2	CHAIRPERSON DROMM: [GAVEL] Okay, good morning
3	and welcome to today's Finance Committee meeting. My
4	name is Daniel Dromm and I'm the Chair of this
5	Committee. I have been joined by Council Member
6	Farah Louis, Council Member Barry Grodenchik, Council
7	Member Robert Cornegy, Council Member Keith Powers,
8	Minority Leader Steven Matteo, Council Member Rory
9	Lancman, Council Member Adrienne Adams, and I said
10	Barry Grodenchik already, yes.
11	Today the committee has four items on the agenda,
12	three land use items and Intro. 1750 which would
13	authorize six BIDS to increase their assessments.
14	First, we have the land use items. The first is
15	Knickerbocker Village Apartments in Council Member
16	Chin's District in Manhattan. This action would
17	provide a partial 40-year Article 4 property tax
18	exemption to support the preservation of 1,590 units
19	of affordable rental housing.
20	The Strivers Plaza in Council Member Perkins
21	District. This action would provide a full 40-year
22	Article 11 property tax exemption to support the
23	preservation of 117 units of affordable rental
24	housing.

2	The third is St. Nicholas Manor Apartments, also
3	in Council Member Perkins district. This action
4	would provide a partial 40-year Article 11 property
5	tax exemption to support the preservation of 112
6	units of affordable rental housing.
7	Each Council Member is supportive of the
8	exemptions in their districts.
9	Next, we have the BID item. Intro. 1750 would
10	authorize five bids and one special assessment
11	district throughout the city to increase the amounts
12	they expend annually.
13	The Council previously approved Resolution 1093
14	on October 17 <sup>th</sup> , setting today as the date for a
15	public hearing on this legislation.
16	The budget increases have been requested by the
17	property owners within the boundaries of each BID and
18	would be used to enhance the services they provide.
19	The details about which BIDs would see the
20	increases and the amounts set forth in the briefing
21	documents prepared by the Finance staff.
22	Representatives of the Department of Small Business
23	Services are here to testify regarding the requested
24	assessment increases, and we'll hear from them now.

2	So, I'd like to call up Stephen Lee and Calvin
3	Brown.
4	COUNCIL CLERK: Good morning. Do you affirm that
5	your testimony will be truthful to the best of your
6	knowledge, information and belief?
7	PANEL: Yes.
8	COUNCIL CLERK: Thank you. You may proceed.
9	Good morning Chair Dromm and members of the
10	Finance Committee. I'm Calvin Brown; I'm an
11	Assistant Commissioner at the Department of Small
12	Business Services and I wish to express our support
13	for the Law providing an increased amount to be
14	expended to five business improvement districts and
15	one special assessment district, in which I will be
16	referring to as BIDs.
17	To propose an assessment increase, BIDs must
18	complete a multistep review process overseen by SBS.
19	The BID Board of Directors which include local
20	property owners, merchants and residents as well as
21	the city Comptroller, Borough President, City Council
22	and SBS must review and approve the proposed
23	assessment increase.
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Additionally, SBS requires all BIDs to submit a five-part justification outlined in how the increase will be allocated.

5 Minutes from the Board meeting, which the 6 increase was approved and a letter of support from 7 the City Council members that are represented within 8 the BIDs boundaries. SBS then reviews these 9 proposals and determine whether they are sufficient 10 to bring to City Council.

Additionally, as required by law, each of the six BIDs published a notice of public hearing at least once in a local paper having general circulation in a district specifying the time and the place of today's hearing, and state in the proposed amount to be expended annually.

Each district has also certified that they have mailed a letter to property owners informing them about the proposed assessment increase and the time and place of the public hearing.

It is a priority of the agency that assessment increased proposals focus on enhancing programs and services provided to the district. The sixth districts proposing an assessment increase are doing so to address vital needs and change in conditions.

These increases will further expand, reinforce and strengthen the existing core services currently provided in a business district and include funds for capital improvements, plaza activation and added staff capacity.

7 Additionally, portions of these increases will be 8 used to sustain current levels of sanitation and 9 public safety programs and services impacted by the 10 rising costs related to the increase in the minimum 11 wage.

12 The proposed increases for Fiscal Year 2020, 13 range from \$360,000 to \$3.2 million, varying 14 according to the budgets size, district size and 15 proposed changes in the programs and services.

I'm happy to restate the specific amounts for
each of the six districts. 34<sup>th</sup> Street is going from
\$12,640,000 to \$13,000,000. Fifth Avenue from
\$3,207,000 to \$6,414,000. Fulton Mall \$2,100,000 to
\$3,006,750. Metro Tech from \$3,274,492 to
\$4,911,738. Noho \$540,000 to \$800,000 and Union
Square \$2,600,000 to \$4,200,000.

23 The city's 76 BIDs invests in over \$158,000,000 24 into local economies in the form of supplemental

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1COMMITTEE ON FINANCE72services and programs that serve 93,000 businesses3across the city.

BIDs have been valuable and proven partners in an 4 ongoing initiatives of neighborhood revitalization 5 and economic development across the five boroughs 6 7 making New York City cleaner, safer and more vibrant. BIDs are also advocates for small businesses in their 8 districts, helping them to navigate government, 9 facilitate networking among fellow business owners, 10 providing business retention support and attracting 11 12 shoppers to their area.

In partnership with the City government, BIDs
help create jobs, improve the quality of life for New
Yorkers and visitors, enhance the city tax base and
strengthen local economies.

17 Representative from each of the BIDs seeking an
18 assessment increase are present to answer any
19 questions, as well as myself. Thank you.

20 CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Thank you very much for that 21 testimony. Are there any questions from the Council 22 Members?

3	make a quick statement. Out of the 76 BIDs in New
4	York City, the Flatbush [INAUDIBLE 12:38] BID was not
5	considered for this assessment which is an issue for
6	us in Flatbush. While they were overlooked by a
7	particular division from your agency. I would love
8	for them to be considered next year for the Spring.
9	There has been a 27 percent increase in services that
10	are needed particularly in our district.
11	So, I'm listening to all the numbers that you are
12	throwing out \$400,000 and million. We asked just for
13	a \$200,000 assessment increase and we were
14	overlooked. So, we definitely want to be considered
15	for the next time. Thank you.
16	COUNCIL CLERK: Matteo?
17	COUNCIL MEMBER MATTEO: Aye.
18	COUNCIL CLERK: By a vote of 11 in the
19	affirmative, zero in the negative and no abstentions.
20	All items have been adopted by the Committee.
21	CHAIRPERSON DROMM: Okay, thank you very much.
22	We're going to leave it open for about ten minutes or
23	so for others to come. Thank you.
24	COUNCIL CLERK: Final vote Committee on Finance,
25	Introduction 1750 Land use 568, 569 and 570 are
