BISHOP DOCTOR RODERICK CAESAR: Our gracious heavenly father, we honor you for the blessing that you have bestowed upon us by allowing us to awaken this morning and to gather together to accomplish something that will be of great benefit to the residents of the region. Look upon us as we

engage in the proceedings of this day and bless us with your divine wisdom and knowledge, which will enable us to make decisions that are in the best interests of our constituents. And I pray that that we will work in the spirit of bipartisan cooperation and that at the end of the day let us conclude with the knowledge that we have made a difference in the lives of many people through our action and our legislation. In the name of Jesus, the one who empowers us to serve, amen.

PASTOR RODERICK CAESAR III: Amen. And
Lord we thank you for the gift of life, of health and
strength, and the ability to work together for the
benefit of our communities. I pray oh Lord, that you
would strengthen us, particularly in this election
season as our nation has been polarized and fractured
by the effects of COVID-19 and racial injustices. I
pray Lord that you would help us to look to the hills
from where our help comes from and trust you in this
season of uncertainty. We will not fail to give you
the praise, the honor, and the glory. We pray these
things in Jesus's name. Amen.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much. And I'd like to make a correction. I

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recognize now that we are having today's invocation
delivered by Pastor Roderick Caesar III as well as
Bishop Doctor Roger Caesar, the spiritual leaders at
Bethel Gospel Tabernacle. And now I will turn it
over to Council Member Adrienne Adams to spread the
invocation on the record. And I know that she is
very excited, ah, to welcome them to the City Council
here today. Thank you so much, Council Member Adams.

COUNCIL MEMBER ADAMS: Thank you very much, Madam Majority Leader, and you're so right. We've been blessed today by what some of us would call a double portion. I believe that this is the very first time that father and son clergy have appeared together to render the invocation for a Stated Meeting of the New York City Council, and it is my pleasure and honor to welcome the Reverends Caesar to the chambers today. Dr. Roderick R. Caesar is the bishop and overseer of the Bethel Gospel Tabernacle Fellowship International. He is the son of Bethel's founders, Bishop Roderick R. Caesar, Sr. and Gertrude Brown, Sr. For ten years he served as pastor of Calgary Full Gospel Church in ? Woodside, Queens, and for seven years he assisted his father in ministry and served as the assistant pastor of Bethel

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Gospel Tabernacle in Jamaica, Queens. In November 1994 Dr. Caesar was consecrated to the office of bishop, becoming overseer of Bethel Gospel Tabernacle Fellowship International. In 2017 he ordained his son, Roderick III, as senior pastor of Bethel Gospel Tabernacle. Bishop Caesar received undergraduate and graduate degrees from North Gate Bible College and Logos Bible College. He also earned a doctorate of divinity from Vision Christian College. Bishop Caesar lives in Hollis, Queens, where I grew up, with his wife, Beverly. They have four children and five grandchildren. Pastor Roderick Caesar III is the lead pastor of Bethel Gospel Tabernacle in Jamaica, Queens. Installed as pastor by his father, Bishop Roderick Caesar, Pastor Roderick Caesar is a Gordon College graduate and holds a master's of divinity from Alliance Theological Seminary. Pastor Roderick resides in Queens with his wife, Stephanie, their daughter, Sela, and of course son, Roderick IV. He is grateful for the examples of ministry set before him by his parents and grandparents and is looking forward to continuing the legacy of leadership with which God has entrusted him. And I am honored and blessed to have this great legacy cradled and shared

within Districts 27 and 28. One property is in
Council Member Miller's district and one is in my
district. And we want to thank you, Bishop Caesar,
and Pastor Caesar, for your examples of true
spiritual leadership not just in New York but
internationally. We are so grateful for your gift of
prayer in these chambers on this day. Thank you,
Madam Majority Leader.

to everyone. As always, I hope that you and you	ır
families are safe and well. Since the COVID-19	
pandemic started this council has looked for var	cious
ways to help our city recover. So many industri	_es
have been financially devastated. Today we have	<u> </u>
bills to help our taxi and restaurant industries	· .
These two industries were struggling prior to CC	OVID-
19, but the virus caused massive decreases in	
revenues for restaurant owners and taxi drivers.	I'm
proud of these bills that we're voting on today	
because they address these very real issues and	they
in turn protect New Yorkers who have been hurt k	y the
coronavirus pandemic. I want to begin by	
acknowledging all of those who have died as a re	sult
of the coronavirus; 23,905 New Yorkers have succ	umbed
to the impact of the virus as of yesterday. Thi	s is
a loss for our entire city and the loved ones of	=
those taken from us by this virus are in my thou	ıghts
and prayers, and I know that they're in all of o	our
thoughts and prayers. On Monday our city lost a	ì
former first lady, First Lady Joyce Dinkins. Sh	ne was
a champion for New York City and an advocate for	<del>.</del>
causes that made our city better. Her life and	
legacy will serve as the inspiration to so many.	. We

2 are keeping for Mayor Dinkins in our thoughts and 3 prayers and their children and grandchildren. 4 are so sorry and sad for this loss for the Dinkins 5 family and for our city. Our city also lost Carlos Rivera, the first Latino FDNY commissioner. 6 7 Commissioner Rivera bravely led the department's response to the 1993 World Trade Center terrorist 8 bombing. He passed away on October 12 at 86 years 9 old. I'd like for us to take a few moments of 10 silence to acknowledge the lives of those we've lost 11 to COVID-19, former first lady Joyce Dinkins, and 12 former FDNY commissioner Carlos Rivera [moment of 13 14 silence]. Thank you. On Tuesday the United States 15 Supreme Court allowed the Trump administration to end 16 the census count early. It will end tomorrow at 6:00 17 a.m. So if you have not filled out your census 18 please do so today, tonight, or early tomorrow 19 morning before 6:00 a.m. This news is extremely 20 disappointing. The Trump administration is using the 21 census to wage a war on immigrants and on our 22 democracy itself. We need every New Yorker, as I 23 said, to fill out their census forms by tomorrow at 6:00 a.m. if you haven't already. This is about 24 25 money and power for our state and city for the next

2 10 years. Now on to our agenda. Today the council will be voting on several appointments. We'll be 3 voting on the reappointment of Stanley Richards to 4 the New York City Board of Correction and the 5 reappointment of Jose M. Arajo to the New York City 6 7 Board of Elections. Just before the Stated Meeting the Democratic Conference voted on the appointment of 8 Rodney L. Pepe Souvenir to the New York City Board of 9 Elections. We will be voting on several land use 10 items, including the following applications submitted 11 by HPD. Weeksville NCP and 1510 Broadway in Council 12 Member Alicka Ampry-Samuel's district will provide 13 over 150 affordable housing units. Three affordable 14 15 homeownership applications in the 37th Council 16 District and in the districts of Council Members Reynoso and Cornegy to be developed under the Open 17 18 Door Program that will provide 21 homeownership units and 22 affordable rental units. We'll be voting on 19 four applications from the Landmarks Preservation 20 Commission. The designation of Manida Street 21 Historic District in Council Member Rafael 22 23 Salamanca's district in Hunt's Point, the rescission 24 of landmark designation, I apologize if I 25 mispronounce this, Beth Hamedrash Hagodol Synagogue

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2 in Council Member Margaret Chin's district, which had 3 been destroyed by a fire, and amendments to landmark sites in Council Members Koo and Perkins's district. 4 We'll be voting to disapprove 3 St. Mark's Place. 5 6 That application sought approval of a special permit 7 to allow the transfer of development rights from the Hamilton Holly House to facilitate a new 10-story 8 building in Council Member Carlina Rivera's district. 9 5914 Bay Parkway rezoning and a MIH text amendment, 10 which will facilitate the development of a nine-story 11 mixed use building, including additional parking 12 spaces, that will provide 36 units of housing, 11 of 13 which are affordable, in Council Member Kalman 14 15 Yeger's district. 50 Old Fulton rezoning, which will 16 facilitate the development of a new five-story commercial building in Council Member Steve Levin's 17 18 district. And finally we'll be voting on a motion to 19 file the Industry City applications, which have been 20 withdrawn by the applicant. This vote is on the motion, ah, to withdraw. Moving on to our 21 22 legislative agenda, we'll be voting on the following 23 bills. The first bill is out of our Committee on Aging. Introduction number 2030, sponsored by our 24 25 committee chair, Council Member Margaret Chin, ah,

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will increase the maximum income threshold for eligibility in both the Senior Citizen Rent Increase Exemption and the Disability Rent Increase Exemption programs, otherwise known as SCRIE and DRIE, and both part of the New York City rent freeze program. 2014 New York State increased the income threshold to \$50,000 through June of 2020. The state authorized the income threshold increase after its expiration this year and as a result the City of New York must do the same and reauthorize the extension. We are doing that and this bill is retroactive and would extend the current qualifying maximum level of income through June 30, 2022. From the staff I want to thank Nushat Chowdry for their work on this bill. Our next bill comes out of our Housing and Buildings Committee. It's Introduction number 2093, sponsored by the committee chair for that committee, Council Member Robert Cornegy, and it will amend the expiration date of the New York City Rent Stabilization Law. In order to maintain the city's rent stabilization law a housing and vacancy survey must be conducted in partnership with the United States Census Bureau. Due to limited capacity of the Census Bureau to conduct the survey concurrently with

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the decennial census the State of New York passed legislation delaying the requirement of the survey by one year. To reflect the state's extension of the deadline this bill would shift the current expiration date of the city's rent stabilization law from April 1, 2021, to April 1, 2022. This bill will go into effect immediately. And from the staff I want to thank Austin Branford for his work on this. Before COVID-19 hit the taxi industry in New York was facing a sharp decline in revenue and in medallion values. The pandemic has only made these struggles more difficult. Today we will be voting on a package of legislation aimed at providing increased oversight and support to this industry. I am grateful to the members who are prime sponsors on these bills and have kept this very urgent issue front and center. Our first bill, Introduction number 1610-A, sponsored by Council Member Ritchie Torres, will require the creation of an Office of Financial Stability within the New York City Taxi and Limousine Commission. office will monitor and evaluate a range of factors related to the financial stability of the taxi industry, including income and expenses for medallion owners, medallion loan terms, and market

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manipulation. The office will also be required to post online and to submit to the council, the mayor, and the Department of Investigation an annual report on the office's activities an assessment of the financial stability of the taxi industry and any recommendations regarding industry stability. Our second bill, Introduction number 1584-A, sponsored by Council Member Adrienne Adams, will require any person with an interest in a taxi license to make annual financial disclosures to the TLC. Required disclosures would include information about income from and expenses related to each taxi license, any loan secured by a taxi license, and any other interests the person filling the disclosure has in any taxi, livery, for-hire vehicle business. Our final bill in this package, Introduction number 1608-A, sponsored by our Transportation Committee chair, Ydanis Rodriguez, would require the TLC to evaluate the character, honesty, and integrity of taxicab brokers, agents, and licensees when they submit a new license application or when they submit an application to renew an existing license. commission will be authorized to refuse to issue or renew a license upon a finding that an applicant

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lacks good character, honesty, and integrity. commission would consider, among other factors, misstatements or misrepresentations in connection with an application and commissions of fraudulent, deceitful, or unlawful acts while engaged in the business license by the commission. And from the staff I want to thank Elliot Lin. The taxi industry is hardly the only one that is suffering now. know that. The pandemic has hit our economy severely. Our restaurant industry has been particularly hard hit and outdoor dining has provided a lifeline to many restaurants. I'm so proud of this council for passing, ah, the bill to create outdoor dining and I know many New Yorkers have enjoyed outdoor dining during the pandemic. It has enlivened our streets. It has offered us a much-needed chance to socialize. It has been a bright spot during this very dark time in our city. And the council will make sure it continues. Introduction number 2127-A, sponsored by council member Antonio Reynoso, will extend the expiration of the city's current outdoor dining program until September 30, 2021. legislation will also require the city to create a permanent outdoor dining program for the future that

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uses city road space. The bill would also allow for the use of propane heaters in outdoor dining areas, subject to guidelines issued by the New York City Fire Department. I want to Council Member Reynoso for leading on this effort. And I want to say that I'm really proud of this program. We're also gonna have to potentially come back and fine tune it over the winter and spring and next summer before the current program expires and the new program is set up and permanence. We know that there are some community concerns, ah, and we want to be responsive while still allowing this space for restaurants who really need it during this hard time. So this will be an ongoing conversation. I want to thank from the staff Balkies Myrig and Leah Skirpiak for their work on this. I now turn it back to you, Madam Majority Leader. Ah, thank you all for being with us today to vote on these important bills.

Ah, I supported this bill, ah, when we first created the program and I think we got there quicker than the administration did on trying to recover restaurants and, and give them the opportunities that are necessary for them to, you know, to, to hang on, ah,

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to get past where they are today, ah, to be able to survive into the future, um, ah, with the hopes that, that they can continue doing that. We've lost, ah, tens of thousands of small businesses throughout the city, including many restaurants, including many in my district and throughout the city. Ah, but in my view to permanentize, ah, ah, the program today without the benefit of reviewing the upcoming winter experience of this program is probably not the best way, at least as I see it, to go. Ah, there's no rush to adopt this bill today in October. We could do it in January, February, March, April, um, with more opportunity to see, for example, the interplay between sidewalks and roadway seating, ah, with the city snow plows, ah, with store owners' and homeowners' ability to shovel snow, to place out trash for pickup in an environment of snow. We don't know what that looks like yet and, um, ah, we don't know how that will work. I do support section one of this bill, which authorizes the use of heating, um, equipment subject to Fire Department guidelines. think that's wise because it does give restaurants this opportunity, um, and I support section three, which extends the, ah, the, ah, expiration of the

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2	program from December 31 to the end of next summer.

And the bill talks about the recent incident where Amy Cooper called the police and made a false accusation that she was being threatened by a black man, and the New York Times recently talked about an increase in the number of race-based falsely reported crimes. And the states of California, Michigan, and Oregon are already engaged in determining in what ways they're going to penalize folks who make false reports regarding race, national origin, gender, religion, age, disability, and sexual orientation. So I want to urge my colleagues to review this legislation and to join on in support of this

resolution by Council Member Cornegy and myself.Thank you so much.

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MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much, Council Member Barron. Council Member Rivera.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you, Majority Leader.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time begins.

COUNCIL MEMBER RIVERA: Thank you. I'd like to speak today about the last thing and continued damage caused by the archaic criminal statute widely known as the walking wall trans ban. The use of this statute by law enforcement to target trans women of color on the basis of alleged suspensions of loitering for the purposes of prostitution has resulted in women being criminalized for the length of their skirt or the streets they choose to walk on. I've been fighting alongside my colleagues here in the council and my state colleagues since last year to repeal the walking law trans ban included through council Resolution 923-2019, which I sponsored and which currently has 30 cosponsors. Even if we are successful in repealing this deeply discriminatory law, we will have to continue working to provide resolution for the

It's a very peaceful, loving, Christian nation and Turkey annihilated 1.5 millions in the genocide in the early 19th century, and once again we have a piece of land controlled, ah, by Armenia [inaudible] and the small land of [inaudible] is under attack, and there's been such little, little cry in today's world for justice for the Armenians are being slaughtered once again. And I had to say something since my children and my family and seeing the hard work that they have done

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and the cry is peace for Armenia. That's all the hashtag is, that's all the call is, it's not for war, it's not for retributions, it's not for sanctions, it's for peace. And in today when all we do is scream and yell and ask for a million different things for something that happened in another city or country, you have a people that are asking for peace. So I had submitted a resolution for that. I know it's difficult for the council, ah, to get into international politics. But we did as a council, ah, I know my father and in past recognized the Armenian genocide, ah, and demanded Turkey take responsibility for that, um, and I, I would ask that we consider the possibility of passing a resolution to ask for peace, to ask for our brothers and sisters in Congress to reach out because the United States always has a play and hand in, in politics overseas. And there's so much involved in that region, the Mid East is always a powder keg for, for chaos. And here is a land, a peaceful land asking for peace. So I just wanted to give you that, because normally I don't speak from the heart often. So I wanted to let you know...
