JOHANNA M. CASTRO: We are live.

SARGEANT PEDRO LUGO: Alright the live feed is rolling. Uhm, Sargeant Hope, Sargeant Hope if you could start the cloud, thank you and you may begin your opening statement.

SARGEANT HOPE: Good morning. Welcome to the New York City Council Committee hearing on Rules, Privilege and Election. At this time, would all Council Members and Council Member staff please turn on your videos. I repeat, Council Members and Council Member staff please turn on your videos.

Thank you. To minimize disruption, please place all electronic devices to vibrate or silent mode. Chair, we are ready to begin.

CHAIRPERSON KAREN KOSLOWITZ: Okay, thank you. Good morning and welcome to the Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections. My name is Karen Koslowitz and I am Chair of the Committee on Rules, Privileges and Elections. Before we begin this hearing, I would like to introduce the Council Members of this committee who have joined us today. Uhm, Speaker Johnson will be joining us during the meeting but we have now with us Minority Leader Steve Matteo, Council Member Adrienne Adams, Council Member

Margaret Chin, Council Member Deborah Rose and right 2 now that's what we have. We are going to be joined 3 4 by Mark Treyger shortly. I would also like to acknowledge Rules Committee Counsel, Lance, I'm going to screw up your name again. Polivy and the staff 6 7 members of the Council's Investigative Unit, Chuck 8 Davis, Chief Compliance Officer and investigators Andre Johnson-Brown, Alecia Vasel (SP?) and Ramsey Sputun (SP?). Today, the Rules Committee will 10 11 consider two matters. First consideration is Rodney 12 Pepe-Souvenir for re-appointment to the position of Democratic Commissioner of Elections for Kings 13 14 County. Second, certain committee changes. 15 Committee changes includes dissolving the Standing Committee on the Justice System and transferring its 16 17 jurisdiction to the Committees on Public Safety and 18 General Welfare and changes to the membership of 19 certain Standing Committees and for Land Use 20 Subcommittee on Zoning and Franchises. Should Ms. Pepe-Souvenir receive the advice and consent of the 21 2.2 Council, she will be re-appointed for a four-year 2.3 term that will begin on January 1, 2020 and expire on December 31, 2024. Chuck Davis, our Chief Compliance 24 Officer has briefed all members of this committee 25

2 regarding the contents of Ms. Pepe-Souvenir 3 background investigation. The Board of Elections consists of 10 Commissioners, two from each of the 4 5 City's five counties. Each Commissioner serves a term of four years or until their successor is 6 7 appointed. Commissioners shall be registered voters 8 in the county for which they are appointed and registered as a member of the political party for which they are nominated. New York Election Law 10 section 3-204 subsection 1 states that at least 30 11 days before the first day of January of any year in 12 13 which a Commissioner of Elections is to be appointed, 14 the Chairman or Secretary of appropriate party county 15 committee shall file a certificate of party recommendation with the clerk of the appropriate 16 17 local legislative body. New York Election Law section 3-204 subsection 4 states that Commissioners 18 19 of Election shall be appointed by the County 20 Legislative body or in the City of New York by the 21 City Council. It is for this reason that the committee is considering this nomination today. 2.2 Kings County Board of Elections submitted a valid 2.3 certificate of party recommendation to the City Clerk 24 on October 23, 2020. This was more than 30 days 25

2	before the first day of January of the year in which
3	Commissioners are appointed. If the Council as whole
4	does not act within 30 days of receiving a valid
5	certificate of recommendation the applicable
6	political party conference within the Council becomes
7	empowered to approve the recommendation on its own.
8	For example, a Democratic vacancy could be filled by
9	a vote of the Democratic Party's Conference and a
10	Republican vacancy would be filled by a vote of
11	Republican Party's Conference. The Board and its
12	Commission is responsible for the maintenance and
13	administration of voting records and elections. The
14	Board also exercises quasi-judicial powers by
15	conducting hearing to validate nominating petitions
16	of candidates and nomination to elective office. The
17	Board is required to make an annual report of its
18	affairs and proceedings to the Council.
19	Commissioners receive a \$300 per diem for each day's
20	attendance at meetings of the Board or any of its
21	committees with a maximum of \$30,000 per year.
22	Welcome, Ms. Pepe-Souvenir. Would you please raise
23	your right hand to be sworn in? Can we sear (CROSS-

2 LANCE POLIVY: Do you swear to tell the 3 truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth?

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: Yes, I do.

CHAIRPERSON KAREN KOSLOWITZ: Okay, would you like to make a statement?

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: Yes, I would. Thank you so much. Good morning members of the Rules, Privilege and Elections Committee, I am humbled and honored to be before this body as a candidate for the Democratic Election Commissioners representing Kings County for the 2021-2024 term. name is Rodney L. Pepe-Souvenir and I am an attorney with over 20 years of experience who put myself through Law School while being married and a mother of two. My parents who were immigrants with a 5th and 8th grade education instilled in me an appreciation of public service to hold scripture to whom much is given, much is required. My goal in Law School was always public service and as you can see by my resume, that is the path that I pursued. currently employed by the City University of New York as a University Title XI Director, overseeing 25 campuses and their immediate response to allegations of sexual misconduct along with instilling a Sexual

2 Misconduct Awareness Program for CUNY students. 3 I considered the role of the Election Commissioner, I 4 first thought of my parents who suffered the tyranny of a dictator where their right to vote was not 5 honored or respected. It was important to them that 6 I did not take that right lightly and I exercised it 7 8 at every election that I was eligible to vote in. also had the thought of the huge responsibility as an Election Commissioner of ensuring that everyone who 10 11 was legally eligible to run for office or vote could. 12 I recalled my days working in Georgia for the 2008 13 Presidential Election, making calls throughout the country asking voters to vote an on Election Day 14 15 serving as an election monitor at various polling sites throughout Atlanta where I was often not 16 17 welcomed because of the color of my skin, but 18 nonetheless there to ensure that voting as accessible to all, particularly to the disabled and the elderly 19 20 who stood in the hot sun, determined to exercise 21 their right to vote. I have been an Election 2.2 Commissioner for approximately one month. Although 2.3 one could say it was a baptism by fire, it was exciting. I realized this was an election cycle that 24 25 I may never see again in my lifetime. I attended my

first public meeting with the other Commissioners and four days later early voting began. I sat out to visit polling sites which I did throughout the weekend. I wanted to see how the poll sites were being run, ensuring that the voters were having a good experience and to see that the poll workers were staying safe. I was (INAUDIBLE) by the iconic New York venues, understanding the need to allow everyone to vote safely by opening such venues as the Barclays and Kings Theatre in Brooklyn as a voting site. meant that the community was willing to work with us to think creatively about the voting process and how to make it more accessible. I came to understand that having safe voting sites was not only based on the Board of Election but it was a partnership with the community and venues that agreed to allow the Board of Elections to use their space. As I observed the poll site, I would direct Line Managers to accompany the elderly, disabled, pregnant women and families with children to the head of the line so that would not have to stand too long. Surprisingly, in some cases, where a senior citizen was brought up the line so as not to have to wait, they often refused. They wanted to experience the standing and

proudly voting as such an important election. more compactum site, I directed that the poll workers ensure that people would appropriately socially distance. In one polling site, when I was alerted that voters had issues understanding directions due to language, I directed that they transfer poll workers who spoke that language to that site to add comfort and provide direction to voters in a language that they understood. In another poll site I asked that port-a-potties be placed there for seniors on the line. I was inspired, exhilarated at the voter's determinations to vote and the yeoman's job that the poll workers were doing. On Election Day I traveled to polling sites, I spoke to poll workers and voters alike ensuring all was well. I visited as many polling sites as I could. I even assisted voters. later went to the Brooklyn voting machine facility where the polls closed and observed the police escorts of the return of poll pads, machines and all the ballots back to the facility. I watched and I spoke to the other overnight workers gathered to unload it to begin the process of accounting for all the voting-related materials. I didn't return home until 2 a.m., I was exhausted but it was worth it.

am encouraged by the fact that New York Legislators have been keeping their eye on the goal of creating an accessible system with early voting and most recently having passed legislation that would allow persons as long as they are eligible to be automatically registered to vote upon completing various municipal forms such as a driver's license or health forms at a local hospital. Absentee ballots being counted without a postmark one day after election day as long as it is received in the Board of Elections and date stamped the day after Election Day. I am learning and I recognize there is more work to be done at the board of elections such as making the voting process language accessible for those where English is not their first language. various early voting locating more early voting sites that is ADA compliant and accessible, making all voters aware of early voting sites or the times of operations. Most importantly, having adequate poll workers who are trained and competent allowing for the voting process to run smooth. In my short tenure as an Election Commissioner I have come to understand that huge undertaking of ensuring voters can vote. My focus is to ensure that the election process is

fair, equitable and accessible to all candidates and voters in Brooklyn. I am committed to working with my fellow Commissioners to uphold our Election Laws, following procedures and to make changes that would enable the election process to work for the people. Thank you.

CHAIRPERSON KAREN KOSLOWITZ: Thank you.

Uhm, I have a few questions and then we will open it up to my colleagues. What steps do you think the Board of Elections should take to ensure that it meets its November 28 deadline for certification of this November's General Election considering the large increase in absentee ballots from prior years?

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: Well, they are taking the steps actually and it is increasing the number of people working at the sites, uhm, ensuring that the ballots, the valid ballots are being opened appropriately. Ensuring that where we have contested elections, that is being handled. Uhm, what slows down the process of course, is in the election, in the contested elections uhm you have poll watchers and you have attorneys who are there who are observing everything and could raise objections and that slows down the process, but we have adequate

people on site to ensure that we are finishing and completing on time. While November 28th falls on a Saturday, uhm and we may have that few extra days we are using every moment possible to ensure that we are completed on time.

CHAIRPERSON KAREN KOSLOWITZ: Thank you.

In your opinion, should staff positions, other than election inspector and poll clerk be filled based on party recommendations?

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: Well, we have the statute, the Election Law Statute that allows us uhm to hire people uhm based on that process. Uhm, I think that we should still continue the mechanism of hiring people within the community because of the fact that we need a large number of people in a short period of time and using websites and all of those things might just slow down the process of getting in as many people who require training to be able to adequately have the voting process run smoothly.

CHAIRPERSON KAREN KOSLOWITZ: Okay, and many voters who attempted to vote early in this

November's General Election in Kings County waited in line for several hours. What can Kings County do to

2 expand early voting hours, sites and capacity at
3 existing sites?

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: Well, first of all you have to remember we are in the middle of a pandemic so we have to be concerned about poll worker's safety and the voter's safety. What we did do during this particular early voting election, when we realized that people were coming in earlier, we moved the times that we opened up our sites from, well we varied it because we thought we were helping the community, we moved it all to 7 o'clock, and so the sites were open at 7 o'clock in the morning until the last voter was able to vote. Uhm, that enabled us to help a lot of people who tend to come early, then the site is open to accommodate them. It's I should say its unfortunate, but it shows the tenacity of people, I found like you know a lot of the seniors were very anxious to vote and so while the site opened up at 7, they were there at 5:30, 6 o'clock and that's just them and if my parents had been alive they would be doing the same thing. They would be at the poll site at 5 o'clock even though it opened at 7, but we recognized the need to open earlier and we

2 did it and we probably will do the same thing again 3 for the other, for the next election cycle.

CHAIRPERSON KAREN KOSLOWITZ: Okay, thank you. Does anybody else, my colleagues have any questions that they would like to ask?

LANCE POLIVY: Yes, Chair Koslowitz,

Council Members Treyger and Adams have questions.

CHAIRPERSON KAREN KOSLOWITZ: Okay.

Council Member Treyger?

MARK TREYGER: Thank you so much, Chair Koslowitz and thank you so much for your leadership as always and welcome to Commissioner Pepe-Souvenir. I just wanted to state for the record that Commissioner Pepe-Souvenir as she was initially someone that we were interviewing and having conversations with in the Brooklyn delegation and beyond made herself always available, accessible, answered every question, every single member who wanted to have a chance to speak, ask questions, she made the time, even members beyond the delegation and I want to just publicly acknowledge that and thank her for that. I also want to state that just recently during their own voting process, there was a little issue with a machine right in Coney Island and the

Commissioner was made aware and in record time, there was a response. Usually in the past, we had to wait a long time for a repair person to come down but as soon as she became aware, they had sent folks down to make repairs immediately and that matters because even the poll workers and folks said wow they never saw such a fast response, I just want that into the record and I want to just acknowledge and thank her for that. Uhm, my question today and I think this is something Commission knows that it is an issue that I care very deeply about as the only you know Russianspeaking member of the New York City Council and as someone who has personally witnessed Russian-speaking They are not just Russian speaking, folks who speak Arabic, folks who speak Urdu who have come to a poll site only to be turned away by the information desk because no one can help make sure that they identify their address and their election district to go vote and I can't tell you the number of painful stories we have heard particularly from seniors who face that language barrier and no one could tell them if they are in the right place or not and we lose so many people. So, an issue that I have been working on for a number of years is language

access to have Russian speaking and other language
translators stationed at poll sites and for years
this has been a battle. You know, the City Council
actually under the leadership of Former Speaker
Viverito and then continued under Speaker Johnson
helped provide funding for language translators and
the DOE in a way resisted that funding. Then the
Mayor created a pilot program with the Mayor's Office
of Immigrant Affairs and there is still tension with
the Board of Elections and now they argue that
because the state does not mandate it, that is why
they are not doing it but there is nothing that
prohibits from providing additional language services
and so, Commissioner you and I have talked about this
at great length, where does this effort stand and I
know that you have been very supportive but I think
it is important to get to the record, the support for
a Russian-speaking, Asian, Creole, Arabic, Urdu,
other critical languages that really reflect the
diversity of our neighborhoods and particularly in
areas that suffer from low voter turnout because of
barriers such as language access, so, again I
appreciate your time and your answers today.

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: Thank you so much Council Member Treyger and I appreciate your, your comments. I am humbled by them. Uhm, yes we have had this conversation many times and as a Haitian-American uhm I understand the issue of language access and as I explained during my statement, I was notified that there was an area where there was a language issue and I immediately had them send people who spoke that language to that area because I know the importance of language access. I am relatively new, I just started, so the conversation of language access is one that I am bringing to the table and I am pushing fervently uhm for us to have that. I know that you have been working on it for quite some time and I want to join you uhm as being a Commissioner and being at the table to discuss it and to discuss the importance of it and to show how it can affect uhm the issue of voting in many communities. could not say to you at this stage here it is because it is a conversation that is about to be brought up. As I said, I came in, in the middle of the heat of the election cycle so it was just concentrating on working on ensuring that people could vote, that we were keeping everybody safe during this pandemic but

certainly it is an issue that is at the top of my list and you and I share that concern as well. So, you know, I hope over time that you will see uhm if we can make changes, if there are Legislative changes to support us that we will be doing that.

MARK TREYGER: Well, I appreciate that and you have been a very uhm courageously outspoken leader in this effort, more than many folks from the past I will say. In the Board of Elections this has not always been an issue that the folks have always prioritized but you certainly have and you hit the ground running and I appreciate how responsive and accessible you have been already to districts like mine who have historically been very marginalized and ignored and so I really appreciate you taking on this role. This is not easy. This is one of the most critical functions of our Democracy and so I appreciate you and to Chair Koslowitz and to my colleagues I am enthusiastically, enthusiastically in support of Commissioner Pepe-Souvenir for her dedication, her leadership and I look forward to working with us on this issue and many more and I thank the Chair for her time.

I just want to add that I have 60,000 Bukharian

people in my community and I have the same problem in
the Queens, and with that, Council Member Adams.

ADRIENNE ADAMS: Thank you so much Madam Chair, I could get into the diversity of Queens right now as well but I will not chime in on that. Welcome Commissioner Pepe-Souvenir, it is a pleasure to be in your company today. Uhm we have heard so many great things about you so I definitely celebrate your appointment as well. I just have one question along one line because this is, this is very important, it is a nuance uhm to the BOE, many City, State and local leadership, Community Boards and voters are very, very concerned about the Board of Elections preparedness with regard to handling ranked choice voting in the next election cycle which is coming up very quickly on us. So, I just want to get your feelings, I've spoken with others who are involved in Board of Election leadership and I just, I know that you are new, on a scale of one to ten, as a Commissioner, what is your level of comfortability with rank choice voting and the mandate of the Board of Elections to serve the voters?

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: I have to say my level of comfortability having spoken to my fellow Commissioners and heard the conversations at the table, it is about an 8, 9 at this point. They recognize the need for more than anything education, uhm educating voters, educating everyone about it and ready to work with organizations around the City uhm and uhm, the Legislative Body such as the Mayors, CC and the like to ensure that we educate our voters on what rank choice voting is. Uhm, I am particularly very sensitive, of course, to the immigrant community who may not be familiar with what it means. You know everytime I, I think of things and I do things I look at it from the lens of my parents because my parents, English was a second language for them and I being the first one born in America was the American who could translate everything and I understand that and I recognize in some communities they don't have that. They don't have a child or a relative who can translate for them and having information about how that is supposed to work, how rank choice voting is supposed to work is paramount to the minds of the people at the Board of Election and so we are preparing, we are getting ready, we are working with

you know media and all of that to get the information out as early as possible. So, I am comf... (CROSS-TALK) working together.

ADRIENNE ADAMS: I appreciate your response and just to put that again on the front burner as I have with uhm with a lot of your colleagues, it is a grave concern. We speak about it out here and we've got quite frankly a big question mark over the voters' heads because we are very concerned. Community Board leaders don't know what this is and as to, up until right now, quite frankly this has not been a priority for the Board of Elections. They have been waiting for the election, the Presidential Election to get out of the way before focusing on this thing that is now coming at us like a freight train. So, I am going to encourage you and implore you to do everything in your power to continue to prepare your colleagues at the Board of Elections for this freight train heading our way. Thank you so much.

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: Thank you so much and I do recognize that and I appreciate you. Thank you.

DEBORAH ROSE: Okay, hi, thank you Chair. I was trying to lower my hand before Lance answered because my sister, Council Member Adams and I are sympatico that has been my issue, my over-arching I am so worried that voters, that voters don't even understand rank choice voting and uhm and so Council Member Adams articulated my concerns. Ι want, but I did want to ask you uhm since you recognize and I was really impressed with your answers to, to the questionnaire and you recognize that we need to educate the electorate, how, how, I'm really interested in how the Board of Elections plans to do that? You know, uhm, it's, it's one thing ot say that we are going to educate them, but we know. I am a Chair of a Committee and one of the things the City does not do well is outreach and education uhm you know and making you know information readily available. What, what steps are, is BOE going to

take to actually educate the voters that they
understand this process and uhm and I want to commend
you for being able to you know be thrown. You are,
emerging by fire. You have little time to get
acclimated to it. I was really worried. I had
spoken with Commissioner Antella (SP?) uhm because
she was filling both roles for Brooklyn and Staten
Island and I know how concerned she was about whether
or not Brooklyn would be able to meet some of the
challenges with you know, uhm without a Commissioner
in place and I want to say that you know it is
admirable that you were able to, to jump in there and
expedited it and get things done. When Council
Member Treyger has high praise for someone uhm you
know all I can say is, I can only co-sign so, uhm I
want to thank you about that but I am really, really
seriously concerned about rank choice and how we are
going to educate the electorate because most people
don't understand it, including the candidates that
are running for my seat. Thank you, if you could
answer that for me?

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: So, so what I've

learned so far is the Committee is partnering with

community organizations to get the information out,

uhm having materials that are in a basic language for people to understand. Once we have uhm buy in from the community organizations and spending the time to really get them to understand the process, it is through those organizations that will help train the electorate. That is what we are working on doing, along with social media, along with literature, along with putting things on our website for people to have access to. Uhm, so it's, it's a working hand in hand with not only community organizations but with elected officials using everything in our power, because like you, I understand the concern of ensuring that people understand how this works and if not just for the electorate it is like you said for the elected officials as well. They want to be able to know that they are on a fair playing field with everybody else and nobody is left by the wayside. So, we are really seriously working on getting that information out, yes, this election cycle was very different than what we normally were used to. We had over 700,000 ballots that we had actually count and that is what we are doing. We were ready to have this information so we could certify everything to have the electoral college sit, (INAUDIBLE) to put

the electoral college in place, so there is a lot going on but rank choice voting is certainly at the forefront it is not on the back burner at all.

DEBORAH ROSE: Is there a timeline uhm that you know that is in place for when we are going to start to see some of the materials and uhm I know after the conversation with Council Member Treyger I know they will be in all of the representative languages that we have in New York City but is there a timeline that you know that we can begin to see this. I mean because I was really concerned, like we had propositions on a ballot on election cycle but there was no real education and so that's how rank choice voting got you know, got voted on and there was no real you know, uhm education, uhm around it and uhm and even you know the advocates didn't do, didn't put any money into you know advocating for it or not advocating for it. So, I am just concerned that we will do it not in a timely manner where it will be rushed and, you know, we will be trying to get people to understand it and there just won't be adequate time. So, is there a timeline and, and can we make it really soon.

RODNEY PEPE-SOUVENIR: Well yeah, let's try to make it really soon. I unfortunately, because of my newness I don't know what the timeline is. know the conversation has been had and because the concentration was on getting this out. The Chairperson 10 11 of the Standing Committee Rory Lancman resigned from 12 the City Council on November 4, 2020. This rule 13 change requires a majority vote of all members of the Committee of Rules, Privileges and Elections pursuant 14 15 to Rule 7.70 (a) and a majority vote of all Council Members pursuant to Rule 10.20. Today's second pre-16 17 considered resolution pursuant to that same power 18 amends Rule 7.00 (a) by changing the membership of 19 certain Standing Committees and the Land Use 20 Subcommittee on Zoning and Franchises. This rule 21 change simply requires a majority vote of the 2.2 Committee of Rules, Privileges and Elections pursuant 2.3 to Rule 7.70 and a majority vote of the Council pursuant to Rule 10.20.
