8	of a former slave, Percy Sutton worked his way
9	through college and law school. As a decorated
10	veteran, Percy Sutton served with the legendary
11	Tuskegee Airmen during World War II and again in
12	the Air Force during the Korean War. As a lawyer
13	he was a civil rights activist. As the longest
14	serving Manhattan Borough President, Percy Sutton
15	encouraged and mentored so many young African
16	American politicians and he always stressed the
17	need to build coalitions across ethnic lines.
18	When David Dinkins was elected the City's first
19	Black mayor he proudly stated I stand on the
20	shoulders of Percy Ellis Sutton. Percy Sutton's
21	funeral and burial is being held today and our
22	thoughts and prayers go out to his family, loved
23	ones, friends and admirers.
24	COUNCIL MEMBER BREWER: Point of
25	clarification before the moment of silence. Let's

2	acknowledge him for being a leader and not pigeon
3	hole him to African Americans, he set the tone for
4	this city and this nation as a leader and a man.
5	Thank you.

9	thousands of full day pre-Kindergarten spaces for
10	our City's youngest students. This legislation
11	led by Christine Quinn made it a priority to
12	connect hungry New Yorkers to accessible and
13	healthier food options.

15	Speaker Quinn secured 18,000 new bulletproof vests
16	for the New York City's men and women in blue.
17	And when the Police Academy classes were
18	cancelled, Christine Quinn and this Council drew a
19	line in the sand and made sure we hired 500 new
20	cadets over the past 5 fiscal years.
21	This Speaker and this Council also
22	mandated for the first time ever reporting of race
23	in police involved shootings. This Council led by
24	Christine Quinn created important protections
25	against harassment and intimidation at our City's

14	the floor and Blacks sit in the balcony.

18	So as I rise to announce my nomination, my

23	Howard Washington used that as a campaign slogan
24	as he became the first Black mayor of Chicago.
25	It's our turn now. 62% of this
