COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: What about me?

2	CHAIRPERSON COHEN: And Koslowitz
3	which But if I didn't write it down, it means you
4	are not here. So, sorry about that, Karen. Now you

6	Koslowitz. Today, we will be voting on a pre-
7	considered bill from Council member Reynoso that
8	seeks to codify permitted outdoor dining you didn't
9	sure that there is clarity regarding the use of
10	heaters. New York City's restaurants struggle with
11	the very slim profit margins at the best of times.
12	With ongoing restrictions in place due to the COVID
13	pandemic, these margins are even smaller and some
14	restaurants have simply been unable to bear the
15	losses. According to the report from the city
16	Comptroller, nearly 1300 of the city's restaurants
17	permanently closed between March and July of this
18	year and about 187,000 food and hospitality jobs have
19	been lost. The city Council has been proactive in
20	doing what it can to alleviate the pain that the
21	COVID crisis has brought onto our cities food
22	industry and this committee in particular has been
23	working to pass legislation to help restaurants and
24	food establishments stay afloat. In addition to
25	codifying outdoor dining due to the passage of Intro

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1957, we also enacted Intro 1916 which required the city to waive and refund contempt fees related to sidewalk café licenses for the duration of the COVID emergency. The city Council also passed a number of bills to limit the fees that third-party delivery platforms can charge restaurants that use their services. Today's legislation aims to further support the struggling industry and will make outdoor dining a permanent feature of this city. The Mayor recently announced that he plans to permit outdoor dining all year round and this bill will codify the mayor's effort. Such measures are pivotal if we are to make up for these significant losses that restaurants have faced and will also assist towards the post-COVID revival and recovery of the city. This bill would also permit the use of propane and electric space heaters and outdoor dining areas subject to guidance from the fire department. winter approaches, many restaurant tours have called for updates to the city's rules to allow for propane gas heaters which are necessary to keep patrons one and restaurants in business. Current rules prohibit propane gas heaters, despite the fact that they are permitted in numerous other cities. Until

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2	restaurants can really open to full capacity, they
3	are unlikely to generate the revenue they have
4	produced pre-COVID. However, the Council will
5	continue to use all of its authority to develop
6	creative and helpful ways to mitigate some of the
7	fallout. Our restaurant hospitality industry are not
8	only key providers of jobs and revenue, but they also
9	had to the didacticism of the city. As such, we want
10	to ensure that we can provide all the relief possible
11	to this a vital element of New York. And, with that,
12	I'm going to ask the clerk to call the role.

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2	COUNCIL MEMBER KOSLOWITZ: Well,
3	certainly, I want to help small business in any way I
4	possibly can. In this legislation, I really want to
5	try it before I buy it. I am worried about the
6	winter months with the snowplows going down the
7	street. I am worried about how this is going to be
8	implemented and I really feel that, at this point, I
9	can't vote for a permanent solution until I see how
10	it works out. So, with that, I vote no.

CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Of course.

I will be voting in favor of today's legislation. I certainly hear the concerns folks have and, obviously, it will be very important to monitor and pay attention for us to be willing to come back and legislate again if we need to, but I certainly want to do what we can to help make it possible. I've been starting to bundle up. I was out yesterday and the rain had a great outdoor dining restaurant that had a little space heater that worked pretty well. I may be a broken record on this, but I'm going to keep

waiting for the official guidance from the city on the outdoor heating situation. They teased it and they still haven't given us the official guidelines as to what that is going to look like and what restaurants needs to do. And certainly, bypassing this legislation, we are going to need that guidance yesterday, basically. So, hopefully, this will push the administration to finally come forward with what that guidance is going to look like and I hope that that year-round outdoor dining is the want to know very few silver linings that may come from the past seven months of challenges that we have seen here in our city. So, with that, I vote aye. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Mr. Chairman, may I be excused to explain my vote?

CHAIRPERSON COHEN: Absolutely.

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you so much.

I, too, support the outdoor dining, although, in my
district, not many restaurants have been able to take
advantage of it for a number of reasons, including
that many of our restaurants don't have the frontage
necessary for that, as Councilman Lander notice to

2 because we share some of the same commercial areas. And also because of the nature of many of our 3 4 restaurants being closed for some of the days of the week, it just simply wasn't worth the infrastructure investment, in many cases. Still, my district is big 6 7 and the city is big and I supported it when we voted 8 for this several months ago. But, like Council member Koslowitz and Council member Koo-- and I don't know if I can be as eloquent as they, but I 10 11 will say that calling this Introduction preconsidered is certainly an understatement. 12 I don't believe it has been considered at all. We have a 13 14 winter in front of us. There is no reason to vote 15 for this bill right now today when we can check 16 Justin a couple of months and see what the interplay 17 between these roadway dining and, for example, our 18 cities snowplows. The ability of storeowners and 19 homeowners to shovel and where are they going to put 20 the snow as they remove it. How is this going to 21 interplay? Can we have a chance to actually watch it 2.2 and see what happens before we make this, you know, 2.3 permanent thing. And, as we step towards permanentizing something, without actually even 24 taking a chance, because there really is no rush to 25

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do it right now. We have the ability to extend the dining into the winter right now. It extends until December. We can extend it through the rest of the winter and give it a chance to work. So, for that reason, I do support section 1 of the statute of the bill of the proposed very pre-considered Introduction to allow outdoor dining to have heating because I think that is a necessary component to giving winter a shot, as Council member Koo and Council member Koslowitz said. You know, let's try before we buy And I also support section 3 to extend briefly into the next year into 21 to the conclusion of the winter to actually see this work. I do believe in many neighborhoods this has been very successful and I say very successful only to the extent that the option was closure and very successful means opening. And to the extent that we can get any business open just a little bit, that is, at least, some success. But wait those reservations and, as my colleagues have said, I will, unfortunately, have to join them in voting no with great respect to those who know that restaurants need this extra helping hand and I certainly have spoken in this committee and on the floor about the need to get restaurants back in

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2	business and to get businesses back in business in
3	our city. But for that, Mr. Chair, I vote no.
4	COMMITTEE CLERK: Thank you. I vote of
5	four in the affirmative, two in the negative, and one
6	abstention, pre-considered proposed Introduction has
7	been adopted by the Council. Committee. Excuse me.
8	Committee.
9	CHAIRPERSON COHEN: I really do just,
10	once again I don't want to forget to really thank
11	the staff for making these virtual hearings possible.
12	There is an enormous amount of organization that
13	needs to go into it and a lot of work and a lot of
14	prep. So, I really just want to thank all of the
15	staff that makes these go as smoothly as they do.
