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SERGEANT-AT-ARMS: Sergeant Martinez, you may begin with the opening statement.

SERGEANT MARTINEZ: Good morning, and welcome to today's New York City Council vote of the Committee on Consumer Affairs and Business Licensing. Participants, please place your—please turn on your video. To minimize disruption, please place your electron devices to silence or vibrate. We are ready to begin. (pause)

CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Well, that's my cue.

(laughs) Good morning everybody. My name is Andrew

Cohen, and I'm the Chair of the Committee on Consumer

Affairs and Business Licensing. Today, we will

voting on Proposed Introduction Bill Number 1957-A

sponsored by Council Member Reynoso in relation to

temporary space for outdoor dining. I will now turn

it over to Council Member Reynoso for an opening

statement.

COUNCIL MEMBER REYNOSO: Thank you, Chair Cohen. I want to start off with a story, I guess. This in over the last three days on a street in Manhattan, we had over eight businesses that have opened up, and haver rehired over 300 employees. It is the type of conversations we want to be having

We've-the COVID crises has taught us a lot or how little we were prepared, but what it did it also put the entire city on pause including small businesses that are still going to have to deal with the issues of rents to be able to stay afloat. Current quidelines do not allow for significant capacity or any capacity to have in-door dining in our restaurants. Even when we expand capacity, we're talking about 25% at best, and with that many people coming into a restaurant they still won't be able to make the amount-a sufficient amount of money to be able to stay afloat in our city. Our restaurants have suffered enough. What we're doing today is codifying into law and opportunity for open dining to happen or outdoor dinging to happen in the City of New York. We've seen it so far for three days. For the most part it has been wildly successful. We are going to go through growing pains as a city while the outdoor dining happens. Everyone is learning on the fly, but we need to give our businesses the benefit of the doubt. We need to give them opportunity to learn, and we need to be one united New York City in ensuring that everyone can come out of this on top. So, I want to thank everyone for their support for

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COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND BUSINESS LICENSING the outdoor dining bill. I'm looking forward to its continued success, and I'm actually looking for the Department of Transportation to look at this longterm, and then whether or not it's something that we can give to our local businesses on a-on a yearly basis. I also want to talk about equity. We have huge issues with sidewalk cafes happening in predominantly white and affluent neighborhoods. The cost of the fee, the architecture the lobbyists that you would need to get a sidewalk café sometime is extremely onerous for businesses in neighborhoods where the profit margins are very thin. This, um, what we're seeing today is going to allow for people in the South Bronx and Central Brooklyn, the Lower East Side and the Upper East Side, and in Coney Island, they're all going to have an opportunity to do this with no fee, and I thought that that was extremely important we wanted to make sure we did so we can build equity into what we're seeing give the amount of—the effect that this Coronavirus has had on mostly black and black and brown neighborhoods. again, I want to thank Chair Cohen for giving me the opportunity to speak here, and encouraging all my colleagues to please vote aye. Thank you.

about and the city I think is a very noble cause that

thank Council Member Reynoso. I already see restaurants in my district and other districts utilizing the public space, but I also wanted to remind us that we've got to continue to support our street vendors, and make sure they also get equal opportunity on this, and I vote aye. Thank you.

CLERK: Koo.

COMMITTEE ON CONSUMER AFFAIRS AND BUSINESS LICENSING 1 2 COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: Hi. Mr. Chair, can I 3 explain my vote? 4 CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Of course. 5 COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: Yes. So, this bill is a good one, but like they-they say there's one-6 size fits all program. New York City is a big city. 7 8 I think there are certain areas that outdoor dining on the sidewalks are not good especially in transit hubs, the streets they have a lot of vendors and the 10 11 streets have a lot of bus stops, a lot of air 12 pollutions. So, I would support the bill with being 13 mindful that DOT when they give permissions, make 14 sure they don't give permissions to (bell) on 15 restaurants that they want to operate on side streets 16 that are already too narrow or too congested with 17 pedestrians or with-with too many buses outside. So, 18 um, if they can do that, I would support the bill. 19 Thank you. 20 CLERK: Koslowitz? 21 COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: I vote aye 2.2 CLERK: Lander. 2.3 COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: Request permission to explain my vote. 24

CHAIRPERSON COHEN:

oh, of course.

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COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: (laughs)

COUNCIL MEMBER LANDER: I vote ave, and I'm enthusiastic about this bill and I've already eaten out in the streets a couple of times. So, I'm grateful to Council Member Reynoso, and certainly I share his point of view on equity. I do want to talk about one other kind of equity (bell) which is for the workers in these businesses because it remains true that, you know, one thing we're doing today is giving street space over to companies like Chipotle and McDonald's who can take advantage of the street space just like every other business, and they still have the right to fire their workers with no cause at all, with no notice, with no reason, and we've seen that happen at Chipotle a few times already, and in addition, these restaurants are going to continue to be doing delivery business as they should, but their delivery workers from Door Dash or Instant Card continue not even to have basic paid sick leave, and I've been pushing as some of you know for this Council to pass an Essential Workers Bill of Rights (bell) that would make sure those restaurant delivery workers that they stay and fast food restaurant

workers and other essential workers are protected from unfair firing so they can speak up when they don't have the PPE or other safety conditions, and it's a big disappointment that this Council has not yet taken the Essential Worker Bill of Rights, and, you know, I'm going to vote for this because it's a good bill, but giving street space to restaurants and small businesses while not asking them, by not insisting that they do right by workers when we have very simple ways to do so, is disappointing. So, I hope my colleagues will join the effort to correct that wrong. We could do it.

CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Yes You know, we had a great hearing. Those are straight bills. Of course, there's pushback, businesses, bosses like to be able to fire people without any reason, and if on one is going to make them give paid sick leave to their delivery workers, they're not going to do it, but we could do it, and I hope you are making sure we get it done. With that, I'm really excited to be out on the streets every night I possibly can, and I vote aye on this bill.
