule of changes for the capital budget since the executive budget, including council discretionary allocations. The fourth item is Reso B for the fiscal 2020 capital budget, which is approval of the capital budget as amended by Reso A. The fifth item is the resolution to approve the new five-year education capital plan

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for fiscal 2020 to 2024. The sixth item is the resolution approving the 46th year of the Community Development Program and the 45th year at Reallocations. The seventh, eighth, and ninth items are the three property tax fixing resolutions for fiscal 2020. The tenth item is the resolution approving an expense budget modification fiscal 2019. The eleventh item is the resolution approving a revenue budget modification for fiscal 2019. The twelfth item is a transparency resolution. The thirteenth item is an LU items MHANY Dumont which will receive a partial 40-year Article 11 exemption to preserve 45 units in Council Member Espinal and Barron's districts in Brooklyn. The fourteenth item is Intro 1607 which would reduce the annual commercial motor vehicle tax owed by taxi medallions from \$1000 to \$400. The other documents in your packet which do not require a separate vote are a list of the terms and conditions adopted for fiscal 2020, Schedule C and other supporting schedules, and the borough president proposed capital changes. reminder to members, Schedule C is a schedule of the expense in contract budgets and the appropriations for the organizations listed in Schedule C are in the

expense and contract budgets. Council members will
have to sign a disclosure form indicating whether or
not a conflict exists with any of the groups listed
in Schedule C or Reso A, which details the
designations of capital discretionary funds. If any
council member has a potential conflict of interest
with any of the organizations included, he or she has
the opportunity to disclose the conflict at the time
of their vote. If you have not yet signed those
disclosure forms staff in the general counsel's
office are available to guide you through the
process, so please see one of them before you vote.
As a further reminder, please disclose any conflicts
you may have with proposed subcontractors that are
used by any of the organizations sponsored. These
disclosures must be made before the subcontractor can
be approved. Similarly, the transparency resolution
sets forth new changes in the designation of certain
organizations receiving local, aging, and youth
discretionary funding as well as new changes in the
designation of certain organizations receiving
funding pursuant to certain initiatives in the
budget. Organizations appearing in the resolution
that have not yet completed the pregualification

process conducted by the Mayor's Office of Contract
Services, the council, or another entity are
identified in the attached charts with an asterisk.
As with all transparency resolutions, council members
will have to sign a disclosure form. As previously
stated, staff from the general counsel's office is
available to assist you with any questions or
concerns regarding disclosure. Those are all of the
items for today. We will take now, we will now take
questions from any members if they have them. OK.
Seeing none, I will now ask Billy Martin, the

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: I just want to congratulate everybody here and I want to thank Chair Dromm, Chair Gibson, and the entire finance team, and everybody that made today possible, and I just want to say this is such a meaningful budget for me as a new mom. It was so exciting to see the progress that we made for our daycare workers and pay pariety. a mom I got to see firsthand how so many dynamic women, particularly women of color, educate children between the ages of zero and three, in such a nurturing, loving, and educational environment. was very proud to see that, so proud to see the work that we're doing with our libraries as we go for story time and to see how many parents come there for educational opportunities and reading time, to see one day he will grow up and have a guidance counselor in his school, the increase of 33 million dollar to culturals where we and so many other families go to for educational upliftment. This is really an exciting budget, um, for parents and families who

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want to raise their children, um, with all the educational opportunities that the City of New York has to offer and to the entire finance division I thank you for your tireless work and effort and all my colleagues and to Latonya McKinney, it's so inspiring to see a woman and an African American woman in this position. While we all know her and inside baseball she is certainly someone that I wish that the entire city and nation could see a woman of this caliber of, of this experience leading a body at this level. So we thank all of you for all of your work. I proudly vote aye, and I will just say I'm disclosing on the record of the council proceedings that the New York City Department of Education is funded in the budget we are adopting and my sister is employed by the Done. I proudly vote aye, and thank you.

WILLIAM MARTIN: Rosenthal.

COUNCIL MEMBER ROSENTHAL: With gratitude to everyone already named for their hard work and for being patient with me, especially Chair Dromm, and the speaker and Jason and Latonya and everyone on the budget negotiating team I proudly vote aye on all.

WILLIAM MARTIN: Van Bramer.

COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: First, I just
want to say thank you to everyone who had a hand in
this budget. As the chair of Cultural Affairs and
Libraries I could not be happier with this budget
that reflects record levels of increases in funding
and baseline funding for libraries and over 30
million dollars for culturals. This is a very, very
exciting budget and that doesn't even get to capital,
our cultural council initiatives increased
dramatically. It's a very, very good budget so thank
you to everyone involved, and I am disclosing on the
record that Breaking Ground is funded in the budget
we are adopting and I am very proud of my sister who
works with homeless individuals in the city and is
associated with this entity. With that I vote aye.
Thank you.

WILLIAM MARTIN: Grodenchik.

COUNCIL MEMBER GRODENCHIK: Thank you,

Mr. Chairman. I want to thank you first of all for

always being on time at every hearing and that's

greatly appreciated by us who travel a long distance.

I see Ms. Adams shaking her head in agreement,

nodding her head. Um, I am disclosing on the record

of the council proceedings that Queens College, which

is a division of the City University of New York, is
funded in this budget we're adopting. My son, David,
is a student at Queens College, um, I'm also a card-
carrying member of the Queensborough Public Library
and I'm a graduate of PS-201 Queens and I'm still
using that diploma. So that's all on the record now.
[laughter] Um, I also want to thank, Matteo, did you
graduate? That's the question. Ah, I also want to
thank the staff of finance who, as always, has done a
tremendous job and is always available to answer my
questions, because I have a lot of them. I want to
thank you, all of you, from the speaker on down for
funding the Queens County Farm Museum here again.
We're going to build that visitor's center for all of
you who are listening out in eastern Queens. This
was a great budget for parks also. I helped to lead
that charge, and I'm really excited. This is a
historic day for the parks system in New York City.
It's probably the one thing that everybody is really,
really happy to use. Not everybody is always
thrilled to go to school everyday, but everybody
really loves their park. So thank you. With that,
Mr. Chairman, I am proud to vote yes.

COUNCIL MEMBER ADAMS: Thank you very
much, Mr. Chair. All of our hats are off to you. It
has been my esteemed honor and pleasure to serve for
the second year with you leading this amazing Finance
Committee, our fantastic finance division. For the
City Council there is no measure for the work that
you all do, lead by our amazing Latonya McKinney. My
thanks to you. My thanks also to my colleague,
Vanessa Gibson, for chairing the Subcommittee on
Capital Budget, amazing work that you've done. And
to our speaker, Corey Johnson, who leads this amazing
body of council members, we have seen historic
landmarks and milestones take place since his
leadership and to him I am very, very grateful as
well. This has been an amazing time for women's
issues and women in particular, so I am very proud to
vote age on all of the items and let's adopt this
budget.

COUNCIL MEMBER GJONAJ: Thank you, Chair.

I just want to reiterate some of the committees that were made about you. It's incredible to see this first hand, two years in a row, your stellar performance and duration for all of these hearings.

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To my fellow colleagues for all of their input and what they've done, to our speaker, but most of all, I can't reiterate the praises that the staff deserve for the long nights, the long days, they truly are what makes this institution such a great place and allows us to make a difference for all New Yorkers. This budget is an incredible budget. I'm glad that I was brought in as the lefty on the ninth inning just over a month ago. I was made a part of this committee and I hope that my contributions have been, I hope my contributions are accepted for what they are and that is to make sure that we do the right thing by New Yorkers and to make sure that we spend, and that we're good stewards of tax dollars. budget has some incredible and wonderful things in it, some things that I'm not so sure about, but with that in mind I want to first make a disclosure. says I am disclosing on the record of the City Council proceedings that PS-175 is funded in the budget we're adopting and my wife is associated with this entity. And that CUNY is funded in the budget we're adopting and my sons are and may be students of CUNY. And thirdly that the Bronx Parent Housing Network is funded in this budget we're adopting and

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my brother may or may not be associated with this entity. And this is all again to the best of my knowledge and recollection. [laughter] Now with that being said I vote age on all except for Reso numbers 962, 963, 973, and the accompanying resolution M174. And the reason for that is in my council district single-family home owners have the highest effective tax rate than any other district in the city. The highest in the entire city. And I can't vote to put a further burden on home owners, all New Yorkers, who are already overburdened by real estate taxes. Thank you again.

WILLIAM MARTIN: Matteo.

[laughter] I want to start off by thanking Chair

Dromm. It's obvious to everyone in this room we
don't always agree, but you have been a very good

partner to myself and to my constituents through this
budget process and I appreciate the bipartisanship

and focusing on what we do agree on. I think that's

what government is all about, and I thank you for
that, for your leadership. I thank the finance team,
led by Latonya, and I've worked with some of you as a

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staffer, certainly worked with all of you since I've been elected and, um, you are all top-notch and you treat everyone's priorities as your own priority and I think we are all eternally grateful for your knowledge and your hard work, so thank you to our extraordinary finance team. I am also voting no on the tax preconsidered resolutions. I don't think it's a surprise to anyone, and I know the [inaudible] may not be, um, reflect the numbers that will ultimately go in effect, but nonetheless they will increase property taxes for Class 1 properties as is now. I certainly look forward to the findings of the Property Tax Commission that we empaneled and I hope my colleagues will continue to fight with me for property tax relief. With that said, and I certainly don't agree with everything in this budget, I don't think that's a surprise to everyone, I am pleased that we were able to increase our reserves and grateful to Speaker Johnson for working with me to fund many projects and initiatives that benefit my constituents in Staten Island as a whole, so I'm voting no on Preconsidered Resolutions 962, 963, 973, and M174, and aye on the rest. I am also disclosing that my daughter attends CSI, that's in the budget.

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One of my sons attends Susan Wagner High School, which we are funding. Another one of my sons attends PS-30, which we are funding. My sons and my daughter are in Summer Youth Employment Program and UAU, and that's in the budget. My brother works at Rumsey, which we are fund.

WILLIAM MARTIN: Powers.

COUNCIL MEMBER POWERS: Thank you. proudly voting aye and I want to thank our chair, Danny Dromm, who works tirelessly and puts in more hours than anybody can really imagine, making sure that we get to a budget that is fair and that groups are heard, and that organizations' priorities are attended to and met. This budget with its historic investment in libraries and cultural institutions and parks I know will make many New Yorkers proud and will provide many new opportunities for New Yorkers in places where they need it, places like libraries where any New Yorker can go and take out a book or learn or spend time in that space. I want to really, really thank the chair for days of his life, hours, weeks, that he will never get back, but it means that this budget has done well and I thank our subcommittee chair for capital, Vanessa Gibson, and

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our tireless leader, Latonya McKinney, as well. They put in just so much more work than I think anybody can ever imagine and we're really lucky to have everybody, this whole team in the finance division. I'm proudly aye, and I'm disclosing Mount Sinai is funded in this budget we are adopting. My mother is associated with Mount Sinai. And with that being said I proudly vote aye. Thank you.

Oheny Sampora and all of the finance division, thank
you, thank you, thank you. I do want to take an
opportunity to recognize another member of our

finance division. This is her last budget and she
formerly worked as my budget director and I could not
be more proud of her. If I have a question at
midnight she is responding to me, and that is one of
our senior analysts, Caitlin O'Hagan. Thank you,
Caitlin! [applause] I definitely wanted to put you or
the spot and say thank you for all the work you've
done and we wish you great success in your new
chapter continuing your higher education, and really,
the finance division, you deserve so much credit. We
could never feed you enough to show you how much we
love and appreciate you. Um, the investments we've
made in this budget in cultural, in the arts, in all
of our libraries, our social workers, which is
historic, saving Weeksville Heritage Center, all of
the things we've done to protect children, families,
older New Yorkers, you all have been so consistent,
and we never gave up. And I want to thank the
administration, Office of Management and Budget, our
director, Melanie Harzog, for working with us, and
certainly the team at OMB, and certainly on a
personal note I have to thank my staff. There's no
way I could do this without my team, my chief of
staff, Wendy Diegos, and completing his first year as

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my budget director, Justin Cortez. [applause] I thank you so much, and with that I vote age on all and look forward to passing the budget later on today. Thank you again and thank you to our speaker, Corey Johnson. I vote age on all.

WILLIAM MARTIN: I vote 12 in the affirmative, zero in the negative, and no abstentions. All items are adopted on today's finance agenda with the exception of Resolutions 962, Resolution 963, and M174, with Resolution 973, are adopted by a vote of 9 in the affirmative, 3 in the negative, and no abstentions.
