Madam Speaker. My colleagues, please join us.

Those of you who don't know this lady, you've probably been under a rock. This little dynamo here, who leads the advocacy voice for our City's seniors is a very special person in our City, since I've been chairing the Committee on Aging, has become a very special person in my life, and certainly has helped the Council to shape its agenda around how we are handling senior issues and the concerns that we were sharing last year or last June around the cuts in the budget.

And I'm happy to say, Bobbie, that with your input and your leadership, you certainly have made us all look really, really good, because you keep us informed, you take the time to make us worry, and that is priceless. And a proclamation, I think, is the least that we can do for you. And we love you and may God give you many, many more years of this work.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, Maria.

And let me just turn the mic over to the Chair of our subcommittee on Senior Centers, Melissa Mark-Viverito.

COUNCIL MEMBER MARK-VIVERITO:

Thank you, Christine, and Maria. And I think
Maria has mentioned a lot with regard to the
importance that Bobbie Sackman has played in the
Senior Advocacy community. And it's a real true
partnership that we've been able to establish and
I feel that I've been able to establish on the
Committee with Bobbie and all of those that
advocate on behalf of quality of life for our
seniors and services. And as mentioned, due to
that advocacy, which really is grass roots, you
know, it really helps keep us as a Council in tune

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with the needs of our elderly, and this City—to be
able to age in place with dignity and to be sure
that we didn't have a severe cut in services for
our elders in last year's budget; and moving
forward will continue to help us shape in what
direction services are aligned in this City.

So this is just a reflection of the years of service. It's again a very small token of appreciation. But we look forward, and I personally look forward to continuing to work very closely with you and your organization and all the advocates to really make sure that we do justice to those that have given so much to us in the City of New York.

SPEAKER QUINN: And Bobbie, I think you will accept what I'm going to say next in the spirit I mean it. You are a big pain in the neck and other places lower on the body. And that does deserve a round of applause.

SPEAKER QUINN: And I mean that with the greatest level of appreciation and thanks. And you are tenacious and hardworking and occasionally we pray you would take more vacation,

especially around budget time, but for the good of the seniors, that prayer is never answered. So thank you for everything you have done for our City for such a long time. And thank you also for being one of the earliest, but always loudest, voices for LGBT seniors in the City of New York. You really raised that cry before really very few other people had done it, and it's made a big difference—reminding us that one group is good, but never enough. So thank you. years of outstanding service to the of New York

City. Bobbie Sackman has been the Director of

Public Policy with Council of Senior Centers and

Services of New York City since 1989. Prior to

Ms. Sackman's arrival at CSCS, she spent ten years

delivering direct services to the elderly and also

served as a Legislative Analyst in the New York

City Office of Management and Budget; and whereas

at CSCS, Ms. Sackman has provided a strong voice

for older New Yorkers, advocating for and winning

millions of City, State and federal dollars for
services for seniors, both in new funds as well as
the restoration of budget cuts, she has also
shared her expertise with others to empower
seniors and service providers to engage elected
officials directly; and whereas, over the course
of her 20 year tenure, Ms. Sackman has created a
lengthy legacy of achievements, she coordinated
the CSCS Senior Center Study, the largest study of
its kind nationally with responses from over 3,600
seniors in three languages, in addition to
coverage in national and local media, she writes
The Power Of Aging blog on CSCS website and she
has authored or edited numerous public policy
papers including No Time To Wait: The Case for
Long Term Care Reform, in 2009 and Hunger Hurts: A
Study of Hunger Among Elderly in New York City, in
2007; and whereas in 1996 Ms. Sackman co-founded
Pride Senior Network, an organization advocating
on behalf of LGBT Seniors, serving as its
president and as an editor of The Networker, the
first national newspaper covering LGBT issues, she
was also a contributing editor to Outing Age, the
first publication on aging from the National Gay

2	and Lesbian Taskforce, and initiated and co-edited
3	the organizations first paper on elder care
4	giving; and whereas Ms. Sackman has truly
5	distinguished herself in this work and she is
6	worthy of the esteem of all New Yorkers, now

9	on the occasion of her $20^{ m th}$ anniversary as the

PASTER DAVID WRIGHT: Father God we come, before we ask you for anything, we want to thank you for life, health and strength. We thank you for allowing us to come together one more time in your name, and we ask that you give us guidance and lead us in the right direction. We ask for wisdom to make the right choices and the right decisions, in the name of our god and our father, and we all say Amen.

SPEAKER QUINN: And if I could just ask my colleagues to remain standing for a moment. Just before we move on with the rest of the day's Stated, I wanted us to stand for a moment and remember the four police officers—not members of the New York Police Department—but the four police officers who were shot and killed at 8:15 Sunday morning in Lakewood in Washington State. Two officers, as I think you've seen from the press reports, the four officers were sitting at a table at a diner working on their laptops preparing to go out to work. Two officers were shot and killed immediately, another attempted to go after the

gunman and shot him before he was shot; the fourth
officer struggled to the parking lot to fire a few
more rounds before collapsing. The officers
worked on a patrol team for the Police Department
of Lakewood, Washington, a suburb of 58,000
people. The force was formed in 2004 after the
city took over law enforcement for the Sheriff's
office, it has almost 100 officers. The officers
who were killed were Sergeant Mark Renninger,
Sergeant Renninger was 39 years old, he had 13
years of law enforcement experience and is
survived by a wife and three children; Ronald
Owens, who was 37, had 12 years of law enforcement
experience, he is survived by a daughter and an
ex-wife; Tina Griswold, she was 40 years old, had
14 years of law enforcement experience, she is
survived by her husband and two children; Greg
Richards, who was 42, had eight years of law
enforcement experience, and he is survived by his
wife and three children. And although they are
not members of the New York Police Department,
this was obviously a horrible attack that resulted
in the loss of four experienced police officers
and I just wanted to add them to our thoughts and

4	exposed to one million words in the vocabulary.
5	So, I hope that we're going to be working together
6	with the great leadership that we have here, and
7	with Speaker Christine Quinn and the Manhattan

9	the type of person when I can agree with something
10	I will say, yes, I will. If I cannot I will say
11	no, I cannot. And if we try together, I will put

5 Brad Lander. I think they are both in the back of

6 the chamber, so welcome.

SPEAKER QUINN: Council Member Ulrich seems to have returned in one piece from his honeymoon, so I hope it was a good break and congratulations again. And today we are voting on a couple of different important pieces of legislation. The first one is Intro 935-A, it's out of the Environmental Protection Committee, sponsored by the Chair of our Committee, Jim Gennaro. I want to than Samara Swanston, Siobhan Watson and Jeff Haberman for their work on this piece of legislation. And this bill quite literally makes sure that the water we drink is separated from water we shouldn't be drinking, and that when there are properties that have both residential water supplies in the building as well as commercial water supplies, that there are clear rules, regulations and reporting in place to make sure that the devices that are necessary to make

sure that the used commercial waters do not backflow into the residential drinking water supplies in this building. It's a little technical, it's a little icky, but very important piece of legislation in making sure that our water supply and our drinking supply stays sound. This is an issue that Chairperson Gennaro has been working on literally his entire career. So whether it's a huge issue like preventing drilling in the watershed or something technical like this, like honing in on our plumbing code, we are very lucky to have a Chair who is so diligent. So let me call on Chairperson Jim Gennaro.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARRO: Thank
you, Madam Speaker. And yes, I certainly join you
in thanking the staff that worked very hard on
this, Jeff and Samara and Siobhan. And very
important that we do this, because if we don't do
this then as you said, Madam Speaker, we could
have contaminants from buildings go into the water
supply. Those of you that may be scratching their
heads, this is due to the fact that when you have
sometimes within a building sometimes the water
pressure can be greater than the feed line coming

in, so it is possible for water that's been used
to sort of flow into the system. We certainly
don't want that to happen.

Some may recollect an event that happened a couple years ago in Council Member Comrie's district with a carwash where it did backflow into the water supply and it was quite a situation. We certainly want to prevent that. This bill will get us there. I'd like to thank Leroy for his support of the bill, too; he's the number two on the bill; and all the other sponsors on the bill. And thank you, Madam Speaker, for your leadership in getting this done and getting this done now, getting a bill that we could all support. I'd like to thank the Bloomberg Administration for working with us in a very cooperative way to get us to this good day. Thank you Madam Speaker.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you, Jim. We are also voting today out of the Housing and Buildings Committee on Intro 138-A. I want to thank Chairperson Dilan and Peter Vallone, Jr., the sponsor of the bill. This is a bill that will require a change in security gates in the City of

New York. A lot of staff have worked on this for
a long time, so I have a long list of people to
start off by thanking. Samara Swanston, Rob
Calandra, Will Hangach, Siobhan Watson, Baaba
Halm, Ben Goodman, Jeff Haberman, Alix Pustilnik,
as well as Council Member Vallone's legislative
staff. This is a piece of legislation that will
require that over the next few years, as building
owners replace security gates, those hard security
gates that you cannot see through will have to be
instead replaced by see-through security gates.
Why are we making this change? Because anybody
who has walked around the City of New York knows
that in many places those hard, non-see-through
security gates often get covered with graffiti and
become a very problematic neighborhood eyesore, a
real quality of life program that can often lead
to other problems in a neighborhood.
The see-through gates are much less

The see-through gates are much less appealing to people who are putting up graffiti.

They have not had that same level of problem, and we believe by changing and requiring all future security gates to be see through gates, we will reduce the amount of graffiti in our neighborhoods

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and leave a living legacy of making the City of
New York a more beautiful place that suffers from
less graffiti. I want to again thank the Chair of
the Committee for his work, Chairperson Dilan. I
really want to thank the sponsor of the bill,
Peter Vallone, who has worked on this legislation
to find the right balance between his crusade
against graffiti, with the needs of small business
people. I think we have found that balance. And
this is another example of Council Member Vallone
working hard to rid our City of graffiti. Let me
start again with Chairperson Erik Dilan and then
the sponsor of the bill, Council Member Vallone.

always seems to find my favorite word, and that's balance. And I think we managed to do this without having a negative impact on small businesses, which was what my major concerns were at the beginning. And I think that with the discussion that we had in caucus a few weeks ago, a lot of members had input and made this a better bill so that it wouldn't have the negative impacts on small business that I initially feared.

To Council Member Vallone, I know

you've been waiting for this day a very long time,
and I'm truly proud of you and proud of the final
product that we are about to pass here today. And
I'll end my comments there because I know Peter
will get into a lot of what this bill really,
really does for him. But my concern was to play
devil's advocate with Peter a little bit and think
about the small businesses, while also being
concerned about graffiti. And I think this bill
does both. Thank you very much, Madam Speaker.
COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: Thank you
Mr. Devils' Advocate Chair. It's been a pleasure
to work with you and the Speaker on this. Because
of your input we have a bill here that is more
effective, I believe, more targeted and easier for
small businesses to comply with, so thank you
both. I'd also like to thank my legislative
director, Jonathan Chung [phonetic], who has
spoken to everybody on your list. Yeah, let's
hear it for Jonathan.

COUNCIL MEMBER VALLONE: He's spoken to everybody on your list, Madam Speaker, including Rob Newman probably every day for three

or four years now. Today the City Council again
leads the way when it comes to graffiti and safe
streets. I don't know of another major city our
country anywhere that's taken this action. But
now you can rest assured that many will. No
longer will our streets look like graffiti-strewn
war zones after closing time. This bill will make
our Police and Fire Fighters safer when they show
up and respond to an alarm. This will make our
streets safer by eliminating over half of the
graffiti and make our City even more beautiful and
really affect the cityscape. This bill is
supported by Police and Fire, by business
districts, by our businesses, by the people of
this City. You know, we pass many bills here at
the City Council, but not too many where we will
actually make a significant difference in the
Cityscape that we view every day.

You know when we are walking down the street eight years from now when we're all out of office except Ydanis, and we're walking down the street with our child or our grandchild, and they point to one of these disgusting gates and say what is that thing; we'll be able to say to

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them, our City was filled with that until we at
the New York City Council did something about it.
So again, I want to thank you all for your help
and look forward to a vote.

SPEAKER QUINN: Thank you very much, Council Member Vallone. Lastly we're voting today on the final piece of legislation in the packet of bills we introduced on the tragic Deutsche Bank fire. Let me start by thanking the staff who worked on this, Baaba Halm, Ben Goodman, Jeff Haberman and Rob Newman. I also want to thank the Mayor's Office, in particular Deputy Mayor Ed Skyler and his staff. These dozen bills that we introduced were really a packet of legislation where the Council and the Bloomberg Administration worked hand-in-hand. We did this work together after the Deutsche Bank fire to make sure that we did everything we possibly could in the memories of Fire Fighters Robert Beddia and Joseph Graffagnino, did everything we could in their memory, to try to prevent such a tragedy from happening again and to make it more likely that if there ever is a fire of the type at Deutsche Bank again, that the men and women who

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rush into that building to try to save lives and property have the greatest likelihood possible of going home to their family.

The bill we are voting on today will change the construct in the City of New York around demolition and asbestos abatement. Prior to this law, you were allowed on a regular basis to conduct major demolition while you were at the same time abating asbestos. Now think of it, when you do asbestos abatement, one of the main things you do is put plastic sheeting around to try to contain the asbestos that you are abating. When you are demolishing a building, you are using high temperature tools and other things to demolish the building. Those actions of demolition, those actions of using torches and high temperature tools right next door to plastics and abatement, it is a recipe for fire and disaster. Now in the City of New York the assumed posture will be you cannot do demolition and asbestos abatement at the same time. The only way you'll be allowed to do it is if you're granted permission by the Department of Environmental Protection, the Department of Buildings and the Fire Department.

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By doing this, we greatly reduce the likelihood of a demolition—building that is being demolished going up in flames because there was also asbestos abatement going on at the same time.

I want to thank everyone who has worked on this entire package, which in addition to the staff is a long list of members. This bill we're voting on today comes out of our Environmental Protection Committee. I want to thank Chairperson Jim Gennaro and the sponsor of the bill, Alan Gerson. I also want to thank Chairperson Dilan. Many of the bills also came out of the Buildings Committee. But these are 12 bills we should all be incredibly, incredibly proud of, and this one in particular, which I believe will prevent many a tragedy in the future. Let me first call on Chairperson Gennaro and then Council Member Gerson.

COUNCIL MEMBER GENNARO: Thank you,
Madam Speaker. Thank you for your leadership not
only with this bill but the whole package. I was
proud to play a small role in getting this passed.
Certainly it is critical that we do this in the
memory of those firefighters that lost their lives

increase their skills during this period. This
kind of devastating cut will hurt CUNY students
who are already struggling. They are proposing
cuts in TAP and other kinds of CUNY programs. So
I'm asking you all to support this resolution
calling on the governor to increase the PIT
surcharge of the richest in this state so much so
that we can take care of that \$3.2 billion

2	deficit. And they do have a rainy day fund in the
3	State, they also have a reserve tax fund in the
4	State that can easily balance this budget without
5	taking it out on SUNY and CUNY. Because what's
6	going to happen, there will be a raise in the
7	tuition of \$90 at the senior colleges and \$60 and
8	the community colleges. We can ill afford another
9	raise in a state that has a \$130 billion budget,

Now we have all items on today's General Order Calendar were adopted by a vote of 45 in the affirmative, 0 in the negative with one abstention, and revised Land Use Call-Ups were adopted by a vote of 46 in the affirmatives with 0 in the negative. I will now call on Council Member Mealy for general discussion.

COUNCIL MEMBER MEALY: I want to just say I hope all my colleagues had a great Thanksgiving, and I want to thank our Speaker also for being her. And I just want all of us to know on December 7th we have to remember our Pearl Harbor-our soldiers that we lost.
