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CHAIRPERSON ESPINAL: Okay, then. [gavel] Good afternoon. My name is Rafael Espinal. I'm the Chair of the Committee of Consumer Affairs and Business Licensing. I'm joined today by my colleagues in the Committee. We have Justin Brannan from Brooklyn, we have Peter Koo from Queens, we have Margaret Chin from Manhattan, and we have Keith Powers from Manhattan and we have Karen Koslowitz from Queens. Today the committee will be voting on Proposed Intro 1657-A sponsored by Council Member Brannan that looks to prohibit street vending on certain streets in Dyker Heights beginning on Thanksgiving until New Year's Day. Street vendors are crucial to the fabric of New York City adding vibrancy and diversity to the retail food landscape. They also contribute markedly to the city's economy. Although data is hard to come by, a 2012 study concluded the direct effect of street vendors could be estimated to be more than \$101-16,000-sorry. 16,000 jobs, \$78.5 million in wages and \$82 million to the economy. Street vending is also a vital source of income for many people especially newly

COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND BUSINESS LICENSING arrived and long-term immigrants. Traditional brick and mortar outlets are typically cost prohibitive for people entering the market, but street vending offers an entrepreneurial alternative and an avenue for economic independence. Despite their benefits, street vending in New York City is also contentious as the most densely populated city in the country, street and sidewalk space in New York is a rare and valuable commodity. However, vending is usually not a problem in the predominantly residential neighborhoods that lack the traffic. An exception to this is Dyker Heights during the holiday season. Ιt has become a tradition for residents of this neighborhood to adorn their homes with festive lights and decorations. The event has become so popular that over the last few years that it now attracts a whopping 150,000 visitors each season, and with these crowds, of course, come with the savvy street vendors keen to capitalize on our increased foot traffic. While we admire their entrepreneurial spirit, we have to make sure that the residents of Dyker Heights can still go about their regular day to day activities. Unfortunately, we have heard numerous complaints about food trucks blocking driveways, vendors

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committee on consumer affairs and business licensing 5 operating illegally, increased garbage, fumes and pollution from vendors' trucks and carts. For this reason, Intro 1657-A seeks to establish street vending restrictions in parts—in parts of Dyker Heights during this particularly busy time, and I encourage my colleagues to join me in voting in the affirmative for this bill.
