2	CHAIRPERSON LAPPIN: Good morning,
3	welcome to the Land Use Subcommittee on Landmarks,
4	Public Siting and Maritime Uses. I'm Jessica
5	Lappin, the Chair, joined today by Council Member
6	Leroy Comrie of Queens, Council Member Rosie
7	Mendez of Manhattan, Council Elizabeth Crowley of
8	Queens, Council Member John Liu of Queens, Council
9	Member Maria del Carmen Arroyo of The Bronx, and
10	Council Member Tony Avella of Queens. That is my
11	nanny calling 'cause my son is sick. We have one
12	item on the agenda today, the Police Academy,
13	which his item number 1240. We had the hearing on
14	this item last week. Before we have a vote, I
15	wanted to open this up to some discussion, and
16	offer Council Member Mendez and Council Avella the
17	opportunity to make some statements for the
18	record. This is in Council Member Avella's
19	district. There obviously have been a lot of
20	discussion in the Subcommittee about this
21	application. Council Member Vacca is not here
22	today, but he discussed the range in his district,
23	and I understand there have beendo you have the-
24	-thank you. Some significant changes made
25	regarding the firearms range at Rodman's Neck.

1 SUBCOMM ON LANDMARKS, PUB SITING, MARITIME USES 3 They're going to [pause] revise the master plan to 2 incorporate rifle and shotgun training at the 3 College Point site, so that no other firearms 4 5 training, other than sniper training, will be at Rodman's Neck. That means as a result, there will 6 be approximately 19,000 rounds discharged there, which is about a 99 percent decrease in the number 9 of firearm discharges at that site, and Council 10 Member Vacca is pleased with that change. 11 has been an addition in the final second phase 12 build out of an addition of 1,000 parking spots. 13 There has also been a change in terms of the drop off area for the museum, which should hopefully 14 15 help in terms of traffic flow in that area. And I 16 wanted to now ask Council Member Mendez to give a 17 statement and talk about some of the changes regarding the 20<sup>th</sup> Street facility, and the process 18 19 for vacating that site. 20 COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you, 21 Chair Lappin. I will make a comment after 22 Councilman Avella, since it is his district, I 23 want to give him that respect. 24 COUNCIL MEMBER AVELLA: Thank you

for the opportunity to make a few comments,

I appreciate the Chair and the Council Members who sort of went to bat not only for me but for some of the issues in the district. Although there's been some minor changes in my opinion to the application, I still oppose it. It is a huge facility, and I think it's more about having Commissioner Kelly go around the, this country, and probably beyond, to say he's built the Taj Mahal of police academies, without really improving the operation of the Police Department. There has been very little improvement in terms of the traffic impact in this--for the College Point and Whitestone and Mitchell-Linden communities. In the very beginning I supported the Academy, but it is well beyond what I originally though the application was going to entail. I would still ask my colleagues to vote against it, but I can understand if you don't. But I have to say for the future, the College Point, Mitchell-Linden, and Whitestone communities are going to be severely impacted by the traffic for this facility and virtually nothing has been done in that aspect to improve the application.

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2	COUNCIL MEMBER MENDEZ: Thank you,
3	Councilman Avella, and thank you Chair Lappin.
4	I'm going to be voting in favor, and while I have
5	a lot of concerns about the cost, and what
6	actually might get done during the second phase,
7	the reality is having toured the Police Academy in
8	my district, that it is a very overcrowded
9	facility, and to keep up with new training
10	methods, it would be in the City's best interest
11	to build a new space for police officers to get
12	trained. The current facility was built back in
13	1964, and it's been serving in that capacity until
14	today. My initial problem with this, besides the
15	fiscal impact on the City, was also that we were
16	led to believe that the consolidation of all the
17	police services at College Point would free up
18	other City owned spaces throughout the City, which
19	may happen during the first phase or the second
20	phase. And my community, particularly, was
21	interested in looking at this site, in addition to
22	other sites, as possible school buildings, since
23	we have a huge overcrowding problem in this City,
24	that has not been addressed by this
25	Administration. However, after reviewing the

1 SUBCOMM ON LANDMARKS, PUB SITING, MARITIME USES 6 changes that have been made, and getting a 2 commitment that once the building becomes 3 4 substantially empty, or once they're going into 5 the full build out, a community advisory committee will be put in place, with community б representatives, and the elected officials that would be me, if I'm still around, and others. 9 think, and after speaking to some of my other colleagues on how this advisory committee has 10 11 worked with fire station closings, I hear that 12 it's been a very helpful process for the 13 community. So, with all that I will be voting 14 aye, and thank you very much for this opportunity 15 to speak, Madam Chair. 16 CHAIRPERSON LAPPIN: Thank you, and

CHAIRPERSON LAPPIN: Thank you, and thank you for your leadership. I know there has been a lot of discussion, not just in your neighborhood, but in all District Two about the need to find new locations for schools, and this is one that has popped up consistently over time. And giving the community an opportunity when the times arises to have a meaningful say in what happens in this building is very important. So, thank you. Any other comments from anybody else
