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## COMMITTEE ON ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION APEARANCES Dr. William Sweet

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CHAIRPERSON LEVINE: [GAVEL] Good morning everybody and welcome to this meeting of the City Council's Committee on Health. For those of you watching on T.V., you might not be able to see we have a capacity crowd in here because of the weighty packet of legislation that we will be considering today.

I'm Mark Levine; Chair of the Committee and we are going to be voting on five pieces of legislation targeting three major policy priorities for our city including our fight against diabetes, the move towards more dignified burials on Hart Island and finally two pieces of legislation regarding animals.

I want to acknowledge my fellow members of the

Health Committee who are with us including: Council

Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel, Council Member Keith

Powers, Council Member Andy Cohen, and Council Member

Inez Barron.

Unbeknownst to most New Yorkers, for the past 150 years, our city has buried its poor and marginalized in mass graves on Hart Island. In the Long Island sound between the Bronx and Queens.

In a twist, that can only be called Dickensian;
Hart Island is under the jurisdiction of the

2 Department of Corrections with burials done by

3 | inmates from Rikers.

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This has converted Hart into a secure facility which is off limits to the public and offers extremely limited access even for families with loved ones buried there.

The City Council has been engaged in a years long battle to fix this, by turning Hart into an open, green dignified cemetery.

Today, we are voting on legislation which would amount to a small but important step forward towards this goal. Intro. 1580 by Council Member Debbie Rose would require that the city conduct a public hearing on the future of burial policies on the island.

At Intro. 1559 by Council Member Ayala would establish an office to provide support to those family members who need burial assistance.

Two weeks after we passed a landmark passage of bills protecting the welfare of farm animals, wild animals and working animals, today we are voting to help protect our beloved pets with Intro. 1496 sponsored by Council Member Brannon which safeguards pets when a tenant is evicted.

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Lastly, we will vote on Intro. 1361. Legislation

I am proud to sponsor which requires the Department

of Health and Mental Hygiene to report on the

occurrence of diabetes and diabetes related illness

and to develop a plan to reduce these health

problems.

The simple fact is, as a city, we are losing the fight against obesity and type 2 diabetes. According to DOHMH, more than half of adult New Yorkers are overweight and/or obese.

While almost half of elementary school children and children enrolled in Head Start are currently at an unhealthy weight. An estimated 987,000 New Yorkers have diabetes without many having knowledge of their condition.

Diabetes disproportionately affects high poverty communities and as of 2013, diabetes was almost 70 percent more common in high poverty neighborhoods than in middle income and upper income neighborhoods.

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African American, Hispanic and Asian New Yorkers were

twice as likely as White New Yorkers to have

4 diabetes.

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While New York City has made major strides in reversing this trend by improving access to healthy food and making public spaces more amenable to physical activity, we need to do much more to reverse these trends.

Our bill would require DOHMH to compile a comprehensive report by December 1, 2021 and submit recommendations and a plan to reduce the occurrence of diabetes related health problems and to implement the Departments recommendations.

I want to again thank my fellow committee members and the sponsors of the bills and all the advocates for their work and passion regarding these various pieces of legislation. I want to acknowledge we have also been joined by fellow Health Committee Member, Council Member Dr. Matthew Eugene and I would like to ask our Committee Clerk, Billy Martin, to begin the roll call.
