2	Whereas the Council of the City of
3	New York is very proud to honor and congratulate
4	the Mount St. Michael Academy Mountaineers for
5	their shared victory on Thanksgiving Day 2009, and
6	Whereas the Mount St. Michael
7	Academy Mountaineers overcame a slow start to win
8	28-22 over their very challenging rival Cardinal
9	Hays for the CHSFL Class AA Title, this feat was
10	not only a triumph in the face of a formidable foe
11	but a triumph in the midst of grief. Shortly
12	before the playoffs the Mountaineers lost Kyle
13	Rembert, a great friend and teammate, through an
14	unexpected death from carbon monoxide poisoning,
15	and
16	Whereas with the guidance of Coach
17	Mario Valentini, the All Bronx Manhattan Football
18	Coach of the Year, the Mountaineers were able to
19	focus on the task at hand while dedicating the
20	remainder of their season to Kyle. And they went
21	unbeaten from that point on. Together they
22	rallied to win their four final games and the
23	school's first CHSFL AA Title with a Turkey Bowl
24	victory over Cardinal Hays, and

2	was truly an event for gratitude on many levels.
3	For just over a week the Mountaineers gathered
4	their best spirit and effort and went on to win
5	two very challenging football games against two
6	great teams. The parents of the Xavier and St.

of duty. While servicing corner litter baskets,
Sanitation Worker Justich was struck and pinned by
a tractor trailer at the intersection of $35^{\mathrm{th}}$
Street and Ditmars Boulevard in Astoria.
Sanitation Worker Justich was an 11-year veteran
of the department and was assigned to the Queens
West District One garage. In the near future the
garage will be renamed in his memory and honor.
Sanitation Commissioner John Doherty in a
Statement mourning Frankie's death reminded all
New Yorkers that sanitation workers perform a
dangerous and essential job helping to keep New
York City safe and clean.
Sanitation Worker Justich is
survived by his wife, Stacey, their two daughters,
Faith and FeliCity, ages 4 and 1, his mother,
Patricia and over 75 immediate family members.
The funeral was held this past Monday at St.
Luke's Roman Catholic Church in Whitestone. He is
the tenth sanitation worker to have fallen in the
line of duty since 2002.

Now as some of you may recall two years ago our green leader, Jim Gennaro, was featured in an environmental documentary on renewable and alternative energy entitled <u>Fuel</u>, and it won the best documentary at the 2008 Sundance Film Festival.

SPEAKER QUINN: And I'm sure Jim's role played no small part in that very important The film featured Jim's and this Council's award. efforts to advance environmentally sustainable And just two years later, now, Jim has biofuels. put the work of this Council in another environmental documentary that appeared last week at Sundance. The film entitled Gas Land, I'm not really sure if we should take that as an insult or not by Jim but entitled Gas Land documents the risk to drinking water supplies from the outrageous gas drilling method known as hydraulic fracturing that is sweeping the northeast United States including a proposal to have it happen in a broad swathe of New York which we are aggressively fighting with Jim's leadership. Jim's also been

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featured in a lot of national news programs about this.

And as folks know the Council passed a resolution sponsored by Jim last November calling for our water supply to be protected from hydraulic fracturing. Gas Land features footage shot right here in the chamber, that's unfortunate 'cause it's such a dumpy room, from several Environmental Protection Committee oversight hearings on this topic that ultimately led to the passage of Reso 1850-A. And no surprise here, last Sunday at the Sundance Awards ceremony, Gas Land took the documentary prize. So two documentaries featured Jim Gennaro, two documentaries won Best Documentary of the Year at Sundance, so congratulations Jim.

SPEAKER QUINN: Autographs and paparazzi later. Now. I just detailed Jim's leadership in the area of film but we also have a bit of an author amongst us. You may not know but 50 years ago an ambitious 18-year old Harvard freshman mimeographed a 20-page pamphlet to be given out on student charter flights. The early

Let's Go guides, advised travelers on motor biking through southeast Asia and how to finance travel in Europe by singing in the street.

The first edition included tips on traveling from Europe to Asia for just \$.04. As of 2010 there are now over 50 Let's Go travel guides in the Let's Go series. And last week a ceremony commemorating the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of that first guide was held at Harvard University.

And I am proud that a member of our Council is that former 18-year old Harvard student, a member of the Class of 1962 and he's here with us today, our own Oliver Koppell.

It's important to note they're only eligible for it until they are 21. After that they lose that

option entirely which will dramatically, maybe irreversibly, impact their ability to stay in this City and country. In addition by not getting that status in a timely and orderly way, they lose out on their options for summer youth jobs, for internships, for participation in financial aid at CUNY and SUNY.

And our job, if we're really going to make this a City that is truly diverse, a City that honors immigrants it to make sure that these children get access to this status and that the Administration for Children Services does their job in a better way than they've been doing it.

We believe there are hundreds of children who fall into this category and we want to make sure they are getting greater attention from the Administration for Children Services. So I just wanted to highlight that one Introduction and that concludes Communications from the Speaker, Mr.

Reso number 6 I'm introducing today represents the

Council's chance to stand united in opposition to

our City being used as a venue for trials of the

September 11<sup>th</sup> terrorists. Now I'm not the first

elected official to oppose the federal

government's initial proposal to hold the trials

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within our City borders but this Resolution is an opportunity for the elected representatives of more than 8 million New Yorkers to say that for this federal trial, we refuse the burden, we refuse the cost and we refuse the potential threat to our City's security.

Although the plan to conduct the terror trials in New York City is symbolic and significant in its own way, bringing terrorists to justice in the City they attacked, it is also reckless. The burden of protecting our residents will fall on the NYPD whose headcount continues to go down. Asking a smaller police force to do more makes no sense and can only come at the expense of less police coverage throughout the rest of the City.

NYPD to keep us and our streets safe but we question the wisdom of putting such strains on a smaller department and on the finances of the City. In terms of both budget and security the City cannot afford to be the venue for these trials. So I invite you to join me, Council Member Nelson, Council Member Vallone, Council

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Member Chin and other Council Members to send a
message, loud and clear, to the federal
government, New York City is the wrong place for
these trials.

However in the event that this burden is placed on our police forces, the federal government which has pledged funding that will constitute just a fraction of the cost of the 5-year trial must fully and immediately bear the financial cost of ensuring that our City is kept safe. That is what our resolution says and I ask you to sign on.

I'm also introducing today a bill,
Intro number 10, to protect our children and other
individuals from adverse health effects of air
pollution. The bill would require the Department
of Transportation to monitor the air quality
outside our schools and parks so I ask you to sign
on to that Intro also. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Thank you very much. We've been joined by Council Member
Tom White. We need your vote for today's agenda.

I'd like to remind the members to please assist us as we try to avert the MTA budget cuts that are scheduled to take place. The City Council has launched a petition drive which is on our website and there are petitions available to all members.

We're aiming to do the best we can.

and I want to say that we've come up with a plan to avert the cut. We did an email reminder to all members yesterday, the Speaker and myself, indicating that the MTA does not have to make these cuts. And we've come forth with a plan identifying resources from stimulus money that can be used to avert the service cuts that the MTA has planned.

In the days ahead there will be public hearings, basically in early March that the MTA will be holding and I hope that all members will rally their respective districts to come to these public hearings. The impact on train and

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bus service, the impact on express bus service, the modifications to Access-A-Ride, the change or the elimination of bus routes and train routes, and of course the elimination of Metro Cards all have to be on our radar as we move ahead. And I hope the members realize that this has become a quite serious situation.

I thank the Speaker and the Council for their leadership and as Chair of the Transportation Committee; I know we will be successful in our efforts. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: All right.

Thank you very much. Before we move onto the next member, let me just read out the new adopted votes. All items on today's general order calendar were adopted by a vote of 50 in the affirmative, 0 in the negative with 0 abstentions however with the exception of Land Use item 1 and Reso 19 which was adopted by a vote of 48 in the affirmative, 1 in the negative, 1 abstention.

And Land Use items 6, 11 and 12 and their companion resolutions which were adopted by a vote of 49 in the affirmative, with 1 in the negative and 0 abstentions. And the revised Land

And next we have Council Member Al Vann.

Majority Leader. I ask my colleagues to sign on to Reso 17 and Intro 26. Very important, please listen up. Reso 17 calls on the State Legislature and the Governor to enact legislation to allow community development financial institutions including credit unions, savings banks and federal saving and loans associations to accept and secure deposits from municipal corporations.

New York is one of the few States that prohibits the deposit of public funds into these traditionally local community banks. This has given commercial banks a virtual monopoly over the deposits of local governments throughout the State. At a time when major commercial banks have decreased lending in neighborhood throughout the City, our community development banks have been a virtual lifeline to small businesses struggling to find capital and provide much needed banking and financial services to low income people living in

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traditionally under-banked communities.

Allowing these institutions to accept municipal deposits will strengthen the communities they serve by offering competition and providing an alternative to commercial banks who have no significant relationship in many instances to the community they serve.

I'm encouraged to note that both
the Mayor and Speaker Quinn will be working with
our State leaders to change this antiquated law.
I understand Mayor Bloomberg recently pledged in
the State of the City Address to strengthen
neighborhood-friendly credit unions by depositing
\$25 million in City tax dollars in these federally
insured and regulated credit unions. Excuse me.

I also ask that you sign on to

Intro 26, also very important. This bill will

make significant changes to the City's water lien

sales to help protect our homeowners, particularly

seniors who are in jeopardy of losing their homes

for unpaid water bills. Thank you very much.

Please sign on these two very significant pieces

of legislation.

Majority Leader Rivera. I--Council Member Cabrera and I have introduced two resolutions today regarding the summer jobs program. And in case you're not aware, the Governor's proposed budget for summer jobs is zero. Not a penny, not a plugged nickel, zilch, zip, nada, nothing. As a result of which the Mayor's proposed budget for the summer job program will lay off 35,000 children in the City of New York.

jobs. This year we're slated for 17,000, a number that should be an embarrassment to the City of New York. I don't have to preach to this choir because I know this Council has stood up every time for summer jobs for our kids. It is the very dictionary definition of an economic stimulus program. Money that's spent almost immediately in our communities for food, clothing, school supplies.

We'll be holding a hearing of the Youth Services Committee on February  $12^{\rm th}$  on both

of these Resolutions. I urge all of my colleagues in a show of force to sign on to these Resolutions and to attend that hearing on the morning of the 12<sup>th</sup> to send a message to Albany, send a message to Washington that we will not abandon our summer jobs program. And if we don't fight for it in February, there'll be no summer jobs in July.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Thank you very much. Seeing no others, oh, Council Member Landers.

I just wanted to say that I was honored to have played a small role in my first meeting as the Chair of the Subcommittee on Landmarks, Public Siting and Maritime Uses in the preservation of a great set of buildings today that reflect really some of the tremendous and diverse character and history of the City of New York. Council Member Williams mentioned Lamartine Place historic district which tends to Abolitionist history and

which was attacked during the draft riots.

The Isaac T. Hopper home which was one of the first buildings created by the Women's Prison Association, the Aschenbroedel Verein Building also known today as the La Mama Experimental Theater. And the Vanderzee-Harper Historic house on Staten Island, showing that we're really thinking broadly about where history and culture needs to be preserved and treasured in New York City. I just wanted to say thanks to my colleagues and to the many people that had a hand in this great set of designations. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: Thank you. Seeing no other--ah, Council Member James.

Thank you.

Although I applaud Mayor Bloomberg for recognizing and highlighting the plight of young African

American and Latino men throughout New York City,

I feel strongly that is simply not enough to speak of the symptoms that plague these young men without addressing some of the root causes.

COUNCIL MEMBER JAMES:

I urge the Mayor to expand his view to a broader scope that encompasses a bolder vision for change focusing on support and

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sustenance for the family structure including but not limited to the development of more living wage jobs; a Citywide paid sick leave policy; subsidies that finance the retention and growth of manufacturing and industrial enterprises; specifically those committed to green industry development; preservation of existing affordable housing and creation of new affordable housing for low and moderate income families and those that are homeless; academic and athletic programs that focus on human development with parental involvement led by culturally sensitive mentors and teachers; expansion of alternatives to incarceration and striking a general tone in the NYPD to respect the growth and human development of young Black and Latino individuals; and capital jobs to rebuild the infrastructure of New York City targeting structurally unemployed communities.

And in that I urge all of my colleagues to sign on two pieces of legislation that I have sponsored. One focusing on youth violence and commissioning a study to come up with some recommendations. And the other basically

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provides for some job opportunities for young
African American and Latino men or all young men
and women throughout the City of New York.

I also want to thank Council Member
Comrie on another note as we celebrate Black
History Month for his wonderful press conference
today which talked about the intentional
discrimination of FDNY in the City of New York and
specifically the Mayor of the City of New York and
his indifference to discrimination which was not
only documented by the federal courts but also by
the Justice Department of the United States of
America.

It's time that we stop appealing these decisions and that in fact we work together collaboratively with the Vulcan [phonetic] Society and all people of conscience to address the inherent discrimination which is pervasive in FDNY. Thank you.

MAJORITY LEADER RIVERA: All right.
