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CHAIR AYALA: [gavel] Good afternoon, We're going to call this hearing to order. Good afternoon. My name is Diana Ayala and I am the Chair of the Committee on Mental Health, Disabilities and Addiction. Today we are holding a vote on a bill that is an essential piece of the puzzle in getting people who don't need to be locked up out of Rikers Proposed Introduction 1590A a local law in Island. relation to requiring correctional health services to report information to the attorney of record for individuals in the custody of the Department of Corrections who are diagnosed with a serious mental illness. Unfortunately, even as the City's jail population continues to decrease, the percentage of individuals who are in Rikers and are diagnosed with serious mental illness is going up. Locking up people who are sick is wrong and it doesn't dissolve anything. Despite the excellent work of the medical staff at Correction Health Services, it's hard to image a worse place to maintain stability and mental wellness than Rikers Island. While it is true that a lot of people come into jail because they lack access to medication, housing and social support necessary

COMMITTEE ON MENTAL HEALTH, DISABILITIES AND ADDICTION to cope with serious mental illness, it is absolutely unnecessary to keep them there for as long as we do. People with SMI on average stay in jail for much longer than everyone else. We need to find a better solution. We need to find a way to connect people to community support rather than keeping them behind bars but that can't happen without the cooperation of the courts that put people in Rikers in the first place and have the power to get them help in settings where they can learn and function on their own in society and get the community support that will keep them healthy. This legislation is simple. requires Correctional Health Services to tell defense lawyers about their client's medical needs, their symptoms and their progress. That way when people get better and are able to manage their daily routines without being detained, their attorneys can find treatment and housing alternatives and advocate to the Judges and the VA's for their release. truth is that we also need major reinvestments in our healthcare system going forward, but this bill is a crucial step in getting people who shouldn't be in jail into the community-based treatment and now we

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will do rollcall.
