He is the recipient of four national Hispanic publications print awards for his work in New York's El Diario/La Prensa the oldest Spanish language daily newspaper in the nation and whereas Mr. Gomez is also a noted stage actor and award winning film producer. appeared in television and radio commercials, films and TV series and currently hosts the Dialogo Albieto, Bronx Net's TVs Spanish Language Public Affairs programs and whereas Mr. Gomez is a graduate of the City College of New York with a degree in broadcast journalism and holds a Master's Degree in

JAVIER E. GOMEZ: Thank you Council man and really, thank you for doing this. It is very I first came through those doors 23 years ago as a rookie, very green, very naïve still in college news reporter for El Diadio. I was stationed in room 9 sitting along giants from the Daily News, the New York Post, New York Newsday at the time and seeing myself here was magical. The place to see to witness up close where things happen to meet up close leadership from the City but also meet up close the leaders and the communities that came here who fill the second floor every day and reminded us about the importance of Democracy and who as a young man gave me a very, very powerful lesson about civic engagement and the responsibility that we all have to make our communities better. So that stuck with me, uhm forever and I think that coming back 23 years ago in a different capacity, it is very humbling and it

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is very moving to see the places and the faces and I think if there is something to learn here it is the importance of perseverance and persistence and really thinking what is your role, what is everyone's role in making communities better. I think we all have a call, we have to be very honest about what it is and we all should make the contribution to whatever our trenches are be it media, be journalism, be the art, be it organizing, be government not for profit and this is a strong reminder of the work that we do of the responsibility that we all have to make communities better across the board and it is also for me a renewal of the commitment to continue to work to build the legacy and build communities stronger, particularly at this day and age when the world is in so much turmoil and we need everybody's work and we need everyone's contribution. Thank you and congratulation to the other honorees tonight. Thank you to the Council and let's get out and continue working and making communities better and grander. (applause).

As many of you may know, Junior was senselessly killed earlier this summer which sparked worldwide attention and increased awareness for change in gang violence prevention. Junior was on the road to becoming a big, big, big example and role model in his community. He had aspirations of becoming a detective in the NYPD and he was part of the NYPDs Explorers Program which taught him the importance of community service. But his death as painful, tragic and horrifying as it is and still is for his family, his mother, his father, his grandmother and his other family members who are here it was not in vain. It prompted extra funding for the 48th Police Precinct to our violence program and it lead to various ways to help everyday New Yorkers to be responsible bystanders and not allow violence to happen in their communities. So I ask everyone who is gathered here today in this chamber to present this proclamation. We are presenting this proclamation on behalf of Junior his mother, Leandra Guzman-Feliz, his father Lisandro, his grandmother Elvin Garcia and to his other family members and to the members of the NYPD who were his mentors and really supported him throughout his life. New York is proud to honor him posthumously for his

achievements and impact on the Bronx community and in

2 New York City and whereas Lesandro Guzman-Feliz known as Junior was born November 11, 2002 in the Bronx New 3 York to parents, Leandra Feliz and Lisandro Guzman of 4 the Dominican Republic. Raised in the Central Bronx he was the youngest of four and admired the New York 6 Yankees as his favorite baseball and whereas Junior was a rising sophomore in the high school, Dr. 8 Richard Izquierdo Health and Sciences Charter School. 9 Junior had aspirations of becoming a detective and 10 joined the NYPD Explorers Program at the 45th 11 12 Precinct. The NYPD Explorers Program is geared 13 toward youth interested in Law Enforcement careers and teaches them the importance of self-discipline, 14 15 higher education and respect for diversity and human 16 dignity through training and involvement and 17 community service. It is through NYPD Explorers that 18 Junior met his group of friends and began his community service projects and whereas on June 28, 19 20 2018, the New York City Police Foundation established a Lesandro Guzman-Feliz Memorial College Fund which 21 2.2 will provide tuition assistance to two NYPD Explorer 23 high school graduates for every, for college every year and whereas Junior's tragic death sparked 24 worldwide attention on gang violence with the hash 25

| tag #justiceforjunior. From this tragedy arose the |

| increased awareness for the fight for change in gang |
| violence prevention, community programs for youth and |
| bystander training and security enforcements for |
| business owners, specifically bodegas and low income |
| communities. This has prompted the extra funding to |
| the 48 th Precinct Program Cure Violence which is a |
| gang violence prevention initiative that is geared to |
| connect with youth-at-risk of joining gangs all |
| around New York State. It has also lead to the |
| proposal of a combination of written guides and |
| public training and security enhancements and bodegas |
| to help us be responsible bystanders and whereas |
| Junior's legacy will live on. Now therefore be it |

The tragedy of losing a RITCHIE TORRES: son to an unthinkable act of violence is just a mother's worst nightmare, it's a father's worst nightmare, it's a family's worst nightmare and even though all of us are shaken by the pain you are feeling I just want to say that I am inspired by the strength and the resilience that you have shown from day one and your son's death was not in vain because the legacy he leaves behind, it is summed up in the hash tag #justiceforjunior has been an awakening for all of us. It has become a national rallying cry. You had thousands of people waiting in line in the wake. You had Carmelo Anthony and Corey B and celebrities I've never heard of uhm come to the wake and commemorate the memory of your son. And so every member of the City Council is indebted to your son's legacy for inspiring us to do more to rescue our young people from the plague of violence on our streets and on behalf of my colleagues and myself I just want to say thank you for the sacrifice that you

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2 made for all of us. We are a safer City because of your son's legacy and because of your strength.

ADRIENNE ADAMS: Thank you Madam Public

Advocate. Bishop Calvin Rice has served as the

senior pastor of the New Jerusalem Worship Center in

Jamaica, New York since January 2005 before going to

New Jerusalem, Bishop Rice served for 20 years as

senior pastor of the First Central Baptist Church of

Staten Island where he grew FCBC from 35 to more than

2 2,000 members. He also founded the First Central Housing Development Corporation which restored two 3 4 residential buildings and converted an abandoned 5 supermarket into a 15,000 square feet Family Life 6 Community Center. In addition, he served as the 7 Executive Director of Staten Island Communities United, a not for profit charged with distributing 8 \$2.5 million in funding to five communities on the 9 North Shore under a New York State Family 10 Preservation Grant. During his tenure in Jamaica 11 12 Queens Bishop Rice has successfully led the effort to complete a \$9 million construction project on the 13 14 In addition to completing the church church. 15 building project which doubled the size of the 16 facility the membership and attendance has increased 17 by 40%. Bishop Rice also founded and serves as the 18 CEO of the Rochdale Early Advantage Charter School. A pre K through grade 5 publically funded education 19 20 institution housed in the lower level at administration wing of the New Jerusalem Worship 21 2.2 Center Complex. The school which opened in 2010 has 23 a current enrollment of 319 students and was recently listed as a reward school, an honor given to only 155 24 schools in the entire state of New York. Bishop Rice 25

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is currently planning a \$5 million expansion to increase the enrollment to 430. Bishop Rice has served as a member of Mayor Bloomberg's Economic Development Task Force and Staten Island Borough President's Anti-biased Task Force. He received the recognition from the New York Association of Black and Puerto Rican Legislators for his community and economic development work. Most recently Bishop Rice was awarded the Vernon M. Dougherty Distinction in Ministry Award, the highest honor granted by the new theological seminary alumnus. He has received countless proclamations for the proclamations from the Governor of New York, three New York City Mayor's, two United States Senators and five New York City Council Members. Bishop Rice has held more than 12 Board positions and served as chairman of four. He has been featured in more than 30 newspaper and magazine articles, has received more then 75 awards and honors for his work including the coveted Living the Dream Award from the American Broadcasting Company. In 1994, Bishop Rice was inducted into the Staten Island College Hall of Fame and was the first living African American to have a New York City Street in the borough of Staten Island named in his

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2 honor. He has preached throughout the United States of America, Canada, the Middle East and South Africa. 3 He has licensed and ordained 40 sons and daughters in 4 ministry including two who currently serve as senior 5 pastors. Bishop Rice is a New York State certified 6 7 Chaplin and served for 22 years as Protestant Chaplin at the South Beach Psychiatric Center in Staten 8 Island. Bishop Rice's academic achievements include 9 a Bachelor of Science in Economics from the college 10 of Staten Island and a Master's of Professional 11 12 Studies from the New York Theological Seminary. completed graduate studies at the National 13 14 Theological Seminary of Baltimore, Maryland and the 15 Post Graduate Center for Mental Health of New York 16 City in conjunction with Hebrew Union Seminary. He 17 has also attended the Catawba Bible College of Rock 18 Hill, South Carolina and holds a Certificate of study from the Hebrew University Jerusalem Israel. He is 19 20 married for the former Willie Mae Rogers and together they have three children and five grandchildren. 21 2.2 am honored to call Bishop Calvin Rice my friend and 23 one of the most revered spiritual leaders, not just in Queens but in all of New York City and beyond. 24 Bishop on behalf of Council Members Richards, Miller

- and myself and the entire New York City Council, we
 are honored and grateful for your selfless dedication
 and service and we thank you for giving us today's

afternoon everyone. Today we celebrate our truths.

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A few of us here in the Council shared our stories last week on National Coming Out Day. It was not easy for all of us but it is important to show the next generation of LGBT individuals that they are not alone and that we stand in solidarity with them and it is also important that those of us here who are allies of LGBT people reinforce our commitment to creating a safe and welcoming environment of the LGBT community and their families and friends and colleagues. I want to thank everyone who is wearing a rainbow ribbon today for your support it means the world to all of us here in the LGBT Caucus and of course there are five members of the Caucus; Council Member Van Bramer, Council Member Dromm, Council Member Torres, Council Member Menchaca and myself and I want to thank LGBT Network CEO David Kilmnick for supplying us with these ribbons. I am not going to stand here today and tell you my whole story but I will just say that National Coming Out Day is not just a moment for LGBT people to come out and share their story and talk about the adversity they faced and how they came to come out and accept themselves and live their lives. It is also an opportunity for other people to come out about things that have been

2 difficult for them to talk about in their own lives that have nothing to do with their sexual orientation 3 4 and what we saw even from some members of this 5 Council and of course from members of the public, is 6 that day being as an opportunity to talk about 7 difficult things that involve shame and adversity but to use it as an occasion to inspire others. 8 here today as Speaker of the Council from a path that 9 had me as a despondent, clinically depressed, 10 suicidal 15-year-old boy in a small town of 3,000 11 12 people, 30 miles north of Boston. Never dreaming 13 that I would leave that small town and never knowing 14 that I would end up in this great City or knowing 15 that I would even run for office or knowing that I 16 would become Speaker of this agust and important body 17 but I didn't do that on my own and I didn't get here 18 on my own. I am here today because of all of the people that came before me to lay the groundwork and 19 20 clear the path to make that possible and I think that Jimmy, Danny, Carlos and Ritchie would say the same 21 2.2 things. We stand on the shoulders of all of those 23 who came before us, whether it be Tom Dewayne who was the first openly gay member of this City Council and 24 25 he was openly HIV positive in the early 1990s when

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people were dying of AIDS in this City or B. Bared Ruston who lived at Penn South in my District and organized the March on Washington for Dr. King or Aundry Lord or Sylvia Rivera or Marcia Peed-Johnson or Larry Cramer. All of those brave men and women who put their lives and bodies on the line before Stonewall, during Stonewall, after Stonewall at the height of the AIDS epidemic when people were dying and when it was still legal in this City to discriminate and fire people just because they were In 1986, this body went through a difficult chapter and finally there was a vote to codify discrimination not being allowed in the basis of sexual orientation and people were screaming from the rafters here in this body that passed in 1986, it took years, many years for it to pass. And at that moment in time there was not an LGBT member of the City Council to be able to stand here on the floor and debate that Bill and talk about the real life impact it was having on the lives of LGBT New Yorkers. Times have changed, we have five LGBT members of the Council, we are down a little bit from the previous term and I stand here today as an opening gay, opening HIV positive man who is only

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able to stand here because of the hard work and activism of all those who came before me and who came before us. So this rainbow that we are wearing, this ribbon is not merely a token of visibility it is a thread that shares the longer, deeper, important story that has allowed many of us to be able to be here today to stand here proudly and openly to talk about ourselves, our struggle and our story and there are still many people in New York City. There are still many children who struggle with their sexual orientation, who are still bullied in school, who are still rejected by their parents and end up on the streets and subways of New York City without a roof over their head. We are the lucky ones. The ones that get to stand here today but there are still too many people who are not as fortunate and so I know the members of this caucus and the members of this body seek to make this a City that every person regardless of their sexual orientation or gender identity or race or gender, ethnicity or religion is able to be someone who lives with dignity and protection and value in our City. We talk about this today even though it is not National Coming Out Day, that was last week but we talk about this from a

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personal place, many of our paths could have gone a different way if one person had potentially treated us differently and so I want to thank all of you, for your commitment to our City, the best City in the world, the most diverse City in the world. The City where 40% of the people living here were not born in the United States of America, the City that was the birth place of the modern LGBT Civil Rights Movement. The City that has been a huge part of the worldwide struggle for equality for all people not just LGBT The Women Suffrage Movement, the Underground people. Railroad, all of it started to happen here in our great City and I want to recognize all of those brave men and women, those who are in this room, those who are not, dead or alive, that put themselves and their bodies on the line to make this possible for someone like me who as a 15-year-old boy contemplating taking my own life in a small town not knowing a single other openly gay person. We do this on their shoulders, we do this in their name and we do it in their spirit. Thank you very much. Uhm today I would like to dedicate (applause). Today I would like to dedicate our thoughts and prayers to a few New Yorkers, Felipe Torres, Felipe Torre an FDNY

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Medic who succumbed to 9/11 related cancer this past He was 54 years old. A medic who was working at Ground Zero to help other New Yorkers, died of cancer. Our thoughts and prayers are with his children and friends and everyone at the Fire Department in New York City, Shakeem Farnam who was killed in an accident while driving the forklift in a food distribution center in Hunt's Points last week, last month, Shakeem was 43 years old. Velesa Monte (SP?) a 47-year-old worker who died at the scene of a wall collapse at a construction site, Sunset Park in Council Member Menchaca's District and Council Member Menchaca was there on the scene that day, tending to the family. Juan Otoya, a Queens resident who was struck and killed by a construction vehicle at a building site on the upper East side, Juan was 40, was 66 years old. Brian Trinidad a 27 year old who was killed by a co-worker in a fight in a Brooklyn Warehouse where they worked and finally on Saturday the NYPD added 43 names of fallen officers to its police memorial wall. The names included 24 officers who died from 9/11 related illnesses, 15 cops who died in the 20th century and one officer who died in the 1869 Ferry Yard Accident in Brooklyn. I think,

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Police Commissioner James O'Neal said it best when he said "their lives were spent and ultimately ended in great service to this City and the people they cared so much about." If all of us could stand for a moment of silence for all of those we are remembering today. Thank you very much and it is actually quite fitting now, sad but fitting, sad for us but good for the City of New York and I want to acknowledge that one of our Assistant Sargeant at Arms, Mohamad Arshad, Mo is leaving us, that big smile, that friendly demeanor, that helpful presence that he is leaving us to join the Police Academy in New York City, I get the chills saying it. I want to thank him so much (applause). Whoever the next speaker is has to consider him for the detail. Okay now the Council is going to vote on the following Land Use items today LeForte's Boulevard Rezoning; it is in Councilman Adams District; 95 Lennox Avenue, it is an article 11 tax exemption to preserve affordable housing in Council Member Perkins District; Lutheran Social Services of New York Early Life Child Center in Council Member Salamanca's District, the Borem Hill Historic District Extension in Council Member Levin's District and the 180 Myrtle Avenue Text

2 Amendment I believe that is in Majority Leader Cumbo's District. I want to thank the Land Use Staff 3 who worked on these projects, Brian Paul, Jeff Une 4 and John Douglas as well as our Land Use Director 5 Roger Mann. The Council is going to vote on the 6 7 following Legislation today. We will vote on the Parental Empowerment Package, we first announced this 8 package of Bills for Mother's Day and we are very 9 10 proud to be voting on these Bills today. You know they say it takes a village to raise a child but uhm 11 12 too often we can fall short in supporting parents and 13 caregivers who are tending to children. Uhm this 14 package of Bills will help provide New York City 15 families with exactly the type of support they need 16 to raise healthy, happy families. I want to commend my amazing colleagues. I especially want to 17 18 recognize Majority Leader Laurie Cumbo who came to me with this package of Legislation uhm maybe a week 19 20 before Mother's Day and said we need to announce it on Mother's Day so thank you for giving me a lot of 21 2.2 time to consider then and our incredible Women's 23 Committee Chair, who is not here, Helen Rosenthal for her leadership as well. They have been unwavering in 24 their commitment to improving the lives of families 25

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across New York City. Introduction 913 A sponsored by Chair Rosenthal required the Department of Health and Mental Hygiene to increase access to doulas for pregnant people in the City including relevant timelines and strategies. The Health Department will also report annually on known City and community based programs that provide doula services and training, areas with a disproportionately high rate of maternal mortality, Cesarean birth and other poor birth outcomes in the City and any updates to the The next Bill is also by Council Member plan. Rosenthal, introduction 914A it will expand upon the report required by local law 55 of 2017 and require the Health Department to submit additional data on maternal mortality as well as information on severe maternal morbidity. The report will include more nuance information such as insurance status, trimester of prenatal care entry and preexisting health conditions. The Bill will require the report to provide recommendations for enhancing agency cooperation to approve outcomes and finally this Legislation will codify the multi-disciplinary maternal mortality and morbidity review committee known at M3RC and require the Health Department to

2 post online information on the disciplines represented in the M3RC committee. Introduction 879A 3 sponsored by Majority Leader Cumbo will expand upon 4 existing laws to require any employer with 15 or more 5 employees to provide a lactation room with a service 6 7 to place a breast pump and require that room be a reasonable proximity from the employee's work area 8 and also to have a refrigerator suitable for breast 9 milk storage. Introduction 878A sponsored by Council 10 Member Robert Cornegy will expand upon Local Law 94 11 12 of 2016 which was also his Bill which became Law 13 which required lactation rooms in places like City 14 Health Centers requiring that City Jails that accept 15 visitors and police precincts offer lactations room 16 for a police precinct or a jail to provide a 17 lactation room due to security concerns, limited 18 space, if it is not practicable to have them, the Bill will require those agencies provide an 19 20 explanation why it is not practicable as well as information on any future plans to improve the 21 2.2 availability of lactation rooms. Introduction 905A 23 sponsored by Council Woman Carlina Rivera will require employers to develop, implement and 24 25 distribute all new hires, a written policy regarding

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the provision of a lactation room. The policy will include a statement that employees have the right to request a lactation room, identify the appropriate process for doing so and provide guidance for what to do if two or more persons need the room at the same The Bill will also require the New York City time. Commissioner on Human Rights to establish and post online a model lactation room accommodation policy. I want to thank the staff who worked on all of these Bills, Brenda McKinney, Austin Branford, Chloe Rivera, Smita Desmuke and Audrea Vasquez for their help in getting us this Legislation. Introduction 853A sponsored by our public advocate Leticia James would require the establishment of a working group to study the feasibility of providing discounted group child care services for children aged 4 and under of City employees, the working group would include experts in the field of childcare and agency representatives and would issue it's feasibility report 12 months from when it was signed into Law. The study would be followed by a pilot project to provide such childcare at one more centers in the City and I want to thank the public advocate for this very important Bill that we are passing into Law

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today and then lastly Introduction 380A sponsored by Council Member Mark Treyger would require the Department of Citywide Administrative Services, DCAS to make available a supply of diapers and baby wipes sufficient to meet the needs of children 3 years old and younger at domestic violence shelters, temporary shelters, family justice centers, life programs and city contracted childcare centers. It would also require visible signage or written notice of the availability of such diapers and baby wipes. It is such an important Bill mark. I am really glad that we are passing it today. All of the Bills are. want to staff who worked on the Public Advocates Bill as well as Council Member Treyger's Bill, Brad Reed, Elizabeth Cronk, Zachary Harris and Rachel Cordero. That concludes our agenda for today's state and I look forward to proceeding with today's votes. you all very much for being here and I also want to tell everyone who celebrated the high holidays, I hope you all had a wonderful holiday season. that, Madam Public Advocate I turn it back to you.

Furthermore, these children are missing out on the early childhood programs that can be critical for their academic, social and emotional development. am very proud that our City is stepping up to make sure that diapers are available for our families.

BEN KALLOS: Three years ago this Council responded to a deadly outbreak of Legionnaire's

Disease with an over haul of regulations on the cooling towers where the legionella bacteria grows.

Today I am introducing two Bills as part of a

Legislative Package with Council Member and Speaker

Corey Johnson, Health Chair Mark Levine, Council

Member Ampry-Samuel, Council Member Constantinides,

2 Torres and Salamanca, these Bills together will improve upon the inspection resume that we 3 established in 2015, last summer a small cluster of 4 5 Legionnaire's in my District on the upper East Side 6 spurred us as a City to dig into how well those new 7 regulations were working. We found there were increased inspections of cooling towers but there was 8 also widespread noncompliance of the new Laws. 9 investigation of NY, WNYC News Sean Carlson, and Wyla 10 Eunice (SP?) found that as of 2016 nearly half of the 11 12 City's 1000 cooling towers were out of compliance. 13 As the Department of Health issues violations to 14 bring towers into compliance many buildings with 15 cooling towers are still failing to report the 16 results of their inspections, leaving us to wonder if 17 the inspections are incurring at all and although 18 inspections happen four times a year, they are only reported annually. When we do get results, they are 19 20 often unreliable as towers may be cleaned the day before the inspection which means we have no idea 2.1 2.2 whether the tower was clean for the rest of the year. 23 Uhm the first Introduction was co-sponsored by Council Member Levine and Council Member Ampry-24 Samuel, Introduction 1150 would prevent building 25

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important package.

owners cleaning towers directly before an inspection is scheduled and tag them with other Bills in the package that would require follow up cleanings if towers are unclear and allow for surprise inspections. This Bill would mean that we are getting real results for where there are dangerous conditions and where towers are clean we would incentivize businesses to keep their towers clean throughout the year, not just on inspection day. Introduction 1149 would require the Health Department to send electronic notices 30 days prior to the date when a building needs to certify that towers have been inspected. This may include a prefilled certification form when the building forgets to certify. We have no way of knowing whether the towers have been cleaned and inspected. This Bill would ease that process for buildings with towers to ensure the know when they need to certify in order to comply with the law. It would send data to the Health Department as soon as inspections are done four times a year instead of only through the annual certification. I want to thank Legislative Counsel Sara Liss for her work on these Bills and this

PETER KOO: Thank you. I rise today to ask my colleagues to join me in signing on three Introductions. The first one Intro 1151 will require the publication of machine readable versions of New York City Consultant Code including amendments. Currently the various codes are spread out online and if you want to buy the 2014 New York City Building Code, just one vote, you will need to spend \$155 at the City's toll. My next two Bills deal with protecting New Yorkers from Cyber Security attacks. In March the world watched as Atlanta was hit with a large Ransomware Cyber Attack which shut the City down for five days. My Bill Intro 1153 co-sponsored by Council Member Rivera will require and electronic system penetration testing protocols and security briefings and reports. This is to make sure that we are ready to defend against attacks, to defend against attacks against our system. The last Introduction 1152 will protect New Yorkers in case our systems every go do. Intro 1152 will create an online payment grace period in the event of an

electronic security system breech lasting more than

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24 hours. New Yorkers will have a 48 hour grace

period to make their periods after the system, after

the system goes back up where no late fees could be

charged. I ask my colleagues to please sign on to

these three pieces of Legislation.

This Legislation would ensure that New York City remains at the forefront of best practices in public education alongside California, Virginia and North Carolina all of which have passed Laws that mandate training in trafficking prevention. Today I am also proud to introduce Intro 1137. This Bill with codify into the New York City Charter the Mayor's Office of Data Analytics. This office is New York City's objective intelligence center allowing the City to aggregate and analyze data from across City agencies to more effectively address crime, quality of life issues and public safety. Office is of valuable tool for the New York City Council helping us be more robust in our work. While the Mayor's Office of Data Analytics was created by Executive Order under Mayor Bloomberg we must ensure that this office successive Mayoral Administrations. I would like to thank our Legislative Division and my Legislative Coordinator Stacy Yearwood for all of their efforts and I urge my colleagues to sign on and

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support both of these very important piece ofLegislation. Thank you Madam Public Advocate.

MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Thank you Council Member Rose?

So if we are going to be the fairest city in America we must continue to pass Legislation that addresses the financial and career inequities that women face in accessing quality healthcare and childcare including providing lactation areas. still face stigma for nursing in the workplace even though State and Federal Law permits nursing in public. This leads to challenges for working mothers to provide the time and the private space to breastfeed. So I am proud that our package of Bill moved through the City Council and that these and

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other issues women face in the workplace uhm just continues to get a spotlight in the City Council as we move one step closer to really codifying Laws that I think that are important for equality. So these Laws in this package are taking care of not just women but the health of all New York families and I am really proud that we as a council are treating family planning and parenthood as a priority. So I want to thank uhm I also want to call on my Council colleagues to support two new Bills I am introducing The first Bill is Intro 1163, 1163 will today. require folders of DOT permits allowing construction or equipment on City Streets to preserve any impacted bike lanes with a safe and sufficient detour. kinds of lane closures are not just an inconvenience to cyclist they are a public safety hazard to all New Yorkers. This Bill will prevent cyclist from being forced suddenly into pedestrian or vehicular traffic without notice and instead give them a detour that includes safe protective barriers. The second Bill will help keep Council Members and Community Leaders informed about public hearings and notices for the Districts. Intro 1162 would require the Director and Deputy Director of the City Records to send and

electronic mail notification to relevant parties. So we all how inconvenient and what a service it is to our neighborhoods when they do not receive adequate notice and it is so important to keep our communities informed and I think that is just a benefit to all of us so I invite you to sign on and I hope you will

I happen to have been a working dad who supported and raised two children and also on behalf of the Public Advocate, thank you so much for the work on 853 and supporting Public and Municipal Workers and that I am very proud of the fact that I was the (INAUDIBLE) agent of the (INAUDIBLE) Transit Union which was the first municipal union in the country to have childcare program and it is so important that nearly 20 or 15 years later that this

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struggle still exists that we have not addressed the needs of working families and this, this package is certainly a step, a positive step in the right direction to ensuring that we continue to value our workforce and our future workforce. Uhm today I will also be introducing Intro 1160. It is a, it will require all cyclist under the age of 18 to wear a helmet. Now we have carefully crafted this Legislation so that there are provisions in the Bill that require parents to be available and other measure so that young folks in communities that have been disproportionately violated will not continue to do so but considering the dangers and what we have seen in terms of cycle accidents this is important Legislation and I hope that my colleagues would support it. Also Resolution 566, myself and Council Member Dromm are introducing this resolution for the State and for the Governor to pass which would require that uhm automatic enrollment to the retirement system for workers after 90 days unless they affirmatively opt out. Their employees will have gone their whole 20 or 25 year careers and not affirmatively belonged to the system and it makes it impossible for them to receive the pension that they

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2 had worked for tirelessly for. Thank you Madam

4 MADAM PUBLIC ADVOCATE: Thank you. Thank 5 you. Council Member Steve Levine?

STEVEN LEVINE: Thank you Madam Public Advocate, I just want to call my colleagues attention to Intro 1156 which I am introducing with Council Member Rafael Espinal. Uhm this is to amend the Administrative Code of the City of New York in relation to requiring the Mayor's Office of Criminal Justice to report on the multi-agency response to Community Hot Spots Operation, otherwise known as MARCH. If you don't know what MARCH is it is probably for good reason because it operates in the Bureaucratic shadows of New York City. It is a multi-agency task force. They bring together the Police Department, the Department of Buildings, sometimes the State Liquor Authority, sometimes the Fire Department and and they do raids on businesses and uhm they are done without any notice and you can be, it can be at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, it could be at 1 o'clock in the morning, you never know and your business could be basically raided by basically a multi-agency and we have no oversight over it.

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don't know how many times they have done these. don't know how they determine where they are going to go. We don't know how, once you are on the MARCH list how to get off the MARCH list and so this Bill would bring some transparency and some sunlight to the MARCH operations and we will get a good sense hopefully from the Legislation of how they are actually doing their business. I want to thank the new Night Life Mayor Ariel Pallet who has been very responsive to trying to figure out how we can best work together but uhm but in every New Yorker has a right to know what their government is doing and, and to operate, to understand with a level of transparency what we, what we do here. And uhm and this is no different so this Legislation would seek to bring that transparency and bring the operations of MARCH into the light of day. Thank you.

We have seen anti-Semitic attacks in Borough Park and last, just a couple of days ago in Crown Heights. I join my colleague, Council Member Deutsch to talk about the anti-Semitic attacks. I just want to point out that one we cannot hate neatly so the best thing

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to do with these attacks is to stand up and speak about them every time they happen, no matter what community. My hope is that every community does that and does not wait for its own community to be attacked. We are in a heightened state I believe much of this is increasing because of the rhetoric coming directly from the White House and the people who continue to hold him up. My hope is in this City we will continue to speak up and speak out against every one of these kinds of attacks and more importantly these attacks were caught on video. firmly believe that there are many more that are not being caught on video. We have to be vigilant about that as well. Yesterday I attended a Property Tax Commission, talking about the need to address the inequities. I am thankful of the Commission's hearing because the Mayor disallowed myself and three other Council Member for joining calling on these kind of reforms. I hope you will continue to push forward and deal with this inequity. Lastly I was to just salute my Legislative Director, Malik Wright who made 40 under 40, congratulations to him and with that I'm finished.
