CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Should I begin?

SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Yes, sir, you're good

CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Okay. Good morning and welcome to today's hearing on the City Council Committee on Transportation. I'm Ydanis Rodriguez the Chair of this committee. Today we will be voting on Proposed Intro 1354-A and it is sponsored by Council Member Holden in relation to requiring certain spillage prevention equipment on concrete mixer trucks. Over the last several years the city and this ...and this Council have made pedestrian and cyclist safety a top priority. In 2014, the city implemented its Vision Zero plan, which has resulted in the decline of more than 25% in the number of traffic fatalities, but we, however, have witnessed the deaths of 29 cyclists. In this year so far, the number have been 7 cyclist fatalities. So, it is clear the City must continue to everything in its power to up with solutions to

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prevent or reduce the number of traffic fatalities involving pedestrians and cyclists. As Chair of this committee, pedestrians and cyclist safety will always be my top priority. While potential danger to cyclists is still the concrete onto the street, and concrete mixer trucks, which can harden and create bumps that leads to crashes. A cost-effective way to prevent this spillage is by requiring concrete mixer trucks to attach a choke cluster to the end of the choke on the truck. This device only costs a few hundred dollars, a small investment for the preventive measure that can reduce the street maintenance costs, and potentially save lives and prevent accidents-crashes. At this time, I would like to call Council Member Holden to make a statement on his bill.

Rodriguez for the opportunity to speak on Intro 1354, which would require, like you said, concrete mixing trucks to operating in New York City to be equipped with chute shutters, or a similar device to prevent the spillage of concrete and materials used in mixed concrete by no later than June 30, 2021. The idea for this legislation came from multiple constituents in

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my district, and my work in civic associations for over three decades I've noticed this problem for a while. I reached out to Transportation, Department of Transportation many times about these concrete mounds on road beds, bike lanes, and even some sidewalks. My staff and I traveled through the district and parts of the city, and noticed so many of these areas, and again, they are a hazard to pedestrians, cyclists and motorists alike. So, Intro 1354 is across neutral legislation, which could actually save the city money because now DOT or Sanitation will not have to clean these mounds, and take up valuable time and resources. They have to jack hammer these mounds many times because they're so deep. So, um, my staff and I, you know, over the last, you know, year and a half or so we're speaking to several industry professionals and trade unions who all agree that this is a big problem, and all agree that it's a simple fix. So, that's why the legislation is going to mandate cement mixers trucks have their chutes capped to prevent spillage of cement, which later hardens, of course, and forms the concrete mounds. You know, I noticed that once I was on the BQE and a truck was going up the Kosciuszko

Bridge. Right in front of me it spilled, and again,
very dangerous, but also it creates ponding in rain
storms. So, I want to thank Speaker Corey Johnson
and hisand his Chief of Staff Jason Goldman who I
hounded for a while but, you know, he came through,
and as well as Jeff Baker and Lori Papa, and also—and
their support for the bill. Also, Chair of the
Transportation Committee, Council Member Ydanis
Rodriguez, and his staff Elliott Lynn, Rick Carbello,
Kevin Katowski for their help, and Alex Washington
for the legislation todayof the Legislation Division
who help draft this bill. And I would also like to
thank DOT Commissioner Polly Trottenberg, and her
staff for working with us on the bill. It's rare that
both the Council and the Administration agree on a
bill so early on, and I was, you know, quite
surprised because it never happens to me, but it
didn't go unnoticed that she liked the bill right
away. So, and finally, I want to thank my staff for
all the hard work on this including we did several
phone calls to constituents and getting city agencies
to remove the cement mounds. So, again, I urge that
all my colleagues vote ave on this bill, and

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thank...thanks all the Council Members who signed on,and supported this bill. Thank you, Chair Rodriguez.

CHAIRPERSON RODRIGUEZ: Thank you, Council Member, and before calling-and calling thethe-for the vote, I'd like to say that-that we were not able to call the hearing on Transportation with all the bills because the MTA refused to come to a hearing that we haven't scheduled, and when DOT agreed to come and MTA refused to come on time to address transportation after the Coronavirus-during and after the Coronavirus. I want to share with my colleagues also that I've been urging the MTA to reopen the train services from midnight to 6:00 in the morning within that, and they said no. Our city is true that we have to clean the transit station, the MTA should establish what is it that that's the timeline on how long the train will be closed so that they do an assessment, and then they can do a-they can know when will they plan to open. So, now, I'm sure that we do, and also to address, to share with you, too, that we will continue working to call a hearing together with MTA and DOT. The other things I want to share with the members of this committee is that, as you know, after the state filed a rule to
