Today is November 26, 2019, and we have a star-studded line-up for you today. am so happy to bring forward, if everyone from Forever Loved Entertainment, Inc. could please come forward, yes, yes, thank you. Everyone, come on

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down, everybody that's here today for Forever Loved Entertainment please join us. All right, perfect. We're getting situated here. Good afternoon. Again, I am Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo and I am so excited about today's ceremonial. Education is at the cornerstone of community. Art is the lens through which we value and express ourselves. Forever Loved Entertainment, Inc. has seen the value in combining these worlds together, creating a network of education and empowerment for our youth using art and culture. You know I love that. Forever Loved Entertainment was found in 1999 by JP Taylor and Tanya Louis Taylor with careers in the music industry and passion for service and empowerment, and I'm so excited that they utilize their experiences, their contacts, and their networks to bridge a gap between the entertainment world and our youth. It should be a no-brainer, right? [applause] FLE is the parent organization of the not-for-profit organization Entertainers for Educational Alliance, Inc. and I Will Graduate Youth Development Program. celebration of their 20th year of service to the New York City and community, 20 years! [applause] And you ain't seen nothing yet. The I Will Graduate Program

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has supported inner city youth to achieve and succeed for the past two decades. Starting from humble beginnings, Forever Loved Entertainment is housed in the heart of Bedford Stuyvesant, Brooklyn, where it continues to impact the lives of students and service the community. Combining art, music, and education empowerment, the Taylors have built an empire dedicated to helping students reach their fullest potential. I just want to make sure that you all know, because this is an organization that the City Council supports, we want to make sure that we will all attend the I Will Graduate Day Celebration on January 9, 2020, at Kings Theater in Brooklyn from 3:00 to 6:00 p.m. Now you know you are big if you are taking over Kings Theater in Brooklyn for a youth empowerment event. Huge venue, you have certainly arrived when you are there. So I want to thank Tanya We thank you for your vision and your and JP. leadership. Congratulations on 20 years of success. We salute you. We support. We thank you for loving our children so deeply, taking them to the next level, and creating those interpersonal connections, because that's where it's at, of letting our children know they are loved, they are cared for, they are

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respected, and that they are our future and we don't just sing it by saying Whitney Houston's famous song, but we put the actual means and the power to making it happen. So we salute you and we appreciate you.

We will now have the clerk read the proclamation and

then we want to hear some words from you.

COUNCIL CLERK: Council City of New York Proclamation. The New York City Council honors Forever Loved Entertainment, Inc. in celebration of the 20th anniversary of its I Will Graduate youth development program, an initiative that has propelled countless students to greater success, both academically and professionally. And whereas in the United States more than 1.2 million students drop out of high school every year. Nationwide, approximately 7000 students drop out of school every day. In New York City, however, graduation rates have steadily increased since 2005, when the graduation rate was 46%. In 2018 the percentage of students who received diplomas climbed to almost 76% and graduation rates within the city have improved at a higher than the state overall. It is a privilege to publicly commend an organization that has contributed so much to this progress. And whereas Forever Loved Entertainment

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was found in 1999 by its current executive director, 2 3 Tanya Louis Taylor, and her husband, JP Taylor. 4 they learned of the shocking drop-out statistics plaguing our schools they sought to use their entertainment industry expertise and resources to 6 help keep students in school. From humble operations in a basement they began organizing events for youth, 8 parents, and others in the community to change the perception of education as not only essential but 10 11 cool. After moving into their current office in Bedford Stuyvesant, Brooklyn they continued to expand 12 13 their reach. And whereas today Forever Loved 14 Entertainment is the umbrella entity for Entertainers 15 for Education Alliance, a nonprofit drop-out prevention organization, and the I Will Graduate 16 youth development program designed to increase 17 student educational achievement. Over the last 20 18 19 years Forever Loved Entertainment and its 20 subsidiaries have produced many public service 21 campaigns to create awareness, influence, attitudes, and behaviors, and empower young people to succeed. 2.2 2.3 And whereas Forever Loved Entertainment has distributed thousands of posters, book covers, 24 postcards, and stickers to schools, libraries, malls, 25

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stores, with positive messages to strengthen connections between youth, parents, and the entire community. And whereas thanks to the organization's visionary founders and dedicate staff, as well as the diverse members of its boards and advisory committee, and the support of many generous volunteers, forever loved entertainment has become a leader in youth development, parent engagement, community outreach, and by going to different New York City public schools it continues to inspire and empower more students each year to pursue their greatest potential. Now therefore be it known that the New York City Council gratefully honors Forever Loved Entertainment, Inc. and its I Will Graduate youth development program for 20 years of outstanding empowering young people and their families in the City of New York. Corey Johnson, speaker for the entire council, Laurie A. Cumbo, Majority Leader, New York City Council, and many members of the New York City Council.

being here today at this very important Stated

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Meeting. Thank you. I want to begin by
acknowledging the recent mass shootings we have had
in our country this month. These horrific tragedies
took the lives of three students in Santa Clarita,
California, four people in Fresno, California, and
three people outside of a Walmart in Duncan,
Oklahoma. My heart is with the families of each and
every victim. The senseless violence has got to stop
and serious gun law must be passed now. Thursday,
November 28 marks Albanian independence day and we
are just getting about a devastating 6.4 magnitude
earthquake that has hit Albania. I am keeping those
affected in my prayers and standing with those who
have family in Albania. I want to tell Council
Member Gjonaj I am sending my thoughts to him and his
community. Last week New York also lost Al Smith IV.
As <i>Politico</i> wisely pointed out, "For Al Smith IV
laughter was the best politics. He truly understood
the power of a solid mocking to make sure we all
don't take ourselves too seriously." It's easy to
forget that in a politically divisive time we
sometimes all need to take a step back and have a
little humor. That's what happens at the annual Al
Smith dinner, where he served as Grand Marshall, and

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New York will miss him. We lost another important New Yorker this week. Marian Saviola, a champion for disability rights died on November 23. Among her many honors she was an inaugural inductee at the New York State Disability Rights Hall of Fame. helped expand access to healthcare for people with disabilities and is remembered for her compassionate, razor-sharp intelligence and wit, and I got to work with her when I chaired the Health Committee. was an amazing, amazing woman. I'd also like to note that this money is Internal Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Month. It is a really devastating form of cancer and our hearts are with anyone who is struggling with this terrible disease. And last, but not least, a happy Thanksgiving to all who will be celebrating. Thanksgiving is a time not just to only give thanks but to give back, and I encourage everyone to do what they can to make someone else's Thanksgiving as warm as possible. Now, let's dive into the legislative agenda. We will be voting on the following land use item: 6003 Eighth Avenue rezoning in Council Member Carlos Menchaca's district, a zoning map amendment to bring an existing three-story commercial building into conformance.

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Out of the Finance Committee, the council will vote on eight Article 11 property tax exemption and they will be in Council Member Ayala, Perkins, Cabrera, and Salamanca's districts. Collectively these exemptions will preserve the affordability of just over 1000 units of housing. Moving on, the council will be voting on the following pieces of legislation. First, we'll have a piece out of the Housing and Buildings Committee by our Housing and Buildings Committee chair, Council Member Robert Introduction number 1661-A would require Cornegy. permit holders to make information about site safety training requirements available to each worker during site safety orientations and periodic site safety refreshers. This information would need to be available in each of the designated citywide languages, and any other languages required by the Department of Buildings. This bill would also contains a technical amendment to Introduction number 720, which the council passed recently, and I want to Austin Branford from the staff for his work on this bill. Next, the council will be voting on a bill to ban the sale of flavored e-cigarettes. I am very proud that we're voting on this. We have seen a

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significant amount of reluctance on the part of the Whitehouse and the FDA to create a ban on these flavors and the governor's executive order is currently being challenged in court. New York cannot and will not wait. And Introduction 1362-A, sponsored by our Health Committee chair, Mark Levine, would ban the sale of flavored e-cigarettes and flavored e-liquids in New York City, including mint, menthol, and wintergreen e-cigarettes and e-liquids. The legislation would also create a presumption that an electronic cigarette retail dealer in possession of six or more flavored e-cigarettes or more than 12 fluid ounces of e-liquids has the intent to sell or offer for sale. This bill would also require the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to conduct a public information and awareness campaign to educate the public regarding the availability of smoking cessation services, and this ban would go into effect on the day of the month next succeeding the 180th day after it becomes law. And I want to congratulate Council Member Levine, who has done an incredible job working on this issue for over a year, understanding the significant consequences that children in New York City face by being marketed to and eventually

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addicted to e-cigarettes and to vaping. grateful for his leadership. Today is a big day for him and for New York City, and I want to congratulate. I want to thank the staff, Zemanuel Halu, Sarah Liss, and Emily Balkin, for working on this incredibly important bill. And, Madam Majority Leader, I want to mention that if Council Member Levine wants extended to speak on this bill I'm happy at the end of speaker time to give him time out of my clock so that he can speak without the two minutes on Next, finally the council will be voting on a him. package of legislation that cracks down on placard abuse throughout our city. We've talked a lot about how to fix our streets lately, but even good design doesn't work if people simple don't follow the law. Neighborhoods across the city are plagued with cars that park with impunity, blocking sidewalks and bike lines, in front of hydrants, double parking. are abusing their city-issued placard. Others try to get away with it by putting a vest or a notebook with the city logo on their dashboard, hoping the traffic agents look the other way. Placard abuse is corruption and no driver has the right to take away space from pedestrians, cyclists, and bus riders.

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2 We've tolerated it for years as one of those 3 unchangeable facts of life in New York City. But we 4 hope with this package of bills those days are over. First, Introduction number 942-A, sponsored by 5 Council Member Peter Koo, would require the city to 6 7 develop a comprehensive citywide plan for the 8 distribution and use of city-issued parking permits. Next, Introduction number 932-A, sponsored by Council Member Margaret Chin, would require city-issued 10 11 parking permits to be revoked from individuals who 12 abuse their permits or fail to pay parking tickets. 13 Next, Introduction number 314-A, sponsored by Council Member Ydanis Rodriguez, would require the police 14 15 department to issue periodic reports on the number of summonses in connection with the improper use of 16 17 city-issued parking permits. Next, Introduction 18 1422-A, sponsored by Council Member Keith Powers, 19 would create a standardized application process for 20 city-issued parking permits. We also have a bill 21 that is sponsored by the public advocate. 2.2 Introduction 596-B, by Public Advocate Williams, 2.3 would increase the existing fine for unauthorized or fraudulent city-issued parking permits from \$250 to 24 \$500. And finally, I've sponsored several pieces of

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legislation that get to the root cause of this issue. Council Members Chin and Torres are co-prime sponsors on these first three bills. Introduction 1393-A would require the police department to evaluate at least 50 sites a week for a period of six months for illegal parking. The sites would be selected based on a review of complaints and summonses related to the misuses of parking permits and obstruction of a bicycle lane, bus lane, sidewall, crosswalk, or a fire hydrant by a vehicle, as well as traffic crashes and moving violations. NYPD would be required to document their enforcement efforts with photographs and this work would be reviewed by the Department of Investigation as part of a new investigation into the issuance of parking permits and enforcement of parking laws. Next is Introduction 1394-A, which would prohibit official city vehicles from blocking a bike lane, bus lane, crosswalk, sidewalk, fire hydrant, and making it the city's official policy. And Introduction number 1395-A would require 311 to accept complaints and photographs related to illegal parking and the misuse of the parking permits. Currently 311 only offers limited ability to specify the type of illegal parking, does not accept

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yield some time to him.

photographs for any parking complaints, and does not allow you to specify that a vehicle is an official city vehicle. And finally the last bill,

Introduction 927-A would require the police department to create a centralized electronic tracking system for all city-issued parking permits.

The system would record all summonses issued and would allow the police department to verify in real time the validity of those permits. I want to the staff, who worked hard on this package of bills - James Digiovanni, Emily Rooney, Rick Arbelo, and Elliot Lynn, and before I turn it back to you, Madam Majority Leader, if Council Member Levine wants to have extended time to speak on his bill I'm happy to

much, Mr. Speaker, for your leadership on this issue and for ensuring that this bill, 1362, is coming up for a vote today. The slow pace at which this country has responded to the teen vaping epidemic has been an epic failure. We did nothing as these sleek new devices with an intense dose of nicotine started to hit the market, or as shelves started to fill up with every fruity, minty, candyish flavor you can

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think of, flavors that are clearly appealing to kids. We did nothing when Jewel and other companies started to market their products on social media, with stylish young people promoting Jeweling as a cool lifestyle choice. We did nothing when Big Tobacco started to pump billions into the vaping industry. We did nothing when middle schoolers, middle schoolers, started to report that they are refusing to go the bathrooms in their schools because they know they'll be filled with peers who are vaping. As a result of our inaction, today there are five million teens in this country who are now vaping. Ιn New York City, as elsewhere, the estimate is that one in four in high schoolers and one in ten middle schoolers have vaped in the past year. children who now face a potentially lifelong battle against nicotine addiction. This failure has been national, with no more grotesque example than that of the Trump administration, which after grand promises about intervening to contain this epidemic did a complete 180 last week in the face of intense pressure from tobacco industry lobbyists. Well, New York City has not given into that pressure. We are acting to protect our kids by banning the e-cigarette

flavors that have been hooking them for years. Now,
I want to acknowledge that we have listened intently
to adults who have told us that e-cigarettes have
enabled them to quit smoking. And that's in part why
we will continue to allow the sale of vaping devices
and tobacco-flavored liquids. But make no mistake.
We have no higher obligation than protecting the
health of kids. And while only 3% of adults vape, as
I mentioned, fully one in four high schooler and one
in ten middle schoolers are vaping. This is
predominantly a crisis of young people and I am so
proud today we are acting as a city to protect their
health. This legislation is the result of more than
a year of intense work by the brilliant staff of the
council's Health Committee, including Zemanual Hilu,
Sarah Liss, Emily Balkin, Lauren Hunt, and my own
staff, Amy Slattery, Winn Roosevelt, and Iya Kief.
And I want to acknowledge the incredible the
coalition of advocates that pushed for this bill,
activists for public health, advocates for kids, and
I especially want to call out Meredith Berkman and
the incredible moms of PAVE. Thank you to my
colleagues, thirty of you who are cosponsoring this

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bill, and I urge you all to vote in support of thismeasure. Thank you.

SPEAKER JOHNSON: Congratulations, Mark, and with that, Madam Majority Leader, happy

Thanksgiving to you and Prince, and I turn it back to you.

Without strong enforcement measure to hold offenders accountable, this abuse will only continue to weaken trust in our democracy. My

legislation, Intro 932-A, will put a three-strike rule on the books that lead to the immediate and permanent revocation of a placard. I'm proud to join Speaker Johnson, Public Advocate Williams, and Council Member Koo and Power on a package of bill to urge all placard holders to follow the rules by increasing fines, making it easier for constituents to report an instant of abuse, and bringing order to this chaotic system. Of course, we can't do this without the hard work of the council staff. I want to specifically thank Jay Digiovanni, Emily Rooney, Kelly Taylor, and my legislative director, Marion Garra. And I urge my colleagues to vote, support the

construction boom continues, we must take every step
to maximize safety. I'd like to acknowledge the
efforts of the Department of the Buildings,
Department of Buildings, and Commissioner Melanie La
Rocca for her laser focus on improving construction
safety that have been a great partner in this work.

are fleeing such violence and seeking asylum in our
city. We must not allow the Trump administration to
succeed in dehumanizing immigrants out of existence
by making the laughable claim that immigrants fleeing
gender-based violence are not eligible for asylum.
And there's one story that I want to start sharing
with you and we'll talk more about it over the next
few weeks, but Grace, who is an indigenous woman from
a small village in Guatemala came to the United
States seeking protocol from beatings, sexual
assault, and Grace made the long and treacherous
journey from Central America, arriving at the border
in June. She was deeply traumatized, having been
raped and beaten and threatened with death for more

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2	than two decades at the hands of her abusive partner.
3	These are the kind of stories that we're talking
4	about. These are stories that will lift up, ah, that
5	we'll be lifting up as we pass and review this
6	resolution and hoping that becomes a victory, a
7	victory, in our long saga against the federal
8	administration. Thank you so much for your time,
9	colleagues.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you.
