SPEAKER QUINN: Today's ceremonial—they're all important but today's one I think is particularly important. A month or two ago I was chatting with Police Officer Barnard down in the City Hall parking lot. Some of the members of my detail mentioned to me that he had recently come back from, was it Iraq or Afghanistan, Iraq. Then in talking to Police Officer Barnard he told me that it was his fifth tour in Iraq.

And then he incredibly impressed us and began talking to folks about how significant that was. When I then began talking about Police Officer Barnard that did five tours already, I came to learn that an incredibly large number of the police officers who are assigned to work and protect us at City Hall and protect the public come to City Hall are actually members of our military. I wanted to take a moment today to thank Detective Michael Butler, Police Officer Walter Columna, whose name I'm sure I just butchered, Police Officer Laurence Easton, Police Officer Byron Lee, Police Officer Mike Pragaan, Police Officer Pedro Perez, Detective Christian L.

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Pintelli, oh, Chris. He doesn't have his own jacket on but I'm not going to say anything.

To take a moment to thank them for not only helping protecting us and the public every day but for literally going above and beyond this job and committing themselves to putting their lives in danger in another way, protecting us and our country by being members of the military. It's really remarkable that when you have a job everyday that puts you in a position where you might not make it home to your families at night that you are such selfless individuals that you would, of your own accord, put yourselves in another position that puts you in a place that you might not make it home at night to your families. And you do that exclusively for the love of you fellow citizens.

I didn't know there were so many of you. I knew that you were all great and giving and selfless individuals but I didn't know there were so many of you that were so incredibly selfless that you'd take on this extra step to protect all of us. On behalf of all of my colleagues, I really just wanted to take a moment

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	to	thank	you	very,	very	much.
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Before we read one of the proclamations, let me give the mic over to our Public Safety Chair, Peter Vallone.

Speaker. There aren't too many people in the entire world that can say that they kept their families, their friends and total strangers safe not only in the streets of New York but on the battlefields of the world. How many people can say that? This group can. I want to thank Ray Kelly for being here and for being in charge of such a fine group of men. You're doing such a great job, all of you. Chris, you've been protecting my family and my father for a long time, too. Chris, we're all still here so you're doing a great job.

I want to add my thanks to that of the Council of New York City's public Safety chair and of the entire nation. So thank you all.

SPEAKER QUINN: I'm not sure if he wants to say a few words or not but I just wanted to also. As Peter did single out our terrific

Police Commissioner, who is here today, I know
James Sanders, who is also a fellow Marine, will
agree with me. It is no surprise and my partner,
Kim's father was not just a Marine but a China
Marine. If you say that to a Marine that's a very
significant thing. So having known Marines, it is
no--Al you were a Marine too? All right. It
would be a big insult if someone wouldn't have
pointed that out. It's of no surprise to me,
Commissioner that someone who has your level of
commitment to this country that you inspire your
men and women to serve on an even greater level.
So thank you.

thank you, Madam Speaker and the Council for recognizing these outstanding officers. They represent, they're sort of the vanguard of over 1,000 New York City police officers that have served overseas, served in Iraq and Afghanistan since September 11th. During that period, we've had two officers killed. We've had Police Officer James McNorton killed by sniper fire in 2005 in Baghdad. Just last year Officer Dion Taylor was killed by a roadside bomb in Afghanistan. They

2 paid the ultimate price for us.

Again, I want to thank you for recognizing them. I want to thank these officers for the outstanding job that they do, day in and day out. Thank you very much.

officers mentioned are all currently assigned to

the municipal security section and are truly some

of New York's finest.

And whereas all of these detectives and police officers have truly distinguished themselves in their service and embodies the generous spirit of service that continues to define our citizenship and our democracy.

Although there are countless variations in such stories of service, he has proven that the values that unite us as a nation remain as timeless as ever. Each individual has the power to bring out the best in ourselves and our country. They have enriched us all with their service and are worthy of the esteem of all New Yorkers.

You made New York City proud. But I think the proudest might have been Council Member Vinnie Ignizio whose district you all come from. We all rise above something, Vinnie. No, I'm only kidding. It's a really great accomplishment. Vinnie, thank you for getting the team to come here today. We really wanted, as a Council, to get to congratulate you. So thank you Vinnie and here's the mic.

York City, you made us extremely proud and you	
make us prouder still that we were able to beat	
the eighth best little league team in the world i	ln
waffle ball outside just a little while ago.	

SPEAKER QUINN: It's the little things.

COUNCIL MEMBER IGNIZIO: But they learned citizenship. They learned camaraderie. They learned how to be good sports when they win and good sports when they lose and that is instilled upon them by their parents and their coach. These kids learned lessons that they're going to take with them forever and that is how to be a good sport, how to play on a team and how to work with your fellow man and make Staten Island a better place. And that's what they did. They brought the Staten Island community together, and for that, we're all grateful. We really appreciate it.

One thing I said last time and I'll say again is, a bunch of them say to me, we're not done yet. This team's not done yet. So God bless

2	you all. I know you're going to be great. I want
3	to turn it over to my colleague from the mid
4	island, Minority Leader, Jimmy Oddo. Jimmy.

6	Vinnie. Madam Speaker, one thing that the
7	tournament and the events after the tournament
8	have demonstrated is that these kids aren't only
9	really good ball players, they're really good
10	kids. They handled themselves with class during
11	the tournament, when frankly, sometimes their
12	opponent didn't. I think that's a reflection on
13	their parents and on the coach and the coaches.
14	It really made Staten Island proud. Guys, it's
15	been a lot of fun getting to know you a little bit
16	and playing with you. Keep doing the right
17	things. God bless.

19	COACH: Thank you so much. It's an
20	honor to accept this award from the City Council
21	and to be recognized.

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for the coach's comments. It should be better.

COACH: Like I said, it's an honor to accept this award and be recognized from the City Council Members. This will hang in our clubhouse along with all the All Star teams pictures that we have since the league started tournament play in 1954. It's a special honor and we really appreciate it, thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: We have a date reserved for you for next year. As Vinnie said you said, you're certainly not done. So if we could ask the clerk to read the proclamation please.

Proclamation, whereas the Council of the City of

New York is proud to honor the distinguished

members of Staten Island's South Shore Little

League National All-Stars for their outstanding

performance in the 2009 Little League Baseball

Series.

And whereas the South shore Little
League National All-Stars consists of 12
incredible players, John Zarella, Nicholas
Viatlli, Anthony Scotti, Michael Russell, Joseph

Rugerello, Michael Lapagnia, Vincent Quinn, Nick Putierelli, Paul Pizzo, Angelo Vinetta, Robert Minstrotti and James Morisano. Working together they became one of only 16 teams to compete for the World Series championship.

And whereas with the support of team manager Mike Zacariello, team mom Maria Zacariello, assistant manager Glen Morisano and assistant coach Anthony Soriteno. The South Shore Little League National All-Stars overcame great adversity this season, leading up to a pivotal game on August 17th. That evening the team played in memory of hero, FDNY Firefighter Michael Camaratta, who died at the World Trade Center during the 9-11 attacks. Mr. Camaratta played for the South Shore team that made it to the World Series in 1991. That year when South Shore defeated a team from Summerset Hills, New Jersey, 4-0, they were on their way to the World Series.

And whereas, throughout the nationally televised Little League World Series, South Shore continued to amaze thousands of viewers. They got hit after hit and even during their final game, they had bases load four times.

They were just a single away from making it to the Little League World Series U.S. Championship game when they encountered a relentless team from San Antonio, Texas and their winning streak came to an end. Despite losing that game 4-1 the South Shore Little League National All-Stars won the hearts of every New Yorker.

Now therefore be it known that the Council of the City New York most gratefully honors the South Shore Little League National All-Stars for their outstanding performance in the 2009 Little League World Series. Christine C. Quinn, speaker for the entire Council, Vincent M. Ignizio, Council Member 51st District, Staten Island, Kenneth C. Mitchell, Council Member 49th District, Staten Island, James S. Oddo, Minority Leader, 50th District, Staten Island.

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Thank you, Speaker and thank you for your help on this. Public Safety Chair it's fitting to honor someone today who has added so much to the safety of this city. I represent the Rikers Island district. Rikers Island is huge; it's bigger than many, many cities. If you didn't live in the district, you wouldn't even know it exists because of how well its run. That is do, in large part, to Norman Seabrook, who represents all of the corrections officers at Rikers Island. I have worked with him. My father has worked with him before me regarding Riker's Island. He has been a partner to my family, a partner to most of us here in the Council when it comes to working on public safety issues. Now, he's been recognized nationally.

Just recently he received the NAACP's Benjamin L. Hook's Keeper of the Flame Award for his excellent work nationally - nationally.

This man has done so much that he's been recognized not only here. This is probably the biggest award he's ever going to get. He told me that; I know that. But he's been recognized nationally and more importantly, he has been a friend to us as the Council. He's been a friend to the people of New York City. He's helped to keep us safe and he's well deserving of this award. Now I'm going to turn the microphone over to the Speaker for some additional words. Thank you.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you. I just, before we read the proclamation, want to echo what Chairperson Vallone said. Being the head of the union that has all of the staff that represents what must be the biggest prison system in the world. Remarkably well run, remarkably few reports of any significant problems. That's a credit to the staff and you as a leader of the staff, it is a credit to you. On a day when we ware honoring and recognizing people who keep us safe, I want to thank you and the men and women that you represent for doing a job that is truly

2	difficult and trying. And doing it so well on a
3	regular basis. I want to just thank you. If you
4	could extend our thanks to all of them as well so
5	thank you.
6	NORMAN SEABROOK: Thank you.
7	SPEAKER QUINN: You're very
8	welcome. Let's ask the clerk to read the
9	proclamation.

11	Proclamation, where as the Council City of New
12	York is proud to honor and congratulate Norman
13	Seabrook on receiving the NAACP's Benjamin L.
14	Hook's Keeper of the Flame Award for his excellent
15	work to the labor community, both locally and
16	nationally.
17	And whereas, since 1995 Norman
18	Seabrook has served as the President of the New
19	York City Correction Officers Benevolent
20	Association, the largest municipal jail union in
21	the nation and the second largest law enforcement
22	union in New York City.
23	And whereas, before taking office
24	President Seabrook served as a former corrections
25	officer at Rikers Island where he knew first hand

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the great inequities that faced correction
officers. Because correction officers were less
visible, their contracts were dramatically
deficient in benefits and wages. In 1998
President Seabrook successfully won major contract
negotiations and soon championed several
legislative initiatives into law. Four of these
initiatives, the Variable Supplement Fund Bill,
the Heart Bill, the Three-Quarters Disability Bill
and the Anti-Privatization Bill were widely
considered to be among the most significant pieces
of legislation passed during the entire history of
the New York City Department of Correction.

And whereas, in more recent years

President Seabrook has remained a passionate

advocate for New York City corrections officers as

well as mane and women in civil service across the

nation. In 2000 he was appointed Chairman and

spokesperson of the Uniformed Forces Coalition.

In this role, he negotiated a new collective

bargaining agreement, which provided a 10% wage

increase over a two year period. Which was the

most significant wage increase for uniformed

forces since the 1980s for New York City

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corrections officer, firefighters, sanitation
workers, police detectives, police captains,
police sergeants, police lieutenants and all other
uniformed city employees with the exception of
police officers.

And whereas, in 2002 President
George W. Bush appointed President Seabrook to the
Presidential Commission on the United States
Postal Service to assess how the post office could
service the public more efficiently. Four years
later in 2006 former New York Governor George
Pataki appointed him as an Executive Board member
of the Metropolitan Transportation Authority where
he now serves as Chairman of the Safety and
Security Committee as well as a member of the
Capital Program Oversight, New York City Transit
Capital Construction and Real Estate committees.

Now therefore be it known that the Council most gratefully honors Norman Seabrook for his outstanding contributions to New York City and the nation, Christine C. Quinn, Speaker for the entire Council, Peter F. Vallone, Jr., Council Member 22nd District, Queens.

But each lock of the gray hair is one of the trials I have been through that has led me to this place, that has led me to a place where I can stand before God and feel a little bit more confident, not totally but a little bit more confident in what I have done in life. Go on, take the journey and get to that place and perhaps, some day you will give the same advice to the next generation.

May God bless all of those here assembled in this room with the passion and the awe of youth. But also the power of the wisdom of experience and may we always pass it on to another but may we always stand before judgment with a little bit of trepidation in our heart. May we all have a happy new year. May we all move forward in this new year and your session today. Thank you.

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are voting on a number of important pieces of
legislation today that range from follow up to the
tragic Deutsche Bank fire to important step
forward to keep our school buses safe for children
and also biotechnology related issues. First,
there is Intro 622A, which was introduced by
Council Member Sara Gonzalez, and shepherded
through the Environmental Protection Committee by
Chairperson Gennaro. I want to thank both of
them. I also want to thank Samara Swanson,
Chavonne Watson, Jeff Haberman and Rob Newman for
their work on this legislation.

Intro 622A is a piece of
legislation that one, will require that school
buses in the City of New York are retrofitted in a
way that will address the pollution that they put
out into the environment and critically important,
the pollution that gets put out into the school
bus where children are. It will also set age
limitation of 16 years on diesel fuel powered
school buses in the City of New York. It's
incredibly important to understand that school
buses that are diesel powered are a huge problem
for the environment and our air quality.

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But a more serious problem,

actually, I the fact that they put out pollution

and particulates into the school buses where the

children are. That air circulates within the bus,

never getting outside. The children are breathing

7 it in over and over again. These are children who

8 are developing lungs; children who may have

9 asthma, allergies and other problems. I really

10 want to thank Council Member Gonzales and

11 Chairperson Gennaro for drafting and passing this

12 legislation, which is going to help us keep

children safe and keep children healthier in the

14 City of New York.

Let me first call on the Chair of the committee, Chairperson Gennaro, and then Sara Gonzalez, the lead sponsor of this legislation.

If we could get a little quiet for the Chair and the sponsor.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: Thank you Madam Speaker. I thank you for your leadership in getting us to this good day. This bill builds upon the good work we did with the passage of Local Law 42 of 2005, where we spoke by and large to the larger school buses. There are many, many

issues that are related to the smaller school buses that by and large transport kids that are in kindergarten and special ed. So those kids will get a very special benefit from this bill.

This would not have been possible without the close cooperation and support of the Bloomberg administration, who I thank, people in the environmental community who pushed very hard to make sure that we got this done. And for your leadership, Madam Speaker, in getting this great bill passed. This is a good day for school kids and a good day for clean air in New York. Thank you Madam Speaker.

proud to be the lead sponsor on this important piece of legislation today. I would like to especially thank the Speaker, Chair Gennaro and my colleagues for their support and hard work on this bill, the administration especially Eddie Batista. In addition to recent Council efforts to make New York City idle free, promote bicycle use and ensure that we all do our part to recycle, Intro 622A proves that this city continues to be at the forefront of the green movement.

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Representing a district where high
asthma rates and increased truck traffic, I feel
this is a bill that makes sense. And we'll
continue to contribute making this city a
healthier place to live. I urge all of my
colleagues to vote yes on Intro 622A. Thank you.
And I'm back.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. We're also voting on Intro 1065 today. It's a piece of legislation relating to the creation of a New York City biotech tax credit. Ι want, in particular, to thank Raymond Jeffski, Nadine Felton and Sarah Brannon for their work on this legislation and Preston Liblack, our Finance I want to thank the Chair of the Director. Committee, Council Member Weprin, also the sponsor of the bill, Council Member Lappin. These folks, remember that in my State of the City address in February I spoke of the need to expand the biotech industry in the City of New York.

We have an amazing number of world class research institutions, a terrific number of world class hospitals. We're a place where many innovations are developed, discoveries occur.

When those innovations or discoveries move on to be the next new drug or medical device, that's really when the jobs kick in. Unfortunately, that's the part in the process where biotech goes to Boston and San Diego and not world class cities like our own. This biotech tax credit will build on top of the state's biotech tax credit and we believe, bring a significant number of new jobs to small biotech firms located in the City of New York.

I want to thank Assembly member

Mark Weprin, who is our Assembly sponsor, state

senator, Tom Duane, who is our Senate sponsor,

also Governor Patterson who signed the bill last

night and thank particularly Council Member

Jessica Lappin for her leadership on this issue.

Let me call on Council Member Lappin.

Madam Speaker. I don't want to add much other than to say this is a great way for us to diversify our economy, to help small businesses stay in this city, grow in our city and to do some good as well. These are the companies, when we hear biotech, what does that mean. These are the

companies that are working on finding a cure for cancer, finding a vaccine for the HIV virus, working on knee replacements and other state of the art technology and surgeries. So to draw on the talent pool we have in this city and to make us competitive worldwide, not just across the country, is a wonderful thing for our economy. So thank you very much for working with me on this initiative.

Member Lappin. We're also voting today on Intro 986A, 1004A, these are two pieces of legislation that are part of the package of bills we introduced with the Mayor's office, particularly the work of Deputy Mayor Ed Skylar in response to the Deutsche Bank tragedy. These two pieces of legislation deal with requiring of more testing, hydrostatic pressure testing of stand pipes and sprinklers, also air pressurized alarm systems for stand pipes and further adding steps in the process of certification and requirements around demolitions.

These two pieces of legislation, coupled with the others, really for the first time

ever create an infrastructure of regulation and standards around demolition in the City of New York. And put important regulations in place around stand pipes so, God willing, never again will firefighters search for 40 minutes for a stand pipe that is not functioning.

I want to thank Rob Calandra, particularly, who has just done tremendous, tremendous work in response to the Deutsche Bank fire. I don't know if Rob is here, he's downstairs. If he was here I'd ask you all to give him a round of applause because he has done great—he's here? Where's Rob?

Oh, there he is. He was hiding.

Also, want to thank Alec Kastilnik, Bill Hindatch and Rob Newman for their work on these bills as well. I want to thank Chairperson Vacca who has seen both of these pieces of legislation and the others through his committee. I want to thank Council Member Sanders, who is the sponsor of Intro of 1004A and Council Member Gentile, who is the sponsor of Intro 986A. I know we have Mr. Graffanino, Sr., again with us today, who has

Vacca to speak on this legislation and then we'll

Member Sanders. If we could get a little quiet

Madam Speaker and I would ask the Council to support both of these intros. This is really building upon a package of bills the Council has passed in the last couple of months that seeks to increase building safety in light of that terrible situation, the fire we had at the Deutsche Bank. My committee reviewed these bills. We had the appropriate hearings. The sponsors, Council Members Gentile and Sanders, ought to be commended. The Council's response to this fire, I think, merits immediate action so I would ask that both bills be supported. I thank the Speaker for her assistance.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENTILE: Thank you Madam Speaker. 986A is one of 12 bills that seeks

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to close the gaps in construction and demolition safety that led to the deaths of Joey Graffanino and Bobby Badia, the two firefighters who put their lives on the line and paid the ultimate price for their work on that day. A faulty stand pipe, which should have delivered water to the floor on which Badia and Graffanino had fought the blaze led, in part, to their deaths. This should never have been the case and Intro 986A seeks to ensure that none of Joey's or Bobby's FDNY brothers or sisters or the families of those firefighters are ever put in that terrifying and tragic situation.

986A requires the hydrostatic testing of all standpipes in buildings of a particular height as well as those being altered or demolished. This testing will detect any leak or malfunction or any manufacture defect in those pipes. By doing that it will make firefighters in demolition sites and in construction sites in our city's tallest buildings safest and more secure for New York's bravest.

These bills represent absolutely necessary protections that will make this city a

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safer place. So I'd like to thank Speaker Quinn and Chairman Vacca for their making the safety of firefighters a priority and the other 11 bills that are in this package, I appreciate everyone of my colleagues support for 986A today.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much. Council Member Sanders.

Madam Speaker. Building upon the good work that the other bills do, it must be remembered that sometimes it's not the most technologically advanced things that we do but sometimes it's common sense that we have to use. Remembering that on August 18, 2007 two of our firefighters were killed and several others were injured with the Deutsche Bank fire.

Imagine if there had been an alarm system within the whole system where we could tell if there was a breach to the hoses. Imagine if something of this nature were there where an alarm was sounded and no work could be done until it was resolved. This may have saved these two gentlemen and saved others. But we may not be able to do anything about what has gone on but we can ensure

2	that it won't happen again. So we apply some
3	common sense to this tragedy and learn from it and
4	honor these brave men by having an alarm system in
5	this system.
6	I thank you vey much for that and I
7	urge all of my colleagues to vote for this.

SPEAKER QUINN: Council Member, I'm sorry, just one second. We'll add some more time back to the clock. Can we please end the conversations and pay attention to the extensions of remarks. Thank you.

Madam Speaker. When DOT changed their rules without telling everyone by changing their rules a driver got 20 minutes instead of 30 minutes at a parking meter. The lack of notice from DOT to local communities is really an insult and a disregard to driver's wallet so Intro 1076 requires DOT to notify Council Members and community boards 60 days prior to any parking meter regulation change going into effect would force the Department to communicate with residents and avoid surprises at the parking meter.

2	1077 goes further, gives community
3	boards a voice in any pilot program poised for
4	implementation in the neighborhood. As it stands
5	DOT can implement a pilot program in any
6	neighborhood without community approval or review.
7	While DOT sometimes communicates with the
8	community, I don't think that should be just a
9	courtesy and it should never be an afterthought.
10	Pilot programs bring with them new regulations.
11	Oftentimes they carry penalties with those
12	regulations.
13	This bill will require the
14	Department of Transportation to present its plans
15	to any new pilot program at the affected community
16	board monthly meeting at least 60 days prior to

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Council Member James.

As most of you know, this administration is in the process of laying off a significant number of municipal workers and engage in outsourcing to a number of contracts that were formerly done by city employees. I urge everyone to sign on to

1081 and I urge that we have a hearing.

In addition to that, I would also urge all of my colleagues to sign on to a letter with respect to the Dental Clinics for Children.

As most of you know, the dental funds were not restored in this year's budget. The clinics were supposed to be picked up by not for profits.

Unfortunately, that is not happening in the City of New York and there are a significant number of children that are going without dental services so I would urge all of you to sign on to my letter.

As you know, Mayor Bloomberg and all of the leaders, including our Speaker Christine Quinn, small business is the backbone of our great city.

With that, I say I have a memo regarding this. If you have any questions, please come to me. But I ask you to please consider Intro 847. We're trying to move this bill into law by the end of our legislative session, which is December of this year.
