CHAIR KOO: (gavel) Thank you for joining our virtual hearing today before the Council's Committee on Parks and Recreation. I would like to acknowledge my fellow Council Members who are present today, Council Members Diaz, Adams, Council Member Cohen, Council Member Levine, Brannan, Council Member Holden, Council Member Van Bramer, and Council Member... I have the list here. Sorry and Council Member Van Bramer, Council Member Gjonaj, Council Member Moya Council Member Borelli Council Member Gibson. We are here today to vote

CHAIR KOO: Thank you Chair. I mean Cohen, yeah on the Council Affairs. Thank you for your dedication and your service on the Parks Committee you know. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER COHEN: Thank you.

CLERK: Levine.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: Permission to briefly explain that we will miss Council Member Cohen terribly.

CHAIR KOO: Please go ahead. Yeah.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVINE: (laughs) Well, you, you've been a stalwart member of this committee

Council Member and Minority Leader Tom Agnibene

who served ten years in the Council with
distinction and was really a role model for me as
a Council Member in delivering constituent
services and redoing parks by the way. He
constructed so many parks in the district that
that was a kind of a and I worked with him on
that for almost ten years in coordinating that.
So, I just want to recognize Tom Agnibene for his
work. Unfortunately, we lost him at the age of 71
and this is, this is my way and the community's
way of honoring Tom Agnibene. Thank you so much
Chair and I vote aye.

CHAIR KOO: Thank you.

CLERK: MOYA.

COUNCIL MEMBER MOYA: I vote aye.

CLERK: Thank you. Diaz. The vote is our Diaz.

COUNCIL MEMBER DIAZ: I vote aye. Aye

CLERK: Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER DIAZ: You're welcome.

I just want to second what Council Member Holden said about Agnibene, a real giant, and an important part of the institution of the City Council played a very close role and friendship with former Speaker Vallone, and putting New York City back on track and saving New York City. So, I'm so proud to cast vote in favor of the street renamings and to honor Tom Agnibene and all the other wonderful people that will be honored today. I vote aye.

CLERK: Thank you. Council Member Borelli.

COUNCIL MEMBER BORELLI: (Bell)

Okay, by a vote of 10 in the affirmative, zero in the negative and no abstentions, Preconsidered

CHAIR KOO: Thank you, Council Members who are here today to vote for this very important bill. We are here to honor all these hills for the contributions to the New York City. So, this meeting is being adjourned. (gavel)

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the city. This co-naming bills are the result of the Council's periodic process where we seek to honor individuals and organizations that have made lasting contributions to the people of our city. Some of this includes co-names for active community members, heroic New Yorkers who sacrificed their lives for others, people who committed their lives to public services or those who greatly enriched the city's cultural landscape. Of the many people honored by this piece of legislation, I would like to call attention to three New Yorkers who dedicated their lives to public services, former Council Members Thomas

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Ognibene Lewis Fidler and Randall Foster. Tom Ognibene served in the Council from 1991 to 2001, and Lew Fidler served from 2002 to 2013. Randall Foster was the first African American from Bronx for holding elected office and served with great distinction for 24 years in the Council. These individuals were power champions for their communities and constituents, and have left our city, left our officials with a great legacy to live up to. I am happy to support this this bill, and I urge all my colleagues on the committee to vote in favor of this legislation. Before we conduct the bill...before we conduct the vote, we will hear testimony from a few individuals who will speak on behalf of some of the New Yorkers we are honoring today. Once their testimony is concluded, we will hold a vote on this bill. Thank you. would like...I would now like to turn it over to our moderator Committee Counsel Kris Sartori to go over some of the procedural items.

COUNSEL SARTORI: Thank you, Chair Koo. Just to note, we've also been joined by Council Members, Council Member Gibson and Council Member Borelli. Good morning. I'm Kris Sartori. I'm

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the Senior Counsel to the Parks committee, and I will be moderating the hearing. Before we begin, I'd like to remind everyone that you will be on mute until you are called on to testify at which point you will be unmuted by the host. During the hearing I'll be calling on the various panels to testify so please listen for your name to be called (bell) as I'll periodically be announcing who the next panelists will be. For this hearing we will be hearing testimony only from members of the public. During the hearing if Council Members would like to ask a question of a specific panelist, please use the Zoom Hand Raise function, and I will call on you in order. For members of the public who will testify please state your name and the organization you represent, if any once it's your time to speak. Once public testimony has concluded we will conduct a vote on the preconsidered co-naming legislation once we have a quorum of Parks Committee members. At this time, I will invite the first panelist to speak. So far, we have two panelists that have registered to speak. I will call on Ashook Ramsaran (sp?) to testify and he will be followed by Kevin Loweninston (sp?) Mr.

Ramsaran, you may begin your testimony. Thank you.

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ASHOOK RAMSARAN: Good morning. Thank you for the opportunity to make my testimony public. My name is Ashook Ramsaran. I represent the Indian Diaspora Council as well as the Committee to co-name one block in honor of Pundik Rumlow to be called Pundik Rulow's Way one block of 133rd Street between Liberty Avenue and 101st Street and Fifth Avenue in Queens. I want to thank Council Member Adrienne Adams for her help in reaching this bill, getting this far and with her quidance, and her encouragement it has reached this stage. We are seeing you approval for coding this one block in honor of the late Damachario Pundik Rumlow (sp?) a selfless and avid community advocate who passed away on January 26, 2019 at the age of 91. There is overwhelming community board, community residents, religious, business and organizational support for this application. Over 5,000 signatures, dozens of letters of support and petitions submitted. In fact, we have a 90-page volume that was presented to the Council Member Adams in support of this request. This gentleman founded the area This gentleman founded the area's legislation. Fraser Center of New York, and the same center is used for various community events including events

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including the annual Gandhi Peace March, the Diwali Parade, the Mine (sic) in the Park, etcetera. As can be seen from this extensive bio, the late Damachario and the Pundit Rumlow was a very respected iconic spiritual leader and scholar, a pandering community advocate who woold be recognized locally and internationally for his lifelong community service. He founded the Annual holiday, holy parade in New York and Queens Borough President declared March 23, 2003 as Spanish (sic) Rumlow week. (sic) He was indeed a tremendous asset to the community with a lifetime of service to spirituality, justice and freedom. We followed all the protocols and procedures in filing this application, and we are supporters who are diligently in favor of this. Queens is the most diverse community and the rate of Pundik Rumlow represented the best and by the Somoans. (sic) Our community even looks forward to this New York City Council approval. Thank you for your consideration. Any questions, I'm... COUNSEL SARTORI: Thank you, sir. Do any

COUNSEL SARTORI: Thank you, sir. Do any members questions or wish to speak? Thank you.

Council Member, I see Council Member Adams does have a question.

COUNCIL MEMBER ADAMS: I do. I was looking for
my Raise Hand. I couldn't find it all of a sudden. I
just want to congratulate Mr. Ramsaran. It has been
an absolute pleasure and honor to knowing you over
the years, and then it's more of an honor for me to
help make this happen. It is more than a pleasure for
me. I don't think I've ever seen a package put
together like yours. Five signatures more for this
amazing individual who more than deserves this street
co-naming. So, congratulations to you, and I salute
you and, of course, I will always salute Pundik
Rumlow. Thank you.

ASHOOK RAMSARAN: In fact, this volume may be presented a new, live new library in Queens in the local community there for others to read as well. They started handing them.

COUNCIL MEMBER ADAMS: Amazing. Thank you.

COUNSEL SARTORI: Thank you very much.

We will now hearing testimony from Mr. Kevin Livingston. You may begin. Thank you.

KEVIN LIVINGSTON: Good morning. I would be delighted. Thank you so much for having me. First, happy holidays to all you and Family and Creole (sic) as well as well. This is a very a... This is

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really, really gratifying to me. I want to thank Council Member Adams for your leadership in allowing my hero community hero Henry Clayton to be brought to this level. A little bit about Henry Clayton. He was an entrepreneur from Southeast Queens back in the '90s. He had one of the largest black and brown owned travel agency in the South, in Queens that employed over 40 to 50 people from our area. Rockville Village in particular, Mr. Clayton had employed 25 young people to learn the travel industry. He would pull them off the street. I would go down the block and walk with my bag. Henry Clayton is my father, and he would go down South Road, areas of the great 28 Council Districts, and, and, and buy clothes for homeless men and women. He often would ride down...he also owned a Frito Lay van (sic) that would go down Sutton Boulevard in the great 28 and pick up young men on the street and give them an opportunity to work. He's done this for 25 years until he went into his travel agency. Henry Clayton is my hero. Clayton is the reason why 100 Suits does what it does in the community. I've learned the things that I've do with senior citizens through Henry Clayton.

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He used to take the community Roman side of Allen Cathedral... I'm sorry, Allen Senior Center and buy lunches for the seniors every month. I've learned my community activism through him. The corner of 137th and 169th is where he had his hub of Hinden Travel that allowed young men and women to learn the industry. He's worked with everybody from the President of Archfield Village to Assembly woman Cook, and he has ringing support all around Southeast Queens. Some of the notables just call him Captain who has reached out and given me his support on this legislation allowing the street conaming of Henry Clayton. I just want you all to understand the enormity of what he's had in Southeast Queens, and to what he's meant to our young people, and when he's put the battery in my back to continue every day the things that I do with a hundred suits. I thank you for getting me to this moment, and I thank you for allowing or considering to continue my dad's legacy, and allowing young black boys and girls to look at that street corner, brown boys and girls, white boys and girls, Asians. No matter your ethnicity, race, creed or color to look at that and see a real community hero, a real

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community champion that cared about people and did

something that's real New York to me is put people

first. That's what Henry Clayton is, and that's why

5 I'm testifying on his behalf.

COUNSEL SARTORI: Thank you Mr. Williamson.

Quickly. I just wanted to congratulate Mr.

Livingston on this day, on this submission. It is not often that we are able to celebrate heroes in the Black communities such as your dad was, and I'm so very happy to be able to have co-sponsored this legislation in his memory. So, thank you very much and congratulations. (bell)

COUNSEL SARTORI: Thank you. Council Member Diaz

I believe wished to speak next.

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thank you to both the presenters for following in the foot steps of the community advocates presented here today. As a community advocate, you allow me to reflect the many members of my community who have taken part in such behavior as yours. Thank you for pursuing the legacy. People need to know in our communities who did what. Often when leadership moves on to a different state of life our heroes are dying. So, again thank you both for presenting and moving forward, and allowing me to be a part today of our process, and honoring your heroes.

We're are better for it. Thank you.

just want to note we've been joined by Council
Members Koslowitz and Council Member, Council
Member Rose as well. I believe that was the last
