22	occasion, in this privilege to be able to pray for
23	our City Council, in the times of trouble, trials,
24	and turmoil that has faced and plagued our country,
25	our nation, and our city, through it all I pray that
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you give strength, clarity of mind, clarity of site, 2 3 for we are in year 2020, that we be able the see clearer, hear clearer, think clearer, understand 4 better, through prejudicialness and hatred and 5 bigotry and strange cares and non-caring issues in 6 7 our society, that this council will be balanced to 8 understand that they are assigned, they are called, 9 they are voted in to keep the city in a balanced situation. God, we pray that you have your way in 10 11 their lives. Give them peace, serenity, and power in 12 times like these. In the name I know, Jesus' name, 13 amen.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much, Reverend Hamatheite. I'd now like to ask Council Member Espinal to spread the invocation on the record.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER ESPINAL: Thank you, Madam Majority Leader. I just want to note that the 19 20 Reverend is actually one of God's chosen people as he 21 was born in Brooklyn, New York, where he's been all his life. He studied at Long Island University and 2.2 23 received his master's degree from Fordham University in 2017. As an advocate for change and awareness, 24 Reverend Hamatheite's concern for the community is 25

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evident, especially in his work with the youth in 2 3 Brooklyn. After working in the department of 4 education for several years and seeing the need of young people, Reverend developed a program entitled 5 Move, M-O-V-E, Men of Valor Empowered, to teach and 6 7 mentor young men in the community. Since arriving at 8 Wayside Baptist Church in 2010, the pastor 9 established the Wayside Baptist Church Bible Institute and is honored to sit on the leadership 10 11 council for Habitats for Humanity as well as a board member for the Conference of National Black Churches. 12 13 Thank you, Madam Majority Leader. I would like to 14 thank the pastor for being here today and for all the 15 work you do for your congregants and our community in 16 District 37, and I make a motion that this invocation 17 be spread in full upon the record. 18 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so 19 much, Council Member Espinal, and Council Member 20 Alicka Ampry-Samuel would also like to join in with 21 you in spreading with the invocation. 2.2 COUNCIL MEMBER AMPRY-SAMUEL: Of course I 23 have to say a little something about my pastor,

Pastor Hamatheite, who has been a spiritual leader

and advisor and everything else in my life for many

4	Avenue, it is my home and the home of my family, and
5	so I just want to thank you for everything you've
6	done for me and the community and the city at large,
7	and so I just wanted to lend my voice and emotion
8	today. Thank you so much.

COUNCIL CLERK: None. 13 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you. 14 We 15 will now have communication from Speaker Corey 16 Johnson. 17 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you, Madam 18 Majority Leader, good afternoon, Happy New Year to 19 everyone for this charter meeting of the City 20 Council, our first Stated Meeting of the year. Last 21 week marked the beginning of my third year as Speaker of the City Council and I am proud of what we have 2.2 23 accomplished together and what we have done to make the lives of every New Yorker better. We still have 24 25 a tremendous amount of work ahead of us, but together

2 we'll keep fighting to make sure that our city works 3 for everyone. Sadly, we started off this year, our 4 city started off this year, our state started off this year by facing a rash of anti-Semitic attacks 5 across this city and state. These intolerable acts 6 7 are an attack against our values and everything we hold dear. This past Sunday I joined many of and 8 9 many other leaders and tens of thousands of New Yorkers in a march of solidarity with the Jewish 10 11 community and Jewish New Yorkers, and we marched 12 across the Brooklyn Bridge. We must never be silent 13 when it comes to anti-Semitic attacks or behavior. 14 And I as well as members of this body remain united 15 with our Jewish sisters and brothers and condemn 16 these unacceptable acts of hate. We will not and 17 cannot continue to let them happen. I also want to 18 take a few moments to acknowledge a few losses that 19 our city has faced recently. The FDNY is mourning a 20 Their chief historian, Jonathan Jack great loss. 21 Lurch, recently passed away at 88 years old on 2.2 December 17. He was the department historian for 23 more than 50 years and knew more about the history of New York's bravest than almost anyone. My prayers 24 25 are with the family of Jack and the women and men of

2 the fire department. During each Stated we 3 acknowledge the lives of those who have died from 9/11-related illnesses. The NYPD lost Sergent Scott 4 5 Johnston to 9/11-related melanoma on December 19. Sergent Johnston was an active sergeant and he served 6 7 the department for over 20 years. He was only 50 years old. The New York State Police also lost a 8 9 member of their department. Investigator Ryan Fortini died of 9/11-related cancer on New Year's 10 11 Day. He was 42 years old. My prayers are with the families of Sergent Johnston and Investigator 12 13 Fortini, and both the NYPD, the FDNY, and New York 14 State Police. Please stand for a moment of silence 15 as we remember Chief Historian Lurch, Sergent Scott 16 Johnston, and Investigator Ryan Fortini.

17 SERGEANT AT ARMS: All rise. [moment of 18 silence]

19 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you. The council 20 is also sadly losing a vital member of our team this week. Julie Kim, the executive director of the 21 council's Women Caucus, Women's Caucus, is leaving us 2.2 23 to become the Queensborough director for the US Census, which is such an important position. So even 24 though we are losing her, she is doing something 25

incredibly vital and important for our great city. 2 3 Julie became the caucus's first executive director in 2018 and has done amazing, amazing work in her role, 4 working with the cochairs of the Women's Caucus, 5 Carlina Rivera and Margaret Chin, to help lead our 6 7 city on gender equity. We will miss you, Julie, and 8 we wish you best in all your endeavors, and I want to 9 give her a big round of applause, where is she? Is Julie here? [applause] Thank you, Julie. And over 10 11 the past few days we have watched the island of Puerto Rico suffered a devastating earthquake and 12 13 damaging aftershocks. Recovery will be difficult and 14 as with Hurricane Maria we as a city need to make 15 sure that Puerto Rico gets the federal resources 16 needed to make repairs. I know that Council Member 17 Salamanca and other members yesterday sent a letter 18 to the mayor asking that our city help the island at 19 this difficult time and the island remains in an 20 official state of emergency, and our thoughts are with our brothers and sisters in New York's sixth 21 2.2 borough. So Happy New Year. Thank you, Madam 23 Majority Leader. And I look forward to working with you all in this year of 2020. Thank you very much. 24

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: All items on 6 7 today's general order calendar are adopted by a vote of 39 in the affirmative, zero negative, and zero 8 9 abstentions. Introduction and reading of bills. SPEAKER JOHNSON: All bills are referred 10 11 to committee as indicated on the agenda. 12 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you, 13 Speaker Johnson. Thank you. There aren't any 14 resolutions on today's calender, so we will now move 15 into general discussion. And we will begin with 16 Council Member Yeger. 17 COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you, Madam 18 President. I rise first to thank Mr. Speaker for his 19 words earlier. Over the last several days he has in 20 very real ways reached out to Jewish community 21 leadership in the city to try to find pathways forward for the necessary security measures that have 2.2 23 unfortunately become abundantly clear are needed in the Jewish communities in New York. I appreciate the 24 thousands of New Yorkers and those who came from 25

elsewhere to stand tall this Sunday against anti-2 3 Semitism. I also think how we got to here should be 4 discussed. For far too long too many who hold public office and those who portend themselves to be members 5 of the media have tinkered at the fringes of anti-6 7 Semitism. You market an us versus them message 8 against Orthodox Jews. You did this. When you 9 deliberately paint a portrait of Orthodox Jews as backwards members of society who don't vote how you 10 11 like, don't do what you want, don't educate our 12 children how you wish, you did this. Those who took 13 the time over Hanukah to show up near a menorah but play divide-and-conquer politics with the lives of 14 15 Orthodox Jews, you did this. When an unprecedented 16 verbal pogrom was unleashed in this chamber earlier 17 this year for no purpose other than dividing New 18 Yorkers and checking a box for your anti-Semitic 19 friends, you did this. Those who spent Sunday posing 20 for pictures with Jews, but spend the other 364 days 21 of the year festering hate against my community, you 2.2 did this. When you hold signs that claim you stand 23 with Hasidic Jews, but then you go stand with anti-Semites, you did this. I won't be silent about who's 24 25 responsible. The notion that a lack of tolerance is

2	at issue, as if Orthodox Jews are so heinous that our
3	presence in society is something to be tolerated is
4	grotesques. We have the right to live in our city
5	like anyone else. We have the right to go about our
6	day without being assaulted. We're not doing this to
7	anyone. You're doing this to us. You attack our
8	yeshivas regularly, repeatedly, with hatred. But
9	whenever has anyone seen a group of yeshiva students
10	run down a street and smack someone in the head? Why
11	is that never discussed? How we raise our children
12	to be honorable, intellectual, decent members of
13	society, how we are kind to one another

14 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Madam Majority Leader, 15 Council Member Yeger, Madam Majority Leader, I want 16 to allow Council Member Yeger to have time to finish 17 his remarks.

18 COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you, Mr. 19 Speaker. It's almost timed exactly. I appreciate it. You paint us all with a scarlet letter of 20 21 derision. You did this to us. Those of you who did this know who you are and you've done its, and it's 2.2 23 your responsibility to stop it, and I'm asking you all not just to show up one day a year and take a 24 couple of pictures, but do this for the other 364 25

2	days that you stand up and you hurt our community
3	with your words, with your acts, with divide-and-
4	conquer politics, with the things that are not
5	necessary in this city just because you don't like
6	how think or you don't like how we dress or you don't
7	like how we educate our children. Leave us alone and
8	let us be part of this city without you festering
9	hate on us. Thank you very much, Madam President.
10	Mr. Speaker, thank you very much for your indulgence.
11	I appreciate.
12	MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Council Member
13	Grodenchik.
14	COUNCIL MEMBER GRODENCHIK: Thank you,
15	Majority Leader Cumbo, and thank you, Mr. Speaker,
16	for your words before. They are well-meant and well
17	received by me and millions of others who live in
18	this city. 116 years ago my grandfather, Max
19	Grodenchik, Mordechai Aaron Ben Issen, left
20	[inaudible] tsarist Russian to find a new way of life
21	here in New York City. His story is not unique.
22	It's shared by millions of New Yorkers and countless
23	millions of people like him and their descendents
24	across our nation. One week from today we will
25	celebrate and remember Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.,
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2 who would have been 91 next week. Dr. King wrote and 3 spoke we must learn to live together as brothers or 4 perish together as fools. I speak today to thank my 5 colleagues in this chamber who are not Jewish especially, who have spoken out recently against the 6 7 torrent of anti-Semitism that has stained our great city in recent weeks and months. Our history as 8 9 human beings is littered with genocide. Armenia, the Holocaust, Rwanda, the Rape of Nanchang, the 10 11 brutality of Stalin, the killing fields of Cambodia, 12 the middle passage of millions of Africans, and the 13 brutality that we visited on Native Americans and 14 other aboriginal peoples around the world. It must 15 stop. And I didn't want to let this session pass without speaking my mind. The Jewish community in 16 17 New York City is not going away. It has been here 18 for over 350 years. It has contributed greatly, not 19 only to the city but to the world at large. The 20 polio vaccine, the internet, half invented by Dr. 21 Robert Kahn from Flushing. For God's sakes we even 2.2 gave you Scarlet Johansson. So I ask today that all 23 people of good will come together, not just today, not just this week, and not just this month, but each 24 and every day to build a better and more just 25

2 society. I thank you for indulging me, Mr. Speaker3 and Madam Majority Leader. Thank you.

4 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you, and I'll just close with, as you said so eloquent, the 5 words of Dr. Martin Luther King, injustice anywhere 6 7 is a threat to justice everywhere, and we must 8 recognize that we have to stand up with each other 9 against all forms of hate, even if leadership favors one over the other. Injustice anywhere is a threat 10 11 to justice everywhere, and we have to unite in order And so I 12 to end hatred all throughout this country. 13 was so glad that our communities have continued to 14 unite. But it's important that we recognize that we 15 cannot tolerate hate speech about any particular 16 group of individuals anywhere in this country. And 17 so I will call on Council Member Steve Levin to close 18 us out.

19 COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you, Madam 20 Majority Leader. First, I want to vote aye on all 21 general order items, as well. But I did want to take 2.2 the opportunity here as well. I represent 23 Williamsburg in Brooklyn, which is a very diverse community. There's Hasidic people, families. There 24 are African American families. There are Latino 25

2 families. And during this recent increase in anti-3 Semitic attacks there was one, there was one report 4 that was in my district and it was at a NYCHA development that is about a third Hasidic, a third 5 Latino, a third African American, and there was a 6 7 report that two children were punched in the 8 elevator. Two Hasidic children were punched. And 9 when I heard that my heart sank, because I thought, you know, this is a development, everybody's lived 10 11 together for a couple of generations at this point, 12 and there's very rarely incidents of violence in 13 these developments, very rarely, and it's almost, you 14 know, a matter of course. You live next door to 15 people that don't look like you. And so my heart 16 sank. A couple days later I heard that that case 17 actually was not, it did not happen. It was a false 18 report. The kids were scared when a bunch of older 19 kids entered the elevator and they, and they said 20 that they were hit, but they actually weren't. And, 21 you know, I was tremendously relieved because that 2.2 comported the reality, the truth, comported with, 23 with the truth that I know of that development, and those developments, which is that when people live 24 together in close quarters and experience this city 25

2 and experience life as neighbors, that is the 3 antidote to hate. The antidote to hate is accepting 4 one another for your differences and in growing up next door to one another. That's, that's the 5 antidote to hate, and so I feel very firmly that 6 7 those of us in this room and the principals and the 8 teachers in our schools and every parent and every 9 civic leader out there in New York City has a responsibility to bring our children together. Bring 10 11 our children together. Let them get to know one 12 another as human beings, and, you know, we are, we're not miracle workers and we can't drive hate out of 13 somebody's heart, particularly an adult who has come 14 15 by that hatred and is unwilling to let it go. But we 16 can and we must make sure that our children don't 17 hate, because it's not just about today. It's about 18 the world that we pass on to our kids and our 19 We have to deal with the hatred out grandkids. 20 there today. But the most important thing that we can do is teach our children to love one another. 21 2.2 Thank you. Thank you, Mr. Speaker. 23 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you. Council Member Treyger, followed by Council Member 24 Koslowitz. 25

2	SPEAKER JOHNSON: Madam Majority Leader,
3	before the council members go I want to ask unanimous
4	consent that Council Members Levin and Cornegy and
5	anyone else who may have come in after we had closed
6	out before, I want to ask unanimous consent that they
7	are able to be marked present today and to vote on
8	the general order calendar. Is there any opposition
9	to that from any members? So with unanimous consent
10	I ask that Council Members Cornegy and Levin be able
11	to vote on the general order calendar.
12	COUNCIL CLERK: Council Member Cornegy.
13	COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: I vote aye on
14	all.
15	COUNCIL CLERK: Council Member Levin.
16	COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Aye on all.
17	SPEAKER JOHNSON: Were there any other
18	members?
19	COUNCIL CLERK: Rodriguez.
20	SPEAKER JOHNSON: Hold on. Let's,
21	Council Member Rodriguez.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER RODRIGUEZ: Yes.
23	SPEAKER JOHNSON: That's everyone?
24	Great. Thank you, Madam Majority Leader.
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2	MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: All items on
3	today's general order calendar are adopted by a vote
4	of 42 in the affirmative, zero negative, and zero
5	abstentions. We will now continue with Council
6	Member Treyger, followed again by Council Member
7	Koslowitz.
8	COUNCIL MEMBER TREYGER: Thank you,
9	Majority Leader. I also just wanted to thank the
10	speaker for his strong words and strong leadership
11	and to my colleagues. I want to note that today I'm
12	introducing Introduction 1847, which will make sure
13	that there is a comprehensive, holistic,
14	individualized response to these violent hate crimes.
15	I'm proud to have Council Members Rivera and Torres
16	as prime co-sponsors. As we've heard, our city must
17	stand united against all forms of hate. All New
18	Yorkers should feel safe. We must all work together
19	to make sure that no one is afraid to live, pray, to
20	be in our city. My bill would make sure that there
21	is an individualized response in a culturally
22	responsive way to violent hate crimes and that the
23	affected community is notified and mobilized within
24	24 to 48 hours after it has been determined that a
25	hate crime has, has been occurred. The rise in hate

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2 crimes is unacceptable. It's chilling and we must 3 look at every resource possible to make sure that we 4 protect New Yorkers. It's imperative that the Rapid 5 Notification and Response Process, which the city uses in its Cure Violence initiative, apply to hate 6 7 crimes, which could have a chilling effect on 8 commuters. Hate crimes require more than just tweets 9 of condemnation and currently there's not enough of a local connection to the response work. Our city must 10 11 do everything possible to fight back against the 12 rising levels of hate. For months I joined with the 13 majority of my colleagues in the City Council to 14 advocate that hate crimes be included in com stat and 15 thankfully NYPD has heeded our call and announced 16 this week that it will be adding hate crimes to com 17 stat. My bill is another way the city could ensure 18 that there is transparency, accountability around 19 hate crimes, and that there is a localized, 20 individualized response to make sure that all 21 communities are welcome and feel safe in our city. 2.2 Thank you, Majority Leader, for your time. 23 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you. Council Member Koslowitz. 24

2 COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: Thank you. In 3 1923, before my time, way before my time, I can't say that too often now, but my grandfather was removed 4 5 from his house in Poland by the Cossacks and taken out because he was Jewish and killed. They're not 6 7 sure if he was shot or he was buried alive, but he 8 was dead. And as I grew up I heard all these 9 stories, and always thinking that this can't happen here. And as I live through the days now and read 10 11 the newspapers, these things are happening here. Ιt 12 is something that we cannot ignore, no matte who you 13 are, what you are, hate is a disease and we must stop 14 the hate that are shown to the people of our city and 15 right now the Jewish people of our city. Let my 16 people, leave my people alone. I am Jewish. I am 17 I am proud to have friends of different proud. 18 faiths, different colors throughout my life. Just 19 leave our people alone. 20 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: I'll call on 21 Speaker Corey Johnson to close this meeting. 2.2 SPEAKER JOHNSON: Thank you for all these 23 I think it's important to have a discussion remarks. about this. The charter meeting of January 8, 2020, 24 25 is hereby adjourned.
