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KEITH POLITE: Testing one, two, one two, today is February 24, 2020. Today's hearing is on Cultural Affairs, Libraries, International Relations, being record by Keith Polite.

CHAIRPERSON VAN BRAMER: Good afternoon, everyone, and welcome to today's hearing, the Committee on Cultural Affairs, Libraries, and International Intergroup Relations is now in session. My name is Jimmy Van Bramer and I'm proud to be chair of this committee. Today our committee will be holding a vote on proposed Introduction 1451-A, sponsored by Council Member Cabrera, a proposed law related to the creation of a task force regarding a museum about New York City's African American civil rights history. Ah, we have heard, ah, a lot about this important piece of legislation in a prior hearing and today I'm really proud that we're holding a vote on it. I know Council Member Cabrera cares a great deal about this issue, this bill, and has done a lot of work on it, so I'd like to ask him to say a few words about this important piece of legislation.

COUNCIL MEMBER CABRERA: And I want to take a moment, Mr. Chair, for your help and leadership, especially in the last hearing, you were

And so to get straight to the bill, the bill would create a task force to consider the establishment of an African American civil rights history museum in New York City. New York City's African American civil rights history is another untold story. New York City was the nexus of civil rights in the north that preceded and helped sparked what is known as the civil rights movements, which largely took place in the south from 1955 through the 1950s, through the 1950s. New York City rights activism was fueled by the great migration of African Americans from the south to large northern cities and whose large presence call attention to segregation and other injustices. The New York City rights agenda and, and address exclusionary housing practices, discrimination and segregation and employment and representation in government. This activism transformed the labor movement in New York to include civil rights. The proposed museum will reveal the activism of African American New Yorkers, which includes Adam Clayton Powell, Ozzie Davis, Paul Robinson, Stan Baker, Motley Julius Archibald, and

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the first African American member of the New York

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Senate, and Bessie Buchanan, first African Americans elected to the assembly, both who won their Brooklyn districts on civil rights platforms in the 1950. I would like to thank committee staff members, Brenda McKinney and Christie Dyer, Dwyer, for their work on this bill. Thank you for the favorable consideration of this legislation. Thank you so much, Mr. Chair.

much, ah, Council Member Cabrera, and
congratulations. I want to recognize all the members
of the committee who are here, which includes the
entire committee, Council Member Francisco Moya,
Council Member Mark Gjonaj, Council Member Joe
Borelli, and Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo. Do you
want to say a few words?

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much, Chair, and I also want to thank Council Member Cabrera for this ground-breaking legislation and just very pleased to speak on this issue, as it is Black History Month. I can think of no other time, ah, to certainly bring this forward and to have the cultural committee here today. But also to really bring attention to the fact that New York City has the

And so it is imperative that we, um, educate our children, but also educate the world 10 about our historical contributions. And if we also 11 look at Washington, D.C. at the National African 12 13 American History and Arts and Cultural Museum there we also see how successful that has been in 14 15 Washington, D.C. and if we only want to look, ah, 16 population served as well as the economics behind 17 that it's certainly prudent for any city to take on 18 an institution of this caliber and scale. But if we 19 look at more deeply the educational and the spiritual 20 upliftment that a museum has the ability to provide 21 people, um, it's imperative that we do this now and 2.2 it's imperative that we bring this forward at this 2.3 particular time. So I thank Council Members Van Bramer as well as Council Member Cabrera for your 24 incredible work on this. And this is really 25

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2	revolutionary and extraordinary, and it's certainly
3	an idea whose time has come. Thank you.

11	Member Cabrera for bringing this very important issue
12	to light and, ah, it will one day make our cultural
13	world in the City of New York more complete, ah,
14	because it is incomplete unless this museum exists.
15	So with that I'll ask Billy Martin to call the roll.
