spiritual leader at the Crown Heights JCC and also a

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very good friend right in the heart of my district in
Crown Heights. Thank you.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Hey, Cumbo, we share the rabbi. Take it easy. [laughter]

RABBI COHEN: No problem.

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MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Rabbi Cohen is all of our rabbi.

RABBI COHEN: Yes. So I'm joining the meeting from my office here in Crown Heights, where the Hanukkah menorah is ready, right here, to be light for the first night of Hanukkah. I want to thank the Majority Leader, our dear Council Member Laurie Cumbo, and also our beloved speaker for this invitation in honoring our community on this eve of Hanukkah. I also have to single out, I'm sorry everybody else, but I want to single out the members that represent Crown Heights, Council Members Eugene, Ampry-Samuel, and Cornegy. So a special shout-out to, to all of you. I also ask you to join me at the suggestion of the Lubavitch Rebbe. I'm holding up here a charity box and I'm putting a quarter in as a symbolic gift to charity, and if you have your own charity box in your home or your office, or wherever else you are please join me in that important act.

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2 This was the suggestion of the Rebbe many years ago 3 to another rabbi who was leaving such an invocation. 4 It's a Chabad custom that we sit and watch the lights of the menorah for half an hour after we kindle them. And while we're watching them, one of our great 6 7 rebbes taught, we must listen to the message of the 8 Hanukkah lights. So what is the special message that these lights are going to be telling us tonight? from Proverbs it says, "For the light of God is the 10 11 soul of man." These lights tell us that every single 12 one of us has a soul inside whose job is to bring 13 illumination and brightness into this world. Many have described these past months as a time of 14 15 darkness, of loss, and of suffering, and indeed we've 16 felt this personally. But throughout we've seen 17 bright souls who have brought healing, comfort, and 18 even joy to those around them. These Hanukkah lights 19 tell us that every one of us can be a bright light, 20 helping our neighbors with charity, with a kind word, 21 and with a helping hand. The New York City Council 2.2 has been the flame to kindle many of those candles by 2.3 supporting initiatives by great organizations throughout the city. So let us pray that you, 24 members of the City Council, be blessed with good 25

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health, with strength, and with wisdom to continue your important work. May you merit to see the success of your initiatives and may we all see you shepherd this city to be safe and prosperous in this tumultuous time. May the Create bless and keep our brave first responders and health workers as they defend us and heal the vulnerable and the sick. He bless our essential workers and all the volunteers at food pantries, social service programs, and other good works throughout the city. And we pray for the good health and good fortune of every single resident in New York City, from our seniors to our children, as we will quickly recover them this pandemic. And may the lights of the Hanukkah menorah usher in the redemption with masiach, a time of great light when good will triumph over evil and where jealousy, war, sickness, and hatred will be abolished, and the world will be filled with the knowledge of God as the waters cover the ocean.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much, Rabbi Cohen. It's always an honor and a blessing to have you here for your very timely words. It's good to see everyone and I hope everyone is well. In my district it is a pleasure to have Rabbi

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Cohen here today. Ever since I've known Rabbi Cohen, since the beginning of my tenure, I have admired his perseverance and unique ability to work with everyone in my diverse district. In addition to being ED of the Crown Heights JCC, which has a robust food pantry and an array of social services, I especially appreciate Rabbi Cohen's footprint in the work he is doing in building bridges with our unique and diverse communities, including, but not limited, to the Hasidic community, the African American, and the Caribbean American communities through Project Care and other initiatives. A little background now. Rabbi Cohen, born and educated in England, has been a resident of Crown Heights since 1973. He received rabbinical ordination in 1980 from the Central Lubavitch Yeshiva in Brooklyn. Soon after their wedding he and his wife worked for three years and founded an outreach social service program in San Francisco, California. Then for 18 years he ran the Chabad in New York University, building a vibrant Jewish communal and religious life on the NYU campus and providing spiritual guidance to the students, facility, and staff. After a couple of years at yeshiva, administrator and board liaison, in 2009

Rabbi Cohen was selected as executive director of
Crown Heights Jewish Community Council, where he has
worked to further the council's mission of providing
assistance to all of the residents of Crown Heights,
including every ethnic group and creed, for the
purpose of creative a more cohesive community and
representing the Crown Heights neighborhood to the
broader New York community. I want to thank you so
much for being here today. I want to thank you for
the incredible work that you are doing in our
community. I know many people that, ah, many of my
colleagues that are here today also want to claim
you. Um, but at this time I will be claiming you and
I make a motion to spread the invocation on full onto

Majority Leader. Good afternoon, very happy Thursday to you all. As always, I hope you and your families are safe and healthy. We are sadly continuing to see an unfortunate surge in COVID-19 cases throughout our city. As we head into the winter and cold weeks ahead, I want to note how important it is to continue adhering to what public experts call the core four - staying home if you're sick, wearing a mask, washing your hands, and keeping six feet apart and doing social distancing. New Yorkers have flattened the curve before and we have to do it again. We all know

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that it's tough, but the alternative is tougher. We have the power to save lives by wearing a mask. have lost too many New Yorkers to this devastating As of yesterday, 24,411 New Yorkers have disease. died from coronavirus and that includes probable deaths. This is more than a number. These are family members, loved ones, neighbors, parents, grandparents, this is our community and our city. want to also acknowledge, as I always do, a few of the folks we've lost from 9/11-related illnesses since we last met. We recently lost Auxiliary Officer Michael Dorian and Officer Frank Rosado of the NYPD, as well as EMT Donnell Ford of Jamaica Hospital, and we are sending our deepest condolences to their families during this difficult time. city, New York City, will be forever grateful for their sacrifice and service to our city. I also want to acknowledge a major loss for our city since we last met. Mayor David Dinkins, our city's first black mayor and a man who fought for the most vulnerable in our city, died on November 23. He was a model for so many who entered public service after him. He never stopped looking after those who needed him the most. He was a mentor to so many on how to

serve with dignity and with commitment. He believed
New York City could meet any challenge it faced by
working collectively. He talked about the gorgeous
mosaic of our city, our heart, my heart, is with his
family and loved ones. It is a major loss. Rest in
peace and rest in power David Dinkins. Today New
York City lost another beloved civic leader and a
true bridge-builder, Dr. Ahmed Jabar, a Muslim
activist who made our city stronger, died this
morning. We all grieve with the Muslim and Arab
community for this major loss and we are grateful for
his dedication to his community and to our city. I

the lives that we've lost as a result of coronavirus,

John's tireless efforts here have helped communities all across New York City and I am wishing you the best, John, on your next steps, 6 7 and we are grateful for all the work that you have 8 done here at the council. Thank you so much. also losing a core member of our team, Briana Mulligan, who is the first deputy press secretary 10 11 here in the speaker's office. Bri joined the 12 speaker's office in 2017 under Speaker Mark-Viverito, 13 and has been in with the council since 2014, initially joining the office of Council Member Paul 14 15 Vallone. For the past few years she has brought so 16 much dedication to this role and the entire council 17 has benefitted from her work. So all of your years 18 of service to the council are appreciated, Bri. are excited for your next steps. We are proud of 19 20 you. Thank you all for all of your hard work here at 21 the council. I want to extend a special welcome to a 2.2 newly elected Council Member, Darma Diaz. We are so 2.3 excited to have you here as a Council Member. Congratulations. Ah, we are excited to get to work 24 25 with you and I know how excited you are to get to

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work on behalf of your constituents. So you were 2 3 doing that work before you were elected, so this is 4 just an extension of that. So I want to congratulate you and welcome you to your first Stated Meeting of the City Council. Congratulations, Council Member D. 6 Diaz. Ah, yesterday was Council Member Adrienne 7 8 Adams' birthday. Council Member Adams, I would sing you Happy Birthday, but it would not sound great, and you are the real singer in the council, so I want to 10 11 just wish you a happy birthday, and I hope you had a 12 great day with Jay and with your family. And last, 13 but not least, as you heard from Rabbi Cohen, I want to, ah, everyone a happy and healthy Hanukkah. 14 15 want to wish everyone a really beautiful celebration 16 of the miracle of the Festival of Lights, which 17 begins tonight. To all of our Jewish colleagues, 18 Happy Hanukkah. To all of, ah, Jewish New Yorkers 19 and, and Jews around the country and around the 20 world, Happy Hanukkah. We hope you have a really beautiful celebration over the course of Hanukkah. 21 2.2 And now on to our agenda. Out of the Land Use 2.3 Committee we'll be voting on the following five land use items. The Department of Sanitation, Queens 24 25 Sanitation Garage One, this is a site selection, ah,

2	to facilitate the relocation of a garage and salt
3	shed to Council Member Costa Constantinides'
4	district. HPD has committed to providing 100%
5	affordable housing at the former site. The Special
6	Flushing Waterfront District, a series of zoning
7	actions which will facilitate the development of 1700
8	units of housing and new commercial space on the
9	Flushing waterfront, in addition to new waterfront
10	open space and new recreation center, and over 3000
11	jobs in Council Member Peter Koo's district. The
12	Bedford Avenue overlay extension, a rezoning in
13	Council Member Antonio Reynoso's district, which will
14	facilitate the development of a three-story mixed use
15	building with commercial and residential uses above.
16	803 Rockaway Avenue rezoning in Council Member Inez
17	Barron's district, which will facilitate the
18	development of a new mixed use building continuing
19	ground floor manufacturing and approximately 174
20	units of affordable housing, including 80 units for
21	formerly homeless adults. Mansion Restaurant
22	Sidewalk Cafe amendment in Council Member Kallos'
23	district. Moving on to our legislative agenda, we'll
24	be voting on two important resolutions that support
25	the repeal of the walking while trans law. Both

resolutions are sponsored by Council Member Carlina
Rivera. For too long the trans community has been
unjustly targeted by law enforcement. Walking while
trans is not a crime and the state penal code should
reflect that. Resolution 1444-A calls on the state
legislature to pass and the governor to sign a bill
to allow violations of for any loitering for the
purpose of engaging in prostitution offense to be
sealed. This law would apply retroactively if passed
by the legislature and signed by the governor. The
next resolution by Council Member Rivera related to
this is Resolution 923, which would declare the
council support for Senate Bill 2243 and Assembly
Bill 654, sponsored by Senator Hoylman and Assembly
Member Polin, which repeals the law that we're
talking about, also known as Penal Law Section
240.37, and often referred to as walking while trans
statute. I want to thank the staff who worked on
this, Chloe Rivera, Brenda McKinney, John Blasko,
Smeeta Desmuk, Andrea Vazquez, and Zeamanuel Halu.
Our next bill is a Housing and Buildings bill,
Introduction number 2033-A, sponsored by the chair of
our Housing and Buildings Committee, Council Member
Robert Cornegy, would permit the Department of

2	Buildings to issue an interim certificate of
3	occupancy to allow for the occupancy of a building
4	before the final certificate of occupancy is issued.
5	The bill would not apply to residential buildings
6	with fewer than eight stories or four dwelling units,
7	nonresidential buildings with fewer than five
8	stories, mixed use buildings with fewer than four
9	dwelling units, or parking structures. And I want to
10	thank Council Member Cornegy, ah, for this
11	legislation. Ah, and I want to thank the staff who
12	worked on this, ah, Genan Zilka, ah, for her work on
13	the bill. Introduction, ah, number 1170-A, sponsored
14	by Council Member Ritchie Torres, will prohibit the
15	sale of biometric identifier information. It would
16	also require certain commercial establishments, such
17	as retailers, restaurants, entertainment venues, to
18	post signage notifying customers if they collect
19	biometric identifier information. Financial
20	institutions are exempt from the signage requirement,
21	as are businesses with security cameras that are not
22	used for automated identification of individuals and
23	do not share video footage except with law
24	enforcement. This bill requires the city's chief
25	privacy officer with the relevant agencies to conduct

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outreach and education to affected commercial establishments. And I want to thank from the staff Valkys Mireg, Leah Skirpiak, Noah Mexler, Florentine Kabor, David Sitzer, and Rachel Cordero for their work on that bill. Next up we're voting on a bill related to the issue of mold in public housing. know that mold remains a chronic problem in NYCHA units and we must do everything we can to alert tenants to their right to live in a mold-free environment. There are places and people to help them and we are pleased that this bill promotes awareness of these resources. Introduction number 1911-A, again sponsored by Council Member Ritchie Torres, will require an office or agency designated by the mayor to distribute a pamphlet or other printed documents that contain information about the mold ombudsperson, the mold ombudsperson's call center, and how to make a complaint to the mold ombudsperson to every NYCHA tenant. The office would also be required to communicate this information to each tenant by telephone. For tenants enrolled in electronic billing the office can opt to send the information via email instead of distributing a paper This legislation would also require the

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designated office to distribute such a pamphlet to certain elected officials and community representatives and to hold a public briefing at least once a year to provide information about the mold ombudsperson. And I want to thank Audrey San from the staff for her work on that bill. this council enacted the historic Fair Chance Act to ensure everyone has equal access to employment. pandemic we are in has posed a public health and economic crisis, ah, and right now any barrier to employment is devastating. Individuals with criminal histories face significant barriers to stable employment. In an effort to strengthen employment protections the council will vote to strengthen the Fair Chance Act, which, again, was enacted by the council in 2015. Introduction 1314-A, sponsored by Public Advocate Jumaane Williams by request of the mayor, would add unsealed violations and adjournments in contemplation of dismissal to the category of dispositions that may never be considered for the purpose of making employment-related decisions. would also extend the protections of the Fair Chance Act to current employees. This bill would also prohibit discrimination in licensing against

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applicants with convictions for violations even prior 2 3 to sealing. And I want to thank from the staff 4 Valkys Mireg, Wayam Daori, Neven Singh, David Sitzer, 5 and Rachel Cordero. Our final two bills are an effort to support the arts and cultural sector of our 6 city, very excited about these bills. The COVID-19 7 8 pandemic has had devastating effects on this sector. It has brought on closures, restrictions, and the canceling of so much programming that our arts 10 11 community does in our city. The arts are integral to 12 the health of our city and they are hurting so much. These bills give them a chance to survive, much like 13 14 we did with Open Streets and outdoor dining. 15 will also enliven our streets and bring so much joy to New Yorkers when we could use more joy during this 16 17 I want to Majority Leader Cumbo and difficult time. 18 the chair of our cultural affairs committee, Council 19 Member Van Bramer, for their commitment to arts and 20 culture. Introduction 2034-A, sponsored by Majority 21 Leader Cumbo, will require the creation of a website 2.2 that would provide information on open spaces 2.3 designated by the city for arts and cultural programming, such as roadways, parks, or pedestrian 24 25 plazas. It would facilitate the use of such space by

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arts and cultural institutions by allowing users to 2 3 search for open space on a map, as well as providing 4 information on other arts and cultural events in the city, either hosted by an arts or cultural 5 institution or outdoor events held on private 6 7 property. The next bill, Introduction number 2068-A, sponsored by the chair of our cultural affairs 8 committee, Council Member Van Bramer, would require the city to create an open culture program that would 10 11 allow eligible arts and cultural institutions or 12 cultural venues to use approved public street space 13 for artistic or cultural events. This program would be similar to the concept of the, it would be similar 14 15 to the concept of open restaurants, ah, our outdoor 16 dining program that launched earlier this year. 17 There would be an application fee of \$20 for 18 participation in the program to cover some costs and 19 discourage frivolous applications. But participation 20 in the program would otherwise be free. 21 Department of Transportation would be required to share a list of spaces for the program by February 1, 2.2 2.3 2021, in just a few months, and the Mayor's Office of Citywide Event Coordination and Management, which 24 houses the city's permit office, would establish the 25

Open Culture Program by March 1, 2021. The program will remain in effect until October 31, 2021, with the possibility of extension, but it would expire by March 31, 2022. Ah, these bills were complicated. They took a long time. The staff worked really hard on them, as well as the members. And I want to thank from the staff Brenda McKinney, Christie Dwyer, Andrea Vazquez, Smeeta Desmuk, and Zeamanuel Halu. That concludes today's legislative agenda. 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2 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Koo, Van Bramer, 3 and Menchaca. OK. We will begin with Council Member

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COUNCIL MEMBER KOO: Thank you, thank you, Majority Leader. Thank you, Speaker. Today we are voting on the Special Flushing Waterfront in my district. This vote comes after decades of planning and proposals, starts and stops, meetings and hearings. And I'm very happy that the applicants and neighbor groups were able to arrive at an agreement that will include good-paying jobs, good-paying local jobs, for the Flushing community. On a grander scale, we have a commitment to an economic shot in the arm for Flushing and the city at a time when we need it most. We are getting a commitment from the development team with long-standing ties to our community, who will finally connect downtown Flushing to its waterfront with an expanded promenade with playgrounds, pedestrian trails, and open spaces. are getting 30% affordable housing on the rezoned portion of the site on site four. Importantly, the applicants have entered into an agreement with the city to further engage in discussions over the next three years with HPD and the council to work on ways

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to secure financing so we can maximum the amount of affordable housing on site. This is critical because we all know the pandemic has caused cuts across the board. So it was necessary to look to the future when we are not so set back by budget cuts, when we can work on securing funding for more affordability. To name some benefits, we are getting a commitment to sustainable shore infrastructure that won't contribute CSO to the Flushing Creek, and a commitment...

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time expired.

Stabilization that goes beyond the required
[inaudible] sustainability measures. We also have
commitments to direct waterfront assets, education,
and programming. We are getting workforce agreements
with the Queens Chamber of Commerce and the Flushing
Business Improvement District. They will focus on
the hiring from both of our [inaudible] developments
at [inaudible] Houses and Latimer Gardens, as well as
12 million dollars to support small businesses
impacted by the development over the next 10 years.
We are getting new, we are getting new community
facility spaces, including a new set-aside for youth

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mentoring and [inaudible] recreational space for [inaudible] food pantry. This is in addition to numerous financial contributions and equipment donations to help support the pantry's mission. most importantly, at a time when the City of New York is struggling financially we are getting a commitment to good-paying jobs with 32BJ and XTC, as well as thousands of temporary jobs and estimated 160 million dollars in property tax revenues. This kind of economic development can help New Yorkers get back on their feet. I would like to thank Speaker Johnson, Chairs Moya and Salamanca, Raju Mann, Jason Goldman, Ebony Meets, Anthony Paris, and Genevieve Michael, Amy Leviden, John Durgas, Arthur Hu, Julia Rubin, and the entire land use division. I would also like to thank the Waterfront Alliance, [inaudible] Latimer Gardens, [inaudible] food pantry, City Parks Foundation, Queen Chamber of Commerce, the Flushing Business Improvement District, 32BJ, XTC, and all the other groups who were engaged throughout this process, and also my own staff, especially Ling Chong and Scott Seaver. I especially would like to thank the applicants and the labor unions who came together despite a lot of misinformation from those who would

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prefer nothing for, for those who would prefer
nothing to be [inaudible] here at all. We have all
struggled in this pandemic and this isn't perfect.

But we simply cannot afford to continue our demands
for the perfect, we cannot simply continue, we cannot
simply afford to continue our demands for the perfect
[inaudible] of over the good. This is a good
compromise that will address many of the issues we
heard from many public hearings to provide goodpaying, good-paying union jobs, affordable housing,
and a host of other community benefits. I encourage
all of you, my colleagues, to vote in favor of this
project. Thank you very much, Mr. Speaker and
Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so much, Council Member Koo. We will now hear from Council Member Van Bramer, followed by Council Member Menchaca.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time begins.

COUNCIL MEMBER VAN BRAMER: Thank you very much. I'm gonna shift gears and talk about open culture a little bit. Ah, Intro 2068-A, which I'm, ah, very proud to be the prime sponsor of, is a, not only a cultural bill, it's a small business, ah,

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2 bill, it's a job creation bill. It creates for the 3 first time a one-stop-shop for expedited permits, ah, for cultural organizations, individual artists, and 4 5 other performing arts venues. And most importantly the performances will be able to be ticketed events 6 7 and these organizations and artists will be able to 8 charge for the performances. It's incredibly important that we allow artists to be paid for the work that they create, ah, and they perform. Ah, the 10 11 New York City Open Streets Program will be a source 12 of dancing and singing, ah, comedy, and performance. And other locations will be able to be chosen by 13 14 artists and arts organizations in consultation with 15 their local council member. All of the DCLA, ah, 16 recipients, ah, our five boroughs arts councils, and 17 all the individual artists who received grants 18 through the arts councils, ah, as well as other 19 organizations like comedy clubs can access and 20 participate in the program as long as they have a 21 sponsor, ah, among those 2000 arts organizations and 2.2 individual artists. This is incredibly important. 2.3 We've lost hundreds of thousands of jobs. Artists have been struggling to pay the rent and stay in New 24 York City. This is the first time that we are doing 25

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something for artists, for the cultural community, for all of those small theaters, all of those small performing arts venues have simply shut down in March and haven't been able to produce, and the artists who haven't been able to be paid for the art that they want to create and share with the world. So start March 1 we will see art, dance, music, performance, break out all over the City of New York, democratizing art, making sure that we're making better use of city streets, and, most importantly, putting artists back to work. I'm enormously proud of this bill. I want to thank, ah, the Speaker, Jason Goldman, my staff, ah, Jack Bronadavitz, this is his first piece of legislation that he's seen through to, ah, completion. My chief of staff, Matt Wallace, ah, our counsel, Brenda McKinney, who worked really hard on this, ah, Christie Dwyer, Aliah Ali, and all of those artists, and all of those advocacy organizations for the arts who pushed for this open culture program to happen. Ah, there is more to be This is just the beginning. But artists and art organizations you are seen, you are heard, we support you, and I can't wait for open culture to be a reality in New York City. Thank you very much.

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2 MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you so
3 much, Council Member Van Bramer. It's been an honor
4 to work with you on this legislation. At this time

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time begins.

I'd like to call on Council Member Carlos Menchaca.

COUNCIL MEMBER MENCHACA: Thank you, Majority Leader. The Flushing rezoning has falsely been presented today as a boost to the local economy and affordable housing. It is not. Spending 10 years on a bad plan doesn't make it a good plan. COVID has changed everything. At a time and place of extreme need this body, our City Council, will be and continuing to approve developments that help the rich at the great expense of our working families. It is egregious to argue that this rezoning is for the people of Flushing, when the community and advocates are saying the contrary. And up until a few days ago a couple unions were against it and standing in solidarity with the people. Well, congrats to them. In a neighborhood with the highest overcrowding rate in the city, this rezoning promises 1700 new apartments, only 3% of which will be affordable. That is a tenth of what would be required in MIH. This mayor promises to create new affordable housing

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problems around this project in the future. Well, 2 3 good luck taking that to any bank with public trust. 4 The community of Flushing is already severely rent burdened in a majority low- and moderate-income neighborhood, majority immigrant, thousands of whom 6 7 are seniors, exacerbating the rent burden means 8 creating a housing crisis and displacement. morning we just sat down with advocates on Stabilizing NYC where we're trying to fund programs 10 11 to support people that we're about to be displacing 12 in the future. Equally important, New York City's 13 waterfront should be publicly accessible. 14 rezoning will result in a, in a privately managed 15 waterfront with limited public access. Planning Commission, to no surprise, also failed to 16 17 conduct an adequate environmental review and has 18 disregarded community input. The environmental 19 factor is crucial to the community of Flushing. 20 Flushing Creek has one of the worse combined sewer 21 overflow problems in New York City. And the arrival of thousands of new residents will undoubtedly 2.2 2.3 exacerbate this unjust environmental burden. Nonetheless, I understand that employment crisis 24 facing our city and empathize with those to see this 25

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proposal as an opportunity to get back to work. But

it is a terrible deal that promises a short-term win

for some while creating a long-term crisis for an

existing community. The promise of good jobs is

important, yes. But it is and cannot be justified

while threatening the homes of thousands of people

barely hanging on to their communities today. The...

development that serves them, that creates
desperately needed stability and opportunity within
our communities. And that goes through a legitimate
environmental review process. I will be voting no
and I will be asking my colleagues to join. Thank

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you,

Council Member Carlos Menchaca. Mr. Parliamentarian,

PARLIAMENTARIAN: Yes, Madam Majority Leader. Council Member Barron.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time begins.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: Ah, thank you very much. I want to echo the comments made, made by

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my colleague, Council Member Menchaca, and to say if you look at the design of the project you will see that that waterfront area is in fact reserved for those who are in those apartments that are at market rate and above. So in addition to those things that were mentioned, we now have another barrier for those who are low income, which I believe is the majority of that, ah, district, to be able to have immediate view and access of that. But I did want to speak in terms of my project, 803 Rockaway Avenue. It is a project that is being, ah, constructed with light manufacturing on the ground level and apartment spaces above. I'm very pleased about it. It's also very significant to me because it faces a public school and it is a public school where I was a teacher for a dozen or so years and where I also served as the assistant principal. So I'm very familiar with the area, the community, the residents that are there. This project will have 174 units and you know what I'm gonna talk about. Affordable to the people who live in the community. And you may want to know what is that area median income for the neighborhood? It's about \$38,000. So I'm not supporting projects that are not affordable to the

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people who live there because that would be contributing to gentrification and displacing those people. So 35 of the units will be at 27% AMI, 28% of the units will be at 40% AMI, 10% of the units at 50% AMI, and 13%...

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time expired.

COUNCIL MEMBER BARRON: ... and 70% of the There will be no units higher than 70% of the AMI. This development will have, as I said, light AMI. manufacturing on the ground floor level and above that will be an outdoor space for the residents to be able to enjoy the outdoors in an area where they can look out and see what their children are doing or just relax themselves. It also includes 2500 square feet of community facility space. And the light manufacturing that is there that will be offered to small businesses will be offered at prices that are at least 20% below market rate. So we're talking about making this accessible to the people who actually live in the community. Ah, there will be the population that is invited to participate in this are veterans, seniors, those who are in need of support services, and those who are formerly homeless. We know we're in a pandemic, we know

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everyone has needs, but certainly this is a

population that has extreme needs and this is a

project that will address those needs of those

people. So I urge all of my colleagues to vote in

favor of this project. I want to all of those in

land use and all of those on the Speaker's staff and

my own staff that worked on getting this project to

this point. Thank you so much.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you,

Council Member Barron. And we will now hear from

Council Member Cornegy.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time begins.

COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Ah, thank you.

I want to speak on my, my bill, Intro 2033, which would allow the Department of Buildings to ensure interim certificates of occupancy before all the work in a building is completed and only a few units are still under construction this should not prevent finished apartments from being safely occupied. We need more housing in New York and this is a commonsense way to create housing with apartments that are already complete. This removes a technical hurdle that will help New Yorkers find a home. The

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building can be legally occupied. 2 Where a 3 certificate of occupancy cannot be issued because 4 there are outstanding concerns, DOB will issue a temporary certificate of occupancy. This temporary 5 certificate of occupancy, which is valid for 90 days, 6 indicates that the property is safe for occupancy, 7 8 but the outstanding concerns preventing the issuance of a final certificate of occupancy have not been resolved. After 90 days DOB must inspect the 10 property before a new temporary certificate of 11 12 occupancy can be issued. As a result, DOB is 13 required to repeatedly inspect properties with 14 temporary certificates of occupancy, placing a large 15 administrative burden on an already overworked agency. Proposed Intro 2033-A would allow DOB to 16 17 issue interim certificates of occupancy before all 18 the work in a building is completed, allowing safe 19 occupancy of specific floors, reducing the need for 20 repeated inspections before the final certificate of 21 occupancy can be issued. This bill does not apply to residential buildings with fewer than eight stories 2.2 2.3 or four dwellings, nonresidential buildings with fewer than five stories, mixed use buildings with 24 fewer than four dwellings, or park constructions.

This bill also requires the temporary certificates of
occupancy, including interim certificates of
occupancy, be posted in buildings. These temporary
and interim certificates of occupancy can be revoked
if they were issued in error or based on incorrect
information. Overall this bill creates a pragmatic
way for DOB and the private sector to allow for units
that are safe to be occupied while removing the
burden of unnecessary repeated inspections. Thank
you so much for everybody on the staff who's worked
on this bill. Ah, I appreciate it. I hope all of my
colleagues will sign on. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you. Mr. Parliamentarian, are there any other members who wish to speak at this time.

PARLIAMENTARIAN: No, Madam Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: At this time I would just like to say I recognize that everyone has very interesting, um, and important land use decisions that they have to make in their districts on an everyday basis. Um, everyone's district is very different. Land values are very different. Ah, the complexities of everyone's district is very

different. And whether it's Industry City in Council
Member Carlos Menchaca's district or it's in Flushing
in Council Member Koo's district, you both know your
districts well. You know them best. You were voted
by an overwhelming majority of the individuals in
your district to make the best decisions for your
district. And so I congratulate everyone here,
particularly Council Member Barron as well, who's
been able to produce extraordinary affordable
housing, um, in her community. So with that I would
then like to go on to the report of special

Majority Leader, for giving me the opportunity to speak briefly on two of my resolutions that we are voting on today. I call on the state legislature to repeal New York Penal Law Section 240.37, commonly known as the walking while trans ban. For years this law has been used by police officers to arbitrarily single out and arrest people suspected of prostitution and has specifically been used to discriminatorily target black and Latino trans communities. In my conversations over the last year with advocates and trans New Yorkers I heard countless stories of police officers going out into the streets to harass and arrest New Yorkers who are

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out with their friends in their neighborhoods. crime, a short skirt, a bra strap showing, tight pants, or simply an Adam's apple. It is unacceptable in 2020 that New York State still permits police to target New Yorkers solely for their gender expression and frankly their existence. The victims of this law, the majority of whom are arrested in just predominantly five black and brown police precincts, can face sexual assault and violence while incarcerated and even after their release the consequence of their arrest can have a lasting devastating effect. The walking while trans ban is one of only two violations in the entire state penal code that can never be sealed, meaning that victims can later be denied public housing, immigration renewals, or other benefits. This cannot be allowed to continue. Today's vote will send a clear signal to leaders in Albany that the removal of the section of the state penal code is a top priority for, for New Yorkers across the five boroughs. And I hope that after the deep public reckoning our nation has faced around police brutality and systemic racism this year the state legislature will act quickly to repeal the walking while trans ban. And ensure that

COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Thank you, Madam President, ah, and thank you to all my colleagues, Mr. Speaker, ah, for your kind wishes in advance of Hanukkah. Ah, I'll just be brief. Um, I've spoken on the floor about what I'm about to speak about nearly a year ago, ah, today, which was the first meeting of this year, ah, long before this [inaudible] because of everything that's been going on, and it seems like far longer ago than a year. Um, nearly 2200 years ago a very small band of Jews decided that, ah, the tyranny and the oppression of those who wished to, wished to obliterate our religion and to end our existence, ah, was no longer

2 going to be tolerated. It's a little surprising that 3 we find ourselves 2200 years nearly later, um, with 4 many of the same battles, perhaps not, ah, necessarily the same results, but the same battles. Two days ago in my neighborhood in Borough Park at 6 7 vehicle stopped at 6 in the morning at an 8 intersection. Ah, three gentlemen jumped out and chased a young teenage Hasidic boy down the street as he was about to go to yeshiva. Ah, in our community 10 11 yeshiva children go at approximately 6 in the 12 morning. Later that day I learned that that same car 13 did that six other times throughout the neighborhood that morning. That's just my recitation of one anti-14 15 Semitic incident, or I guess six, in the last 48 16 hours. I spoke about this last year. I'm gonna say 17 it again. The obligation on those of us who hold 18 public office and those in the media to watch their 19 words, to watch what they do in our communities, to 20 shine lights on us, lights of division, lights of 21 derision, lights of stain, that, ah, Jews don't

belong here, um, keeping in mind that the United

States is one of very few countries where Jews have

not been expelled in our history. And here we are

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2 today and the same thing is happening, and it's over
3 and it's over, Madam President, I'm about to go over.

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time expired.

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COUNCIL MEMBER YEGER: Um, ah, in the home of, of, you know, the greatest city in the world, ah, the place where, where we were guaranteed, ah, religious freedom, the place where people in my community and the Roman Catholic community had to go all the way up to the Supreme Court to get that religious freedom back and be [inaudible] Thanksqiving. Um, it's time to say enough is enough, and I sometimes feel that we're not saying that. I know that there are a number of members here who do very strongly say that. Um, but the reality is that the language we've seen in government in the last six or eight months, shining a light on my community, as not the victims of the coronavirus, but the creators or the spreaders or the perpetrators of the coronavirus. And weeks later we see it spreading all [inaudible] not a word is said about the religion or the ethnicity of the victims of the coronavirus in other neighborhoods. But when it's Orthodox Jews it's all over the place. You won't read a single

word, and I'm wrapping now, thank you, Madam
President, about the incident I spoke about a few
minutes ago in the New York Times. You won't. If it
happened to any other ethnicity anywhere else in the
city you would. But you won't because the victims
were Orthodox Jews. So, again, I wish you all a very
happy Hanukkah. I'm grateful for your friendship and
for your service and for your kind words to my
community, and to those who celebrate, Merry
Christmas, and a happy and healthy and wonderful
2021, and may God bless you all, and I'm very
grateful for your friendship. Thank you.

7	COUNCIL MEMBER CORNEGY: Um, I would
8	like, I would be remiss, um, I had a long list of,
9	ah, thank-yous and, and earlier and I was remiss in
10	not mentioning, um, those celebrating Hanukkah. Hav
11	a happy Hanukkah, especially in the hoods around
12	Brooklyn, all my, ah, ah, civic colleagues and
13	friends, ah, in Williamsburg, Borough Park, Crown
14	Heights, happy Hanukkah, enjoy.
15	MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you,
16	Council Member Cornegy. Are there any other members
17	at this time?
18	COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Majority Leader,
19	I, I have found my remarks.
20	MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Levin, you're
21	back.
22	COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: Thank you. Um, my
23	colleagues, ah, this week one of our, our neighbors
24	in New York City died on the street, likely due to

hypothermia from sleeping in the cold. It is the

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beginning of December, but, um, this was predictable. Um, once the governor ordered the subways to be shut down nightly for cleaning early in the pandemic, um, it, we, it became clear that, ah, many New Yorkers would not be able to have the refuge, um, those that are not living, that do not have a home, um, from the cold weather. And knowing that many sources of temporary shelter, such as libraries, hospital waiting rooms, etcetera, would also not be available, um, due to the restrictions put in place to combat the pandemic, the city has done little to prepare alternative solutions. We're all aware of, um, the controversy associated with the use of hotels, um, to give people experiencing homelessness, um, ah, safe refuge from, ah, the pandemic. Um, in the immediate, the governor should reopen the subway for 24-hour service and the city needs to implement a pandemic Code Blue response. We also need real solutions that include fewer police calls on people experiencing homelessness and more investment in supportive housing. Yesterday the campaign for New York, New York Housing, which is supportive housing, um, reported that the number of single adults sleeping shelters is higher than any time in history in New

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York City, with more than 20,000 single adults in shelter every night. We need to immediately prioritize permanent supportive housing development in addition to temporary housing. The General Welfare Committee will be holding a hearing on supportive housing this coming Monday, December 14, and so I encourage you all, um, to join us in this hearing so that we can, um, so we can shine a light on...

SERGEANT AT ARMS: Time expired.

COUNCIL MEMBER LEVIN: ...the city's and state's efforts, um, to support, ah, the, truly the most, most vulnerable New Yorkers at this most vulnerable time. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: Thank you.

Parliamentarian, are there any other members who wish to speak at this time?

PARLIAMENTARIAN: No, Madam Majority Leader.

MAJORITY LEADER CUMBO: I just want to close and continue to echo the sentiments of Council Member Barron, um, in lifting up our great honorable, the late great David Dinkins. I just remember in the 1990s as a teenager in Brooklyn, New York, going to

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Boys and Girls High School to see Nelson Mandela come to Brooklyn, New York after 27 years of being imprisoned and knowing that the Honorable David Dinkins played an instrumental role. He was a global leader. He raised his voice to end apartheid and he was synonymous with ending apartheid but also the lead-up to Nelson Mandela eventually becoming president of South Africa. Here in New York City he continued to be a leader by shattering those glass ceilings and becoming the first African American mayor of the City of New York with such projects as expanding and revitalizing Times Square, the Billie Jean Tennis Center, the Safe Streets Safe City program. He built more affordable housing than his successor did in two terms following him. He was a dynamic leader, an incredible role model, and because of him we are all here in this body. This is one of the most diverse city councils in the entire country and it is because of him, because we believe that we can dream that much bigger because of his legacy, and it's because of him that we have so many firsts in New York State, such as Attorney General Leticia James, Public Advocate Jumaane Williams, we have our first black African American borough president in

2	Eric Adams, the first district attorney African
3	American Ken Thompson, then followed by, ah, the
4	great Eric Gonzalez. We have district attorney from
5	the Bronx, Darcel Clark, Speaker Carl Hasty, County
6	Leader, the Kings County County Leader is Ranish
7	Bishot. We have three majority leaders, African
8	American women, Andrea Stewart Cousins, Crystal
9	People Stotes, and myself. We have Congress Member
10	Hakim Jeffries, the Democratic Conference leader. We
11	have Congress Member Yvette Clark, the only African
12	American woman representing in New York State in the
13	House of Representatives. There are so many firsts
14	and I could go on and on and on. I'm looking at one
15	such as Council Member Debbie Rose, first African
16	American woman elected in the Borough of Staten
17	Island, and the list just continues. It's because of
18	Mayor Dinkins that we have a President Barack Obama.
19	He's shattered so many ceilings and caused us to
20	believe that we can be whatever it is that we truly
21	want to be, and we thank you for his courage. Our
22	condolences go out to the entire Dinkins family on
23	the loss of Mayor Dinkins and [inaudible] fondly
24	referred to her as Joyce as his bride. You are going
25	to be missed. You set a strong precedent. We love

you. And thank you for always coming up to the steps
of City Hall, even in your nineties, to fight for the
issues that mattered most to everyday New Yorkers.
How many of us can say at the age of 90 we will
continue this fight, we will continue this struggle,
and we will continue to be out here when the people
call. Thank you so much. And I will now turn this
meeting over to Speaker Corey Johnson to close
today's Stated Meeting.

Majority Leader. We continue to hold, ah, Council
Member Ampry-Samuel and her family in our thoughts
and prayers. Moving, I didn't know it was, ah,
Council Member Ayala's anniversary, but I love her
husband and I love her and I'm really happy for them.
And, ah, the Stated Meeting of December 10 is hereby
adjourned. Thank you.
